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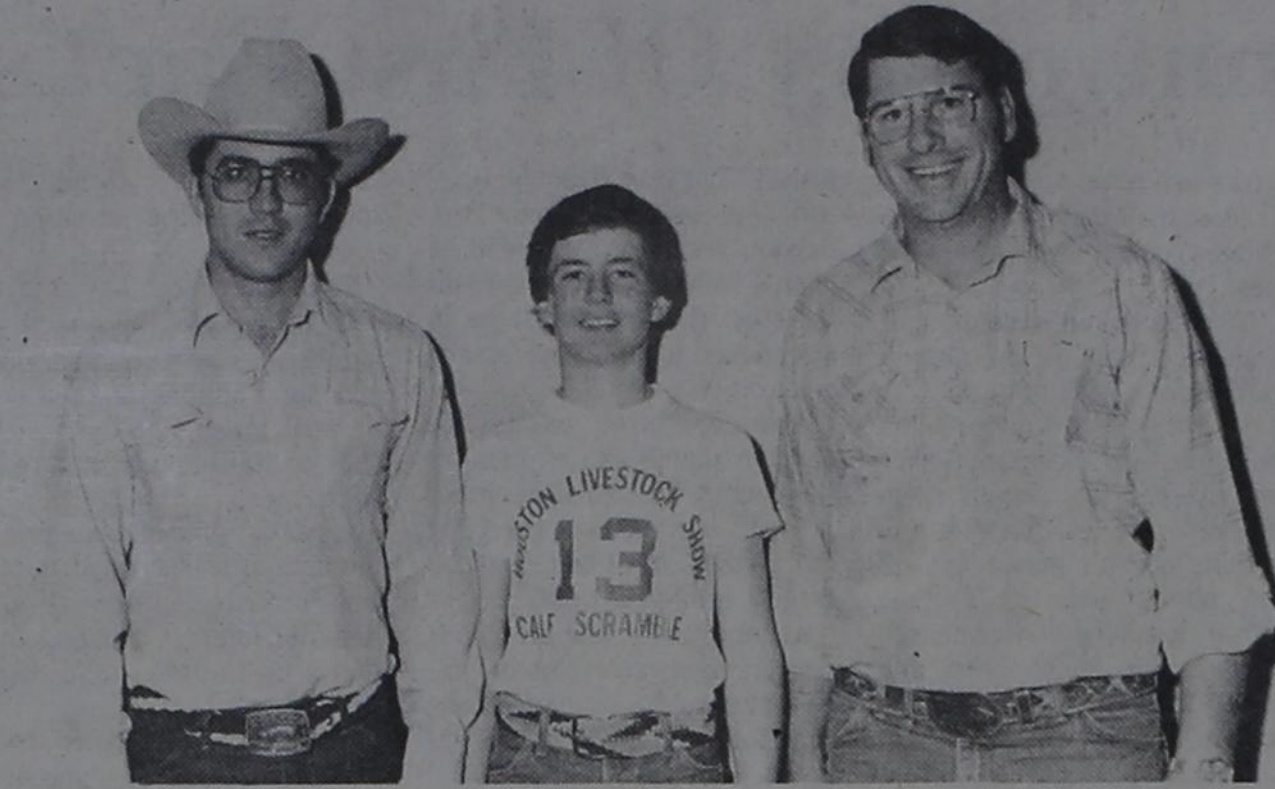

Capital Credit refunds of \$200,000 were returned to members who purchased electricity during 1970. This refund should turn over and have more than a million dollars effect on buying power in the area economy.

Bill Marquis, attorney for the cooperative, directed the business meeting, and reports were given by James Hull, manager, A.W. Anthony, Jr., president, and Jerry Roberts, secretary. An election of two directors was held.

There were various drawings for door prizes throughout the meeting which started at 5 p.m. with a free fish and chicken dinner, served by Fins and Hens of Lubbock. The Hereford Campfire Lodge provided ten girls to refill ice tea glasses and coffee cups before the business meeting.

Highlight of the drawings was an electric barbecue grill and a microwave oven, the latter which was won by Donald Vasek of Hereford.

Entertainment was provided by the Tri-State Bluegrass Express, a group from Amarillo that has played together for 10 years and appeared on TV and radio.

James Hull, manager for the Cooperative, addressed the membership in an effort to explain management's philosophy. "Cutbacks have been forced in the following areas: The total number of employees

have been reduced 29 percent; outside construction contractors are no longer being used, and tree trimming is done by existing crews to save about \$15,000 each year. Also, inventory has been reduced from two million to five hundred thousand dollars.

"Just as we feel these cutbacks were necessary, your Cooperative has continued expenditures in the areas of line maintenance and repairs; employee training and schooling, and vehicle maintenance. This is evident as we compare the average outage time of the Cooperative to the national average."

Hull concluded by stating that the Cooperative's rates were competitive with areas of the United States that have historically enjoyed the cheapest electric power, and that our current Board of Directors was very much aware of existing economic problems and these men are working to ensure a strong cooperative for those it serves.

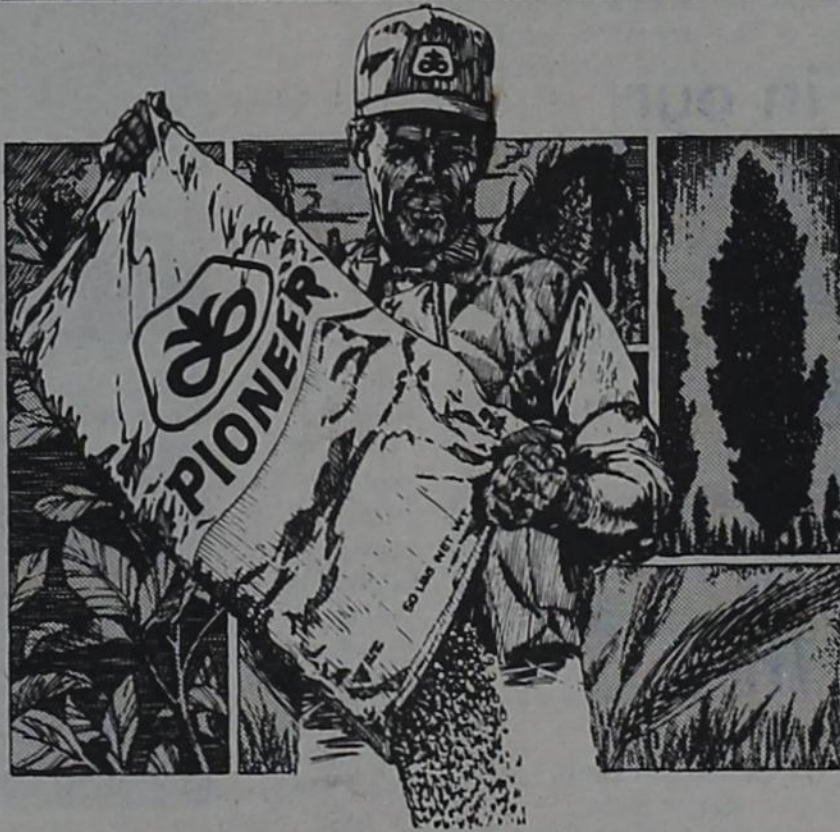

Energy Is Blowing In The Wind

Man has harnessed energy from the wind for centuries. Wind is not metered nor run by a cartel, and it is inexhaustible. Catching the wind could even be profitable.

Researchers at the Plains Branch of New Mexico State University Agricultural Experiment Station in Clovis installed a wind charger a little more than a year ago to catch winds on the Eastern Plains. Wind-generated energy at the station, in the form of 480 volts of three-phase alternating current, is sold to a utility company.

"At this point, we just want to see how much electricity can be generated in this area," says Dr. George Morin, wind charger project leader. "It is already clear that a wind charger has economic potential, whether the energy is sold to a utility company or used directly."

The station wind charger is generating an average of 108 kilowatt-hours of electricity a day, enough to run four or five households of two and close to the manufacturer's claim to

average daily output of 110 kilowatt-hours. Morin says wind-generated energy could be used to run irrigation pumps or used in a tail water pivot to collect runoff and recycle irrigation water.

"My concern with depending upon wind generated energy in an irrigation program is that in this area there might not be enough wind during critical times of the growing season," the researcher said. "We hope to do irrigation research using the wind charger in the future."

At first glance, the wind charger at the station looks like a stream-lined, twentieth century version of traditional windmills, but the resemblance fades upon closer inspection.

The wind charger has only two blades that look more like airplane propellers than windmill blades. The blades are strong, flexible fiberglass paddles mounted on a pivot that allows them to respond to wind from all directions.

The blades are held aloft by a single, slender pole tower. An electronic generator at the top of the tower feeds energy to the utility company. The generator uses about 10 or 12 kilowatt-hours a month for excitation energy to the blades.

Despite blade damage from bullet holes and electronic damage from lightning, the charger produced 52,652 kilowatt-hours of electricity after 16 months of operation.

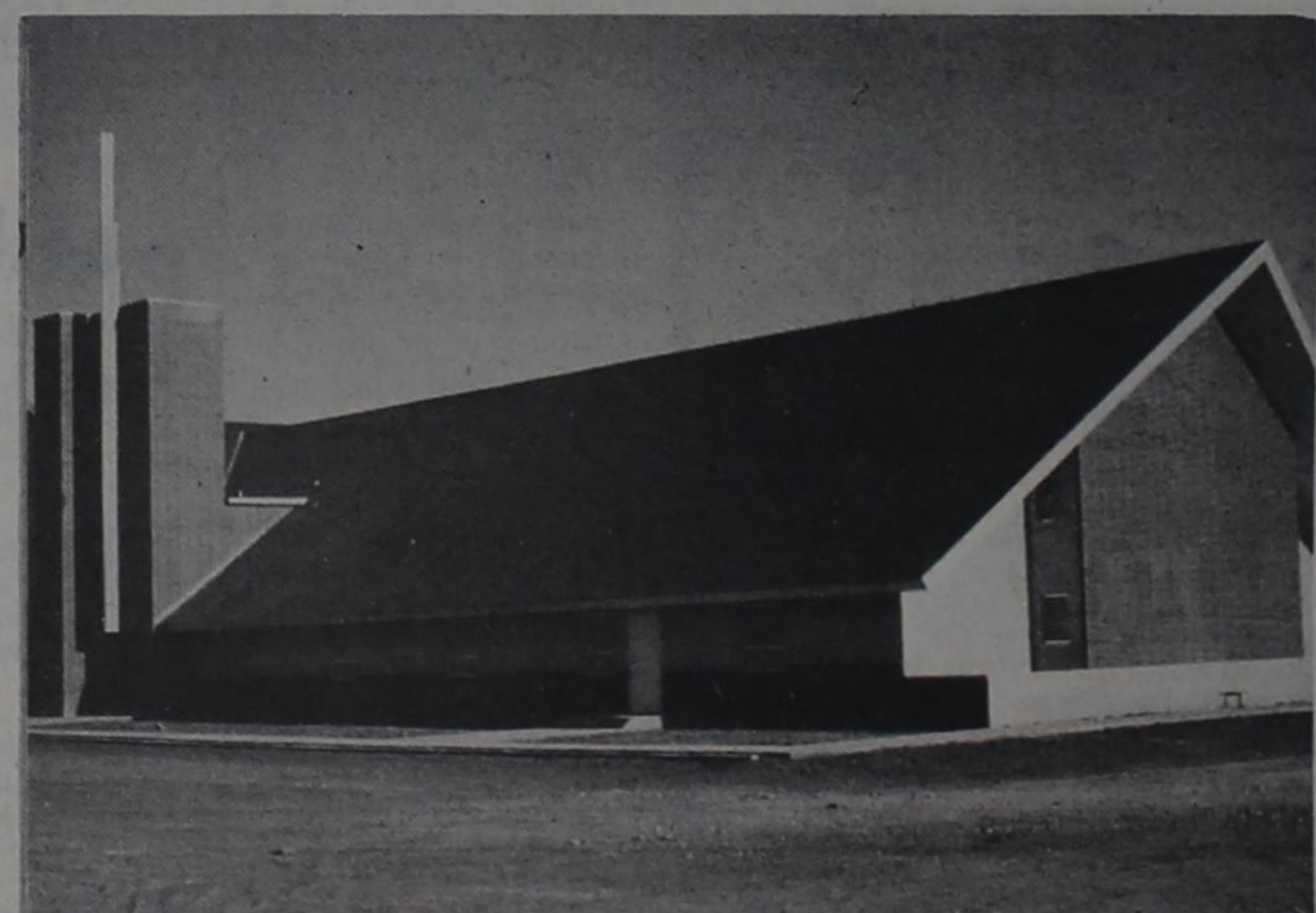

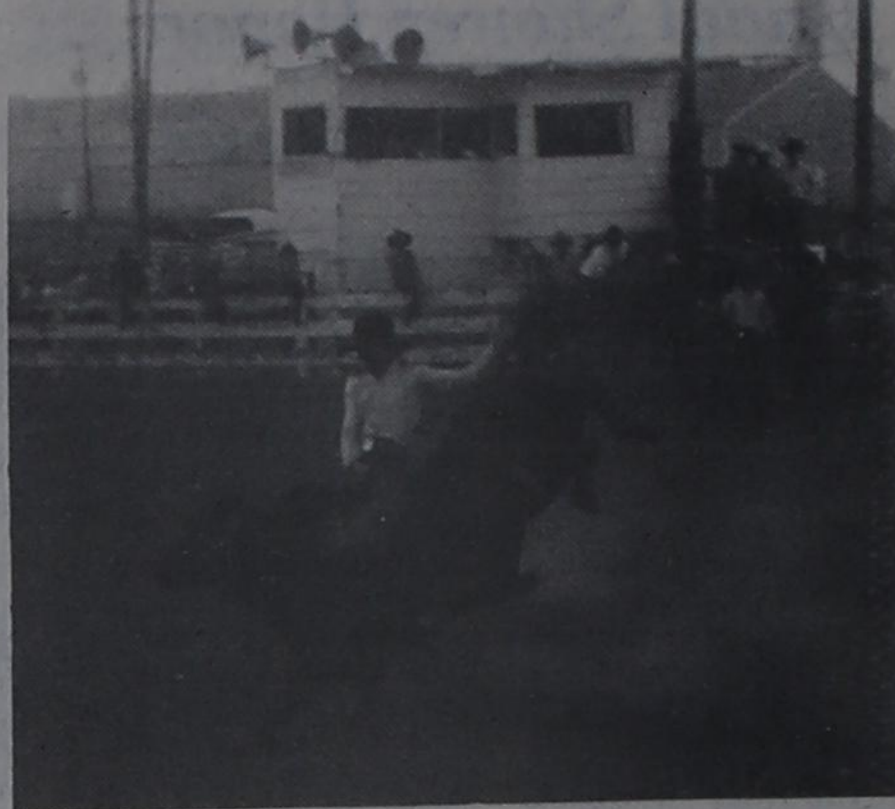

Are you wasting water bill dollars when watering your lawn? To check how much water your lawn sprinkler is using, place an empty coffee or soup can on your grass. An inch of water per week is enough for most lawns. If you're exceeding this amount, reduce the water pressure or cut back on the length of time you water your lawn. Are you a tub person or a shower person? Taking a shower uses about 10 gallons of water, while a bath uses 20 gallons. To save on water bills, take showers instead of baths. And if you prefer baths, after bathing let the water stand in the tub until it cools. The heat from the tub is sufficient to warm a small house on a chilly summer or fall evening.

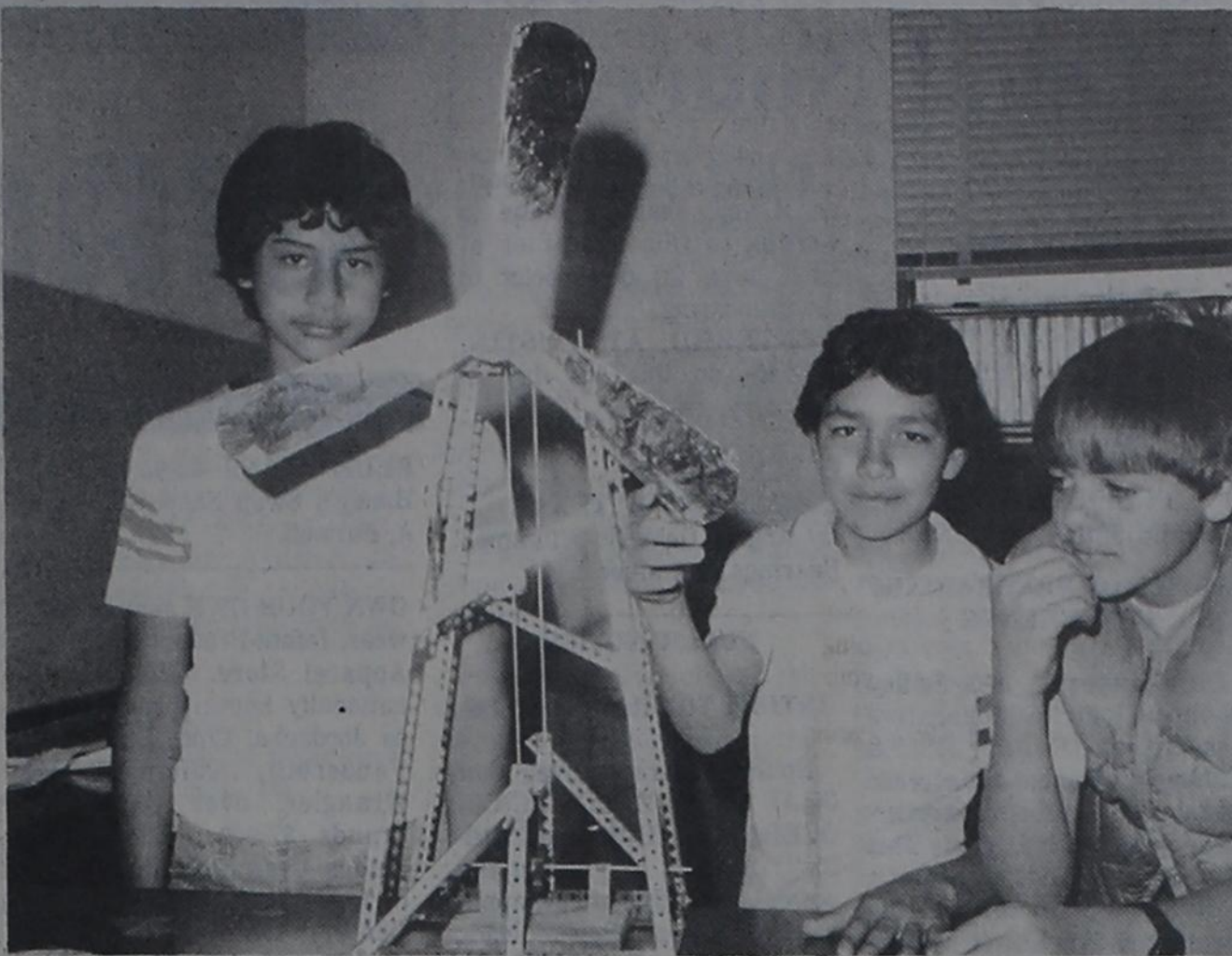
