'YOU LIE,' ROARS PROBER, COUNSEL SMILES

Continued New Oil Production Gives Added Zest to Drilling

REPUBLICANS SEE THE SKIES FALLING ON 'EM

Oil and Graft Scandal and Tax Reduction Worry Them Greatly.

Special. WASHINGTON, March 21.—One of the amazing things in connection with the Teapot Dome scandal is the seemingly deliberate policy of official Republicanism to discredit the revelations in one way or another and stand by the Republicans who have been besmirched. The Republican national committee gave the cue for this plan of defending the persons involved in the scandal and of defying public opinion.

John T. Adams, chairman, and George B. Lockwood, secretary, of the Republican national committee, organ of the Republican party, to uphold Daugherty and Denby and Fall while attacking Senators Walsh, Wheeler and others who have been conspicuous in exposing corruption in the Harding-Coolidge administration. Apparently President Coolidge is influenced by this attitude and strategy, since he made a fight for Denby and Daugherty almost exactly along the lines followed by the Republican national committee.

Minimizing the Scandal. Republicans in official positions in Washington are members of one of the Republican state clubs organized and controlled by the Republican national committee. These clubs are federated into a League of Republican State Clubs. Edgar C. Snyder is president of this league of clubs. He is also an official of the federal court. At the latest meeting of his organization President Snyder declared that the Teapot Dome investigation "is merely political hysteria and nothing more."

This hysteria, he said, "will be dissipated by June."

W. C. Connor, past president of the league, took the same comfortable view of the worst scandal in the history of the United States. "It is pure politics and nothing deeper," declared Mr. Connor.

Democrats and independents are commenting that this plan of campaign is either the result of egregious stupidity or utter disregard of popular standards of decency. In either case, they say, it will bring disaster to Mr. Coolidge and his party.

Between Two Thorns. Western Republicans were unwilling to take the consequences of giving their votes to the Mellon scheme for cutting the surtaxes on the incomes of millionaires, and they sought escape from the necessity of making an outright choice between following the administration or favoring their own constituents.

Chairman Green, Republican chairman of the ways and means committee, saved the faces of a large number of Republicans by his numerous warnings to President Coolidge that the Mellon plan could not be enacted as it was submitted by the secretary of the treasury. Green was really notifying the country that the Mellon plan was dead, though his statements on the subject were directed to individuals.

In the last stages of the tax bill's consideration in the house there were at least three distinct factions of Republicans. They were those fully and unreservedly committed to the Mellon scheme. These were relatively few. In another category were those who favored a compromise as was finally accepted. The progressive Republicans constituted the radical wing, but finally surrendered to the wiles of Leader Longworth.

In contrast with these Republican cleavages was the Democratic solidarity. This cohesion on the part of the Democrats is expected to be seen in the senate also. It is taken to argue the existence of a high morale and a general harmony in Democratic ranks on the eve of a historic campaign.

STRIKE THREATENS TO STOP LONDON PASSENGER CARRIERS

LONDON, March 21.—A strike of the London bus men and tram conductors and motormen, involving 40,000 workers, was to start tonight at midnight, it was announced here today.

Hoover Replies To Untermeyer's Rap With Some Asperity

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Secretary of Commerce Hoover today issued a sharp reply to Samuel Untermeyer, who in a letter to Senator Capper of Kansas, charged that the American public was trust-ridden, because of Hoover's "convenient blindness," and was inactive in respect to the anti-trust law.

Hoover, writing to Capper, said that Untermeyer has either lost his memory, or knows nothing of the function of the department of commerce, or is endeavoring to restrain foreign price combination against the American people.

CUPID HELPS OFFICERS TO ARREST BANDIT

Shadow His Sweetheart and Seize Him When He Calls to Bid Her Goodbye.

MARSEILLES, France, March 21.—Love for a woman led today to the arrest of Paul Camilleri, a member of a gang that carried out the famous Shattuck jewel robbery in New York in 1922. Detectives who had been shadowing the man's sweetheart for weeks, noticed on the international bandit last night as he was meeting her. He fought them savagely, but was overpowered.

"It is always women," he said as the police led him to the station. "I could have escaped easily had I not waited to see the girl. My plans were all made to go to South America, but I wanted to see her just once again. I love her, and I couldn't leave without seeing her."

A special guard has been placed over the bandit's cell to prevent a second jail delivery. He and some of his comrades fired their way to freedom last month, firing over the heads of the guards and wounding none.

GENERAL ALLEN WILL NOT ACCOMPANY OLYMPIC TEAM ABROAD THIS YEAR

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 21.—General Henry T. Allen will not take the United States Olympic team to Paris this year as deputy manager. Admiral Andrew T. Long, representing the navy and a representative of the army, yet to be appointed, will have charge of the team in France.

This change was made at General Allen's request. He will continue to serve as vice president and member of the Olympic committee, and continue as active leader in the campaign in this country to raise funds for defraying the expense of sending athletes abroad.

ELDERLY MAN SHOTS AND KILLS SON-IN-LAW

ROBY, March 21.—Asaph Martin, 24, was shot and killed on the court-house steps today by his father-in-law, Dan Stevens, 65, of Royston. Stevens surrendered, immediately to officers and was held without bail in a local jail. The shooting, it was said, resulted from a family quarrel.

FRANK E. DAY TO DRILL AGAIN IN SHALLOW FIELD

Frank E. Day of the Dorothy Oil company will drill another well on a new 25-acre lease he has recently acquired, offsetting his other lease on the east, in the Elizabeth Finley survey, just about a half a mile north of the prolific little shallow pool which has been developed on the Gray-Hightower tract by the Panhandle Refining company and the Texas company.

DALLAS ROTARIANS WANT INVALIDS TO HAVE RADIOS

DALLAS, March 21.—A radio receiving set in the home of every invalid in Dallas county is the object of the Dallas Rotarians' radio committee.

"Bringing sunshine to the shut-in" is the slogan of the committee, said Dr. J. J. Simmons, chairman.

The poor farms, homes for the aged, and orphanages will receive sets.

BUSY CREWS IN PROVEN FIELDS DRIVING AHEAD

Something Like Old-Time Fervor Activity Possesses Eastland County.

Nice production on three wells that were completed late Thursday in the Ranger field was reported this morning.

The J. C. Harrell No. 3 of the Mook-Texas company, six miles west of Ranger, is flowing an estimated 400 barrels. Production was reached at 3,598 feet.

The J. M. Williams No. 3 of the Thompson Oil corporation, 11 miles north of Ranger, flowed an estimated 15 barrels an hour last evening. Oil men estimate the well to be good for probably 200 barrels. Oil was struck at the usual Frankell depth, 2,100 feet.

The McLester well on the Chapman farm, 15 miles southeast of Ranger, is making an estimated 100 barrels a day at an approximate depth of 2,800 feet. Drillers reached the sand last week, but the well was not in shape for production until Thursday.

The No. 3 J. C. Harrell offsets the Mid-Kansas well on the L. C. Harrell lease, the latter coming in for 500 barrels some time ago. The Mid-Kansas well was reported holding up early this week.

The Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company has made its first location on the Walter Gardenhire lease, 11 miles north of Ranger.

Drilling has been resumed on Cornelius & Taggart's No. 1 Wagner after completing a fishing job. The well is down 800 feet. The Wagner is four miles north of Ranger. The Stanton's No. 1 Wagner, the only producing well close by, has been giving oil four years, it is said.

A shallow test will be made by Williamson and Blake on the Fayette Fox lease, one mile east of the famous Hightower tract. The rig is now being put up.

A showing of oil at 3,312 feet on the Mook-Texas No. 2 Sibley is reported from the field this morning. The well will be given a shot of nitro today and oil men say it should be a "nice well." The Sibley tract is six miles south of Ranger.

HOPE ABANDONED FOR MEN IMPRISONED IN SUNKEN SUB

TOKIO, March 21.—Hope for the 14 officers and men imprisoned in the motor room of the Japanese submarine No. 40 had been abandoned today. All attempts to communicate with them by emergency telephones between the submarine and the salvage vessel proved fruitless. No sign or word had come from within the submarine hulk since 7:40 p. m. when divers heard "hurry, hurry it is difficult to breathe," in Japanese, following "banzi emperor." Telephone communication was immediately established with the telephone system of the submarine, but it has brought no answer.

TWO-YEAR SENTENCE IS ASKED FOR LUDENDORFF

MUNICH, Germany, March 21.—Prison terms ranging from eight years to one year and three months were demanded for General Ludendorff, Adolf Hitler and their fellow conspirators of the beer cellar putsch of last November by the state prosecutor today. Stating up for the state, the prosecutor asked for the following sentences:

Hitler, eight years; Ludendorff, two years; Kiebel, Toehner, Weeber, six years; Brueckner, Wagner, one year, six months; Gernick, one year, three months.

WATER IS RISING IN BIG LAKE NEAR CISCO

Water in Lake Cisco has reached a depth of 40 feet in some places in the valley, say reports from Cisco. The rains and snows of the last few days have been helpful in filling the lake below the big dam.

The flood gates did not arrive in time last fall to hold the runoff water from the heavy rainfalls in the valley and it was lost. However, with a wet spring in prospect, Cisco may have a real lake soon.

JOHN ABBOTT REPORTED RECOVERING FROM WOUND

Reports from the sanitarium at 12:45 today stated that John Abbott, who was shot Wednesday night, was doing nicely and so far as could be ascertained, was on the road to recovery.

NOTE THE DIFFERENCE

In the Ranger Times yesterday the people of Eastland county were told the court of civil appeals at El Paso had reversed the judgment of the district court and held that Eastland county could not collect from the state bank guaranty fund about \$750,000 of county funds on deposit in the Security State Bank & Trust company in August, 1921. The opinion was handed down at 10 a. m., and The Times lost no time in obtaining the gist of it, so the people of Eastland county might be informed.

The Eastland Oil Belt News contained not one word of the story, although it might have obtained it just as did the Ranger Times. It has been promising to tell its readers all about the so-called road graft and developing nothing but hot air. Its news comes chiefly from Atlanta, as a glance at yesterday's Oil Belt News will show. Had the Texas appellate court been sitting in Atlanta, headquarters of the Ku Klux Klan, probably the kluxer organ in Eastland would have had a report of it.

Ranger Lions Name Their Delegates To Annual Convention

Dr. H. A. Logsdon and F. A. Brown have been appointed delegates to the international convention of the Association of Lions clubs to be held in Omaha, Neb., in June as representatives of the Ranger Lions clubs. From Omaha, Dr. Logsdon will go to Detroit to attend the national convention of the Elks as a delegate from Ranger lodge of Elks.

Brown has been placed on the program of the state convention of the Lions. He will be on the Tuesday morning program for an address on "How Some of Us Are Going Overland." Brown has also been placed on the state convention committee as chairman of the Omaha auto transportation committee.

Two Voting Boxes For Ranger School Trustee Election

Two voting boxes will be installed for the convenience of Ranger voters for the school trustee election on Saturday, April 5. The dividing line will be the Texas & Pacific railroad tracks. The Ranger Independent School district board made this decision Friday at a called meeting.

Voters living east of the tracks will vote at the Young school house and those west of the T. P. tracks at the high school building.

Charles Bobo will be presiding judge of the west precinct and Sam Davenport, assistant judge. Marvin Colie will preside in the east precinct and Tom Russ will assist.

V. V. Cooper, president of the board, will call on the men named to officiate at the election to ascertain if they will serve.

MADOO IS TWO TO ONE FAVORITE IN NATIVE STATE

ATLANTA, March 21.—William G. McAdoo, a native son, won a 2-1 victory over Senator Oscar Underwood of Alabama in Wednesday's presidential democratic primaries in Georgia, practically complete returns today showed. With complete returns in from virtually every county, the popular vote was 93,646 for McAdoo and 49,947 for Underwood. McAdoo won 322 county units to 84 for Underwood. The county units control the state convention which nominates delegates to the party convention.

MUDDY DAYS IN RANGER RECALLED BY OIL WORKER

Joseph DeGrasse, director of the film production, "Flowing Gold," which comes to the Lamb theatre Sunday interviewed an oil field worker who had spent a great deal of time in Ranger during the oil flush production era.

"Ranger was quite muddy in those days, was it not?" DeGrasse inquired.

"Muddy? say, I was walking along the sidewalk on Main street one day, mud almost to my hips. Looking down I saw a man's head above the mire in the street. Big-hearted, I reached forth and offered him my assistance to the sidewalk. 'Never mind,' he laughed, refusing my aid, 'I'm riding a horse.'"

PLANING MILL IN HOUSTON IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

HOUSTON, March 21.—The Massey Manufacturing company planing mill was destroyed by fire today, the loss being estimated at \$65,000. With the damage to surrounding buildings the loss will reach \$75,000.

The fire was discovered by a passer-by, who said he saw a flash like an explosion, just before the flames leaped through the building.

SINCLAIR PUTS HIMSELF AMONG SUPER-CITIZENS

Would Be Excused From Testifying Without Making Plea Odious to His Honor.

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 21.—Harry F. Sinclair today won a respite from testifying before the senate oil investigating committee, which has called him as a witness. After a heated argument of two hours between the committee and Martin W. Littleton, counsel for Sinclair, the committee postponed its decision on Littleton's demand that Sinclair be excused from testifying further. Adjournment was taken until tomorrow, when a decision will be made.

A majority of the members of the committee indicated strongly that they would vote to compel Sinclair to submit to examination.

Littleton presented a lengthy legal argument to the committee that it did not have the power under the constitution to compel his client to testify. The committee as a whole did not seem to be impressed by Littleton's argument, but at the request of Senators Spencer, Missouri, and Bursum, New Mexico, Republicans, let the matter go over until tomorrow. Spencer and Bursum said they wanted more time to consider the question.

Sinclair was unqualified in favor of forcing Sinclair to submit to examination. Littleton did not seek to keep Sinclair from the witness stand on the ground that the evidence he might give would tend to incriminate him but asked that the committee "should not force my client under the odium that such a plea involved."

During it all, Sinclair sat on the sidelines smoking cigars and unconcernedly watching the proceedings.

Littleton Charged With Trying To Put Stopper On Probes

By United Press. WASHINGTON, March 21.—Senator Dill, Washington, a member of the senate oil committee today charged in the senate that Martin W. Littleton, counsel for Harry F. Sinclair, was leading a "fight against all congressional investigations that would be effective."

'TWO FRIENDS' GET THE MONEY FOR INFLUENCE

Go-Between for Bootleggers Tells of Paying for Liquor Withdrawal Permits.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—In an amazing recital that dove-tailed into the investigation of Jesse Smith, friend of Harry Daugherty's, a man who acted as a go-between for New York bootleggers today told the senate committee investigating Attorney General Daugherty that he paid \$200,000 to two men with "influence in Washington."

The witness declared that he paid this amount to get withdrawal permits for 50,000 cases of liquor from warehouses and distilleries, one of which was the Overhold Distillery at Pittsburg, reputed to be owned in part by Mellon interests.

The go-between was John Goroni, of New York. He said he paid the money to Will Orr and Owen Murphy for permits which he alleges Orr sold him at \$15 for each case.

Orr has already figured in the inquiry concerning the films showing the Dempsey-Carpentier fight.

William J. Flynn, former head of the department of secret service, was brought into the investigation by Goroni. He said that Flynn sent him to Thomas B. Felder, a lawyer, when he wanted to engage counsel. Witness said that Felder got back \$40,000 of the more than \$200,000 that had been paid when certain permits "did not go through."

Orr told him, the witness said, that he had influence in Washington and knew Jesse Smith and Howard Manning. He said that Flynn sent him to Thomas B. Felder, a lawyer, when he wanted to engage counsel. Witness said that Felder got back \$40,000 of the more than \$200,000 that had been paid when certain permits "did not go through."

Orr testified that a "special assistant U. S. attorney" named L'Esterance got 50 cents out of each \$15 paid to Orr and Murphy. L'Esterance, according to Goroni, was in the office of the United States district attorney in New York as "assistant U. S. attorney."

Goroni also testified that Orr told him part of the \$15 was split with Jesse Smith.

"Did he say the attorney general got a split?" asked Senator Wheeler. "No he didn't," was the reply.

COTTON GIN TO HAVE ARCHITECTURAL BEAUTY

AMARILLO, March 21.—A "bungalow" cotton gin with all the architectural beauty of a bungalow will be erected in Amarillo soon.

In taking out a permit for the gin, which will cost \$5,000, J. N. Green said that the gin would resemble a bungalow in every particular, and would be a beauty spot in any residential section.

JOB FOR UNDERTAKERS S. LOUIS, March 21.—"I'm going to give you fellows a job," Emil Heidenreich, 50, told a group of undertakers here. Shortly thereafter he drank a bottle of carbolic acid.

PAGAN DANCES BANNED BY EPISCOPAL BISHOP

NEW YORK, March 21.—Pagan dances will be held as part of the church services at St. Mark's in the Bowery next Sunday. Bishop William T. Manning, Episcopalian, recently banned performances of this sort in the church.

DAUGHERTY IS CHARGED WITH HIDING WITNESS

Senator Ashurst Demands That Howard Mannington Be Produced to Testify.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—In the midst of today's session of the senate committee investigating Attorney General Daugherty, a charge was made by Senator Ashurst, Arizona democrat, that the attorney general had "spirited away" Howard Mannington, so that his testimony could not be obtained by the committee.

"The only way this suspicion of mine can be removed is the prompt production of Mannington by the attorney general," said Senator Ashurst.

Mannington, who left Washington several years ago, is supposed to be in Paris or on the Riviera.

"As counsel for the attorney general, I formally deny all of the insinuations of wrong doing on the part of the attorney general," replied Attorney Allen, who is representing Daugherty.

"Then produce Howard Mannington," ordered Ashurst.

"Howard Mannington will be here if we want him," said Allen.

"That's just it. If you want him subpoenaed," said Ashurst. "I demand that Secretary Hughes forthwith send to the committee the original application of Howard Mannington for a passport."

Allen then said that Wheeler was examining witnesses and putting in damaging evidence against Daugherty and suppressing testimony in his favor.

"When you say that you lie," countered Wheeler leaping to his feet. "Oh, don't let me get low," said Allen. He was smiling.

"I'm not going to turn this investigation over to you," Wheeler shouted.

LAFOLLETTE CLIMBS TO NOTCH ABOVE JOHNSON IN NO. DAKOTA PRIMARY

FARGO, N. D., March 21.—Senator Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin is the runner-up in the North Dakota republican presidential preferential primaries, outdistancing Hiram Johnson of California by more than 3,000 votes. Coolidge won a minority victory over the two senators with a margin of more than 14,000 votes over LaFollette. With all but 228 of the 2058 precincts in the state counted, the vote is shown as follows:

Coolidge, 47,947; LaFollette, 34,096; Johnson, 30,253.

The final count will change this result but little, politicians declared today. Harrison Garnett, a supporter of Coolidge, was chosen republican national committeeman for North Dakota by an overwhelming vote. R. A. Kinsler, his nearest opponent, was beaten by more than 2 to 1.

FIRPO LEARNS SUCCESSFUL PRIZE FIGHTER MUST TALK

BUENOS AIRES, March 21.—Reports that Luis Firpo, South American heavyweight, intended to retire from the ring were said to be part of the wild bill's advertising campaign for his coming tour of the United States. From close friends it was learned the big fellow had no intention of giving up the prize fighting trade, which he finds very lucrative.

WOMAN MAY BE SECRETARY OF RAILROAD COMMISSION

JUST MAKE COMPARISON.

Far be it from any wish of this newspaper to boast its many "beats" or other achievements, for anything well done is commendable only as it acts as an incentive to greater accomplishments, but it cannot refrain from noting the difference in the value of the news it receives and publishes compared with its esteemed contemporary, the Eastland Oil Belt News.

After having filled its columns with threats of revelations in the so-called graft in the Eastland county road fund, the Oil Belt News failed to report yesterday the opinion handed by the appellate court in El Paso, in which the opinion of the district court was reversed and the state bank guaranty fund absolved from payment to Eastland county of close to three-quarters of a million dollars county funds on deposit in the Security State Bank & Trust company when its doors were closed in August, 1921.

Had the court been sitting in Atlanta it is probable the Oil Belt News would have received and published it. 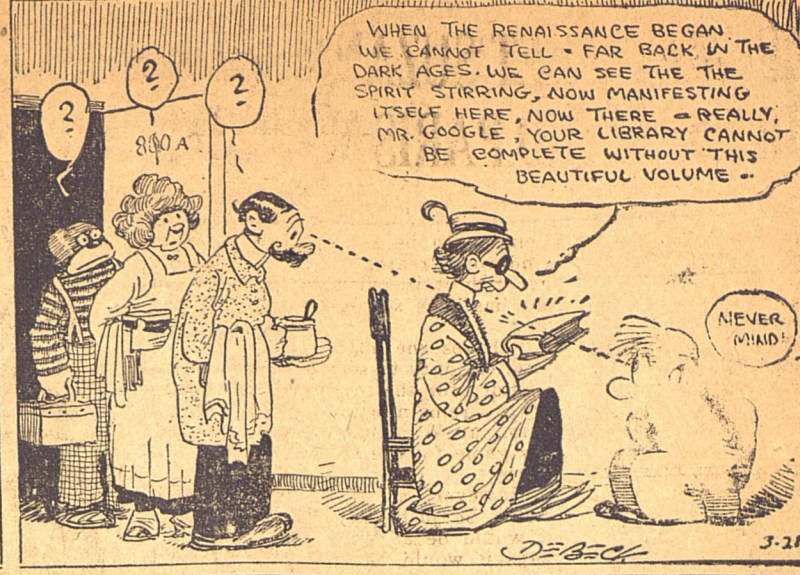
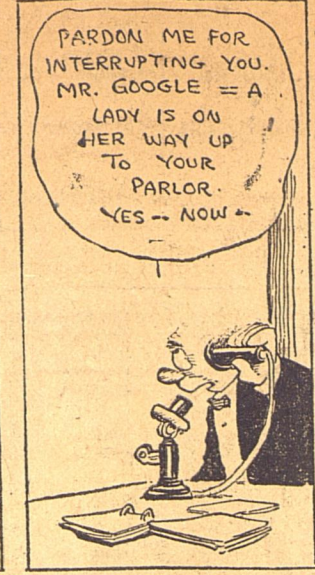
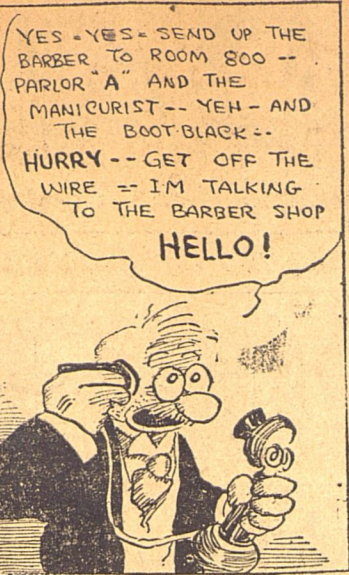
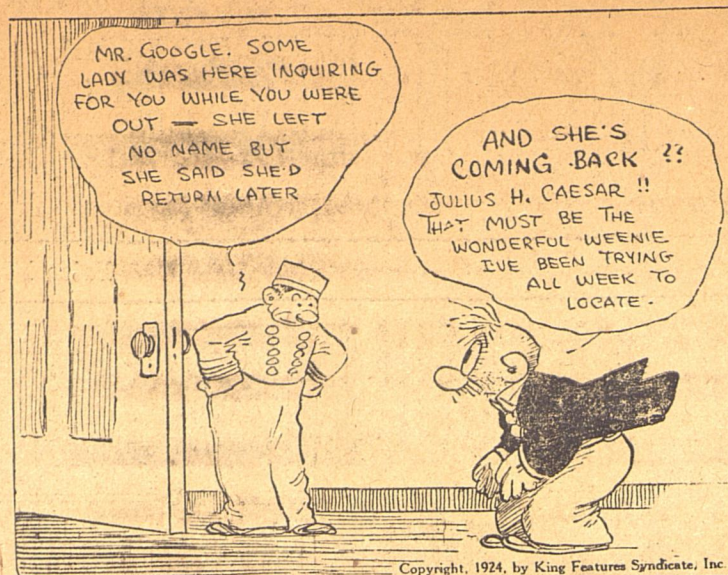
CLOTHES AND CARS The National Retail Clothier claims to have authentic information to the effect that 6,000,000 persons, earning less than \$40 per week, own an automobile. This information is offered as the reason why men wear shabby clothes and do not spend as much money on dress as formerly, and the inference is drawn that our wage earners have mortgaged their incomes for indulgence.

While this may be true to a limited extent, it is also true that there are only 4,000,000 of people who file income tax reports on \$2,000 a year, while there are 10,192,000 registered automobiles. Digging a little farther into general financial conditions it is found that life insurance companies have sold 12 billions of insurance on the installment plan, while savings bank deposits were never so great as at present.

One concern, whose specialty is financing automobile credit, reports that of \$400,000,000 thus financed, 60 per cent of all the cars were paid for in a year, and the losses are but a small fraction of one per cent. COST OF WHEAT AND BREAD

For several years there has been the conviction that between the granary of the wheat grower in the Middle West and the table of the consumer of bread there has been too great a spread of profit to the manufacturers of flour and the bakers and distributors of bread. Retail prices are practically the same as the high point caused by demands for feeding men in all armies.

It is alleged that we are paying more than \$1,000,000 a day too much for bread and the farmer is not getting it. The price of wheat is so low that those who grow it are subjects of government aid. It is shown that whereas the price of wheat declined to 93 cents a bushel last September, a decrease of 55 per cent since 1917, bread prices have declined but 5.4 per cent. In other words, the price of wheat has been reduced

10 times as much as the price of bread. Despite the frequent flaunting of the slogan, "East More Wheat" it appears that the per capita consumption of bread in the United States has decreased 44 loaves a year from the average in pre war periods. An illuminative exhibit in the report of the Peoples Legislative Service is that which states that \$1 invested in common stock of one of the larger baking companies in the year 1916 now represents a value of \$309.

HELEN WILLS, NATIONAL TENNIS CHAMP, MAY MEET SUZANNE IN WIMBLEDON AND PARIS MATCHES

 NEW YORK, March 21.—Announcement by the United States Lawn Tennis association that Miss Helen Wills, national tennis champion, will be a member of the team that the association is sending to Wimbledon and Paris puts in prospect what might be the greatest event of the year—a match between the California girl star and Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen for the world's championship.

No other sporting event of the season has in it the possibilities for public appeal and international interest than a match between the great French champion and the California miss who seems destined for heights not even attained by Mlle. Suzanne.

If the pair should meet at Wimbledon, the match would be of tremendous importance, as it would involve the world's championship, unofficially at least, because it is the British championship held by the French girl against American competition at Wimbledon that has earned for her the right to be called the champion of the world.

It would not be gracious for Mlle.

Lenglen to be so unfortunate as to find some reason for not defending her title this particular year, when she has been so eager to do it in the past.

Perhaps she might consider it her greatest duty to sacrifice her personal glory for the interest of her country by remaining out of the competition at Wimbledon and conserving her game for the Olympic matches in Paris.

However, a Wills-Lenglen match would be just the same at Paris as it would be at Wimbledon, and perhaps it would be even bigger as an attraction, because the Olympic games will have whooped up interest in all amateur sports by that time.

Miss Wills is not going to Europe "after" Mlle. Lenglen. It is quite possible that the modest California girl has not given it a great deal of thought, as she is not one to worry herself. She was invited to join the American team of women that is to defend the Wightman Cup against the British woman's team and that is to play in the British championships and then in the Olympic championships.

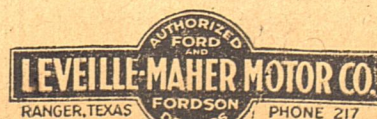

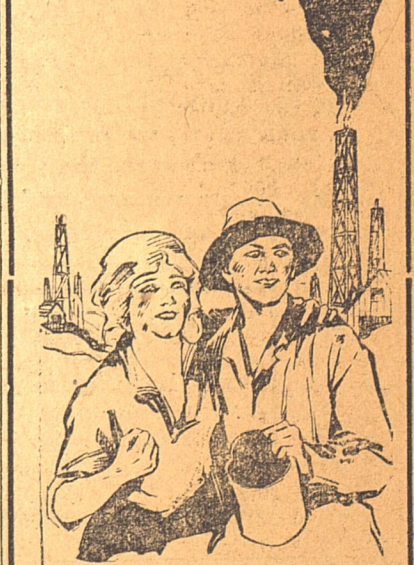
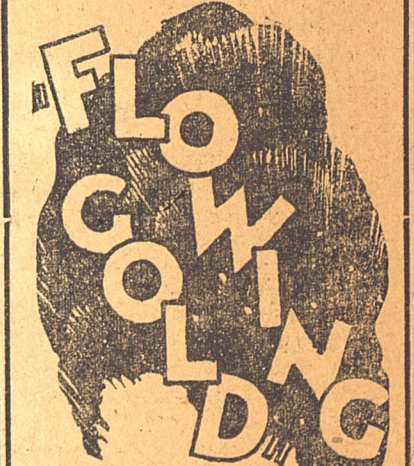

NEW YORK, March 21.—As the great French liner docked in New York the other day three curiously-garbed American girls returning from Paris lined up before the photographers.

One might easily have mistaken them for Apaches, so closely did their costumes resemble the boyish Apache garb.

Their shingled heads were thrust into tiny felt hats, huge plaid scarfs entwined their necks, and their scant skirts reached just below their knees.

Their whitened faces, shadowed by darkened eyelids and vivified by vermilion lips were actually startling. Their three-quarter-length coats, cut on boyish lines, wrapped tightly about their slender figures, displayed but three inches of the hem of their frocks beneath them. Something of the bygone flapper was reflected in their boyish attire, and one wonders whether the flapper is to be supplanted by the Apache.

Fashion Hints.

"Yes, we have no bananas," but we have a new shade called "banana" that promises to be one of the season's favorites. It is a pinkish flesh shade, verging on yellow, and is seen among sports attire, lingerie frocks, hats, hosiery and undergarments. It adds a new note to the summer pastels.

One could write paragraphs on scarfs this season, as every frock and costume seems to have an accompanying scarf of some sort. as common as other meats on the public market.

Like the cattle in the United States the new beef will be shipped by railroad to packing houses on the coast of central Alaska, butchered and transported either by the Biological Survey steamer Boxer or private transportation.

At the rate the Eskimo herds of reindeer are increasing it will soon be necessary to butcher a large number that the owners may have revenue from their industry.

The slaughter and shipment of meat will begin shortly after the immense herds of the Seward Peninsula and Point Barrow country are moved down to regions abutting the Alaska railroad, which will permit of proper preparation of the venison for shipment to the States.

Heretofore the big private reindeer herds have been slaughtered and shipped with skin on, a system that has proved unsatisfactory, because it is hard to freeze the animals properly with hide on and, in addition, the odor of the skin is transmitted to the meat.

This year, Superintendent Lopp of the Alaska division of the biological survey, prepared meat wrapped in cheese cloth and found a ready sale in the Pacific northwest.

"It is only a few years when we will have domesticated the millions of native caribou of Alaska and begin herding them as we do the reindeer at present," said Superintendent Lopp.

"The caribou is only a wild reindeer, and sufficient evidence has been gathered to show that he may be domesticated, the same as the deer.

"Possibly no animal of the herbivorous or ruminant species is a more rapid breeder than the reindeer. The fawn of spring will fawn the next spring, and it is nothing unusual to see an old doe with a yearling following, which in turn has a fawn following, while the mother has her suckling fawn at her side. These families mate with other families and thus there is no deterioration in the stock."

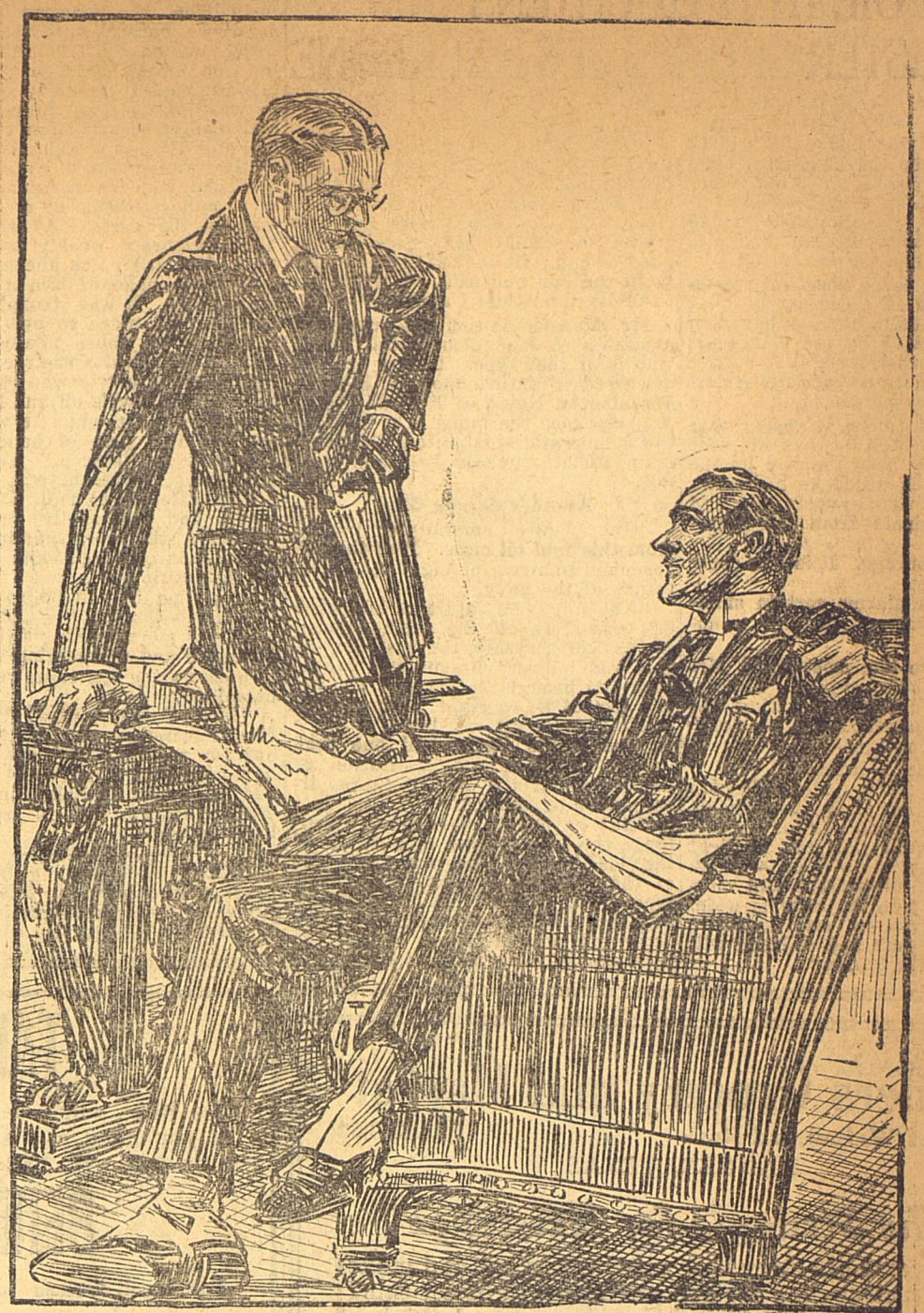

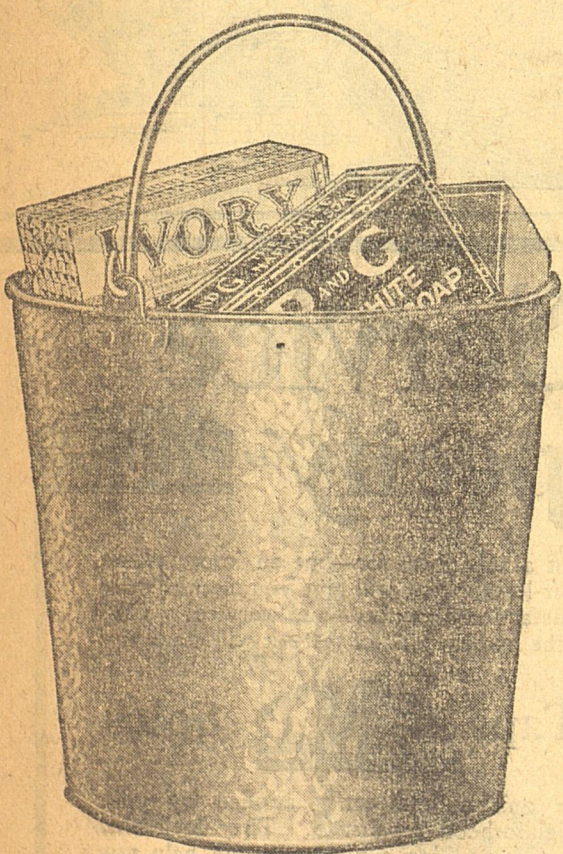

IT ISN'T OIL THAT FRIGHTENS SINISTER GROUPS, IT'S BACKBONE

So far as we know, President Coolidge will be the next republican candidate for president. That seems probable at least. Mr. Coolidge has been president long enough for all to know his attitude on the wet and dry issue and many issues as well.

What seems to be practical republican certainty is faced by a great democratic uncertainty. What man will be nominated by the democrats for president, therefore, is a matter of intense concern to patriotic Americans of the dry persuasion.

The effort to make it appear that William Gibbs McAdoo has in some mysterious way been touched by the oil scandal, with which he had nothing whatever to do, appears to be an effort to eliminate from the democratic race a man of some ability and splendid courage. It is McAdoo's backbone and not his alleged oil connections which alarms certain sinister groups which prey on the democratic party.

The thing we like most about Mr. McAdoo is that he looks you straight in the eye and tells you what he thinks. No pussyfooting. No hedging. No "playing safe."

Prevention Intended. On Sept. 9, 1920, Mr. McAdoo said, "Prohibition means prevention. It does not mean license in any form. To permit the sale of light wines and beer is to open a crack in the door of prevention and once the crack is open, the door is wide. The greatest victory ever achieved for helpless women and children will be thrown to the winds."

A few days ago certain persons interested in the nullification of the prohibition law visited Mr. McAdoo and asked him to make his stand clear. Mr. McAdoo did not say, "It is law, and all law must be enforced, good or bad." He looked them squarely in the eye and said, "I want you to understand this: I am dry."

Mr. McAdoo is not the only man available to the democratic party who is of that type. Others may be discussed in future months, but the Washington News, of Feb. 25, 1924, proposes now the name of a man for the democratic nomination who is all man. That name is Josephus Daniels.

Another Strong Man. "One figure emerges unspotted from this foul oil mess. It is that of Josephus Daniels, for eight years secretary of the navy.

"Not only is he untainted but when one considers all the circumstances of his secretaryship, the pressure, direct and indirect, brazen and subtle, that was brought to bear on him every day of those eight years to give away the navy's oil, Daniels comes as one heroic figure and one that should challenge the admiration of the people of the United States irrespective of politics.

"But he should particularly challenge the interest and admiration of the leaders and the rank and file of the democratic party in their search for a presidential candidate who is qualified by reputation, character and general fitness to lead the fight during the coming campaign for

honesty in government and particularly for the conservation of the country's natural resources. "It will be remembered that during the entire eight years of Daniels' regime in the navy department he was the object of the most vicious and malignant campaign to discredit him and drive him from office.

"He was pictured as a man unqualified for the position and held up to public ridicule by a certain section of the press. It was strongly suspected then and more so now, that this campaign of abuse against Daniels was an organized conspiracy financed by the oil interests who were trying to steal the navy's oil and knew they could not do it while it was in the custody of a man of honesty, courage and integrity. And so the outrageous spectacle was presented of the attempt to ruin a man officially and personally because he possessed the very qualities which pre-eminently fitted him for high public position.

"Nothing that Woodrow Wilson did as president of the United States redounds more to his credit than his inflexible and unwavering support of Daniels during the eight years of his presidency.

"When Daniels retired from the office of secretary of the navy, his record for personal integrity was spotless, his record for official efficiency had never been equalled in the navy department and the oil grafters had been kept at bay."

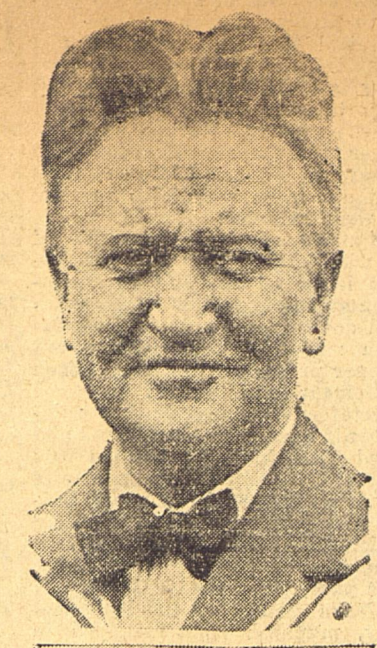
American May End King Tut Row.

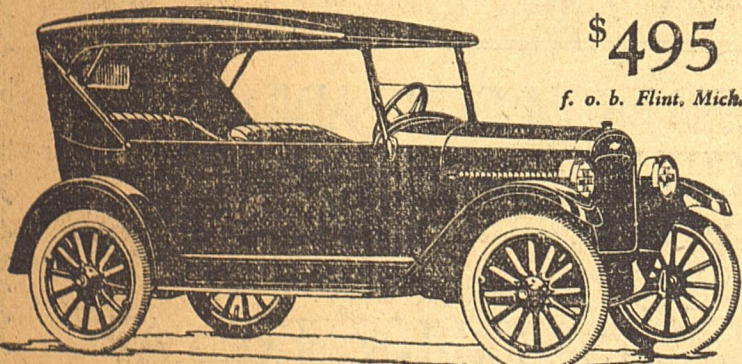

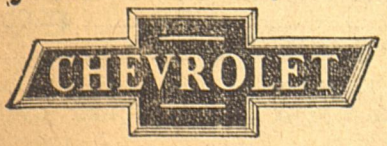

WOODROW WILSON ANIMATED BY SPIRIT OF TOLERANCE

James W. Girard, former U. S. ambassador to Germany, in the March Current History magazine, says:
At a time when intolerance raises its ugly head in many places in our country, it is not amiss to call attention to the spirit of toleration which ever animated Woodrow Wilson. Jews and Catholics were his friends and were by him appointed to high offices and administered them well. The crusading spirit of his Puritan ancestor and his Presbyterian upbringing found an outlet in his attacks on injustice and on wrong. No man can be a great statesman who cherishes the intolerant prejudices of the small-minded. Woodrow Wilson's last public act was to send me a letter, three days before his death, agreeing to become a member of the committee to raise funds for the suffering and starving intellectuals of Germany.
From the first Woodrow Wilson viewed the World war in its proper scale. He could forget the details and grasp the plan in all the breadth and possibilities of the awful world catastrophe. The ex-kaiser said to me in the gardens of the chateau at Charleville during the discussion of submarine war: "Why does not America go after England, which is violating, by its blockade, the rules of international law?" and my answer, that if two men came to my house and one of them murdered my sister and the other stepped on the flower beds I would first attack the murderer, was only the reflection and the echo of Woodrow Wilson's broad view of the situation and of the policy we should pursue.

Expert Describes Popular Hot Dish

By HELEN HARRINGTON DOWNING.

"I shouldn't be bothering you with a call at this time of the evening—I know you're busy getting dinner—but am on my way to meet John on his way from the office. We're going to have dinner down town tonight," said Elizabeth to her just a little older and more domesticated sister, Helen.

"Come into the kitchen, and we'll talk while I finish the dumplings," said Helen.

"Do you know," said Elizabeth, "we are both actually tired of eating at home lately. I'm simply running out of ideas—and I suppose we're tired of eating at home because I don't have enough variety. That's just why I stopped tonight. I was sure you could suggest something."

"You see what I am having tonight," said Helen, as she lifted the lid from the kettle on the stove, to show Elizabeth. "What is more delicious on a cold night than a beef or veal stew, with light, tender dumplings, or home-made noodles. Have you made any lately? If you haven't I suggest that you surprise John with some real soon."

"I've tried them once," said Elizabeth, a little doubtfully, "and they weren't very good."

"Don't be discouraged," said Helen, "if they haven't raised when you made them before—or if they were heavy—just try my recipe."

Two pounds of boiling beef is sufficient. Cut in small cubes and cook slowly in four cups of cold water for an hour. To this add your dumplings. Here is a secret I learned from a friend. Don't thicken the gravy until the dumplings are done, as they don't cook well in a thick gravy, though many people don't know this. Remove the dumplings before thickening the gravy and return them after it is thickened.

Dumplings.
Two cups flour, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 level teaspoon salt, 2-3 cup milk, 1 quart beef stock, steaming hot but not boiling.

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add milk slowly, mixing with a knife until a soft dough is formed. Quickly drop by spoonful into the steaming beef stock. Place on kettle a lid which fits tightly and steam for 15 minutes. If the beef stock boils the dumplings break apart. Thicken stock by mixing four tablespoons flour with one-half cup cold water. Remove dumplings to a warm bowl and add the flour mixture to hot cooked stock. Boil for two minutes or until it is slightly thickened. Serve hot over the dumplings with the beef or without.

"Or, if you would prefer noodles, here is a recipe, which is a good one. They are easily made and can be kept for some time if you make an extra supply. You may add them to any vegetable soups or stew," said Helen.

Noodles.
Two eggs, about 2 cups flour, 1/2 level teaspoon salt, 1/2 level teaspoon Beat the eggs and salt, and slowly add enough flour to form a stiff dough that may be kneaded without sticking to the board. Knead for 19 minutes on a floured bread board. Roll out very thin, in fact, just as thin as possible. Cover with a cloth and let stand for 30 minutes in a cool place. Roll up loosely, over and over, and cut into strips one-eighth of an inch thick. Let dry another hour and then cook for 20 minutes in boiling soup. If these noodles are desired for gravy, creamed meat or any other thick mixture, cook them first for 20 minutes in boiling, salted water. They are then done, and may be reheated in the food with which they are to be served.

Elizabeth made careful note of the recipes and directions, and arose to go. "Your dinner looks delicious," she said, "and I'm going to surprise John tomorrow."

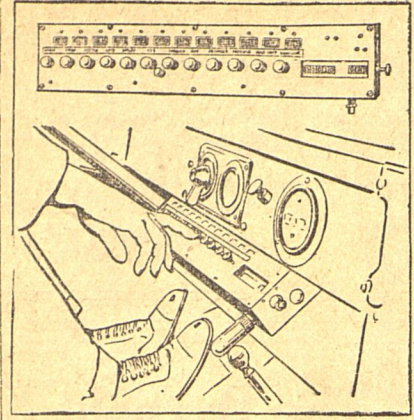

Crops Measured by Meter on Auto Dashboard

For recording the measurements of fields planted in various crops, a meter attached to the dashboard of an automobile



has been included in the equipment of the Department of Agriculture. The instrument is operated from the same gearing mechanism used for an ordinary speedometer. Each crop may be recorded on its particular section and the dimensions of the "stands" are shown in feet. At the right of the device is a scale that registers the total distances covered in miles and the number of trips made. As each patch of a certain kind is measured, it is added to the total. Each scale is labeled and has a button which must be pressed to throw it into action. Ten principal crops are provided for as well as idle ground and pasture land.

Renewing Golf Balls

A cheap and practical method of re-ewing old golf balls is to fill the cracks with white rubber cement, which can be obtained at any drug store.

After filling the cracks, the entire surface of the ball is naited. By repairing the balls in this way there are no bumps or cracks, which have a tendency to influence the course of the ball, and the whitened surface will

show up well. It is a good idea to wash the balls in cool soapy water before going to the grounds, as this helps to retain the old luster and removes stains.

Secrets of the Seven Seas Told by "Bottle Papers"
To learn the speed and direction of ocean currents, government experts use "bottle papers." Accurate knowledge of these drifts is important to navigation, and the safety of hundreds may depend upon it. Small slips, with directions for their return printed in the principal languages, are given to ship captains, to be sealed in flasks and thrown overboard. Months or years later, some return. One floated nearly across the Atlantic and back, and another crossed the widest part of the Pacific in a little over two years. A third, dropped near the Cape of Good Hope, was picked up on the western coast of Australia.

Sand for Railroads' Safety Costs Millions Yearly
While big figures are used in telling the cost of safety to the railways, the amazing item to the average person is the amount spent for sand. Four tons are required for every mile of road in the United States, according to the figures of one trunk line with 7,500 miles of track. As this road is in the middle west and south, where mountains are not encountered, the figures given are regarded as conservative. The cost of putting the sand into the engine box is placed at \$2.50 a ton as an average minimum. For all the roads, the yearly cost is estimated at \$2,637,070. For the most part the sand is brought from river bottoms and dried by waste steam at the round house.

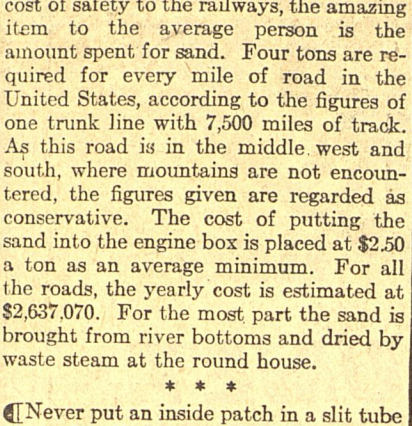
Magnets Lay Nails Straight in Packing Boxes or Kegs

To lay nails straight in containers, a packer equipped with magnets is reported to have been built by a Swiss inventor.

The machine is said to be able to fill kegs, boxes, or paper cartons and to handle wire rods, hairpins, knife blades and fishhooks with equal ease. The articles to be boxed up are poured into a huge vibrating hopper in lots of about a thousand pounds and are straightened out on large trays below.

Inexpensive Sign Hanger

WINDOWLESS MUSEUMS COMING

Electricity Promises to Replace Old Sol, Whose Ultra-Violet Rays Have Been Found to Ruin Natural History Specimens.

Think of a museum without windows! This sounds freakish, does it not? If you agree, you are wrong.

According to Frederick A. Lucas, director of the American Museum of Natural History, New York City, the ideal natural history museum of the not too distant future will, if housed in a new building, be guileless of windows and if its home is old, have its windows blocked up. All light in such a museum will be provided by electricity.

There is a solid, scientific reason for dispensing with museum windows, the outcome of a number of years of investigating in both Europe and this country. Day light has been found, according to Dr. Lucas, to be the arch foe of natural history museums because certain of its rays, especially the ultra-violet, quite rapidly deteriorate specimens exhibited under it.

Ruined by Daylight

A lunar moth, perhaps the most beautifully colored of its family, when exhibited under daylight, fades so completely within a few days as to be scientifically worthless. The baneful effect of daylight is by no means limited to such small things as moths. Some time ago the American Museum of Natural History had a group of deer absolutely ruined by being exhibited but three years in a gallery lighted by daylight.

The Hall of the Age of Man at the American Museum is an example of what can be accomplished in a windowless museum. The upper third of the four walls is given over to a series of mural paintings, depicting scenes from the life of early man. To light these pictures there are twenty-four ceiling type semi-indirect electric luminaires. Below the paintings, completely surrounding the hall except for doorways, a set of wall cases contains the smaller exhibits. These, together with the cases placed upon the floor to house the exhibits of larger animals, are likewise illuminated by elec-

tric bulbs placed in reflectors of such design that the light source is not directly visible to the eye.

Light Is Restful

Walking into this room from its neighbor, which is daylight illuminated, one cannot help noticing the restful quality of the lighting. Another advantage which Dr. Lucas pointed out is the greater amount of material which is on display here because side-wall cases are not interrupted by windows. He considers that the cost of electric current consumed is more than offset by the exhibition space gained by closing up the windows. Further, Dr. Lucas stated that the specimens in the hall lighted exclusively by the light of frosted incandescent electric bulbs are insured against deterioration for many years to come.

"Daylight is the great foe of natural history collections because of its actinic rays," said Dr. Lucas, as he was going about the museum showing what had been accomplished there in the way of electrical illumination of its exhibits. "Visitors to the mammal gallery of the British Museum of Natural History find the shades drawn and labels calling attention to the fact that it is done to preserve the specimens. In many continental museums the galleries are shrouded in darkness save for a very few hours on stated occasions."

Only One Course

"Light, however, is necessary if the visitors are to enjoy the exhibits; so museum authorities have been more and more perplexed, as museums have become increasingly popular, by the problem of providing plenty of light and at the same time of preserving the specimens for posterity. Many

experiments have been conducted in search for a glass which would exclude the harmful rays of daylight and still not alter its color. So far, these experiments have not been successful. Sir Sidney Harmer, director of the British Museum of Natural History, for instance, carried on such a series of experiments for ten years and closes an article describing these experiments with this sentence: 'A gallery without windows, lighted entirely by electric light, preferably not arc lights, would have great advantages.'

"A gallery so lighted would have other advantages in addition to preserving the specimens on exhibit. Nearly all of the wall space could be utilized; there would be no dark corners and the degree of illumination would be the same summer or winter. Modern improvements in electric lamps make it possible to secure almost any quality of light up to pure white. For all these reasons I am firmly convinced that many of us may live to see the time when museums of natural history will be constructed without windows."

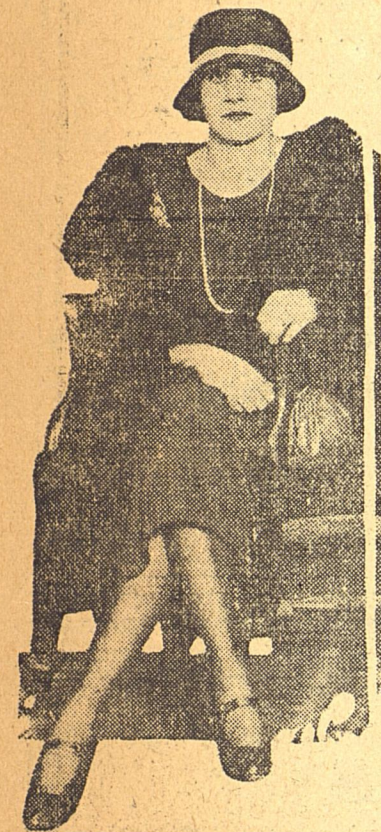

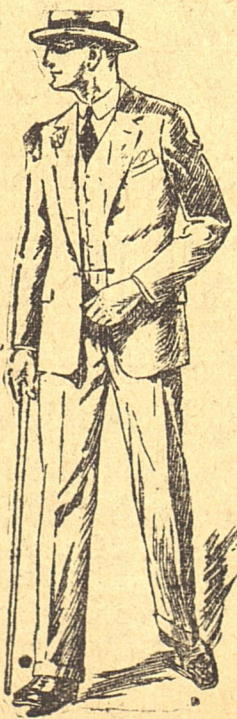
