days. Four of the old familiar days of rest will be shifted around to fall on a Monday; and one holiday, Veterans Day, will be shifted from November to October. This seems to us to play very liberal with the original Armistice Day which was November 11. the armistice date of World War I. George Washington will also have his birthday changed to conform to "Monday-itis"; Memorial Day will be changed to follow the "New Speak". Labor Day already falls on Monday.

In addition, a brand new national holiday will be created. Columbus Day will be celebrated on the second Monday of October. This doesn't grab us as a holiday. We have always considered ourselves as patriotic as the next citizen, but Christopher Columbus just does not cause our head to bow or our eyes to moisten with patriotic ferver. In Friona --**Steers Meet Chieftains**

The Farwell Steers will collide with the Friona Chieftains, their cross-county rivals, tonight at Chieftain Stadium. Game time is 8 p.m. This will be the first regular season game for both of the teams this year; however the Steers have played scrimmage games with Portales and Hereford Juniors, The Chiefs have met Boys Ranch and Springlake in scrimmage games.

Coach . by Booth stated early this week, "We'll be ready for the Chie's Friday night." He went on to say, "We will use a wideopen attack, with a throwing and running offense." He states that the two teams will be about the same size in the backfield; however the Friona line will outweigh the Steer line by several pounds per man. As a whole the Steer squad will weigh an average of 165 lbs, per man. The Chieftains weigh about 180 lbs. on the average.

While Coach Booth states that he knows little about the personnel of the Chieftain team he says they will have a strong running game with the same type offense as that used last year. The Chiefs move well and are lauded as a strong defensive club;

however, "We will be ready for them," he reiterates. In the scrimmage with Hereford on Thursday, the Steers looked Chandler Services Held good overall, according to Coach Booth. He stated that the offense was irratic, with the running game lacking a little, but the passing was good. Defense was "pretty good," and Coach Booth expresses himself as "well pleased" with the team effort. The boys looked better than they had the week before in the scrimmage with Portales, he stated. 



This is a good thing and has our whole-hearted support. We think that many of our state constitutions are a horrible hodge-podge of special interest laws and archaic legal deadwood. A periodic revision is also in order for Texans. We in Texas are the victims of a terrible mess for a State Constitution, not to mention a legislature.

One of the things New Mexico is considering is a long or short ballot. That is, to have many officials elected by the people and thereby produce a long ballot or to let a few elected officials appoint many of the other public servants. This would cut down on the number of elected officials and hence produce a short ballot.

We are completely in agreement with those who favor the long ballot. We think that it is not asking too much of the citizen to vote for ALL the people who will control his very life and future. There is no more crying need in America today than that of returning local government to the people by making it easier for the citizen to participate, and more difficult for the politician to control. * * * *


