Graham said work done under the popular Great Plains Conservation Program in the northwes! one-third of the state has been a big factor in reducing Texas dust storms. He pointed out that in the last 10 years in this 99-county area, soilprotecting grass has been planted on 700,000 acres of rangeland; 463,000 acres of highly erosive cropland has been retired from farming and planted to grass; and strip cropping, stubble mulching, cover cropping, and other conservation measures have been applied to some 2.3 million acres of cropland. Vast areas of grassland have also been improved.


SCS conservationists help farmers, ranchmen, city officials, and other users of land plan and apply measures to prevent wind and water erosion. This work is done through 187 locally run soil and water conservation districts in Texas, Graham concluded.
