Muleshoe All-District Players Lead List

Muleshoe led the list in 3-AA with All-District football players chosen this week.

Nine Muleshoe Mules were named to the All-District offensive and defensive teams, two of them by unanimous choice.

On offense, Mike Northcutt, a five-eleven, 165 pound junior, was named quarterback.

Fullback honors went to Jeep Shanks, a 5' 9", 170 pound senior.

Dickie Sudduth, a 6 ft, 175 pound senior was named center and Terry

Shafer, 6'3", 190 pounds, and a senior was named lineman.

Defensive players included Charles Briscoe, 6-1, 175 pounds and a senior, at safety.

Corner honors went to a 6 ft, 170 pound senior Brent Burrows; Sam Whalin was a unanimous choice as linebacker. He is 5-10, 185 pounds and a junior.

James Atwood, at 5-11, 165 pounds, and a junior, was also unanimous choice for lineman.

Receiving honorable mention were Mark Harmon for linebacker. He is 5-9, 165 pounds and a senior; also, Zeke Pecina, for running back, a 5-8, 150 pound junior.

Muleshoe had nine players on the All-District team; Littlefield had seven; Olton, five; Dimmitt, four; Friona, three and Morton, one.

Players on the offensive team from Littlefield included Eddie Gregory, quarterback; Rudolph Smith, running back; Ron Martin, receiver and Richard Soria, lineman.

Littlefield's defensive players included Ron Martin, corner; Dale Demel, linebacker and Richard Soria, lineman.

From Dimmitt, offensive player was Dennis Veals, running back; and defensive players from Dimmitt included Jack Stewart, punter; Dennis Veals, safety and Norris Cole, lineman.

Olton's offensive players included Danny Garcia, running back and Steven Rose, lineman; along with kicker, Brad Allcorn.

Defensive players for Olton were Vance Stroebel, safety and Genio Garcia, lineman.

Kevin Kothman was named tight end from Friona and Jeff Peak, lineman on the offensive team; with Kevin Kothman named linebacker on the defensive team.

Morton placed Mike Hensto as a lineman on the defensive team.

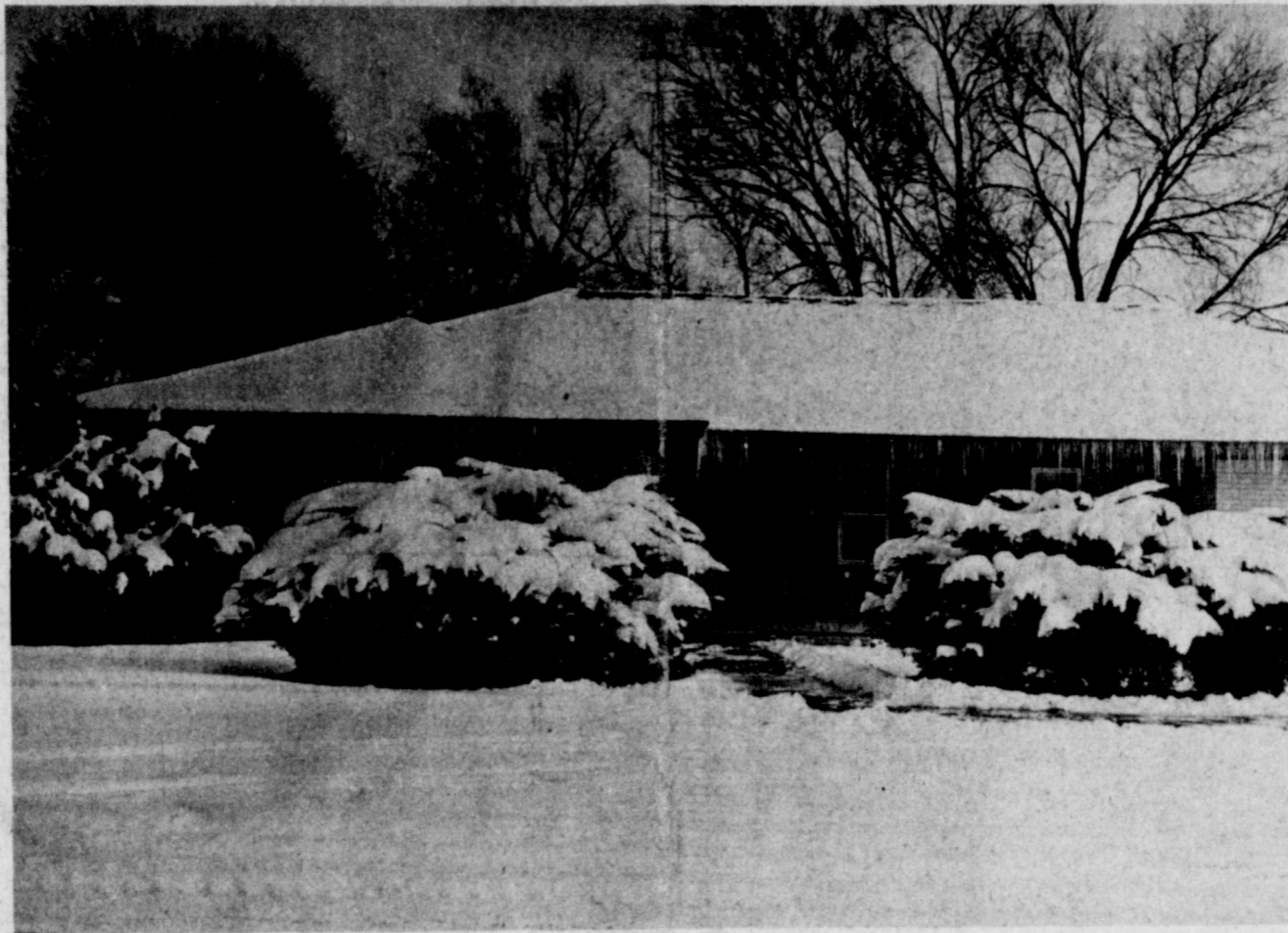
Contributions Are Talled From March

Terry Young announced late last week that the final figures for this year's victory march of the Bailey County Arthritis Foundation are in. OH, IT'S GETTING TO BE MORE LIKE CHRISTMAS... Totally unpredicted as to accumulation, with only light snow again predicted, the area was unprepared for the more than five inches of snow, accompanied by a brisk, bitterly cold wind that slammed its way through the area late in the week. Most homes were festooned with snow, and the accompanying icicles, such as the home of Rev. and Mrs. J.E. Meeks. Only a slight thaw was noted during the day Friday, as partly cloudy skies during Friday afternoon kept a warm sun from shining.

Temperature Drops And Harvest Stops

Late Wednesday, a cold, bitter wind ushered in sand and snow, to announce the latest winter storm to come blasting out of an Arctic cold front edging its way through the area.

By early Thursday morning, after intermittent snow all Wednesday night, the snow settled in for real, and with the temperature hovering around the 25 degree mark for the day, snow continued to fall.

Although school buses had made their routes before the heavy snow started falling, school was dismissed at 2 p.m., so buses could make their routes before dark.

The sudden snow, which fell on sleet and freezing rain from earlier in the night also kept the Muleshoe City Police and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers busy checking accidents.

Numerous accidents occurred as residents failed to make allowances for the extra slick streets and went slipping and sliding around.

Between 8 - 8:30 a.m. Thursday, three accidents were investigated in various parts of town, with additional minor fender-benders not being reported to the police.

Also during the noon hour, additional accidents occurred, as did others on the highways near Muleshoe.

A small sports car overturned approximately eight miles southeast of Muleshoe on Highway 84, sending the driver to the hospital for treatment of minor injuries.

Cuts, scrapes and bruises also marked other minor injuries reported in some of the accidents, most not requiring medical treatment.

Four miles south of Muleshoe on Highway 214, a car skidded off the highway and into a tree approximately a mile north of Muleshoe on Highway 214, a collision occurred between a stationwagon and a butane truck. Then, approximately 12 miles east of Muleshoe on Highway 70, a pickup overturned.

Water Seminar Slated Monday For Producers

Campbell Irrigation plans a special water management seminar at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow (Monday) in the Bailey County Civic Center/Coliseum meeting room.

Roy Nelson, water management specialist with Lockwood Corporation, Gering Neb. will speak on "Water and Plant Relationship" and "Conserving Energy and Water" and "Increased Yield."

Nelson said, "Overwatering can hurt a crop as much as underwatering, and especially in this part of the country, overwatering can leach out fertilizer from a plant's root system."

Nelson said that through Water Management, "It has been proven to increase crop yield and profits."

Explained will be precise information on when to irrigate, and how much, to achieve maximum crop yields and profits.

Following his presentation, Nelson plans a question and answer session and will attempt to answer all watering questions. He will also be available to answer questions at Campbell Irrigation on Tuesday, December 12.

There is no charge for the seminar and all farmers who irrigate, or plan to irrigate will be welcome to attend the seminar.

Conservation Will Meet In Lubbock

The Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, will meet December 11, 1978 for their regular monthly meeting.

One item of importance will be the Board issuing a call for the order of the election to be held January 20, 1979. The election is being held to elect two members to the Board of Directors from Director's Precincts Three and Four, and to elect two county committeemen each from the counties of Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Potter and Randall. Director's Precinct Three covers Bailey, Castro and Parmer Counties with Precinct Four composed of Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall Counties. In a related action the Board will consider appointing M.L. McGehee to serve out the unexpired term of Leslie Adams on the Armstrong County Committee. Adams, who's term expires in 1981, resigned after moving out of the District area.

The Directors will also consider continuing the District's membership in the Groundwater Management Districts Association and Water, Inc., will consider the building of a storage facility onto the back of the District office building; will consider what holidays to close the District office in 1979 and will consider sponsoring a science fair for high school students to be held March 9 and 10, 1979.

Also on the agenda will be consideration of information pertaining to violation of the District's Rules concerning well spacing and uncapped wells in reference to wells on land owned by Clifford Hamilton of Bailey Co.

Pet Owners Given Warning On Leash Law

If you like your pet, and plan to keep it, Muleshoe City Police Chief Johnny Richards suggests you keep the pet at home, take care of it and see that it is fed properly.

He said that because of the numerous complaints coming in about frequent violations of the dog leash law, he is rescheduling the hours of the animal warden where he will be working some nighttime hours.

Chief Richards explained that many persons turn their dogs loose after returning home from work in the evening, and reminds that the Muleshoe leash law, requires animals to be confined or on a leash 24-hours a day.

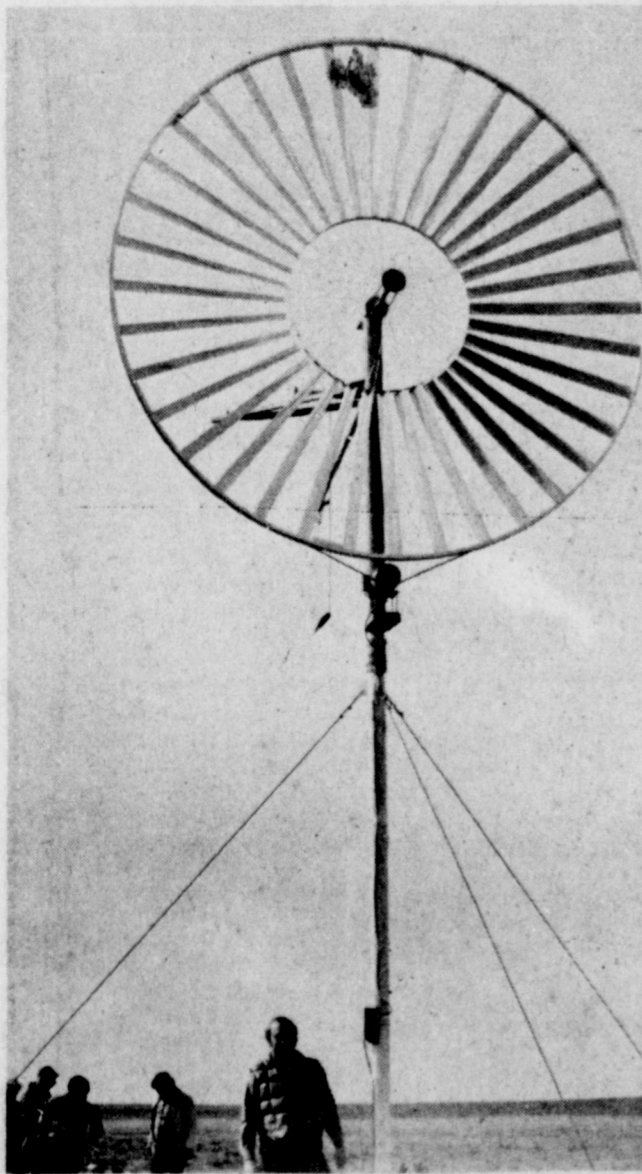
He said violators will be issued a summons to appear before Municipal Judge Linda Huckaby in the crackdown on the leash law violations.

**EASTERN ZONE OPENS
FOR CRANE HUNTING**

Both zone A and zone B areas are now open for the taking of sandhill cranes with ample populations of birds reported on area lakes.

Zone B opened Dec. 5 and the season for cranes will continue in both zones through Jan. 31, 1979. The daily bag limit of three cranes along with other rules are the same in both zones.

Reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service managers indicate a good population of cranes on the South Plains.

Muleshoe refuge near Muleshoe reported 17,300 cranes and Grulla refuge across the New Mexico line reported 36,000 birds.

The Lamesa area lakes are holding approximately 25,000 birds, down somewhat over last year at this time. Brownfield and Tahoka lakes are holding approximately 20,000 cranes scattered over area.

Crane hunters are required a crane permit to hunt the birds in both zones and those hunters who have not tried their luck and want to obtain a free crane permit, can do so by calling toll free 1-800-252-9327 and give name, address and county of residence for each permit requested.

Regulations pertaining to duck and goose hunters also apply for crane hunters including restrictions on shotguns, shooting hours and methods of hunting. A crane hunter is not required a duck stamp to hunt crane, but many hunters in the field will find ducks and geese in the same general area and a duck stamp is required for these species.

**LAKE TEXOMA
STRIPER POTENTIAL
RECORD**

A 32 lb. 12 oz. striper

was caught Nov. 20 off Preston Point by David Cole of Cole Construction Company in Denison and the fish could be a record.

If the fish is certified by the State Records Committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, it will be the third time in the last 13 months the record has been topped.

The new potential record striper measures 38 1/2 inches in length and 24 1/2 inches in girth. It is the first record fish to be caught above the dam in the lake.

Two Texas lakes, Texoma and Toledo Bend, have been producing these record fish since 1974. The former record striper was caught in Toledo Bend and weighed 30 lb. 6 oz.

As more Texas anglers fish for the stripers in state lakes, it will not be long before the record will again be broken with an excellent chance the fish will come from either Texoma or Toledo Bend.

**A CODE FOR
RESPONSIBLE
TRAPPING**

Trapping has been recognized as an efficient means of harvesting fur bearers and controlling predators when it is conducted according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department rules.

Trappers can enhance their welcome on private property by following some of the unwritten rules such as: avoid setting traps in areas where domestic animals may be caught; check their traps regularly, preferably in the early morning; dispose of animal carcasses properly so as not to offend others; assist farmers, ranchers and other landowners who are having problems with predators; support strict enforcement of regulations set by Texas.

Getting permission from the landowner to trap appears to be the most important item on the list of any responsible trapper.

**Cattle Brands
To Be Burned
In Stairway**

The search continues throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include in another chapter of their history by "burning 'em in" Texas A&M University's "Branded Stairway".

L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,500 brands, or more are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center.

"County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels." Maddox, Texas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said. "We now have slightly more than 500 burned in."

There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record.

The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle.

"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughout Texas," Butler said.

Application of the brands

was initiated last June during a meeting of directors of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. Officials of other livestock groups also are being invited for a "branding party".

Maddox said that branding ceremonies also will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded." This probably will be about next April 2-3 when the annual Texas Animal Agriculture Conference is staged at Texas A&M.

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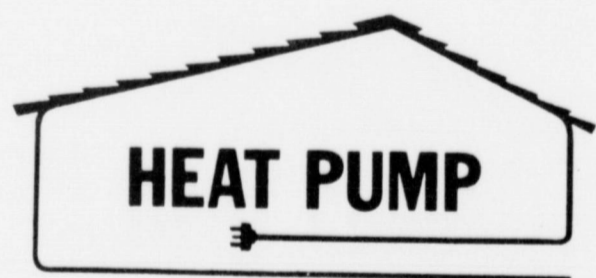

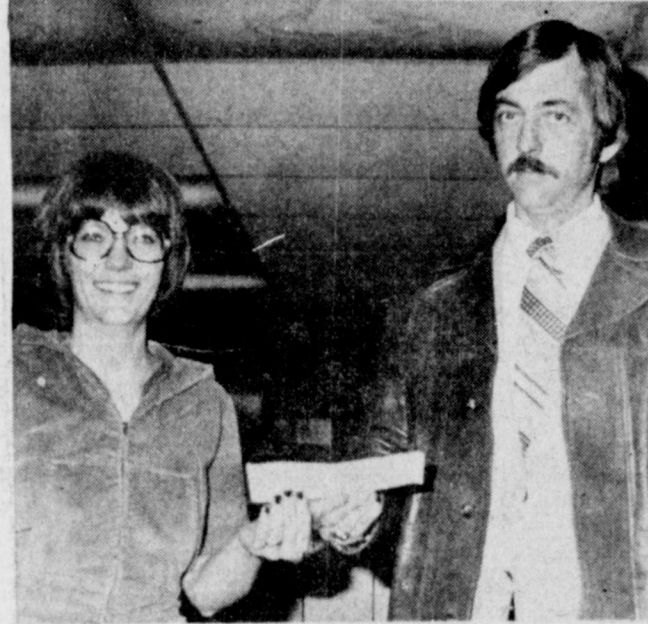

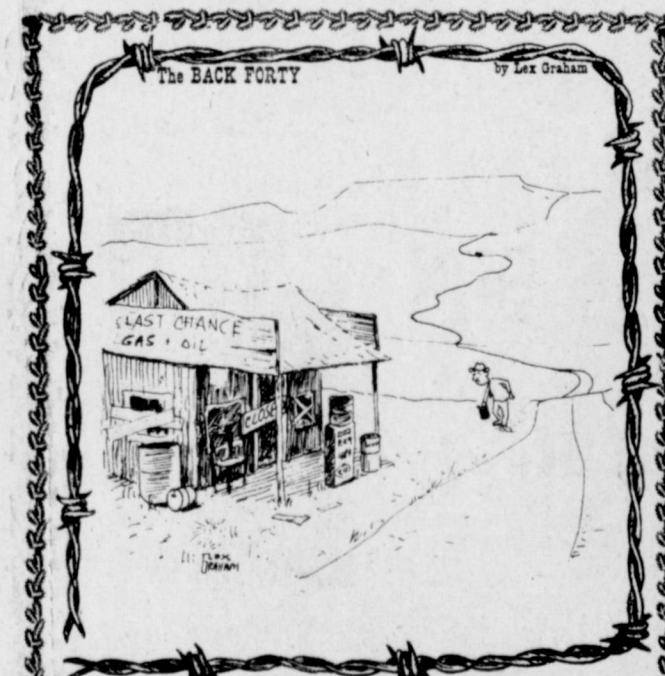
Health Fair Planned For January 13

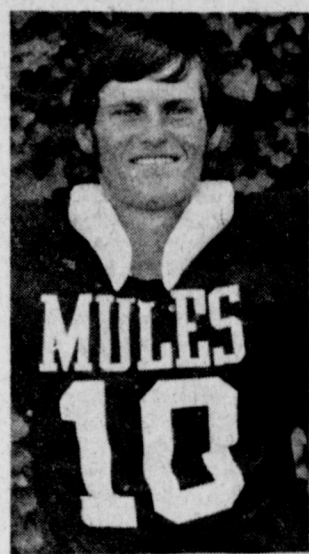
The Freshmen record is now one win and one loss. Their next game will be Monday, December 11, against Littlefield in the Muleshoe Junior high gym.

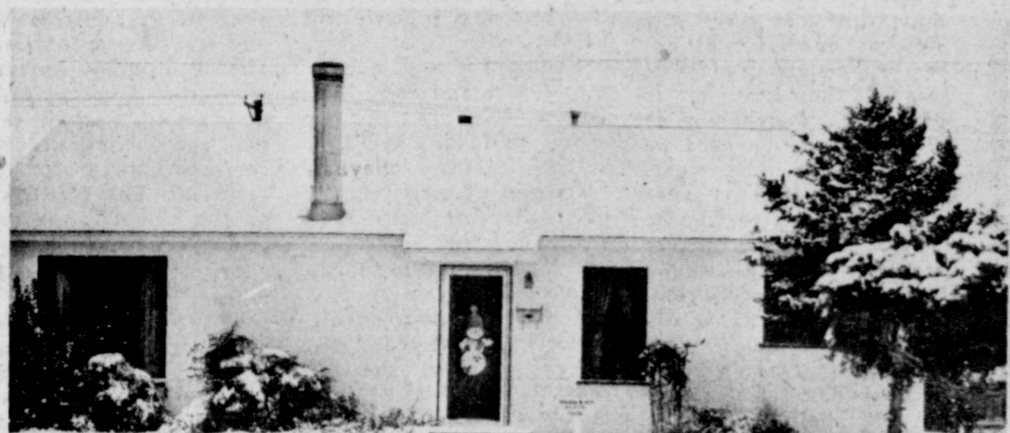

the morning. It was estimated that approximately five inches of snow fell Thursday and an additional inches Friday morning. Late Friday, some thaw had started, although partly cloudy skies were noted, along with a prediction for possibly more snow. Muleshoe and Dimmitt apparently formed the beginning and ending point for a narrow band of snow which accumulated. Other locations reported from one to four inches total snowfall.

National Weather Service predicted the temperature would fall to around the 0 point for Friday night, after reaching the 30s during the day Friday. Early Friday morning, a low 5 degrees was reported in Muleshoe.

Saturday, the temperature was expected to reach the low 40s keeping travel advisories in effect as the gradual temperature rise would not enhance 'fast' melting of the snow accumulation.

USDA Guidelines Ignoring Advice

United States Department of Agriculture has shown a disregard for the cattle industry's wishes when it adopted new guidelines for improving department regulations. Don C. King, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association secretary-general manager, said November 22.

"Although USDA had asked for industry suggestions on how to improve the process of creating new regulations, its final report shows that virtually none of the suggestions were taken. Instead of making the rule-making

process simpler and easier to understand, USDA has maintained its past course of making the process more complicated and more burdensome. In short, USDA has given us a formula for more complicated procedures for producing regulations instead of its stated goal of simplifying the decision-making process," King said.

USDA began the revision of its rule-making process after President Carter directed all his executive agencies to "improve regulations." USDA asked for suggestions from industry groups like TSCRA, but in the end, it seemed to incorporate none of the suggestions into the new procedures, King said.

In presenting suggestions for improving the rule-making process, TSCRA has asked that "the rule-making process should be responsive to public opinion, free from decision-making of administrators and bureaucrats, conscious of the interests of Congress and, most of all, simple and understandable to the average citizen."

King also said that "We are adamantly against misuse of public tax monies through subsidizing agency - desired testimony from specific individuals or groups." Paying for testimony from witnesses led to the resignation of Robert Angelotti, administrator of USDA's Food and Safety and Quality Service on August 4.

"Despite our suggestions," King said, "USDA agreed to continue paying witnesses for expenses incurred when giving testimony. And we feel sure that expenses will be paid with public tax money only when testimony supports the USDA official position." "We asked for a rule-making process that the public could have a hand in, one that would be responsive to the needs of the persons that USDA serves. But instead, it maintains its position of keeping all decision-making processes within the bureaucracy."

"We asked for less duplication among agencies, but the department has seen fit to increase the paperwork between agencies which will only increase duplication and waste of public tax money." "And we asked for regulations that would be easy to understand and still follow the intent of stations to agency administrators -- the same bureaucrats who are responsible for the jargon that regulations are written in now."

King said that the newly adopted guidelines are in direct contradiction to President Carter's executive order to "improve regulations."

"If organizations are willing to go to the time and trouble of wading through USDA's past rules and regulations in order to make suggestions on how

to improve future and existing regulations, then USDA should be more responsive to these organizations' recommendations. Perhaps then public money would not be needed to produce a new rule-making process that in effect is more complicated than the old one. Apparently USDA's request for industry comments was more 'window dressing' than sincere interest for industry input," King said.

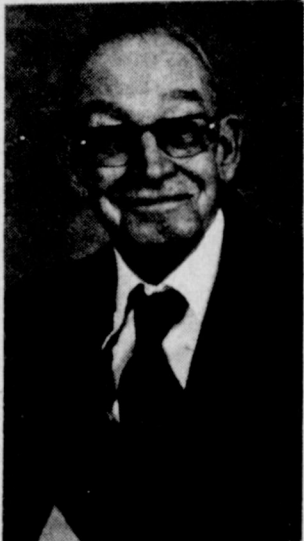
