Max Meadors of Clovis was in last week for a reason apparently no other than to find out how crops in and around the county are making out.

We told Max the truth—or as best we knew it—even though it would have been easier to tell him that this is the "greatest year ever."

However, we know that there is a real danger in letting the impression get around that the crops this year are flukes, which they definitely are not.

We have a tremendous grain crop, there is no doubt of that. Production-wise, it broke all records. Profit-wise, it left something to be desired.

It had been our intention to contact all the elevators in the county this week, to get an approximate idea of what our production was in grain sorghums.

Our guess is in the neighborhood of 14,000,000 bushels, but we will attempt to verify this figure before another week goes by.

Cotton, the only relatively high-profit major crop left to High Plains farmers, ranges from "terrible disappointment" to "greatest of our expectations" this year.

Everybody agrees that we had a terrific cotton crop—up until about the middle of October. After that, it was something else.

Rising costs of production, coupled with factors already mentioned, will no doubt mean that there will be less spendable income at the end of this year than was the case a year ago.

But please—don't paint a depression picture from these paragraphs, because it just isn't there. The fertile, highly productive farms of the High Plains are still much better off, as a whole, than many, many, farming areas of other parts of the country.

If you don't believe it, just take a day off for driving in any direction a few hundred miles distant, and make some inquiries. We are sure that you will return convinced that things aren't so bleak after all.

Dick Doshier just-left the office in high spirits, after informing us that the Bass Elliott sale was a "dilly." This is just another barometer that there is spending money around, and that sales can be brisk when properly handled, and if well-advertised.

Oh yes, we forgot. Several people phoned in to explain to us how the Bureau of Reclamation's farm give-away program works. Apparently it's true that the government gives away these farms in drawings.

To be eligible, a person must have a certain amount of liquid assets, have had so many years in farming, and agree to live on and improve the farm he is given. Veterans are preferred.

The trip to Austin over the weekend, although made for business reasons, was enjoyed by the writer and his wife. Previous visits to the capital city have never left us in too happy a humor, and we were always glad to get back home.

The reason, we imagine, is that because on other occasions, trips were made in the summertime. And July or August just ain't no time to be in the pretty Texas Hill Country, we'll assure you.

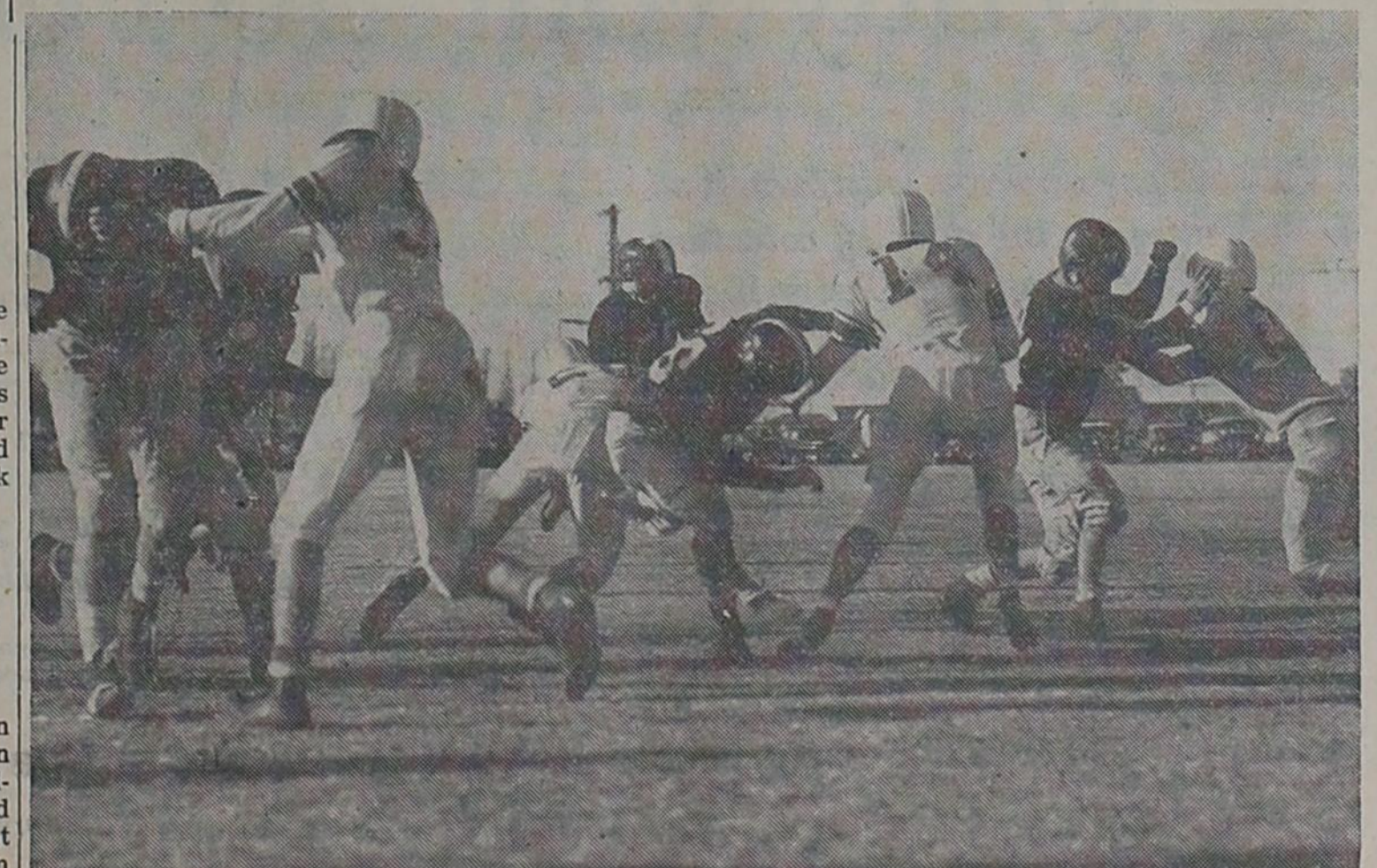

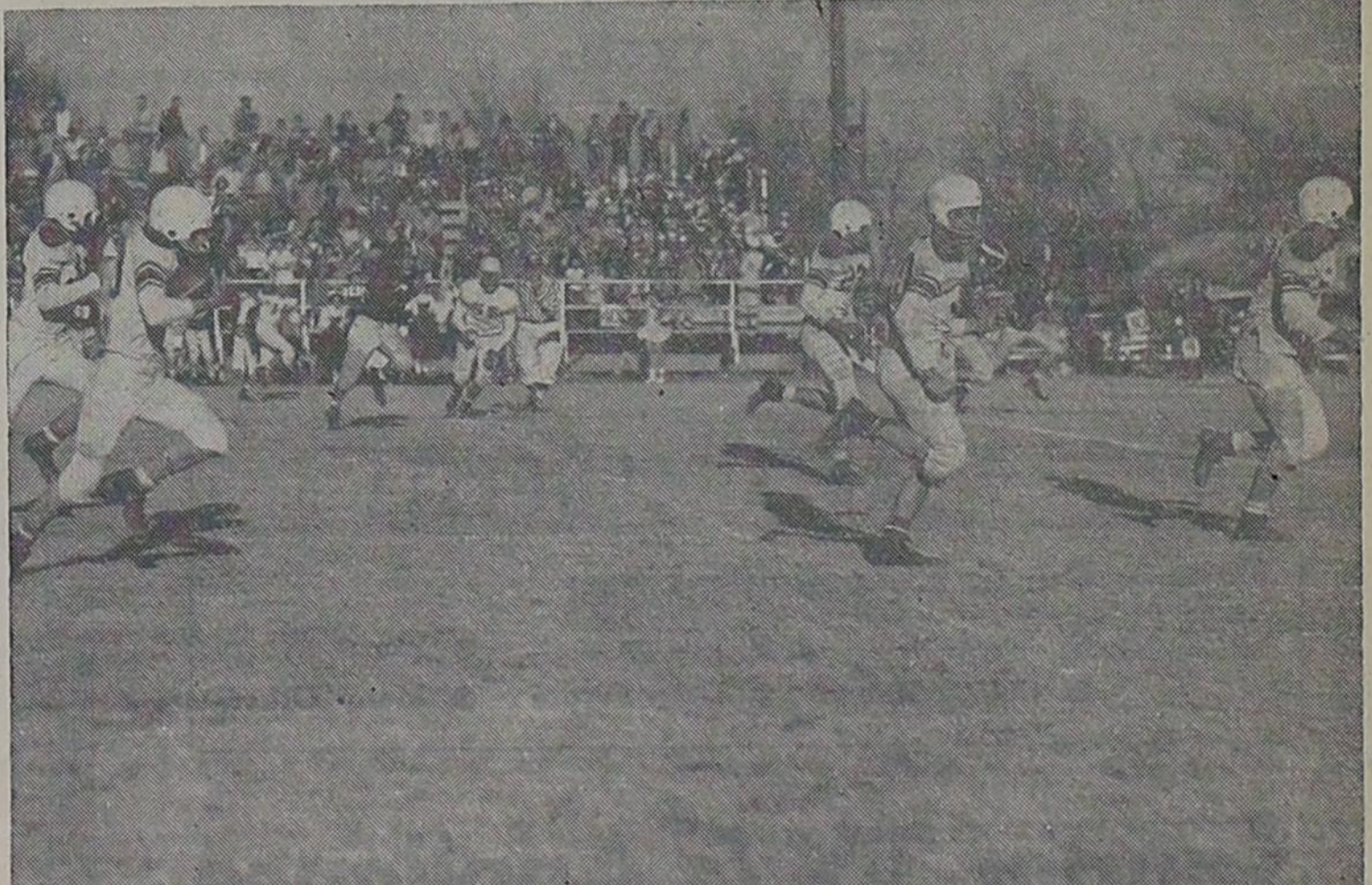

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Easy to Get Confused, But Just Remember to Say 'Yes'

It will be an easy thing to get confused among all the white, pink, and blue ballots at the special Farwell school bond election Saturday, but the important thing to remember before you leave for the polls is to vote "yes."

We say this because we are firmly in support of the board's proposed building and improvement program at the school, which we know to be sensible. The need for the improvements cannot be denied or ignored, and the need will continue to worsen. The time has come to act.

No man serving on the Farwell school board has anything in mind other than what he considers to be best for the district. His is a thankless task, trying to run the school system efficiently and yet economically. Anyone who has ever taken the trouble to attend a school board meeting knows the long hours that must be given to problems that affect the school.

Board members are taxpayers themselves, and no doubt are just as conscious of the "bite" of taxes as would anyone else, but they also are in a position to see what is needed. We have confidence in their judgement.

The needs of our school children should not be ignored. They CANNOT be ignored, in fact, by any community that pretends to be in tune with modern day living. The responsibility of providing their basic needs in the field of education is ours, and should be discharged with as much pride as sense of duty.

The school improvements are needed. The cost is reasonable. It can be repaid by an increase in

Buil Dollars Have Son

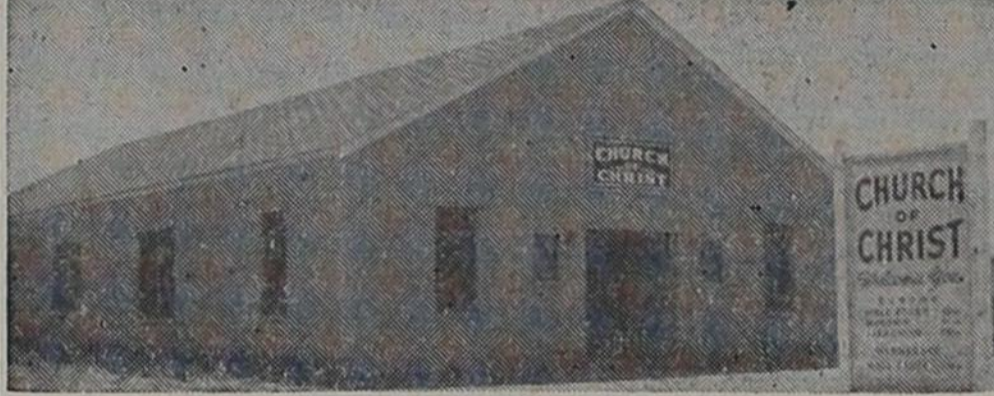

Fire Strikes Elevator At Bovina Friday

Fire, from an undetermined origin, swept through the head house of Bovina Wheat Grower's Elevator early Friday morning destroying the head house and possibly leaving the remainder of the wooden portion of the structure a total loss.

Fire departments from Bovina, Texico-Farwell, Clovis Air Force Base, Friona, and Hereford were called to help extinguish the blaze. The groups of firemen had the fire under control by 9:00 a. m. However, they continued to work on the fire for several hours after.

Capacity of the wooden portion of the elevator was approximately 45,000 bushels and the concrete portion approximately 50,000 bushels. Damage to the grain in the concrete bins will be only from water.

The original flame was noticed in the head house Friday morning about 7:00 a. m. by a passerby who told employees of the elevator, who were in the process of opening the elevator for the day's business, of the fire. One of the employees had checked the head house late Thursday for anything out of the ordinary and found nothing wrong. Damage to the buildings can not

be estimated until all the grain is moved from the storage space, A. C. Teter, manager of the elevator says.

Since the grain moving equipment was destroyed with the head house, the grain will be loaded on the cars with portable elevators.

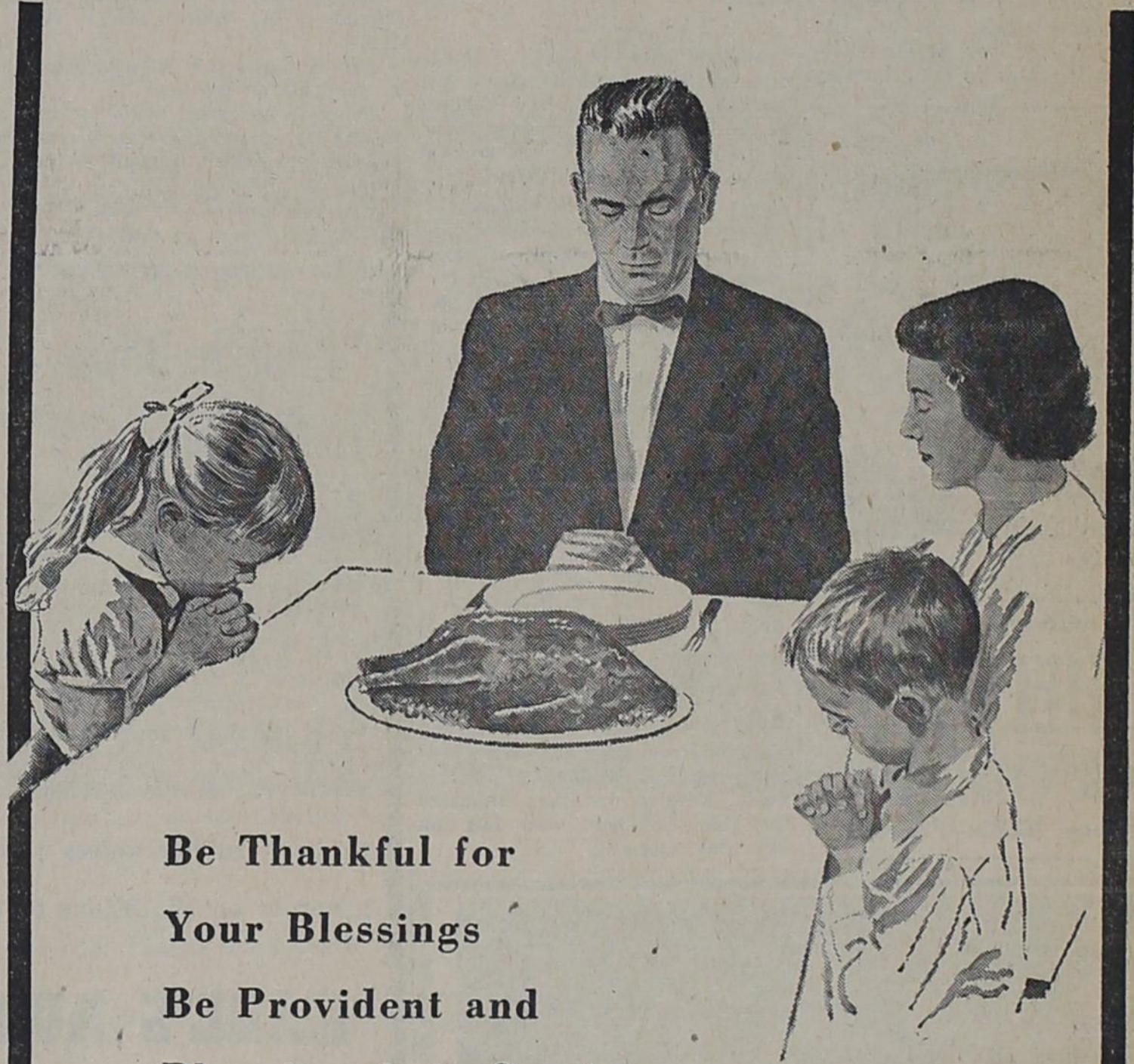

fect the interests of the farmer and the nation. We must have acreage controls to keep production in line with demand. The present program puts the basis of control on the commodity. A more workable program can be set up on the basis of total farm acreage control.

Support prices should be set at 90 percent of parity on all basic commodities when, by referendum, producers favor allotments. On non-basics, the support should vary from 75-90 percent to encourage shifting of over-produced crops to those in short supply.

Good soil conservation should be encouraged by payments on retired acres.

We recommend that only two percent of the state cotton allotment be retained by the state ASC committee.

Parity should be based and applied so as to maintain a true parity between prices obtained for crops and the prices farmers pay. The formula should include all costs of production and be applied so as to reflect the actual percentage of parity indicated. We do not favor the change to the so-called "modern formula."

AFBF should make every effort to channel surpluses to needy people in the U. S. and foreign areas through existing welfare agencies.

Import duties should be maintained to protect American agriculture. Funds derived from such tax should be used in the subsidy program.

We recommend that Smity-Doxey obtain better qualified cotton classifiers who can and will accurately class the farmers' cotton, and also to add such machines that are now in existence, such as Micronaire.

We recommend that CCC provide loan value for cotton classed between grades established with special attention to the difference in spot and light spot grades. Also include plus grades.

We recommend that the federal school lunch program be continued as an outlet for agricultural commodities.

We recommend a sales tax (for financing the state's school system).

We are opposed to support prices or controls on livestock.

There is no sound basis for imposing on cooperatives an income tax on earnings refunded to patrons.

We recommend exemption of motor fuel used on farms from

federal sales tax. We recommend that a committee be appointed to study the price differential between what farmers receive and what housewives pay in the market. We oppose any minimum wage for agricultural labor.

Senate Bill No. 116. Election No. 3: For or against the adoption of Senate Bill No. 116.

Election No. 1 is composed of three propositions and the ballots will be white.

Election No. 2 is composed of one proposition and the ballots are pink.

Election No. 3 is composed of one proposition and the ballots are blue.

A. A person is qualified at all three elections if he or she:

(a) Is a resident of the district; and

(b) Holds a current poll tax receipt or is exempt; and

(c) Owns property rendered on the tax rolls of the district; and

(d) Owns property rendered on the tax rolls of the county.

B. A person is qualified to vote at the first two elections only if he or she possesses all qualifications listed under sub-paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) above, BUT NOT (d).

C. A person is qualified to vote at the second and third elections only if he or she possesses all qualifications listed under sub-paragraphs (a), (b) and (d), BUT NOT (c).

D. A person is qualified to vote at the second election only if he or she possesses both qualifications listed under sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) above, BUT NOT (c) or (d).

If the bonds are approved, a tax increase of 36 cents per \$100 valuation will be necessary to retire the debt over a 25-year period. Rates would be raised from \$1.50 to \$1.86.

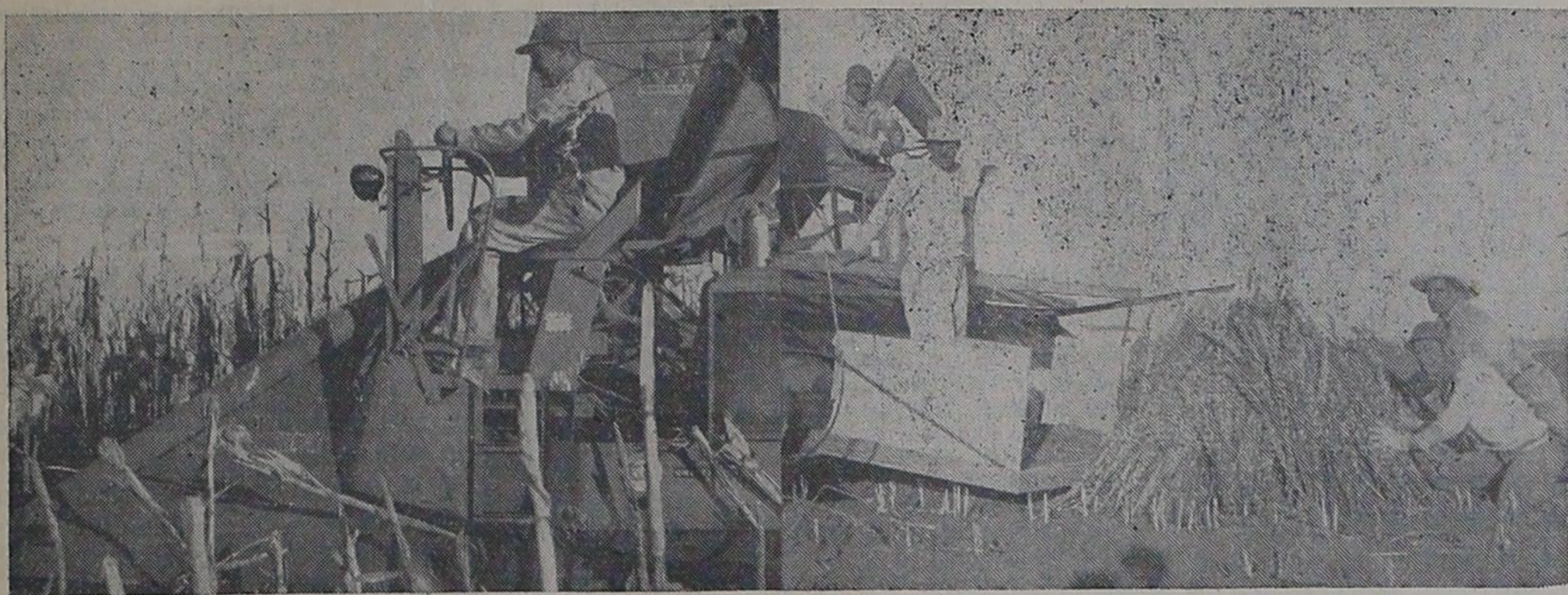

Sesame, Corn Yields Indicate Possibility for these New Crops

Reports from growers of "new" cash crops in and around Parmer County this year indicate that there may be some changes in High Plains farming if present trends continue.

Most farmers who have tried sesame, an oilseed crop, and field corn, the old standby of the Plains 30 years ago, are pleased with results this year, and indications point toward greater acreage of both crops next year.

The seeded sesame crop was estimated to be around 2500 acres the first of the year, and this figure could be fairly well established because the seed outlets were known.

However, poor stands resulted in the destruction of much of this planted acreage, and it is generally agreed that about 1400 acres of sesame have been grown in Parmer County this year.

When one stops to consider that not an acre of this crop has ever been given a commercial trial in the county prior to 1955, it is surprising to notice the acres that were given over to the production of this crop.

Because farmers who grew sesame this year did so "from the book" or under the advice of others because they had no experience, many admit they learned a lot from their mistakes of the first year.

Men connected with the Texas

Sesame Seed Growers who have promoted sesame production in this area say that this has been a "poor year" for sesame—weatherwise.

The kind of weather that does cotton good is the kind of weather that sesame likes too, they point out, and all know that 1955 has been hard on the cotton grower on the Plains.

In spite of these adversities, most reports indicate that farmers have fared pretty well, generally speaking, in their efforts with sesame.

There is an extremely wide range of yields, with the seed turning out all the way from 400 to 1400 pounds per acre. All of the sesame crop this year is irrigated.

Doyle Cummings at Cummings Farm Store in Friona, the only receiving point for the seed in Parmer County, reported Wednesday night that he has taken in 230,000 pounds so far, but has no estimate on what percent of the harvest is completed.

Marketing of the crop is through the Growers, and they clean and sell the seed for 10 percent commission. About 75 percent of the crop was sold prior to harvest at \$9.75, and the remaining one-fourth will move out at whatever the market might be, although not much variation is anticipated.

Asked what farmers' reactions to the experiment in growing

pointed with their yields, others are well satisfied. W. H. Downing of the Hub community, who was credited with having the most promising crop in the country prior to harvest time this fall, was reported to have been hard hit by the early October freeze.

The seed pods on his plants were popped by the cold snap, and he

was forced to combine the field, rather than bind, shock, and thresh, as is the usual procedure.

Billy Marshall east of Bovina was threshing last weekend, and estimated his yields to be between 700 to 900 pounds per acre. He was pleased with his crop, and reported that it had posed no speckling problems.

C. W. Sanders of Oklahoma Lane, who himself accounted for about a third of the 1955 crop with his 400-plus acres, reported this week that his narrow-row (20-inch) sesame yielded about 1100 pounds, but that his entire crop would probably average 700 pounds.

Cummings, who has dealt with more sesame growers than anyone else in the county this year, be-

lieves that the average yield for 1955 will run somewhere in the neighborhood of 700 to 800 pounds.

Few sesame growers who were interviewed said they felt their sesame this year would not prove more profitable than their milo crops.

How did the corn fare this year? "I'm going to plant everything in corn next year, except my cotton land," exclaimed Woodrow Wright of the Hub community this week, as he watched his trial corn crop being picked, shelled, and sold.

Wright, who lives midway between the Hub and Bovina, reports that his Texas Hybrid No. 30 corn is yielding from 70 to 80 bushels. On one 51-acre plot, he picked and

shelled 71 bushels per acre, and then hired Mexican nationals to pick up corn that had fallen to the ground. An additional eight to 10 bushels were gained in this practice.

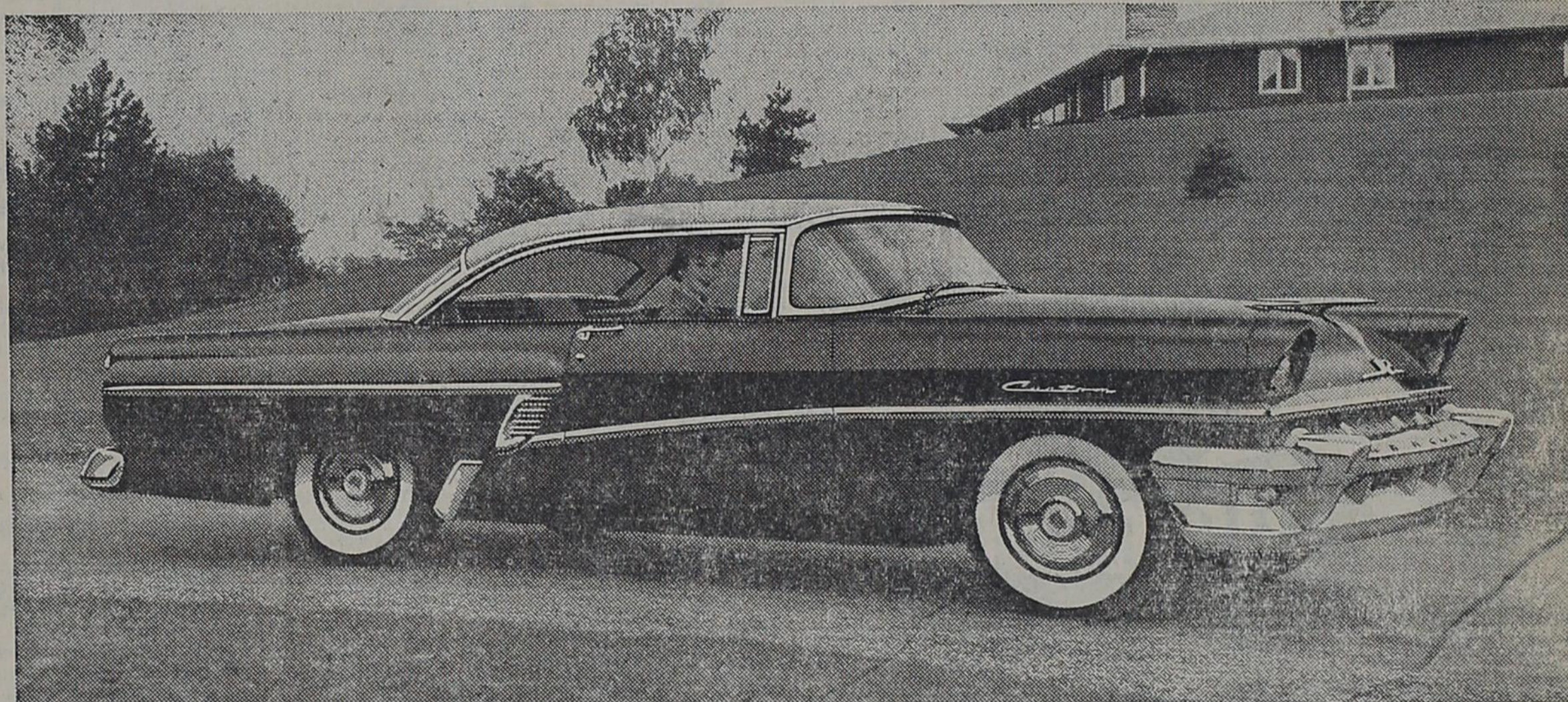
The corn has been sold to H. A. Mills of Burkburnett, co-owner of Mills & Fleming Gin at the Hub. Mills also owns an elevator at Burkburnett. The grain brought \$1.25 per bushel, loaded into trucks at the field.

Mills is not trucking the grain back to Burkburnett, but is selling it here and there as market opportunities present themselves.

Wright says that he had some trouble with high winds in the harvest season, not because the plants couldn't stand up, but be-

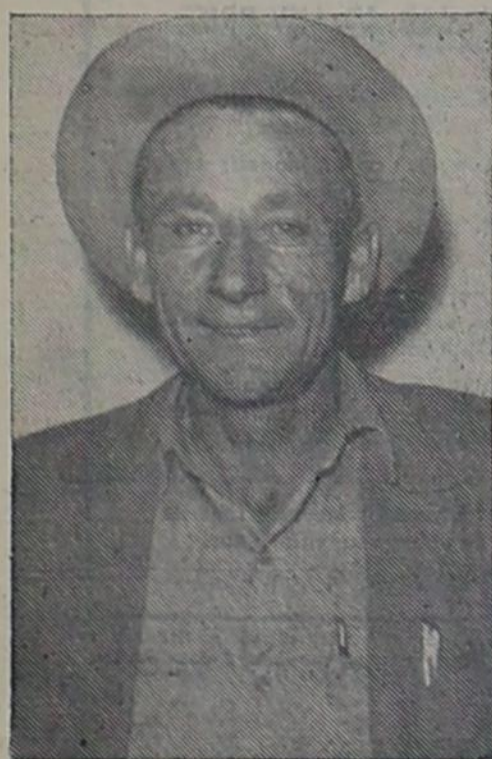

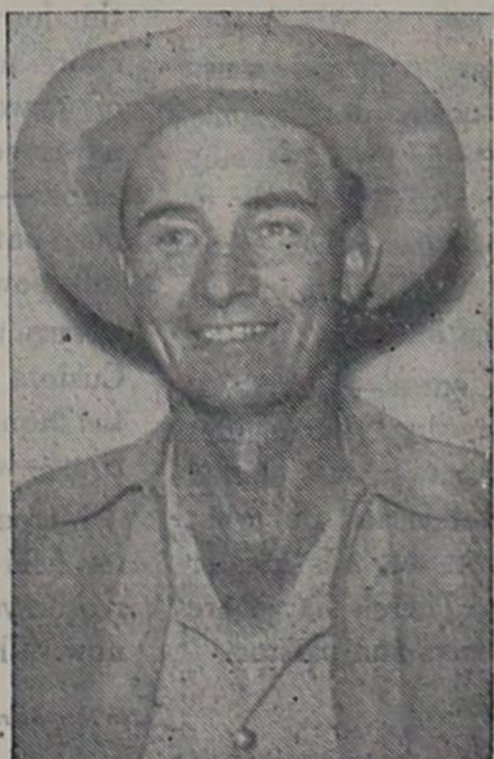

With June

Most of us see much but observe very little. This thought was brought very clearly to our mind this week. An aunt and uncle of ours who live in western Oklahoma, who had not visited us in about seven years, came to see us. Their amazement at the growth of our section of the country caused us to stop and think. Those of us who live IN AND AROUND FRIONA see the changes from time to time, but pay very little attention to them.

Of course, most of us know that there has been some paving done, the rural telephone lines have become a reality, some new buildings have gone up, a lot of our friends and neighbors have built new homes and some improvements have been made to the school system.

However, it would be a surprise to most of us if we stopped long enough to consider just how much progress the town and country around it has made since 1948. The remarks made by our aunt and uncle started us to thinking, and these are some of the changes that have been made since we started calling Friona home early in 1948.

As we remember, Uncle Ben Galloway, now deceased, started the building on the west side of Main Street which finally resulted in a solid line of new modernistic business buildings from the used furniture store north to the next street. When it was finished, it made new homes for the Farm Bureau and the Galloway Implement Company.

Next, Ralph Taylor constructed his new building which provided new homes for his barber shop and the Charm Beauty Shop which is owned and operated by Anna Jo Blackburn. Some time later, the Friona State Bank building was built on the corner. In addition to the bank, it houses Allen's Jewelry, Buske & Magness Cattle and Realty Company and the Southwestern Public Service Company.

When the Osborn Building was completed and Ralph Roden's Bi-Wize Drug Store and Lewis Variety Store moved in, the space, which a few years before had been vacant lots, was a new business section of Friona.

Then last year a parking area was built just across the alley west of the bank. Across the street between Gib's Cleaners and Plains Hardware, Wright Williams constructed a new building and Rockway-Hurst Department Store moved in. A large new building was built and occupied by Piggly Wiggly Grocery. Another beautiful new building was built, and Ware's moved to Friona.

New fronts have been installed and improvements made at the City Drug Store, Foster's, White's Auto Store and Vestal-Brewer Hardware. Additions have been made to Edd White's Cash Grocery, Maurer Machinery Company, McCaslin Lumber Company and the Santa Fe and Wheat Growers elevators. Two new cotton gins have been built and two Drive In Theaters put in their appearance on the outskirts of town.

Down on the highway, Vic Krue-

ger's Villa Cafe, the Texaco Service Station, Strickland's Shamrock Station and Steffey's Drive-In have been built. Smiley's Courts

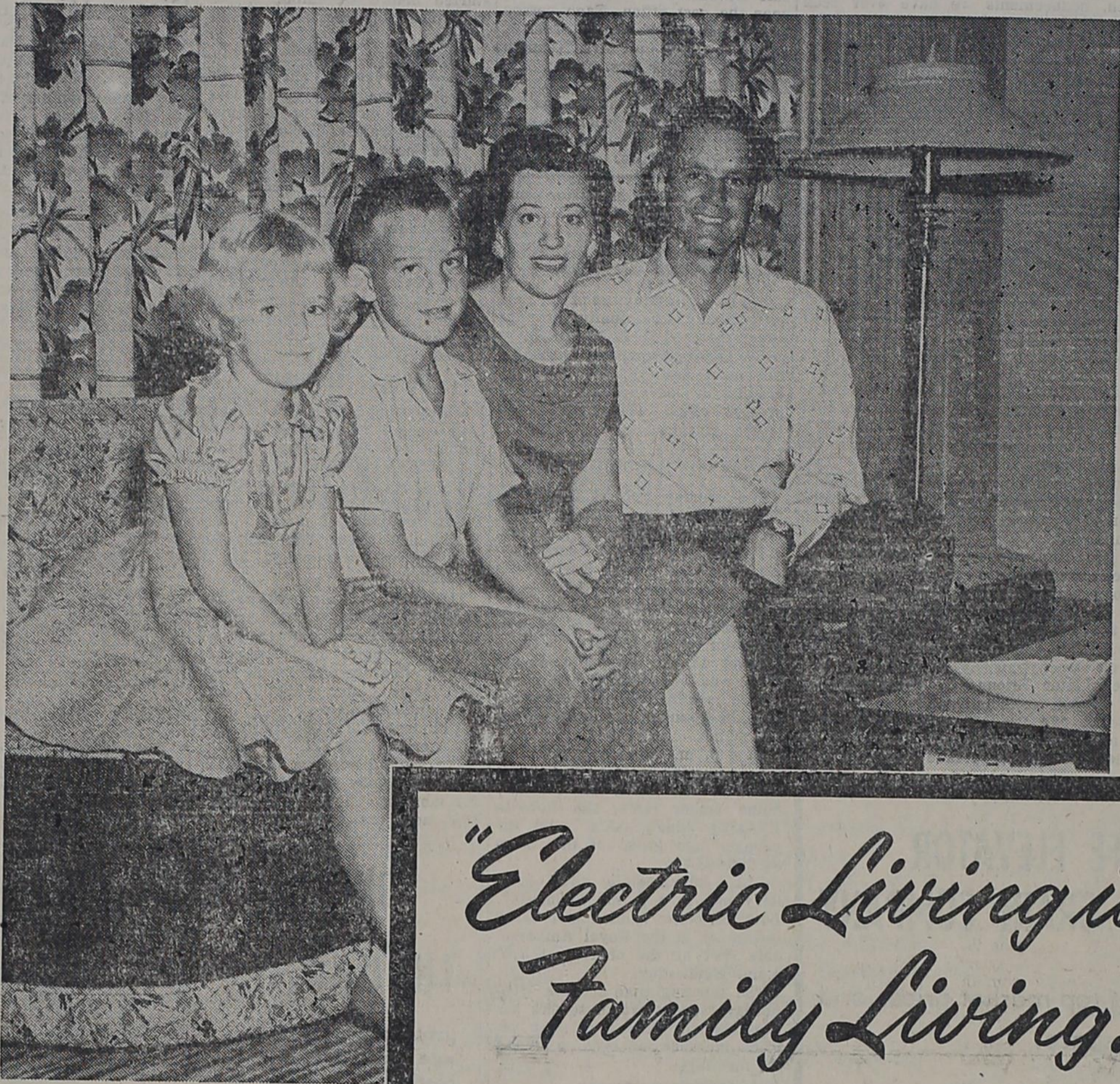

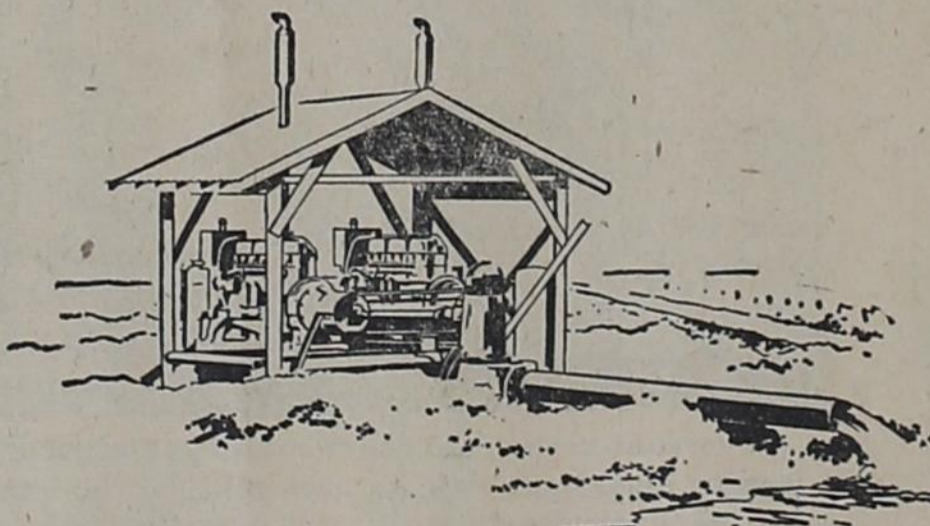

Curbing May Start Soon on Highway 86

The residents and property owners on Highway 86 in Bovina have an excellent chance to get more paving and curb and gutters along their property, O. W. Rhinehart, who lives on the highway, reported earlier this week.

The work will be done by Texas Highway Department and will cost the property owners approximately \$1.50 a foot if they want it. The Highway Department will pave all of its 120 feet right-of-way.

Rhinehart said that all the residents on the highway that had been contacted were in favor of the project. However, he said that all residents had not been contacted.

The state will lay curbs and gutters for as short a distance as three blocks. If enough owners are willing for the work to be done it

is possible that the work can be started in the next week or 10 days. The pavement, however, cannot be laid until spring because asphalt (of which the pavement would be composed) is not put down in winter months.

Rhinehart estimated that the project will be increased by approximately \$10 a foot if the project is carried out.

cause some of the ears were blown to the ground.

The old corn borer, which once chased corn growing clear off of the High Plains, bothered Wright very little, he says.

The crop was planted on April 18-19, and fertilized with 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate—applied at different times to test the effect. Wright says he is sold on side dressing for corn.

The corn, which had been pre-watered, received two waterings during the growing season.

Wright is of the opinion that corn is not as hard on his land as other crops—milo for instance—and that the crop definitely has possibilities in this area.

The Hub farmer burned off 30

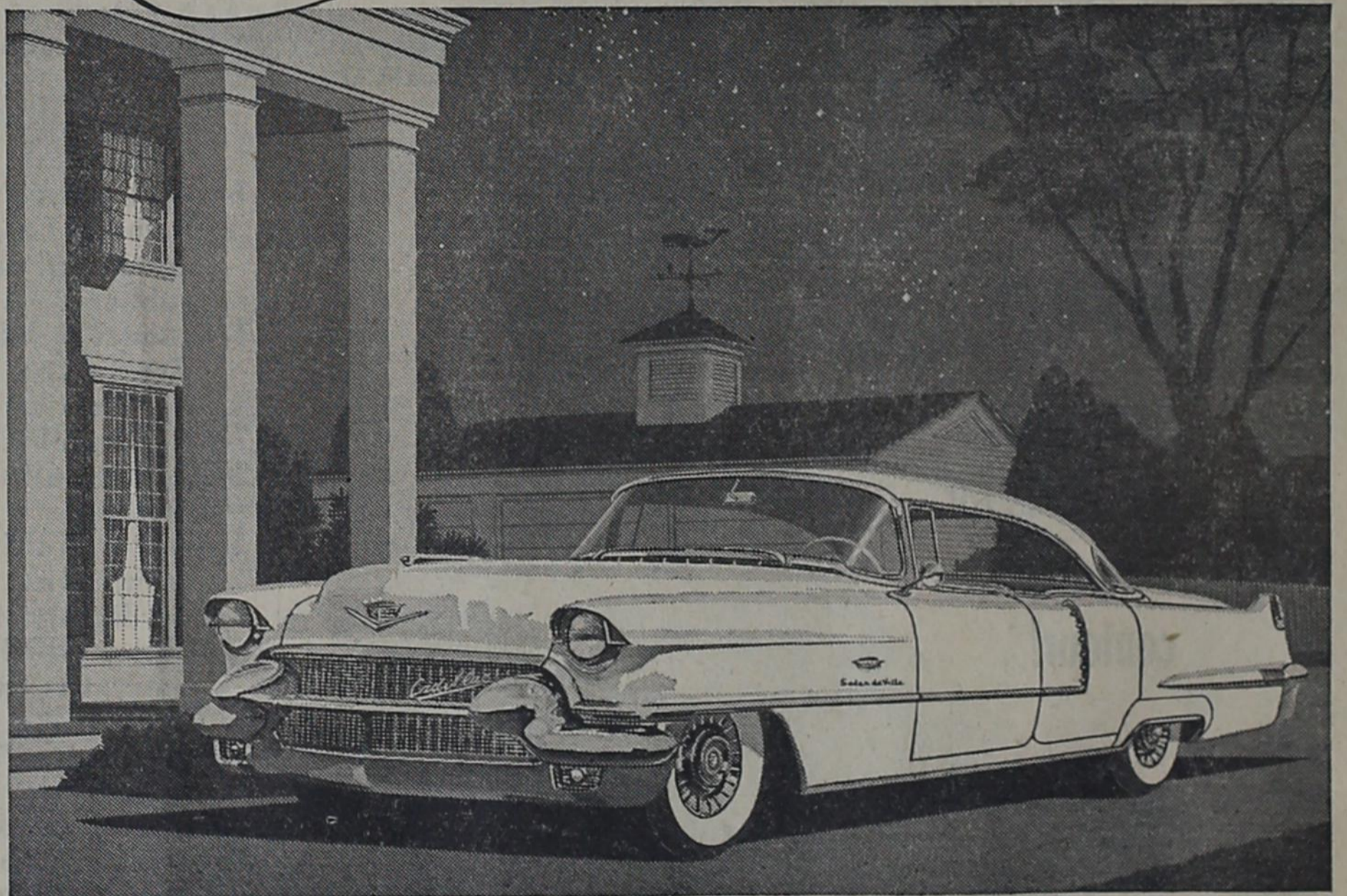
acres of stubble, and will plow the remainder back into the soil so that he can see which method of disposing of crop residue he will prefer.

Harvest costs were held to \$7.50 an acre, and here Wright was fortunate enough to secure a combination picker-sheller for the job, which eliminated having to haul the corn in the ear and shell it in another operation.

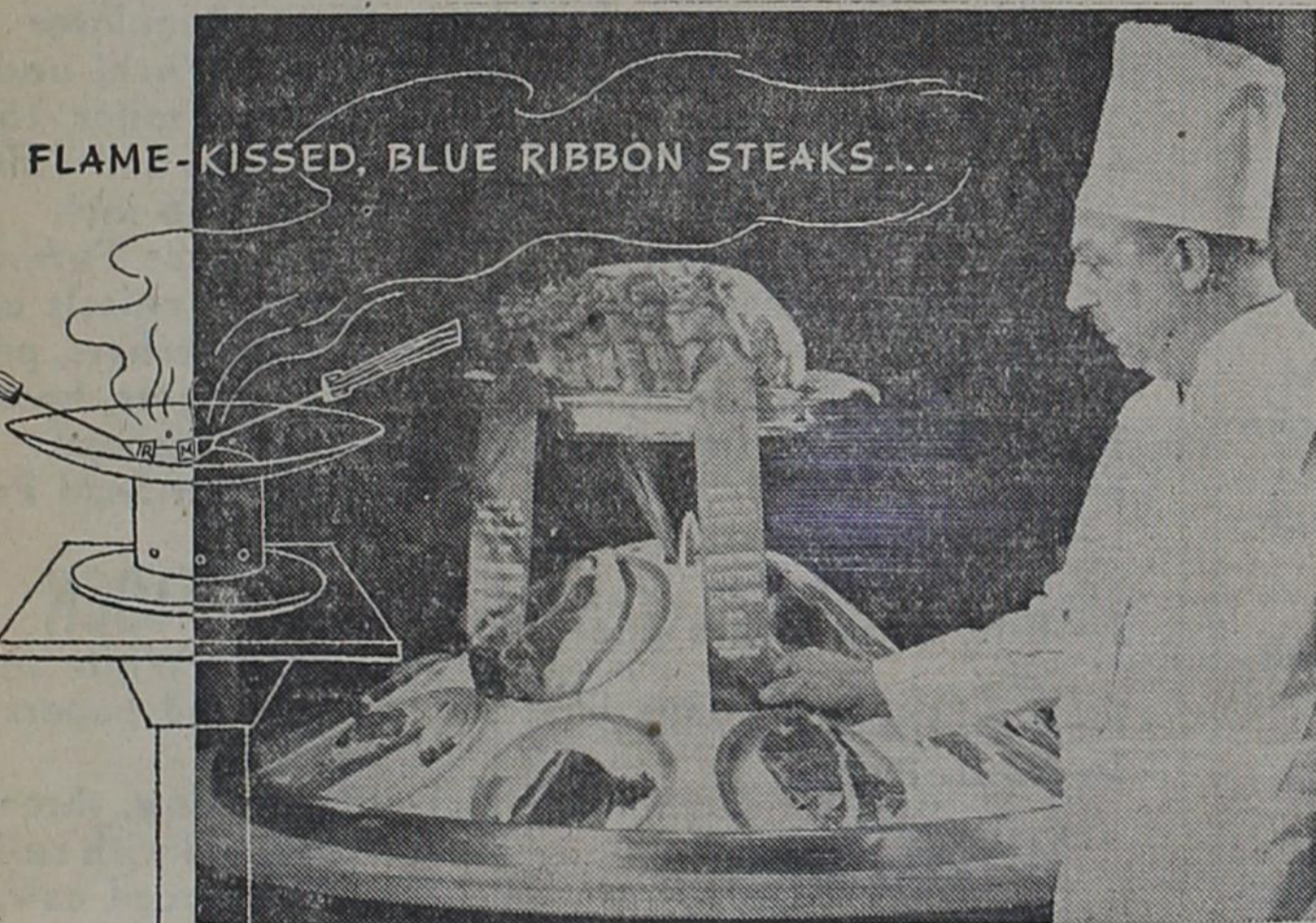
