





ASC Reviews 1955 Program in County

The 1955 program year has been reviewed by the county ASC office, and the statistics may be of interest to those in and closely associated with farming in the area. Here is a breakdown of activities and the money appropriated or loaned in connection with them: "The Agricultural Conservation Program-installing 211,316 feet of concrete irrigation tile, \$105,658; control of bindweed with 49,951 pounds of sodium chlorate, \$4,496.-50; emergency wind erosion control, \$4,190.50; 783 acres bench leveling, \$1,174.12; constructing diversion terraces, \$106.72; establishment of summer and winter leguines, \$92; and establishing sod waterways, \$71.25.

What's Happened **To the Statistics?**

A fellow whose name we didn't know addressed the writer on the street recently, wondering what had become of the well drilling statistics which we ran all during last year, about every four weeks.

After explaining to him why we no longer publish the statistics, it occurred to us that the explanation should be passed on to other readers, who might also be wondering about this matter.

The statistics of permits issued and wells completed within the boundaries of the High Plains Water District are still available to us, and we usually take them from the monthly publication of the District, "The Cross Section."

During 1954 and 1955, Parmer County was one of the leading counties in the District in the well drilling statistics, and in fact, may have drilled and completed more new irrigation wells in that time than any other county.

The latest count on the number of wells in the county now stands at 2200, and with most of the choice irrigable quarters already drilled on, it is likely that the "boom" for drilling wells would be over, even if depressed farm prices had not applied the brake they have to development.

Last year and the year before, Parmer County consistently developed as fast, if not faster, than any other part of the District, and we were proud to report those figures. Now, however, the picture has changed, and drilling has slowed to a trickle.

In December, only 16 wells were reported completed here, whereas, in Lubbock County, 40 installations were made. It would be a distortion to present these figures in print without appropriate explanation, however, because there is no distinction made between reporting NEW and REPLACE-MENT wells.

Parmer County, fortunately, has had a minimum of replacement wells in its statistics. Lubbock County, however, has listed many wells as "new" ones, when in reality, they were only taking the place of wells that had failed. The same thing is true in other eastern and southern counties of the District, and has been for some time.

That is the explanation of why we haven't bothered to print well drilling statistics recently, simply because they didn't furnish a truly proportional picture.

We would make a suggestion to District officials that the situation could be clarified considerably if the permit applicant would include in his required information, whether the well was truly a new one, or just a replacement.

At any rate, here is the last go-'round on figures, which is a compilation of the 1955 statistics. Take 'em with a grain of salt: WELLS COMPLETED- FOR ASSESSOR-COLLECTOR: Lubbock, 606; Hockley, 547; Parmer, 494; Lamb, RAYMOND MARTIN 456; Castro, 371; Floyd, 358; Deaf Smith, 285; Bailey, 254; Cochran, 196; Randall, 147; Armstrong, 12; Potter 4.

And a last warning: Don't forget that these figures aren't broken down into pump sizes, either, and capacity of wells is a good yardstick of how FOR STATE REPRESENTATIVE, extensively an area has been developed.

strata between the water table and the redbeds in 1938 before an appreciable amount of water had been pumped from the reservoir. The map in plate 2 shows the decline of the water table from the spring of 1938 to January 1955.

The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of material unwatered since 1938 from the total volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent.

These data show that 12,800,000 acre-feet of water was in storage available for pumping in 1938, and that the net decrease in storage from 1938 to 1955 was 1,100,000 acre-feet. In other words, the net. decrease in storage is about 9 percent of the quantity available in 1938.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent.


