South Of Bovina - -

**Three Injured
In Wreck Sat.**

Three persons from Parmer County were injured in a car-truck wreck seven miles south of Bovina early Saturday afternoon. Joe Schilling of Oklahoma Lane and Mr. and Mrs. Barney Green of Bovina are all in Lubbock Methodist Hospital following the wreck. Green is listed in critical condition in intensive care and Mrs. Green and Schilling are in fair condition.

According to Jim Bishop, Texas Highway patrolman from Farwell who investigated the accident, Schilling was in a truck traveling east on a dirt road toward an intersection at farm road 1731 and the Greens' car was traveling south on the farm road. Schilling apparently pulled out in front of the

Greens' car, Bishop said. The Greens were enroute to Littlefield at the time of the accident.

The three were taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona and Green and Schilling were transferred later that day to Lubbock Methodist Hospital. Mrs. Green was transferred to Lubbock Sunday.

Bishop said extensive damage was done to both cars. The truck was damaged on the left side after the car apparently hit it broadside.

The Greens are parents of Doyle Green of Oklahoma Lane. Green has been in Lubbock with his parents since they were transferred there.

**Former Prisoner Of War
Returns Home Saturday**

Lt. Col. Robert J. (Bob) Sandvick returned to Farwell last Saturday, Mar. 17, to resume a family life that had been interrupted some six and a half years ago when he was captured by the North Vietnamese.

At the time of his capture he was a U.S. Air Force pilot flying an F105 fighter plane over the North Vietnamese capitol. His plane was struck by enemy fire August 7, 1966, and he was forced down in their territory. Col. Sandvick was listed as missing in action until early in 1970 when his wife, Shirley, of Farwell was notified of his prisoner status.

In an interview at his home this week, Sandvick said that much had changed in these intervening years. He admitted that the current men's hair styles were strange to him and that the moustaches were particularly noticeable to a person out of touch for so long a period. He also remarked that both men's and women's clothing styles were drastically different and that even the military uniforms had changed.

Col. Sandvick said that he was officially notified of the impending prisoner release two or three days after the formal signing of the cease fire agreement in Paris. This was in conformity with the protocol which required notification no later than five days after the Paris signing. In commenting on this, he revealed that over the years as peace talks waxed and waned there had been rumors of release, but that he learned not to put too much faith in these rumors and thereby kept from having too great a letdown when they proved false.

Sandvick looked in good physical condition and he attributed part of this to a strict regimen of exercise that he set for himself and which he

faithfully adhered to each day when possible.

When asked about his first words to his family and those from his family, the colonel, his wife Shirley and son Warren all admitted that the moment was so filled with joy and emotion that nobody really remembered their exact words, but said that it will always be an unforgettable part of their lives.

In describing his return to the United States, Sandvick praised the Air Force for the great care and thoughtfulness that was shown by everybody. Mrs. Sandvick displayed a beautiful purple orchid which was a gift to her from President Nixon. She said that all of the wives received orchids from the President, and that all the families were treated like royalty during the reunions.

In an attempt to bring the returnees up to date on events which happened during their captivity, Sandvick explained that they were briefed on year by year past news events and sports. Each year was broken down into a 30-minute film on news events and 30 minutes on sports.

When asked about the order of release, the colonel said that order of capture determined order of release except for the injured and those with special problems. According to date of capture, Col. Sandvick was eligible for release with the first group of prisoners but that the wounded and illness of some of the other men put him in the second group to be released.

At the present, Sandvick is on an extended convalescent leave and he is enjoying the comforts of home and becoming re-acquainted with a son who jumped from a tricycle to a motorbike in his absence.

Warren was only four years old when his father last saw him and next month Warren will be 11 years old. When asked if he would have recog-

nized his son without being told, Col. Sandvick replied, "Oh, yes, he has grown up and matured, but I would have known him."

Sandvick expressed great gratitude to community residents for their concern and for honoring him by flying the American flags and to the Farwell Chamber of Commerce for the banner of welcome which was displayed across the main street of town. He admitted that the neighbors' sign of "Hi Bob, Wel-

come Home" which was displayed at his residence was especially appreciated.

Sandvick was stationed at Cannon Air Force Base from 1956 to 1960 and was a squadron mate of Mark Liethen who is now a Farwell resident and farmer.

In the near future, Col. Sandvick will grant an interview for the area news media but, understandably, will not discuss anything concerning conditions of captivity, captors, places of detention or anything concerning other prisoners of war. However, he said he will be glad to discuss his personal observations and speak only for himself at the press conference.

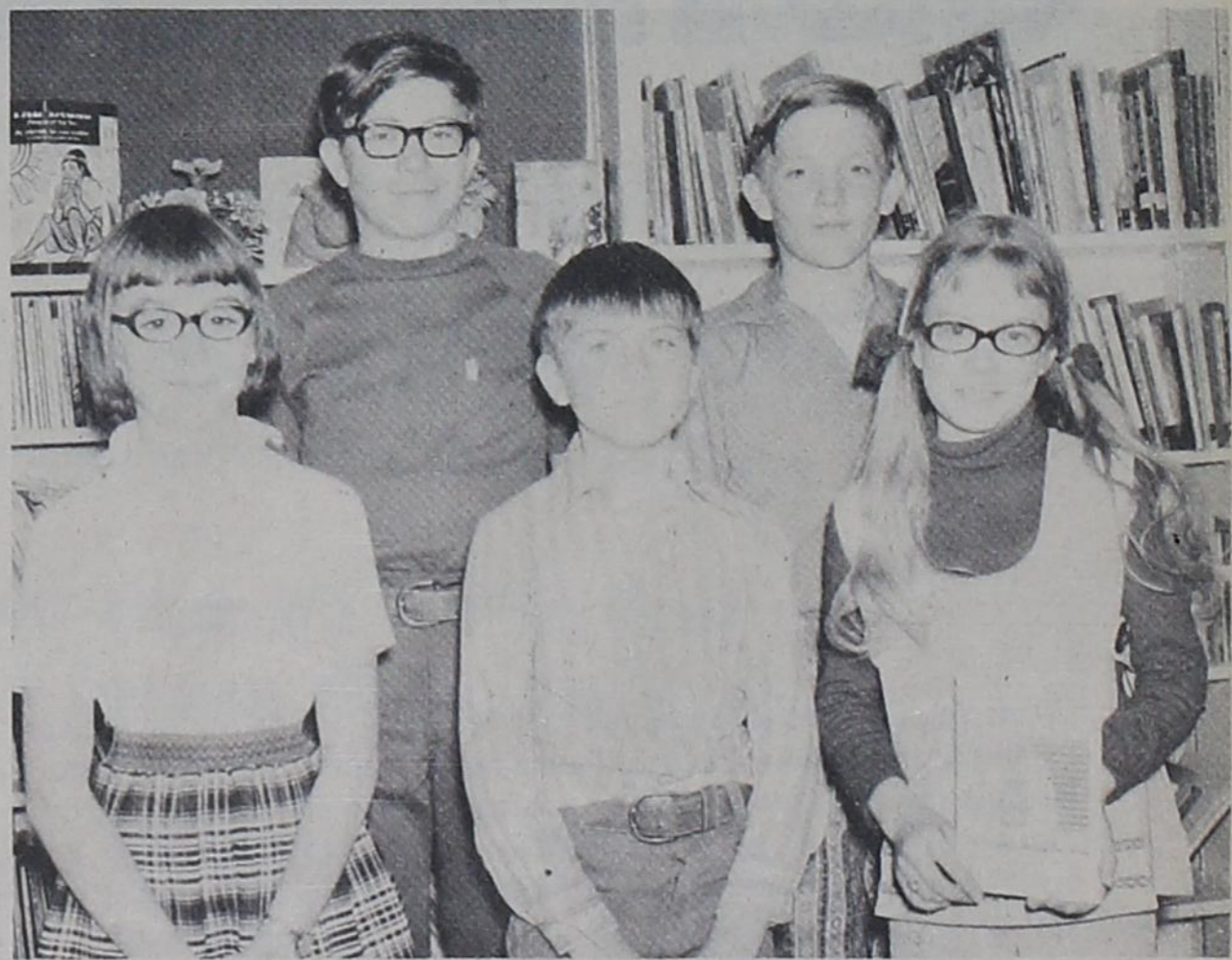
**Club Makes

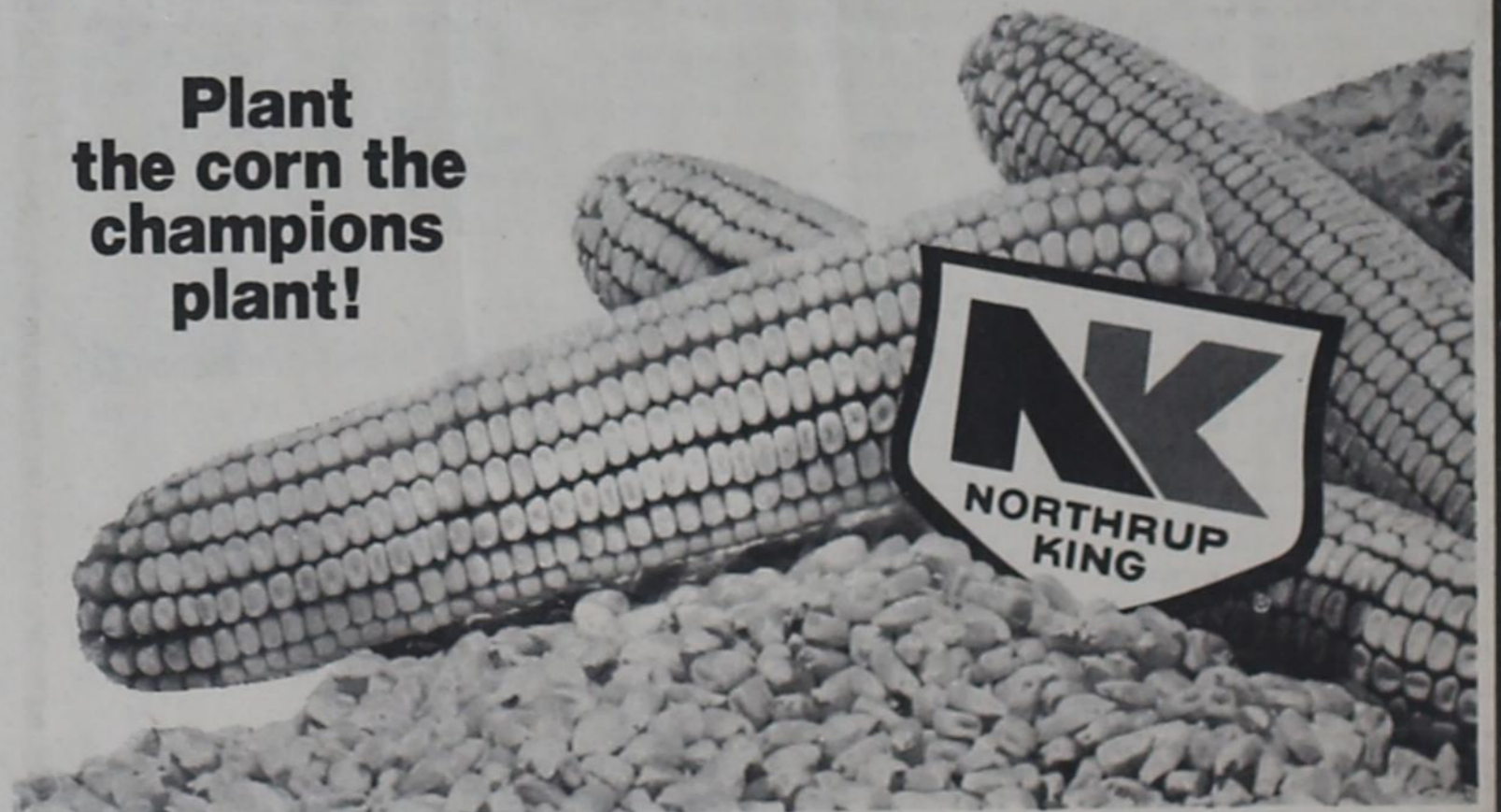

Farwell Football Team To Sell Easter Lilies

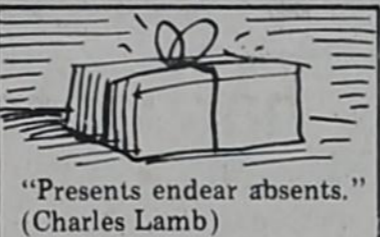

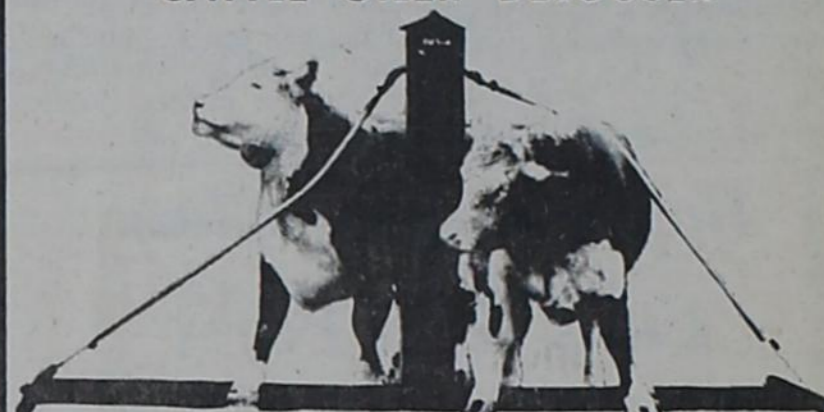
an entrance fee.

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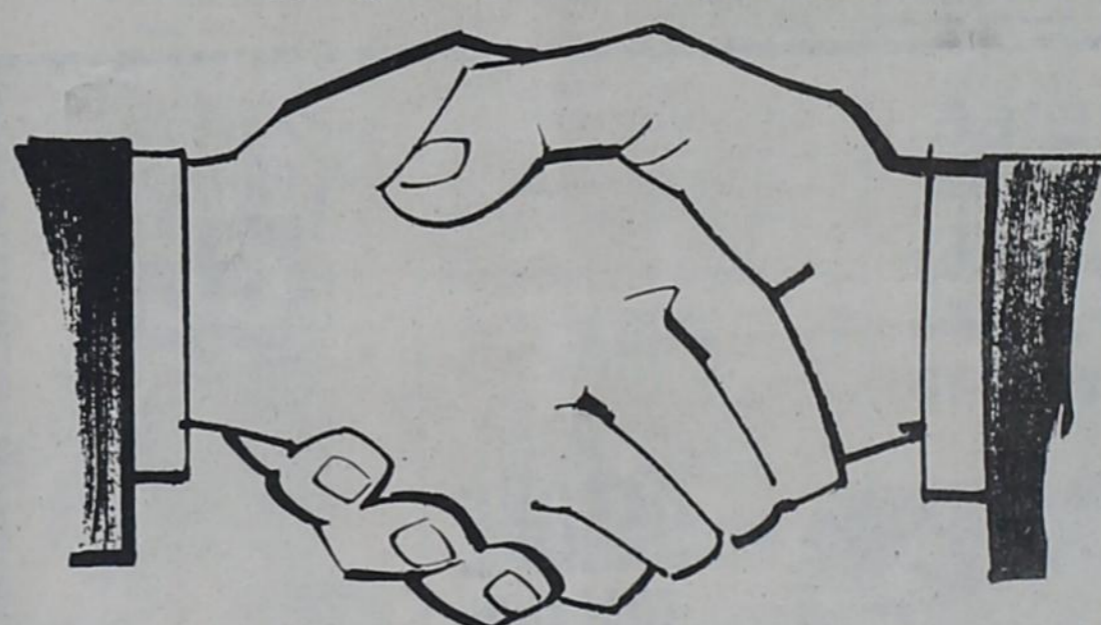

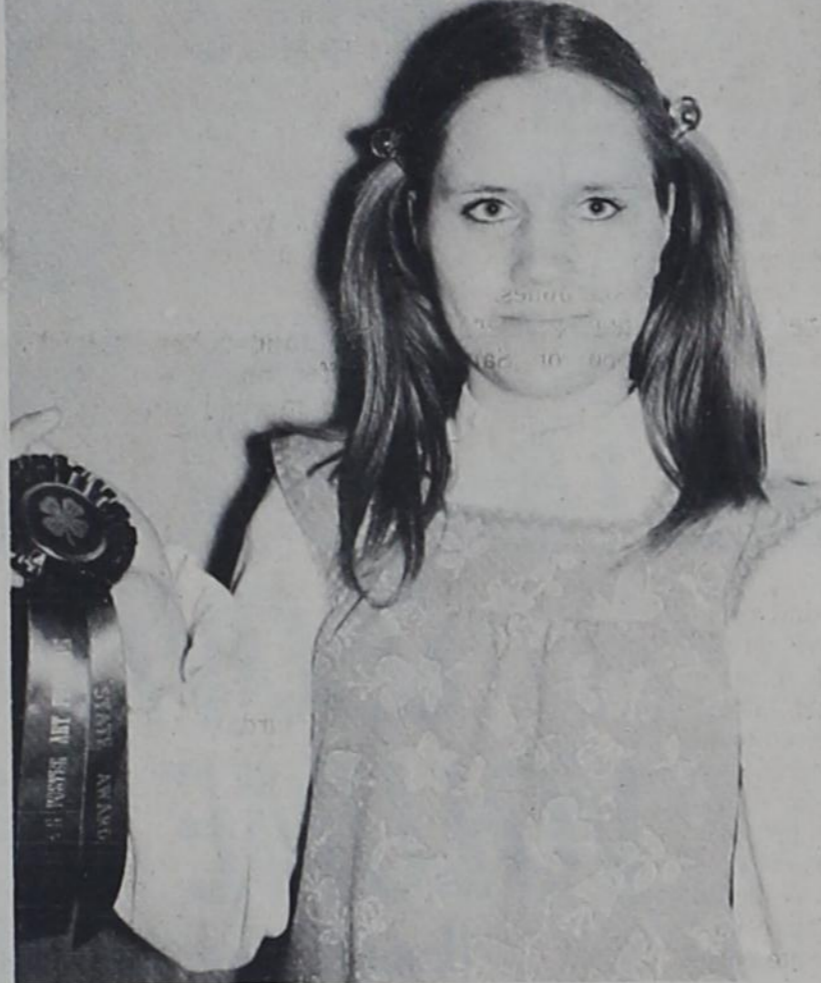

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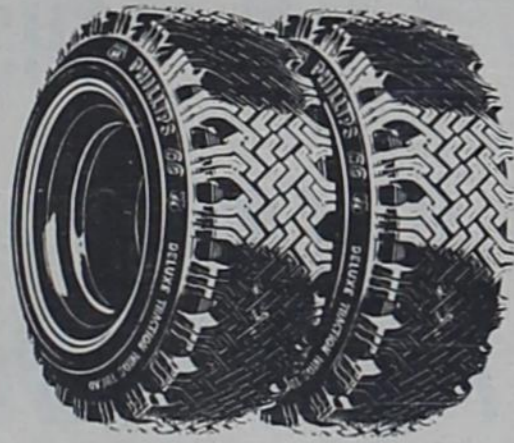
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Cities' Seniors Honored At Methodist Banquet

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On The Farm In Farmer County

A Crop Production meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 28, at the Hub Community Center. Starting time is 7:30 p.m. This meeting will be centered on the vegetable business as an alternate agriculture commodity in Farmer County.

Three Extension Service Specialists will be the speakers for the evening. Dr. Roland Roberts, area vegetable specialist, will present a talk on various types of vegetables adapted to this area. Leon New, irrigation specialist, will speak on vegetable water use and grass return per acre inches of water applied. The third speaker will be Dr. Bill Clymer, extension entomologist, who will cover the harmful and beneficial insects that are most commonly found on vegetables in this area.

This meeting should be very informative and educational. I hope you can take time out from your busy schedule for this event. Again, the date is Wednesday, March 28, at 7:30 p.m. in the Hub Community Center.

The Texas Chester White Swine Show and sale is scheduled for this weekend, March 23 and 24, at the Lubbock fairgrounds. Chester breeders from throughout Texas will show and sell their fall boars and gilts. The sale will start at 1 p.m. on Saturday, March 24. All animals will be breeding age and registered.

With the arrival of warmer weather and rapid wheat growth, bloat may become a problem in your cattle.

Bloat is basically caused by the failure of gas to escape from the rumen (stomach) of an animal through normal and regular belching.

Cattlemen should observe cattle closely for signs of bloat whenever animals are turned in on fresh pastures. There are many and varied causes of bloat and many forms of prevention.

Ranchers should become familiar with preventive measures and first-aid treatments that can be applied until veterinary assistance can be obtained. Five measures that can help prevent bloat are:

1. Keep good quality hay in portable racks where cattle are grazing. The dry feed encourages belching.
2. Avoid turning cattle in on wet plants the first day after a rain. More water means more fermentation and results in more gas formation.
3. Be sure cattle are extremely hungry when turned on pastures. Feed them with good quality roughage first.
4. Change onto pastures gradually. Allow access to pastures for increasing time periods until cattle have full access to pasture.
5. Keep salt and minerals available for animals at all times to help prevent bloat through better digestion.

Another measure for bloat control is the use of poloxalene where cattle have had problems on certain pastures. Limited trials conducted by the California Extension Service indicate that frothy bloat in animals was effectively controlled when adequate amounts of poloxalene were consumed. Five first-aid measures that ranchers can practice until veterinary assistance is obtained include:

1. A "gag" can be inserted in the animal's mouth. A stick about the size of a broomstick or shovel handle can be tied crossways in the animal's mouth. This encourages chewing and movements of the

tongue to cause belching.

2. Some drenches are recommended but must be used with care to avoid getting liquid in the animal's lungs. Drenches can be obtained from your veterinarian and kept for emergency use.

3. Try to keep animals on their feet and walking.

4. Knead left flank vigorously with fists to force out gas.

5. In extreme emergencies to prevent death, it may be necessary to puncture the animal's side so the gas will escape. This should be done only as a last resort since the resulting wound usually becomes infected and is difficult to heal.

The proper place to "tap" an animal is high on the left flank about halfway between the hip bone and last rib. Veterinarians generally prepare the area properly, time permitting, and use a trocar and canula made especially for the job.

CONFIDENCE IN DEATH

In the thirty years of my ministry I have seen many people approach death and have seen some die.

Some, who knew Christ as their Savior, were ready, even eager, to go to be with Him. Some passed from this scene with songs or words of praise on their lips. Others, who had failed to prepare died in mortal fear, not merely of death, but of what lies beyond.

These things do not always run true to form however, for I have also seen the most hardened unbelievers go out of this life joking and seemingly unafraid, while, on the other hand, I have seen sincere Christians cringe with fear at the approach of death. These human reactions do not change the fact that the unbelievers had reason to be afraid, while the believers need not have been.

The Word of God tells us that "it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment" (Heb. 9:27,28). It is the "after this" that makes men so afraid to die. They fear the truth of Rom. 14:12, that "every one of us shall give account of himself to God."

But wait; I didn't quote all of Heb. 9:27,28. The full passage reads as follows:

"And AS it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment; SO Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for Him shall He appear the second time apart from sin, unto salvation."

This can mean only one thing: that Christ died for us and bore the judgment for our sins, the "second death."

This is why Heb. 2:9-15 declares that "by the grace of God" Christ "tasted death for every man . . . that through [His] death He might . . . deliver those who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage."

Report From The Sheriff's Office

on the problem of organized crime is being opened by the Texas Organized Crime Prevention Council.

The Council, established in 1970, is co-chaired by Atty. Gen. John Hill and Col. Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Department of Public Safety. It is a subsidiary of the Texas Criminal Justice Council.

Gambling, narcotics, auto theft, prostitution, loan sharking, credit card fraud, and infiltration of legitimate businesses were classified by the Council as initial target areas of criminal activity.

State enforcement officials say crime organizers do not operate today in the classic style of the Mafia, but there are similarities.

"We know some of these people have syndicate connections, but we don't believe they are under the direct control of the national crime cartel. However, the results are about the same," Atty. Gen. Hill commented.

"With the cooperation of the news media throughout the state, we believe we can alert Texans to what the problem is and how they, as individuals, can help us combat organized crime," Col. Speir noted.

The Council was created by executive order of the Governor to help coordinate work in Texas of law enforcement agencies in their fight against organized crime.
