

License Tags Available By Mail

Residents of the state of Texas will have the opportunity of securing their automobile license tags by mail in 1970 for the first time. Their neighbors in New Mexico have been able to obtain their auto tags by mail for a number of years.

All Parmer County residents are urged to check their mail carefully before throwing any away since the forms for obtaining the car tags will arrive in a narrow envelope, marked "important" some time during the month of January. How-

ever, licenses do not go on sale until February 1.

The application is a three-part form which should not be torn apart. Instructions will be included with the form.

At the beginning of the registration period residents may take their application and fee to the county tax office -- or order by mail -- whichever is most convenient. However on March 1, the auto licenses will no longer be available by mail. April 1 is deadline for registration of all motor vehicles.

Persons who wish to have their tags sent by mail should send the application form to the county tax office along with the registration fee, plus \$1.00, for handling and postage. Be sure to include your correct address which will be shown on the registration form.

If you are one of those people who would rather go to the courthouse or substation to obtain your car tags, then take the application form with you... present it to the clerk along with the proper fee and she will place a sticker on the application form -- showing your registration number and other necessary data -- and handover your 1970 auto license plates.

With the initiation of the new mail order service the obtaining of car license plates should be speeded up greatly.

Details Of 1970 Grain Program

Producers in Parmer County will receive notice of their feed grain bases and an explanatory leaflet on the 1970 Feed Grain Program in January. Sign-up period for the voluntary farm programs - including wheat and cotton as well as feed grains - will be February 2 through March 20. The 1970 Feed Grain Program will be much like the 1969 program. Provisions of the 1970 Wheat and Cotton Programs were announced earlier. Following are the details on the 1970 Feed Grain Program.

1. Acreage diversion and diversion payments.
2. Minimum diversion at 20 per cent of a farm's feed grain base acreage will be required for

program participation. No payment will be made for this first 20 per cent diversion, except for small farms.

Payments will be made for additional diversion of corn, grain sorghum, and barley. Maximum acreage that can be diverted for payment will be the larger of 30 per cent of a farm's feed grain base or 25 acres less the qualifying 20 per cent diversion. Payment rate for this additional diversion will be based on 40 per cent of the total county price support (loan plus support payment) times a farm's projected yield of the crops involved. No advance diversion payments will be made. Upper limits will be es-

established on the per bushel rate which will be paid for the additional voluntary diversion of feed grain acres. The maximum payments will be: for corn, 60 cents per bushel; for grain sorghum, 55 cents per bushel (not hundredweight); for barley, 45 cents per bushel.

2. Price-support loans and payments.

National average price-support loan rates on all feed grains will be the same as in 1969. However, corn loan rates, while unchanged, will be at \$1.08 per bushel. "No. 2" basis - which is equal to the 1969 level of \$1.05 for average quality. The national average loan levels of the other feed grains will be: grain sorghum, \$1.61 per hundredweight; barley, 83 cents per bushel; oats, 63 cents per bushel; rye, \$1.02 per bushel. (Price-support is required by law for oats and rye, but there are no provisions for acreage limitations.)

Price-support payment rates will be: corn, 30 cents per bushel; grain sorghum, 53 cents per hundredweight; barley, 20 cents per bushel. Price-support payment for a farm is arrived at by multiplying the per bushel price-support payment times the farm's projected yield times the smaller of the planted acreage or 50 per cent of the farm's feed grain base.

3. Small farm provisions.

A farm with a feed grain base of 25 acres or less will be able to qualify for payment on the first 20 per cent of its diverted acreage, with the payment rates based on 20 per cent of its diverted acreage, with the payment rates based on 20 per cent of the total county support rate times projected yield. For the remaining diverted acreage on small farms, the diversion payment will be based on the 40 per cent payment rate, subject to the maximum limitation.

Producers with feed grain bases of up to 125 acres will have the option of temporarily reducing their base to 25 acres to become eligible for the small farm provisions. In such cases, no corn, grain sorghum, or barley is to be planted for harvest on the farm and the temporary 25-acre feed grain base must be put to conserving uses.

4. Other program provisions.

Soybeans planted in lieu of feed grains will not earn price support payments.

Malting barley will not be exempt from diversion requirements in 1970 since supplies are more than adequate to meet needs.

Substitution provisions relating to wheat and feed grain acreage will continue as in pre-

At Home In Parmer County

To restore the non-stick quality to your Teflon cookware, scrub it with a plastic scrubber but never a metal pad or scouring powder.

Once - a - week scrubbing should renew both old and new types of Teflon finishes. To remove any unsightly stains and to restore the utensil to an almost new look, use a special commercial cleaner designed for Teflon or use this recipe:

- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup household bleach
- 2 tablespoons baking soda

In the utensil boil for 5-10 minutes or until the stain disappears. Wash the pan thoroughly and oil it before you use it again.

Are frankfurters and hot dogs the same thing? Well, almost. Hot dogs or wieners are "skinny franks." Franks are about one inch in diameter and 4 inches long; wieners are about 3/4 inches in diameter and 4 to 5-1/2 inches long.

Have you asked, "Does cold water remove soil effectively?" To find out, home economists from six experiment stations in the Western States teamed cold water laundering against hot water.

Results? Mrs. Doris Myers, extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University, reports that hot water temperatures (140 degrees F) used with a regular detergent was most effective in removing soil.

In the test, home economists applied soil similar to that accumulated in normal clothing wear to white cotton fabrics. They then washed the fabrics in hot water with heavy duty granular detergent and with liquid cold water detergent and repeated the procedures with cold water.

The four methods were compared for appearance, smoothness and softness. Fabrics washed in hot water also tended to be smoother and softer.

Pasture Grass Big Factor In Profitability

Pasture grasses are rapidly becoming of major importance in both the High Plains and Rolling Plains. Midland Bermuda grass, which has proven its adaptability over the past few years, along with Indiangrass and Switchgrass, which have long ago proven their adaptability, are the principal grasses being established.

High-producing pastures do not "just happen." They are planned and managed for. There are not any "short-cuts" in establishing high-producing pastures. The following are "musts" to consider in establishing high-yielding, improved pastures:

1. Soil must be highly productive. A shallow, eroded soil can store only limited moisture and fertility. If the soil produces low yields from cultivated crops, it likewise will be expected to produce relatively low yields in grasses.
2. Must select adapted species of grasses. There are many grasses adapted to the Texas Panhandle. However, many of these do not respond favorably to fertilization and/or irrigation.
3. Must have proper seedbed. Many failures to get grass established can be traced to improper seedbed preparation. If the seedbed is considered adequate for the planting of grain sorghum, then it is adequate for grass planting.
4. Must have good planting material. High-quality seeds may cost more in the beginning, but in the long run, they have proven less expensive. There is little loss in livability of Bermuda grass springs when they are planted immediately after digging. If the sprigs are to be transported any distance, dampen and cover and get them in the ground as soon as possible.
5. Material must be planted at the proper time. Failure to obtain stands after July 1 are quite common since the grass has insufficient time to establish an adequate root system

and, in many instances, winter-kills.

6. Must control weeds. Any plant that competes with improved pasture grass is a weed. Effective methods of control may be herbicidal sprays, cultivation, or even controlled grazing, depending upon the species of weed competition.
7. Must fertilize properly. Vigorous growing grasses such as Midland Bermuda grass, Switchgrass, and Indiangrass respond to fertilizers in many ways. The water requirement per ton of forage produced will be reduced about one-third on well-fertilized pastures as compared to non-fertilized. The tonnage will be much higher and the feed value will be almost doubled.
8. Must allow plants to establish before grazing. Since grass plants receive approximately 95 per cent of elements for growth taken from the air through the leaves and the elements are transported to the roots as "stored food," it is all important that the grass be allowed to keep its leaves until established in order to carry on the manufacturing process.
9. Must follow a timely and proper irrigation plan that will provide about one-third inch of water each day.
10. Must properly use the grass after it is established. Research and experience have shown that Midland Bermuda grass should be grazed no closer than five inches, and tall grasses such as Indiangrass and Switchgrass no closer than 12 inches during the growing season. Since over 80 per cent of the total feed value of a grass is above the proper-use height, one only risks the disappointment in reduced yield if it is not properly used.

Cold Wave Continues

Although no measurable amount of snow fell on Monday some snow did fall throughout the day from an almost cloudless sky. The temperature which has been in the 20's and 30's for the past week, hovered around the zero mark during the early morning hours and remained low throughout the day. A strong wind added to the discomfort of the unusual cold.

On Tuesday, although the sun shone brightly from a cloudless sky, the temperature remained in the 20's. Weather prognosticators indicate that more cold weather may move in by the weekend.

The length of the cold spell has allowed little opportunity

for snow which fell early last week to melt. Cattlemen and farmers are looking for a break in the weather since the unusual amount of snow has caused difficulty in cattle feeding.

Traffic which moved at a snail's pace last week is almost back to normal at this time. However, much ice and caked snow still remain on the city streets.

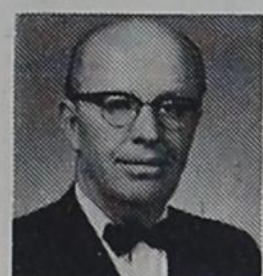

Livestock is to be rendered as personal property. While there is often a question as to the fairness, tax laws in the State of Texas are very definite as they pertain to livestock. Thus we have no alternative but to adhere to the laws as they exist.

Livestock is assessed for tax purposes according to its location on January 1st, regardless of the owner's residence. All livestock in the Farwell School District on January 1st of this year must be rendered by the owners or those in charge or possession. Taxes will be due the following Fall and payment should be made to this office.

Since by law, the rendering of property is the responsibility of the owner, it is hoped that the livestock will be properly rendered to the Tax Office by all owners. A 100% count is expected. This will prevent inconvenience and liability for feed lot operators and others in charge.

We appreciate your cooperation of the past and hope that the above information will be of assistance as you plan your feeding operations. For your convenience the form below may be used to return the needed information to the school tax office.

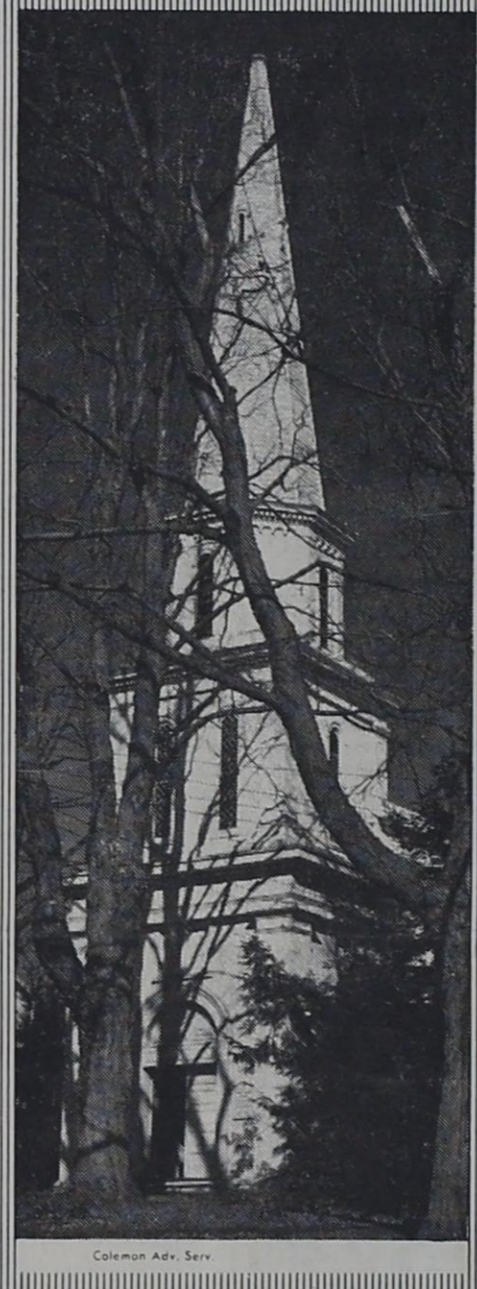

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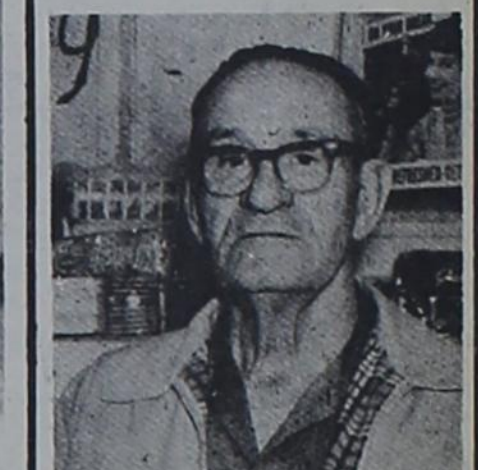
