Formal Coronation Set - -

Plans Are Underway For Farwell Freshman Initiation, Homecoming

A week of frenzied, hurry-up, slow-down, spirit raising, "halt, freshman" activities will get underway late this week as freshman initiation and Farwell Steer Homecoming plans kick off today (Friday).

Activities will be formally launched this afternoon at the high school when 1974 seniors draw for "their freshman."

During the forthcoming week, each senior will be responsible for his freshman's activities and the activities are a bit on the unusual side.

Tentative plans for next week include a special day every day. Kid Day ranks first on the tentative agenda with the freshmen portraying kids on Monday. Tuesday will see the school hosting the kids' counterparts when Old Persons Day rolls around. Wednesday will see a circus as the freshmen plans include Animal Day to be followed by Tacky Day Thursday. Highlighting the daily activities will be Dress Up Day Friday, Oct. 4, when all school administrators and students are urged to don their "Sunday go to meetin' duds" for the day of festivities when the 1974 Homecoming Queen and Beau will be announced.

Homecoming spirit-raising events will kick off Thursday evening, Oct. 3, at 8 p.m. when the freshman-sponsored bonfire and pep rally will begin warming spirits for a Steer defeat of the O'Donnell Eagles during the Homecoming clash scheduled for 8 p.m. in Steer Stadium. The bonfire and pep rally will be held south of the school buildings and everyone is urged to attend.

A change in coronation events has been announced for the 1974 crowning. According to Joyce Hargrove, Pep Club sponsor, formal Homecoming Coronation activities will be conducted at 2:45 p.m. Friday,

Oct. 4, in the gymnasium. Candidates were to be chosen late this week with the pep club selecting five beau candidates, one representing each class and one candidate-at-large. Farwell's football teams were to select five queen candidates; again, one from each class and one candidate large.

Following the formal crowning by last's year Queen Cindy Watts and Beau Kent Armstrong, a spirit rally will be conducted during which the band will play and, hopefully, the "roof will be raised with the rising spirits" of all those in attendance.

Friday afternoon at 5:30 a senior chili supper will be served in the cafeteria and patrons will be served a menu of chili, beans and homemade pie. Tickets may be purchased from any senior or at the door. They are priced at \$1.75 for adults and \$1 for children and students.

The 1974 Homecoming game will kick off at 8 p.m. in Steer Stadium with the Steers hosting O'Donnell. During halftime activities of the game the 1974 Queen and her court will be presented to those in attendance. They will be escorted around the field and will remain on the sidelines throughout the remainder of the clash.

Everyone in the area is invited to attend the Homecoming activities beginning with the bonfire and pep rally Thursday evening. An open invitation is also extended to everyone for the coronation and spirit rally Friday afternoon and for the chili supper preceding the Homecoming clash.

With last week's contest a thing of the past, the field of

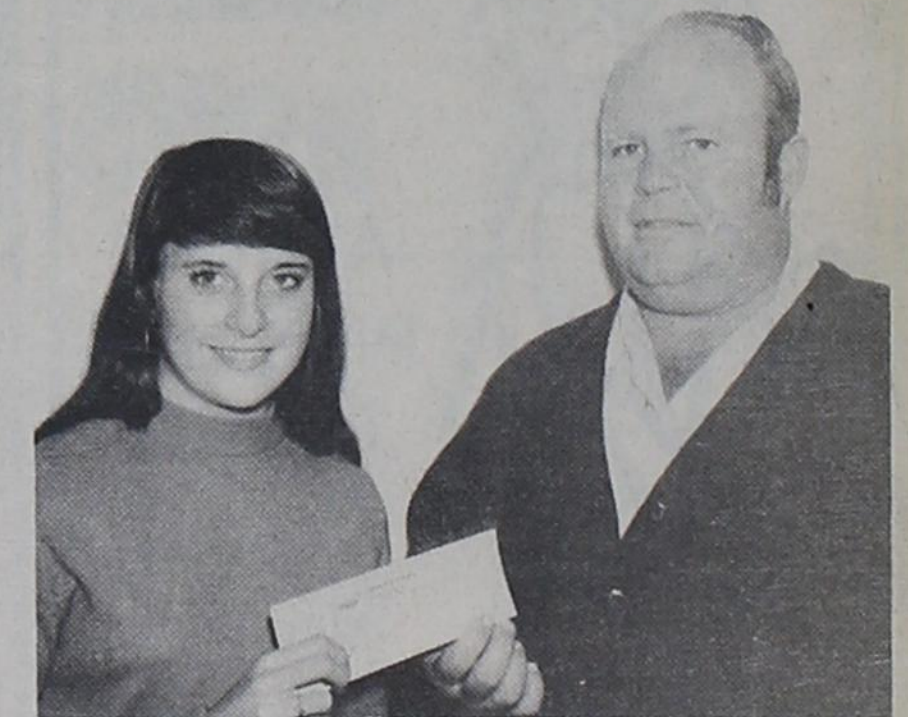

Randy Chandler Injured In Farm Tractor Accident

Randy Chandler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Chandler, was injured Thursday, Sept. 19, between 3:30 and 4 p.m. in a tractor mishap about one mile east of Farwell.

According to the youth's father, Randy was sowing wheat and tried to get back onto the tractor as it was moving. He fell and the tractor passed over his leg, the edge of his back and rib cage and the edge of his shoulder. A wheat drill behind the tractor also passed over Randy.

Mitz Walling and Milton Lee Walling discovered Randy approximately 30 minutes after the accident occurred. The Farwell emergency vehicle was summoned to the scene and Randy was transported to Memorial Hospital in Clovis by Milton Lee Walling and Joe White.

Randy was admitted to the emergency room where it was discovered that he suffered a dislocated hip and numerous cuts. However, he had no broken bones. He was dismissed from the hospital on Sunday and presently is recovering at home. His father says he is doing "just fine" now. Randy suffered no permanent injuries, and his father said the doctor stated he should be as good as new in a couple of weeks.

Farwell Voters Give Approval To \$260,000 School Bond Issue

Inclement weather Tuesday did not discourage Farwell voters from going to the polls to decide the fate of the \$260,000 school bond election. Voters approved the measure for school improvements 202 for and 129 against.

Property owners cast 196 ballots for the proposition and 128 against. Non-property owners voted six for and one against.

Approval of the bond issue means that the Farwell Independent School District will be

able to construct a new band room as well as instigate several areas of improvements including air conditioning of the cafeteria and renovation of the gymnasium and wood-working shop including dressing room facilities, flooring, electrical and windows.

Other improvements scheduled include renovating and relocating lights and bleachers on the football field, paving, and a concession stand. The latter item is optional depending on available funds.

Qualified registered voters, both property owners and non-property owners, were able to vote Tuesday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. CDT at the Parmer County Court Room in the Court House.

Members of the Farwell Independent School District Board met Tuesday evening at 9 p.m. to canvass the votes.

Commenting on the passage of the bond issue, School Board vice-president R. J. Garner said, "We sure are pleased that the bond issue passed. It means improvements to the school system that are needed. It was a reasonably good turnout considering the weather."

Walter Hughes, member of the Farwell School Board, commented that he was "real pleased to see the number of people who turned out and was happy to see the vote go the way it did. As a group (the School Board) we were very pleased at the passage."

The travel and tourist boys in Austin have a pitch that says "Texas, the Land of Contrasts." They should come to the Panhandle where everything is bigger if not necessarily better. Here we come out of a record year of drought into almost a record rainy season. Two weeks of clouds and drizzle is almost unknown in this land of sunshine.

Our total rainfall in this period has not been of record proportions but the manner in which it has fallen has been unique for this area of the country. A 72-hour steady rain with little or no wind is SOP for Houston but for Texico-Farwell it is - well, UNUSUAL.

While this spell of dampness has been unusual, again we have missed some of the six- to eight-inch post pullers that hit other communities. For this we can be very thankful - we would strangle on that much water in a three- or four-hour period.

In our 26 years of local weather watching, we do not recall Texico-Farwell ever having one of these massive cloudbursts. We remember back in the early Fifties a three-inch-plus drenching in a few hours and this left things in bad enough shape.

Possibly some of our older residents with better memories (are you listening, Dutch?) can give us a report on any bigger local downpours. To sum up the overall water picture, "Aren't you glad you live in the Twin Cities?"

We noted a blast by one of our U.S. Senate bleeding hearts about the massive military budget. It's too big, it's too big, he hollars. Yet nothing about the even larger expenditures for social welfare programs. For our tax-battered purse, our sob sisters in the Senate could cut the food stamp program drastically and get nothing but cheers from this corner.

Last week-end we dashed into a local grocery store and picked up a half gallon of milk. Just ahead of us at the check-out counter several youngsters were going through. Their purchases were four candy bars, half gallon of Borden's Golden Vanilla ice cream and a box of prepared cake mix.

For this highly nutritious and necessary list of staples they produced a book of food stamps and paid the approximate \$3 tab. The last kiddo in the line hauled up a "True Confessions" magazine and laid out 60 cents cash. Bread, beans, meat, milk and flour we can understand. Candy bars and ice cream - NO.

We would be glad to GIVE a portion of our few dollars to put substantial and nourishing food in a hungry person's mouth. We bitterly resent the government legally extorting money from our poor purse to provide the luxuries to others we cannot afford for ourselves.

Upon this quirk of human nature, all socialistic societies in the past have foundered. The socialistic trend in Congress will in the fullness of time cause this country to likewise succumb. You cannot rob Peter to support Paul and have it continue indefinitely.

The Texico cheerleaders and Pep Club have scheduled a pep rally to begin at 3:15 p.m. today (Friday) in the new gymnasium at the school.

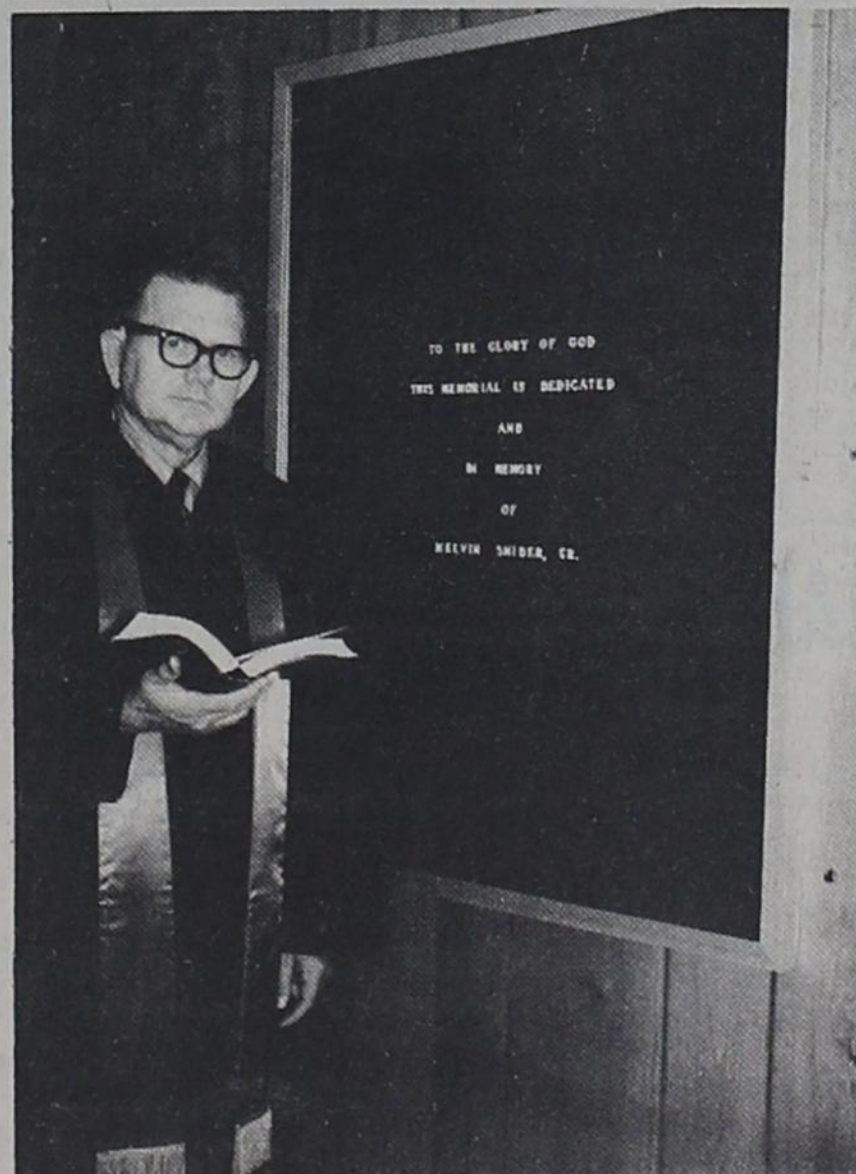

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Vaughn Eagles Soar, Declaw Wolverines, 14-0

Drizzling rain and the Vaughn Eagles combined to temporarily dampen the Wolverine's spirit in last Friday night's game at Texico.

Vaughn received the opening kickoff and returned it to their own 20-yard line. After three tough plays and only five yards gained, the Eagles were forced to punt and the ball was downed on the 48-yard line by a Vaughn halfback.

Tommy Galvan picked up Texico's first down by running 17 yards to Vaughn's 35-yard line. On the following play, Texico fumbled and Vaughn recovered on their own 40-yard line. Two plays later the Eagles completed a pass from Texico's 25-yard line which moved them to the 10.

After a three-yard gain, Tommy Lucero broke across the Wolverine goal line to put Vaughn's first six points on the scoreboard. The extra point was not good and the first quarter ended with the score 6-0.

Vaughn started the second quarter with a first down on Texico's 36-yard line. The Eagles then moved the ball to the one-yard line but were moved back to the 16-yard line because of a holding penalty. Lucero forced his way through the Texico defense for his second TD of the ball game with 8:59 left in the half. The PAT was good and the Eagles extended their lead 14-0.

In third quarter action, Wolverine Steve Harrington re-

turned the kickoff to the 32-yard line, but after three plays the Wolves were forced to punt. The Wolverine defense pushed the Eagles back until they had to punt but Terry Reid and Sammy West tackled the Eagle punter at Vaughn's 18-yard line.

Texico took the ball and on their fourth play, Harrington finally completed a pass to Spencer Turner. But it was not enough for the first down and the ball went to Vaughn. Neither team scored which ended the third quarter with the score remaining 14-0.

Tommy Galvan got the Wolverines going in the fourth quarter when he ran from Texico's 15-yard line to Vaughn's 43. A 15-yard penalty against the Eagles moved the Wolverines to the 28-yard line. Vaughn intercepted a pass and ran to the 32-yard line where they were stopped by Robbie Bradley. The Eagles moved downfield until Harrington picked up a fumble and ran it back to about the 30-yard line.

Steve Askew then took a pass and was knocked out of bounds at the three-yard line. The Wolverines struggled to make the touchdown until Harrington broke around the end and made the TD. But, because of an off-sides penalty against the Wolverines, the touchdown was called back and the game ended with Vaughn on top, 14-0.

Vaughn scored their first touchdown on a three-yard run by Tommy Lucero. Their

second was a pass to Lucero and he ran in from 12 yards out and ran the conversion for Vaughn's 14 points. The rest of the night we contained them and kept them from scoring," stated Wolverine Head Coach Ray Manly in commenting on last Friday's game.

According to Manly, Texico dominated the ball game from early in the second quarter until the final buzzer sounded. "We had a touchdown called back in the fourth quarter," the coach related.

In referring to individual play, Manly said, "Tommy Galvan was our number one running back with 100 yards rushing." He continued by remarking that the defense did a real good job and the offense executed real fine at times.

"The weather was a major factor. Costly fumbles occurred because of a wet ball. It was misting during the first half and the ball was slick. I believe there were about a dozen total fumbles during the game," Manly stated.

The coach referred to Steve Harrington, defensive man, and Steve Askew on the offense for their outstanding play. He also commented on the play of Roger Pace, James Stewart, Spencer Turner and Joey West, who was back full strength following an injury. Manly related, "These boys gave all they had. They played like they were really trying to win."

"The only reason Vaughn scored was our mistakes. They made a few lucky plays which paid off. We were able to con-

tain both their inside and outside running games. We really beat Vaughn everywhere except on the scoreboard. Texico gained 250 yards offensively. Our boys really moved the ball well, we just couldn't score," he said.

Next opponent for the Wolverines will be the Melrose Buffaloes tonight (Friday) at Melrose with game time set for 7:30 p.m. MDT.

In regard to tonight's clash Manly stated, "Melrose isn't big or fast but they're a salty ball club. They will come at you with everything they have and will fight for everything."

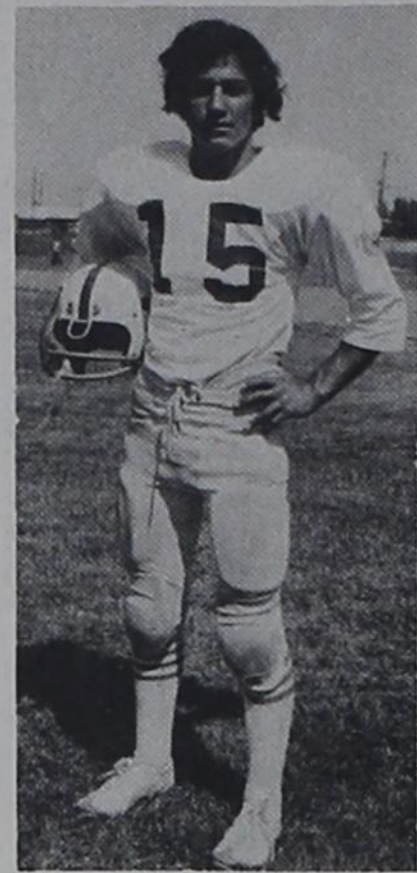
According to Manly, the Buffaloes have lost to Tatum and Fort Sumner and will be playing for revenge. But, Manly commented, the Wolverines should be able to handle them fairly easy and it should be a real contest on the field.

"In order to take Melrose, we must get our offense and defense working in unison," he said, continuing, "If we can accomplish this, we really should take them very easily."

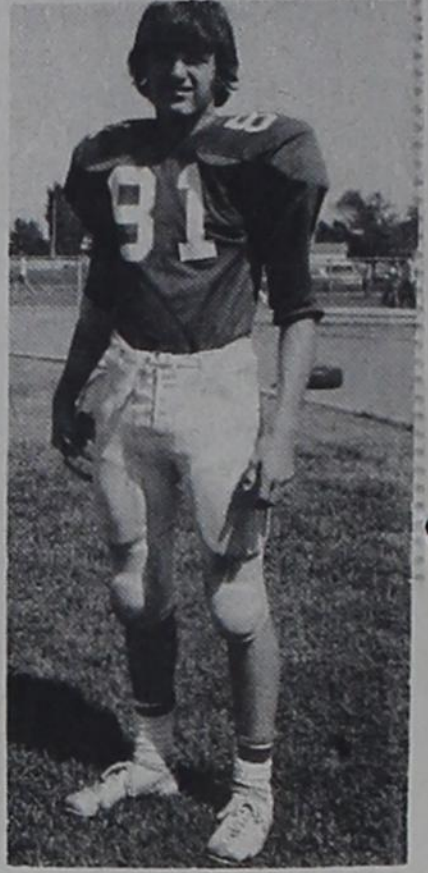
Manly related plans for player "platooning" during tonight's battle. "We will be playing all the boys as much as possible."

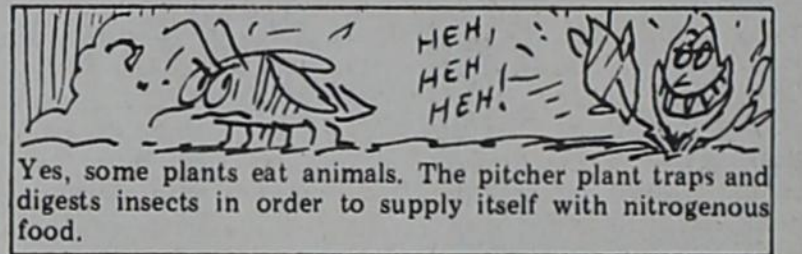

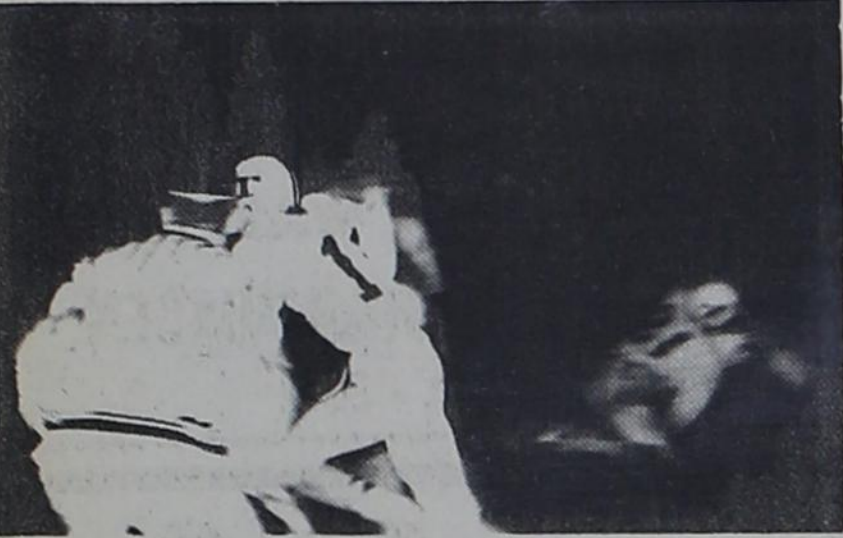

Wolverines 'Buffalo' Melrose In Shut-Out

The Junior Wolverines of Texico High School hosted the Melrose Buffaloes for action last Thursday, Sept. 19, and shut-out their opponents 28-0.

"The boys played like they should and kept their heads straight," said Coach Kenneth Shaw in commenting on Thursday's action. The coach further stated that the Wolverines' opponents had no advantages and the teams appeared to be closely matched.

"We had 260 yards total gained in the game," remarked Shaw. The yardage was picked up on 43 total game plays. Credited with the yard gainers were Steve Turner, 90 yards; Holmer Asley, 64 yards; Terry Rolan, 37 yards; Ricky Orojzo, 38 yards; Ruel Esparsa, 17 yards; and David Newcomb, 14 yards.

It was reported the Wolverines had two touchdown plays called back. According to Shaw, the first call-back was on a 95-yard punt return and the second TD call-back was on a 28-yard run.

Credited with TD's for the Wolverines were Holmer Asley, two TD's; Newcomb, a 13-yard TD run; and Turner, a 10-yard TD run.

Outstanding players cited by the coach were Holmer Asley, quarterback, and defensive man, Glen Summers, who was recognized for having made the most game tackles.

Shaw stated, "We played 35 players and still had 27 who

didn't play. But, we don't plan any personnel changes for the game Thursday."

The Wolverines were to meet the Portales Lambs in action at Portales Thursday (yesterday) at 2 p.m. MDT.

In regard to the Wolverines' Thursday game Shaw commented, "We should have no trouble beating them if we play like we should. But, along with the boys, it helps the team a lot if there is support behind them."

The coach, players and supporters urge everyone to support the Wolverines as they face their various opponents during the 1974 football season.

Eighth Grade Yearlings Claim Second Season Win

The Muleshoe Mules hosted a defeating team last Thursday, Sept. 19, as Farwell's eighth grade Yearlings invaded Mule territory and swamped their opponents 12-6.

According to Yearling Coach Larry McDorman, "The clash was pretty well a defensive game til late in the second quarter." During second quarter action, Rowdy Chandler gained the end zone on a dive from one yard out to put the Yearlings on the scoreboard. Points after touchdown try failed and the Yearlings led 6-0.

Muleshoe was unable to even up the scoring tally and when play for the first half closed the Yearlings were still leading 6-0.

Muleshoe hit pay dirt during third quarter action and tied the score 6-6 with their PAT failing. The score remained six-up til early in the fourth quarter when Bruce Mayfield, a pulling guard, threw a key block which freed Randy Russell who ran 30 yards and again put the Yearlings on the scoreboard, 12-6. Gary Lee hit for the PAT but the play was called back on an off-sides penalty. The second PAT attempt by Russell was successful but once again it was called back on an off-sides penalty.

The Yearlings' third attempt at the PAT failed and the score remained 12-6, Farwell. "Tony Madreno, nose guard, was one of the main stays on the Yearling defense. He was real tough," stated McDorman in reference to last Thursday's clash. "Our defensive ends, David Hernandez and Joe Costillo, played a good game for us," he continued, adding, "DeeDee Foster was real tough in his linebacker position also."

In a summary of the game McDorman related, "Overall it was a real good game. It was pretty nip and tuck in the fourth quarter. Muleshoe was in a drive on our 20-yard line in the last three minutes of the game, but we held them."

The Yearlings were to have an open date scheduled Thursday (yesterday) and are preparing for their next clash when they host Plains in Steer Stadium on Oct. 10.

The defensive game went for four quarters without either team putting one point on the scoreboard. The two teams were pretty evenly matched as far as experience and weight. Farwell's offense threatened to score a couple of times, but could never quite make it over the glory line.

Lesley Curtis kept feeding the ball to Mike Woods and George Garza and the Steers gained several first downs with assists by Jay Alana, but the gains were never quite enough for the entire evening. The plus points for the Steers seemed as elusive and slippery as the field Friday night.

During the second quarter, Woods intercepted a Valley pass and headed for the enemy lines. But the drives just never seemed to be enough to win the battle. While the Steer line held off the advances from the Patriots, the Valley defense was no weak link, holding off the Steers at each attack.

Second half game action was much the same as the first half, the only difference being that there were less fumbles and penalties on the part of the Steers. The score remained just the same for both teams. Farwell's defense looked good, but the offense just couldn't get over into scoring range. The climax of the wet, muggy evening wasn't very exciting... just the same old zeros at the end of the game -- Farwell, 0; Valley, 0.

The Steers have a rest this week, but the excitement of Homecoming should conjure up thoughts and dreams of a BIG WIN for the Steers.

"Our Steers did play a real good ball game but they should have played better. They just didn't cash in on some

breaks," stated Steer Head Coach Eugene Jennings.

According to the coach, field conditions during last Friday's clash didn't affect the game. "Valley had a slight advantage in that they were larger and a little quicker than the Steers. The Patriots displayed a real team effort during the game," the coach said.

The Steers suffered no lasting injuries during the clash and the coaching staff reported that the little nagging injuries which have slowed the Steers down during season play should take care of themselves during the forthcoming week since Farwell has an open date scheduled tonight (Friday) and will not see action on the field until next Friday, Oct. 4.

In regard to individual Steer players, Jennings commented on Clint Robertson. "Clint played a real good defensive ball game. Overall, our defensive game was stronger than our offensive." The coach continued by stating that the Steers made too many "mental errors and suffered from broken assignments."

In further recognition of players, Jennings cited linebackers Jay Alana, David Cantu and Gene Christian for playing a "better defensive game than previously played." Chip Craft was referred to by the coach for a "real good effort defensively."

In commenting the coach said, "We had some young boys who showed promise in David Snider and Kent Goldsmith."

Statistics for the game re-

vealed Brad Jones hauled in three passes for 57 yards gained which, according to the coach, "was real good playing." In other statistics, Lesley Curtis hit for five of 12 passes for a total of 71 yards and Woods carried 17 times for 119 yards. Jennings commented, "This is the second game in a row in which Woods has been credited with over 100 yards."

The Steers have an open date scheduled tonight and will face their next opponents on home ground Oct. 4 when they host O'Donnell for the 1974 Farwell High School Homecoming game.

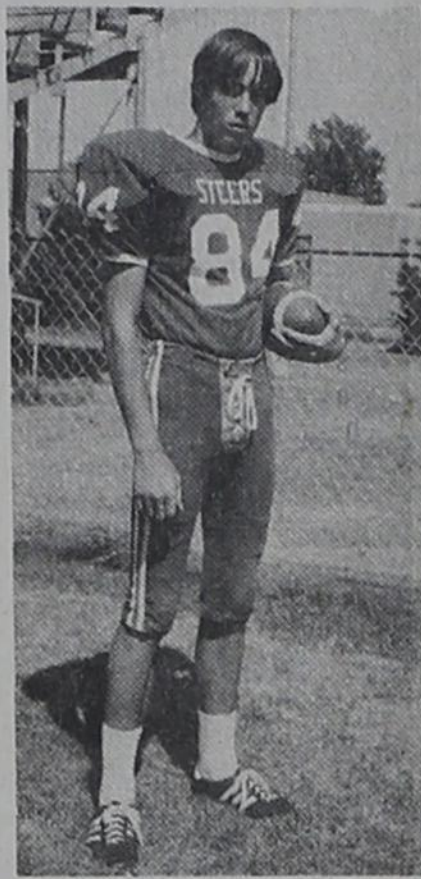

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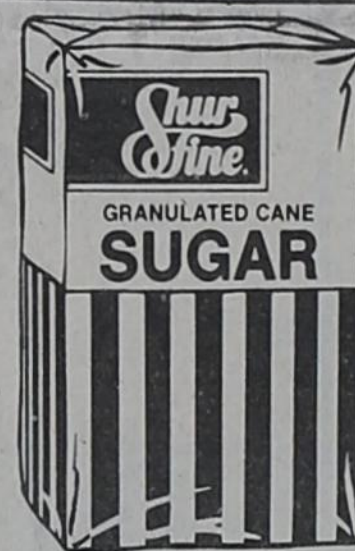

Local Men Enter Golf Tournament

Four men from the Farwell area were entered in competition recently at the Third Annual East Lazbuddie Pelleform Invitational Golf Tournament played at the Country Club in Muleshoe.

Defending champion Hal Helton and his partner, Tim Foster, of Farwell lost their bid for this year's championship to John Loy and Ben Tipton, both of Muleshoe.

Among the 20 players entered in the tournament besides Helton and Anderson were Woodrow Lovelace and Joe Helton, both of Farwell.

Representing Smith-Douglass Pelleform, sponsor for the tournament, during the competition were Dick Fosdick and Lyndel Cownes, both of Texas City.

According to a spokesman for the group, Hal Helton and Foster were tied with Loy and Tipton for the first place slot but were defeated on a third hole play-off.

First place golfers were awarded a putter for their win and a traveling trophy with their names engraved as winners which they will keep for one year or until they lose the championship title.

History of the tournament dates back to 1972 when, on a sunny afternoon in September, five men congregated at Muleshoe Country Club and had a friendly golf match. Little did they know that they were making history by bringing into existence the world famous "East Lazbuddie Pelleform Invitational Golf Tournament."

Although the first tournament was relatively small the competition was fierce. Play see-sawed back and forth until reaching the seventeenth hole, where the first par was recorded (all others were bogeys or above) by the team of Demp Foster and Dick Fosdick. Foster and Fosdick managed to half the eighteenth hole with a double bogey, thus, capturing the title for the first tourney.

The first tournament did not net the winners any prizes, but the prestige began to come to life months later when a trophy was donated by Horace Lanier and Roy Brun of Norfolk, Va.

In 1973 the East Lazbuddie Pelleform Invitational began to stir the attention of golfers from all over the world. It was at this time two essentially unknown golfers appeared from the west to capture the title for the second tournament.

Bob Anderson and Joe Helton conquered the field with a blistering par 36 on the back nine. Anderson and Helton teamed up for a great partnership, since neither one of their individual scores showed to break 100.

Qualified golfers interested in entering next year's tourney are requested to pay strict attention to the rules.

TOURNAMENT RULES FOR 1974

1. All players must tee off at the same time to avoid confusion and the possibility of

teeing someone off who has already been teed off, or teeing someone off who has never been teed off before.

2. All players must start with a new ball and finish with a cut ball (each will be checked).

3. All balls in water cannot be teed up.

4. All fairways will be played as marked, unless ball is outside marks.

5. All divots must be repaired except those made beyond the out of bounds markers.

6. Defending champions (Bob Anderson and Joe Helton) must use putter won in last year's tournament.

7. Jess Wynn and Bill Brown will be penalized 2 strokes on the first tee to compensate for cheating.

8. No bribes will be taken except those concerning additional fertilizer allocations.

9. Givemes will be allowed when putt is inside putter leather. Putting with a driver is not allowed.

10. Winners' names will be engraved on the trophy. The trophy may be displayed by the winners at the place of their choice for a period of one year.

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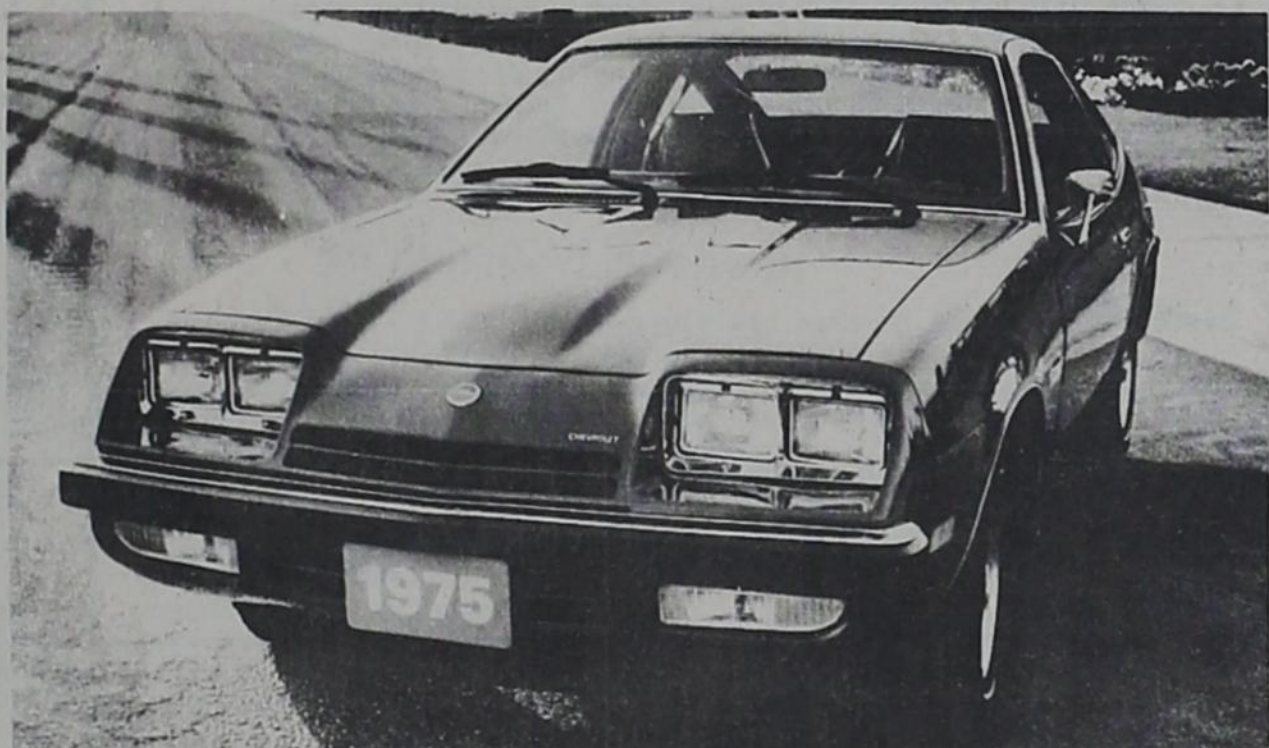
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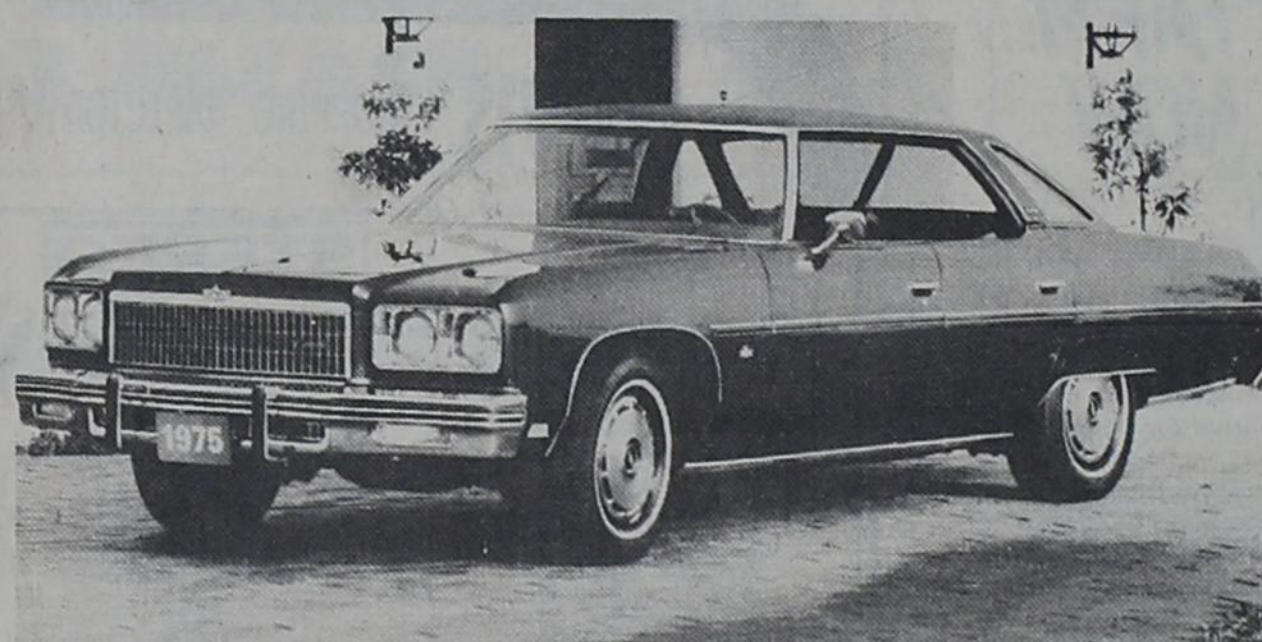

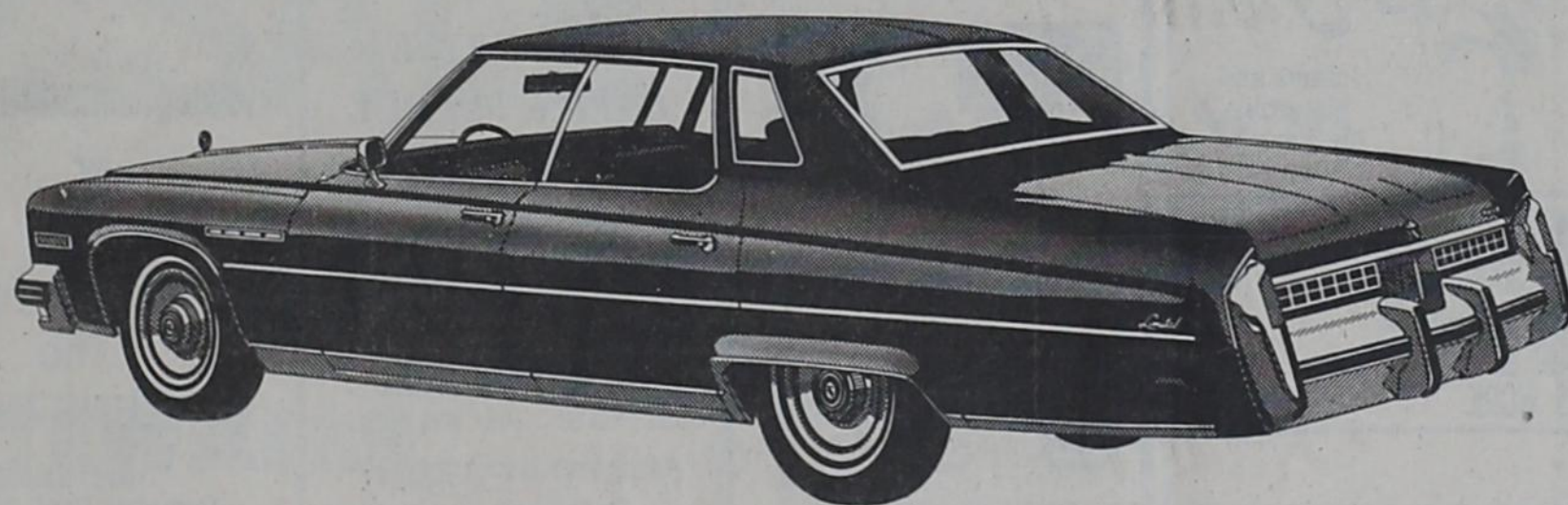

ASLEEP IN A STORM

What a disappointing scene! A terrifying storm, souls in danger of death, but Jonah, the man of God, is sleeping!

Sailors are not soon frightened in a storm, but this time the fury of the gale was so great that "the ship was like to be broken" and even the sailors were driven to their knees "and cried every man to his god" (Jonah 1:4,5).

Can it be that Jonah, the only man aboard who knew the true God, was sleeping? Sleeping in such a storm? Sleeping while souls were perishing? This was the shameful truth, and not one of us would blame the terrified captain for rudely awakening him and crying: "What meanest thou, O sleeper? Arise, and call upon thy God!" (Ver. 6).

Politically, morally, spiritually, the night is dark, the storm is raging and souls are perishing, but "God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts" (11 Cor. 4:6). Texico Resident Harvests Bumper Crop Of Tomatoes

Micky Rogers of 300 Anderson in Texico has had remarkable luck and success with the eight tomato plants that she planted at the end of April. She bought the plants at a grocery store in Farwell and planted them, not utilizing any special plant food, soil or fertilizer. From the plants she has obtained several tomatoes weighing two pounds.

The tomatoes started coming off in June, Micky says, and last Saturday she picked three weighing a total of 3 1/4 pounds. One shelf in her refrigerator has double rows of tomatoes waiting to be put into the freezer and Micky says she has given over two dozen away.

Micky stated she has watered the plants when it hasn't rained, soaking them with a slow drizzling watering. She plans to raise some more tomatoes next year.

What is her secret for the extra large yield of approximately 1/2 to 3/4 pounds each -- "just lots of tender loving care," she says.

Preschoolers Need Snacks

Help your preschooler snack his way to good health, one foods and nutrition specialist suggested this week.

"Small children with small stomachs need more food than they can eat in only three meals each day," Sally Springer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, contended.

Even though the child's growth rate is slower than during infancy, he still needs a diet high in nutrients for growth and energy.

"Snacks eaten at least 2 1/2 hours before mealtime don't seem to influence the child's appetite for the meal," she noted.

Some nutritious snack suggestions are fruit juice, fruit wedges, vegetable sticks, peanut butter cookies and cheese cubes, the specialist continued.

"But filling snacks eaten too near mealtime will increase the chance of the child's loss of appetite," she pointed out.

Another point in favor of snacks is that the body uses smaller, more frequent meals

in a way that slows the formation of adipose -- fat -- tissue and stimulates muscle formation. These are desirable factors in the preschool years, she noted.
