## **New Bike Laws To Affect Texans**

New bicycle safety laws have been recently passed by the 62nd legislature of the state of Texas. The laws went into effect September 1 and are part of the Uniform Act Regulating Traffic on the Highway adopted by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Any person performing any act forbidden, or failing to perform an act required by law will be charged with a misdemeanor, according to Highway Patrolman Glen Fant.

The parent of any child or guardian of any ward shall not authorize or knowingly permit any child or ward to violate provisions of this act, said Fant.

It is strictly the responsibility of the parents or guardians of their child or ward to see that a child obeys these laws, the patrolman added. All bicycles will come under the same laws as a motor vehicle, according to the law.

No bicycle shall be used to carry more than one person at one time other than the number for which the bicycle is designed or equipped. This means no more handlebar riding or riding in front of the operator.

No person riding upon any bicycle or other coaster, roller skate or sled, etc., may attach himself to any vehicle upon a roadway. This has been previously a safety practice, but now is a new law. In the winter, no sled may be pulled by a moving vehicle. "Roadway" means either the city streets, highways or rural roads.

Every person operating a bicycle upon a roadway shall ride as near to the right side of the road as practicable, exercising due care when passing a standing vehicle or one preceding in the same direction.

Persons riding bicycles upon a roadway shall not ride more than two abreast.

Wherever an usable path for bicycles has been provided adjacent to a roadway, bicycle riders shall use such path and shall not use the roadway.

No person operating a bicycle shall carry any package, buncle or article which prevents the operator from keeping at least one hand upon the handlebars.

Also, they must be equipped with a red reflector on the rear which has been approved by the Texas DPS. The reflector must be visible from a distance of 50-300 feet to the rear when in front of lawful upper beams of the headlights of a motor vehicle.

Every bicycle shall be equipped with a brake which will enable the operator to skid his wheels on dry level clean pavement.

Patrolman Fant stresses that if a bicycle operator is caught disobeying these laws, he will be taken to his parents or guardian, and the parent or guardian will receive the citation for the misdemeanor.
