Father Of Local Man Succumbs

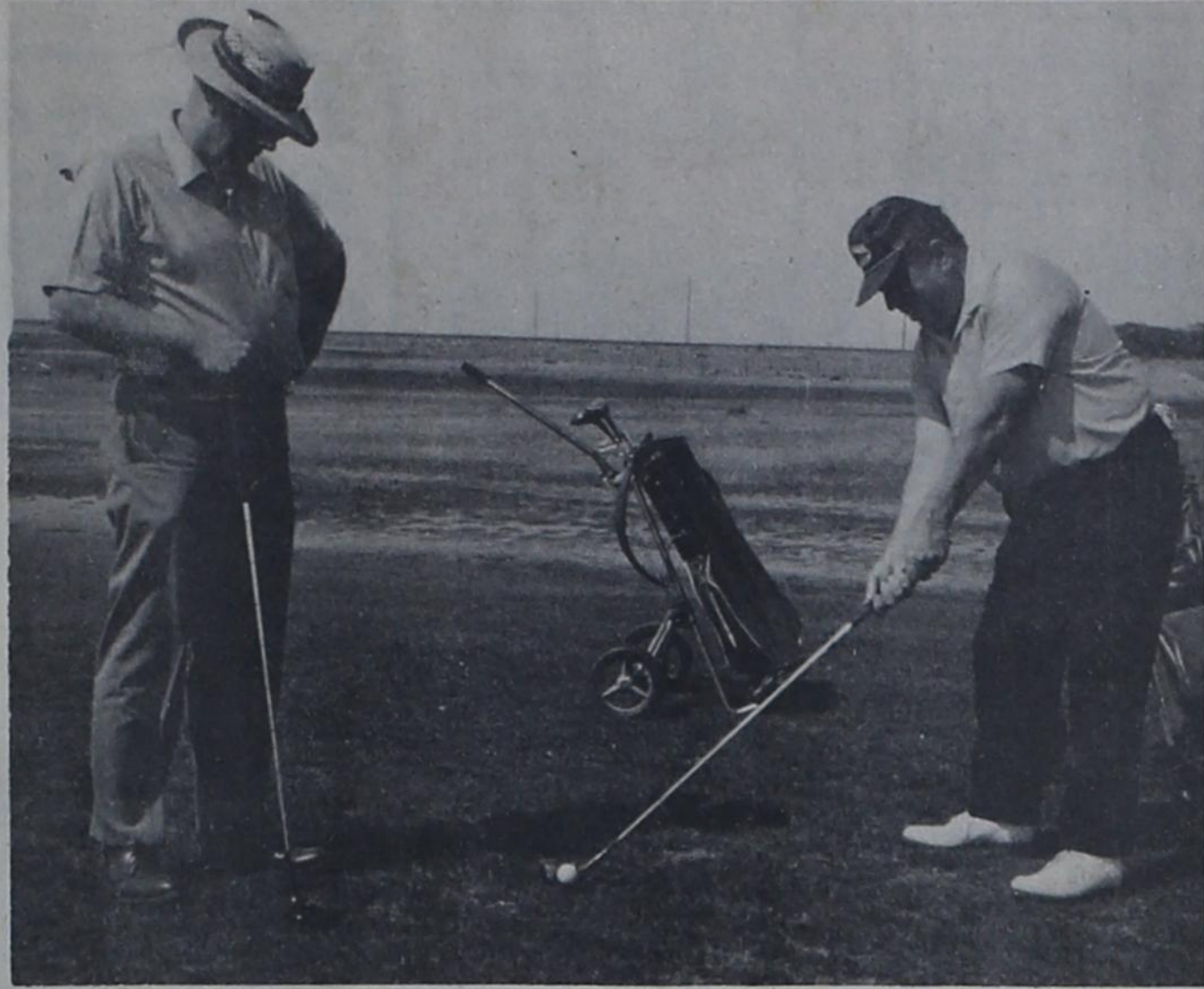

From Six Communities --

Art Council Names Steering Committee

Representatives from six communities met Monday evening in Farwell High School auditorium for an organizational meeting of the proposed area Fine Arts Council.

Farwell Mayor Elmer Hargrove welcomed the group. Don Williams, Farwell Chamber of Commerce president, introduced guest speakers Mrs. Emily Whitesides, assistant director of the Texas Fine Arts Commission, and John Anderson, secretary of the Lubbock Cultural Affairs Council.

In speaking to the interested persons, Mrs. Whitesides spoke of the purpose of the Fine Arts movement, tracing it from the formation of the National Endowment for the Arts under President Kennedy to the state level and down to the formation of local councils. Mrs. Whitesides stated that the program was not "just to present art for art's sake alone, but as an attempt to generally improve the quality of life in the present era."

She noted that culture was a

life style and that on our own state level, we are becoming aware of a heritage uniquely our own. Even now we are adding to the world's culture while forming a very distinct American culture and it is important that we try to restore personal and human values to better the quality of life for our children and possibly those of ourselves, she said.

Anderson spoke to the group about the problems the city of Lubbock faced in forming its Cultural Affairs Council and noted that there were more people present at the meeting in Farwell than were on hand at Lubbock's first meeting.

At the suggestion of the two speakers, the local group form-

ed a steering committee to draft ideas and by-laws for a local organization. Hugh Moseley presided at this portion of the program and was later named temporary chairman of the steering group.

Members of this committee are Joe Moore and Kitty Gallman of Lazbuddie, Marlon McDaniel and Anne Souder from Three Way, Steve and Marcia Messenger of Friona, Don Spring and Sue Naegle from Bovina, Charles Aycock and Peggy Snider of Farwell, and Martha Lamb and Jerry Hutton of Muleshoe. The committee will have its next meeting on Monday, May 18, at 8 p.m. in the community room of the First National Bank of Bovina.

Voter Turnout Light --

A total of 319 voters in Farwell went to the Democratic Primary polls Saturday, among

1512 in the county, and re-elected Archie Tarter county judge in the only county-wide contested race on the ballot. Parmer County gave the nod to Lloyd Bentesen for U. S. Senator, with Farwell voting 214 to 92 for the winner. County vote was 932 for Bentesen, 559 for Yarborough.

Seventy-four votes were cast over the county in the Republican Primary, with George

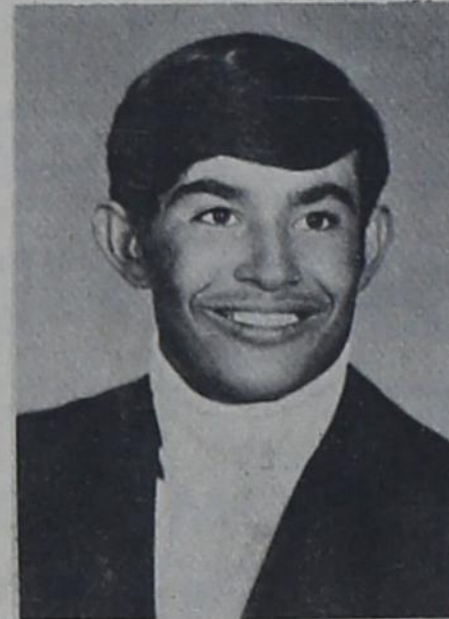
Bush getting 44 votes to Morris 31 for the U. S. Senate.

In his bid for re-election as county judge, Tarter carried all boxes in Parmer County except Black and Friona. He defeated W. L. Edelman by a county vote of 964 to 537. Farwell voted for Tarter 302-15.

In the commissioner's race, Precinct 4, Raymond G. Trelder, Jr. won that election over J. D. Carpenter, 117-102.

All other county officials whose terms expired this year ran unopposed, including District Clerk Dorothy Quikel; County Clerk Bonnie Warren; County Treasurer Mabel Reynolds; Commissioner, Precinct 2, Charlie Jefferson; Justice of Peace, Precinct 1, J. R. Thornton; JP, Precinct 2, Frances Euler; JP, Precinct 3, Wilbur Charles.

Turnout Light --

Parmer County went along with the state in approving Bob Armstrong for commissioner of General Land Office, over Jerry Sadler and Fred Williams. Armstrong received 752, Sadler 524, and Williams 108. In other state races, Parmer County approved Crawford C. Martin for attorney general over David H. Brown 666-369; Ben Ramsey for railroad commissioner over Connie Lawson 1025-328; James G. Denton for Supreme Court of Texas, associate justice, place 3, with 598 over Matt Davis' 407 and Hawthorne Phillips' 141. Only race the county was out of step with the state was that for court of criminal appeals, but it was a close one here. Parmer County gave 587 votes to Earl W. Smith and 585 to Truman Roberts.

With the results in from both party primaries, Governor Preston Smith will meet Paul Eggers in the general election; Democrat Ben Barnes and Republican Byron Fullerton for lieutenant governor; Democrat Crawford C. Martin and Republican Edward M. Yturri for Attorney General; Robert S. Calvert (D) and S. L. Abbott (R) for comptroller of Public accounts; Jesse James (D) and Robert F. Koennecke (R), state treasurer; Bob Armstrong (D) and Harry Trippett (R), commissioner of general land office; John D. White (D) and Daniel C. Heath (R) commissioner of agriculture.

Bill Clayton, state representative of 72nd District, was re-elected on the Democratic ticket unopposed.

In Republican Primary, Farwell registered 13 votes out of the 74 total for the county.

In addition to Bush, Republicans okayed Paul Eggers for governor over Roger Martin by a 68-6 margin. Bob Price was re-nominated for Congress, 18th District, without an opponent.

Land Bank Reduces Interest Billing Rate On Loans

Ernest Kerr, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe, received word recently that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8 1/2%. The variable rate loan plan, which was introduced by the Houston Bank last July, lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in the price which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans.

"Recent Improvements in the money market have made this reduction possible," Kerr stated, adding "we are very happy about it." The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the bank had slightly over one-half billion dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local Association makes and services loans in Bailey and Parmer Counties. Members of the local board of directors are Gordon Duncan, president; Morris Douglass, vice-president; Jim Claunch, A. L. Hartzog and James Glaze.

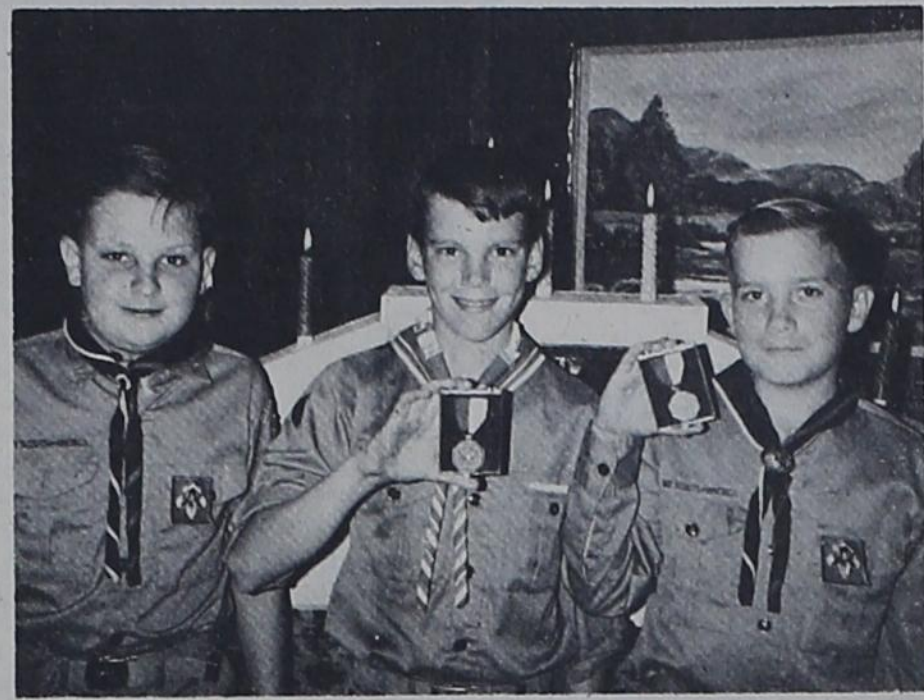

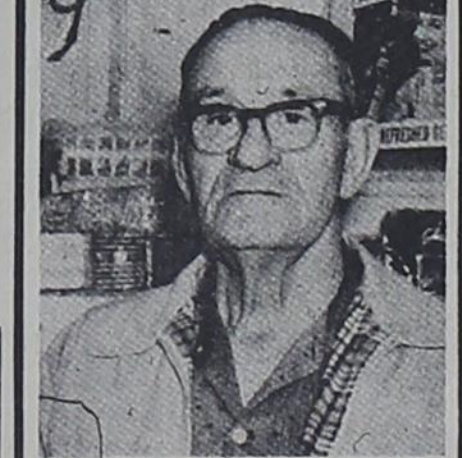

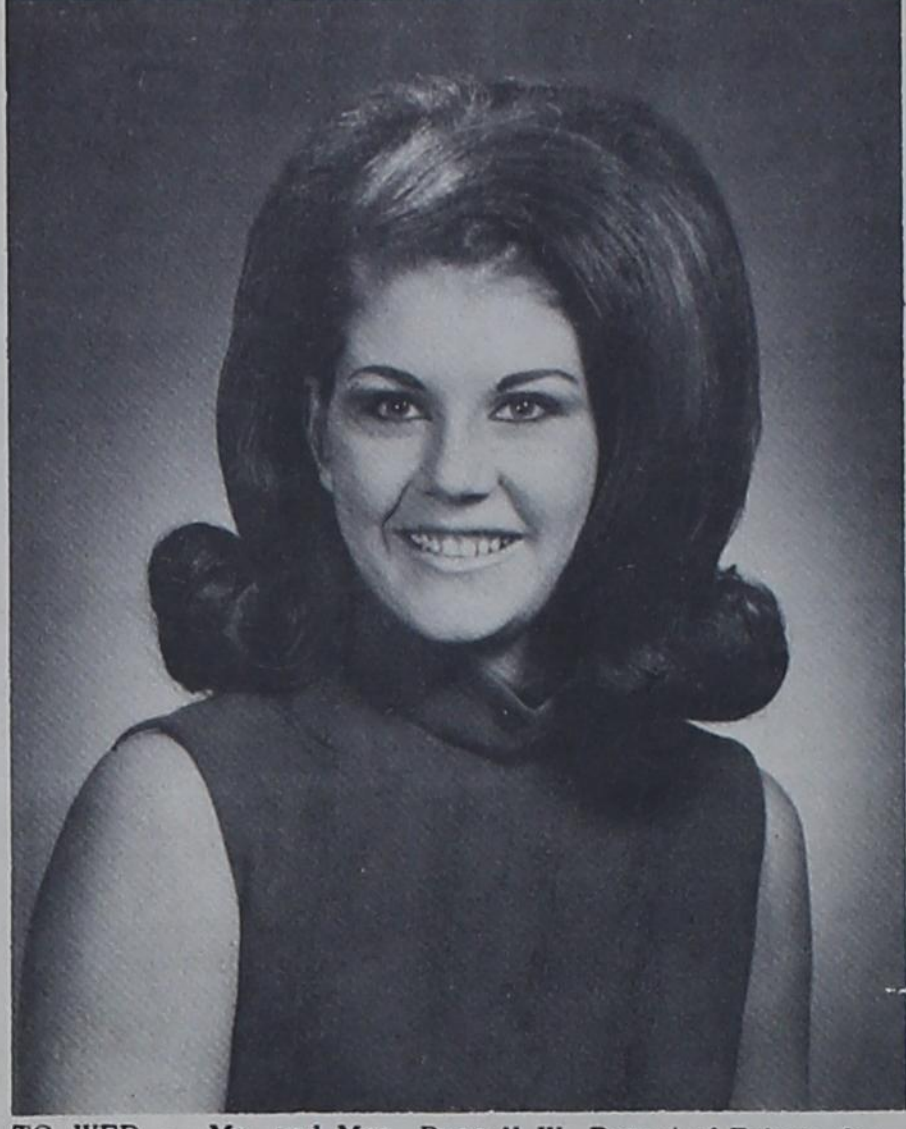
