

FROM THE HOPPER

Even though it hasn't rained much, the feed crop has been wonderful, the cotton the same, and a pretty good jag of irrigated wheat has been harvested in the area during the past season. But farmers look worried.

High costs of production and an atmosphere of uncertainty about what the next national farm program may bring are enough to frown many a brow, but that doesn't seem to be the main concern at the moment.

Farmers are sweating out something they really know very little about: their underground water supply. Nothing could be more obvious than the implication of what would happen to this booming section if the supply of this precious life-giving resource should be depleted.

The calamity that would follow probably would make the days of the dark thirties look like a holiday. That is, if it doesn't set in and rain and rain for a long, long time.

Hardly anyone (save the few dryland farmers still left) realizes how acute the lack of natural moisture really is. All we can talk about is "full pipes," 2-bale cotton, and 5000-pound grain.

An element of uncertainty is beginning to creep into the marrow of many farmers though, in the face of bountiful production under irrigated conditions, for they are hearing ominous reports from the east and southeast about the water that used to be—but is no more.

The truth of the matter is that we are crowding ourselves into worry and near-panic in spite of entirely insufficient evidence to support our alarms.

What would be true 75 or 100 miles east of the Parmer County area is certainly not necessarily true of ourselves here at the western edge of the great Ogallala formations—the High Plains irrigated district.

Farmers are talking or thinking of selling their farms without really knowing a good reason for doing so. It is true that prices for our land are now very good, and that the future prices of farm produce in the next few years do not seem to be encouraging, but it is also true that we are just coming into our own as an intensively developed agricultural area.

Why should we run out on our dreams when they are just beginning to come true?

There is talk that irrigation farmers may be on the precipice of stringent controls that would pro-rate water for each individual.

This however, is in the future, and the present trend bears watching. Favor for pro-rationing is being found only where people agree that it should be made applicable to a local level.

That is, it does not appear that Austin or Washington will, in the foreseeable future, dictate when and how much farmers can use their irrigation wells.

All this is due to the foresight and hard work of a number of leaders on the High Plains who have kept a wary eye on down-state movements that might take control out of our hands.

About this water problem: The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, comprised of 11 counties (of which Parmer is one), will soon undertake the mountainous task of inventorying the underground water resources of the district.

This gargantuan effort, which will take an estimated four years to complete, will be the first truly organized effort made by qualified men to find out how much water lies beneath the fertile plains on which we live.

The good news of the moment is that it will not be necessary for us to wait four years to find out what we have on tap, but that the survey will have its beginning right here in Parmer County, and we will be the first of all counties in the district to find out the measure of our underground wealth.

Tom McFarland, manager of the District office in Lubbock, told us last week that plans are being made to begin the work in the northeast corner of the county, and that surveying should get underway within the near future.

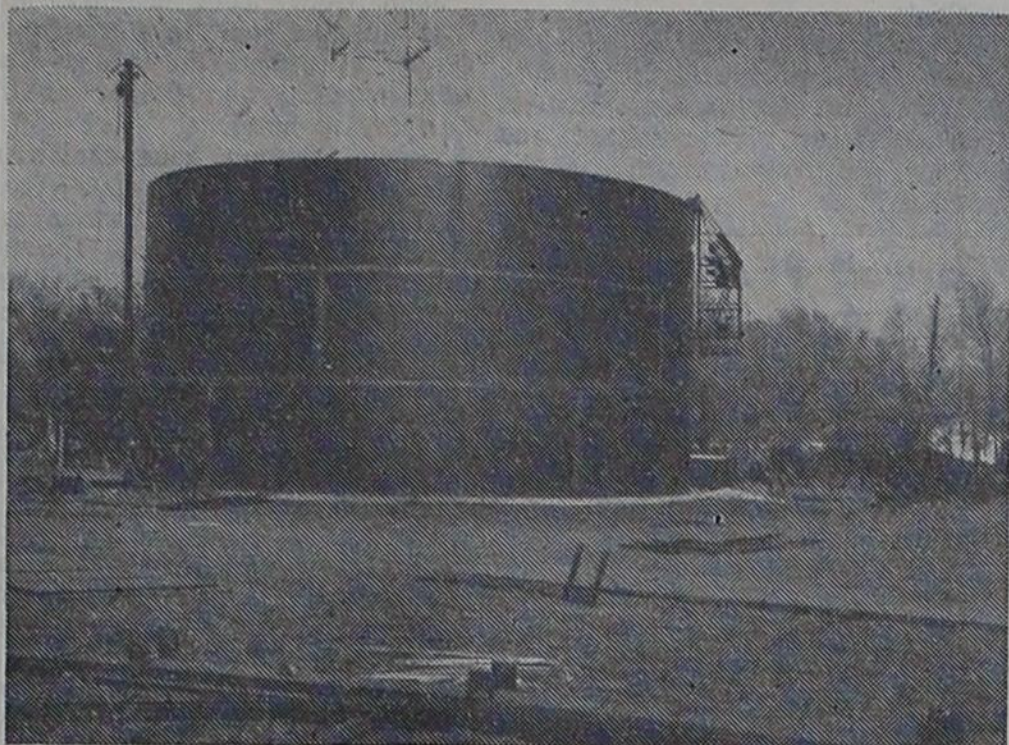
Engineers of the district will use scientific and accurate methods of checking underground formations and the saturation present in order to assemble their report.

We consider this news to be of great importance to us, as it will affect the immediate future of everyone within the area.

One pet theory which the writer (being an optimist) holds on the subject of our underground water is that the Ogallala formation from which our water comes is considerably more abundant beneath our area than is often the case in areas further to the east and southeast.

And even though our water-bearing sands appear at a greater depth from the surface than at other parts of the district, which means that the expense of

Farm Bureau Head Hopes for Increase in Loan Rates

Optimism was voiced this week by Aubra Ellison, president of the Parmer County Farm Bureau, over the possibility of an award adjustment of loan values on irrigated land which are placed through the Federal Land Bank.

Word has come through the Bureau, he said, that contact was made with Sterling Evans, president of the Houston Branch of the Federal Land Bank, which oversees operations in Texas, when he was in a meeting with appraisers in Washington recently.

J. Walter Hammonds, president of the Texas FB, says that he has "good reason to believe that a substantial raise will come in loan rates in the near future."

Ellison, who said that the Bureau has been working on the problem for some time, pointed out that the commodity basis used in making loans is outmoded for the present day.

"Loan rates," he said, "have been based on one dollar grain sorghum and ten cent cotton. This is far below the present price structure which shows good possibilities of remaining at a comparatively high level for some time."

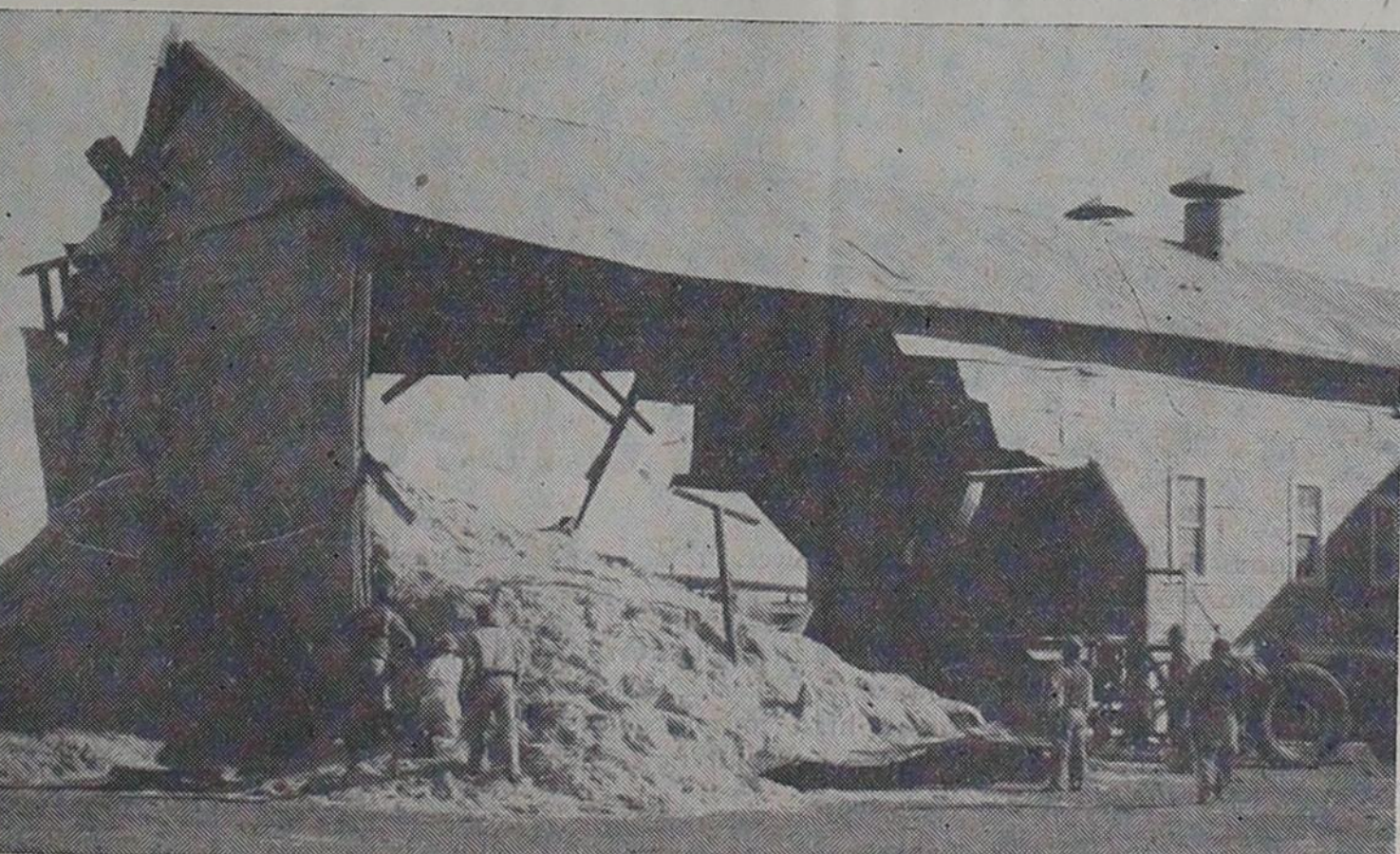
Farmers now find that they can borrow only up to \$25 per acre on their high-priced irrigated land today. The possibility of doubling this amount is being considered, according to Ellison.

The ultra-modern car, Ford's entry into the classy, practical "sports car" field, will be on display all day Monday.

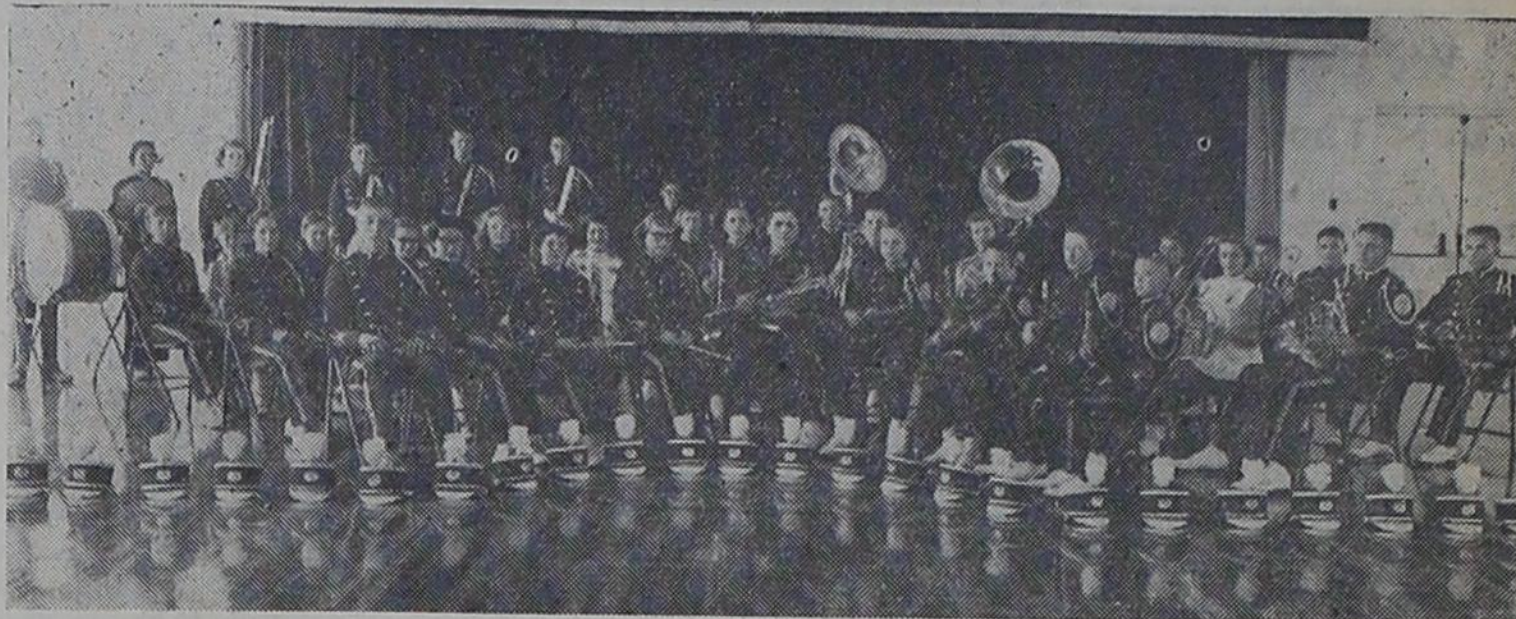

Cotton Allotment Is 43,000 Acres

The 1955 Parmer County cotton allotment has been announced as being 43,194 acres. This compares with slightly over 56,000 acres allotted county growers this year.

The decrease of 13,000 acres came in spite of considerations from the state totaling over 4,000 acres which moved the original 1955 allotment up considerably.

Parmer County received 632 acres from the state "reserve" with which to make adjustments for those farmers who would receive fewer than 15 acres next year, in addition to 3546 acres from the reserve for "inequities

and hardship cases." Without these allowances, the allotment would have been 38,016 acres.

The manner in which the county allotment (excluding the allowances) was arrived at is as follows:

The cotton allotment "base," a figure arrived at by averaging production from the past five years (excepting 1949) was found to be 43,421 acres.

This was diminished by a "reduction factor" based on the ratio of reduction experienced on a state

level. In Parmer County's case, the allotment, after the reduction, would have been 27,918 acres.

Of greatest help to the county is the upward adjustment for a "trend" toward greater cotton production with the development of irrigation in the area, which accounted for 11,098 more acres.

It's complicated, but is said to be the fairest method yet devised for establishing the allotment system.

Individual allotments are being prepared now, and Joe Camp, ASC chairman, says they will be in the (Continued on last page).

Ginnings Top 30,000 Bales

About two-thirds of an estimated \$9 million cotton crop for Parmer County was safely ginned and trucked off to market the first of this week as ten gins hummed around the clock to keep up with the tremendous pace being set by mechanical harvesting methods,

County Agent Joe Jones has placed a late estimate of 50,000 bales on the county cotton crop, of which 30,000 has already been ginned, and quite a bit more sitting on gin yards or ricked in field turn-rows because of trailer shortages, waiting to be ginned.

In spite of curtailed acreage for 1955, cotton growers consider this to be a very profitable year for the fleecy produce, which has come to this area in big acreage only within the past four years.

Hardly any cotton is making less than a bale to the acre, and the great majority is nearer 1½ bales per acre. Small, highly-farmed plots are yielding two bales and over, but in the main, this figure would be too high for one representative of the area.

A gin-by-gin check by The Tribune over the weekend and up until Wednesday of this week indicated that around 30,000 bales have been ginned, and that all gins more than had their hands full with the crop.

Using round figures, and bearing in mind that some of the reports are as much as four days old, the following tabulations will give a pretty good idea of the harvest picture:

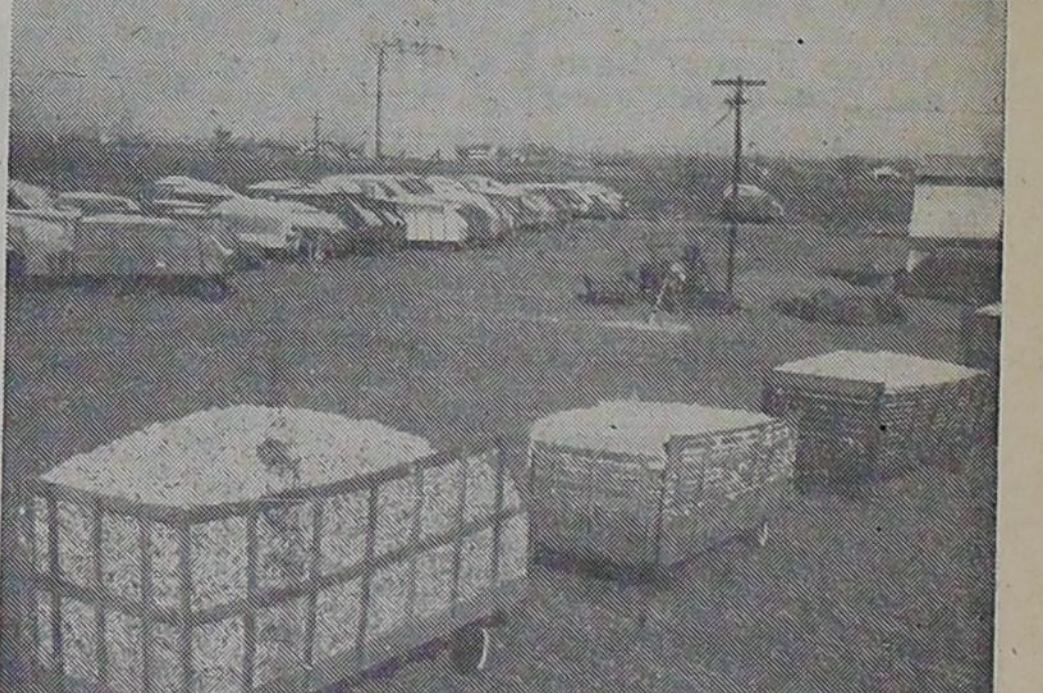
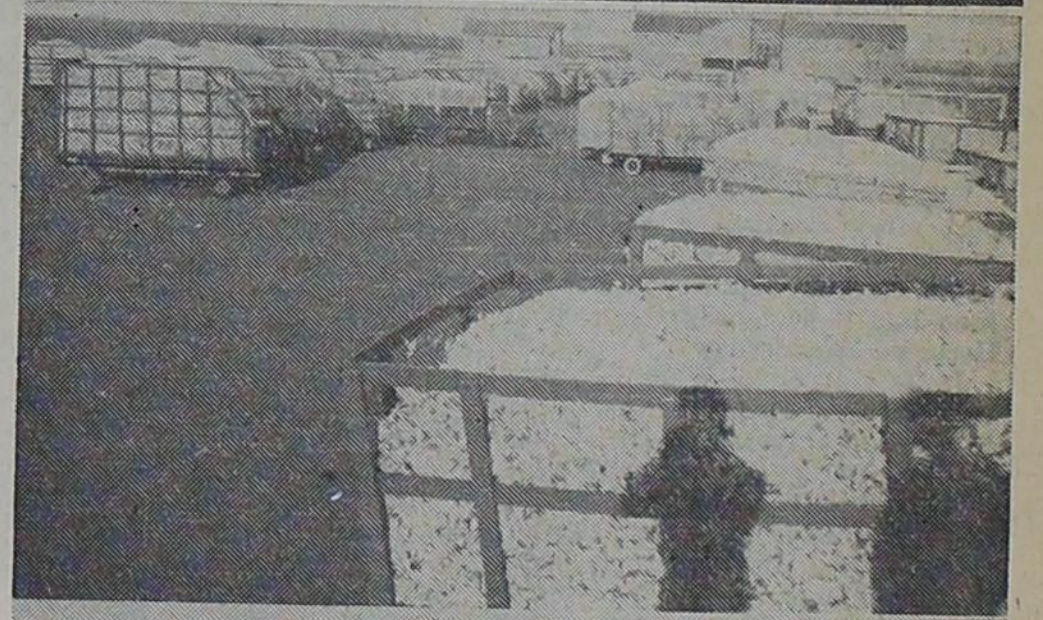

Being 81, I have lived thru all the changes you mention, and many more but; didn't know until

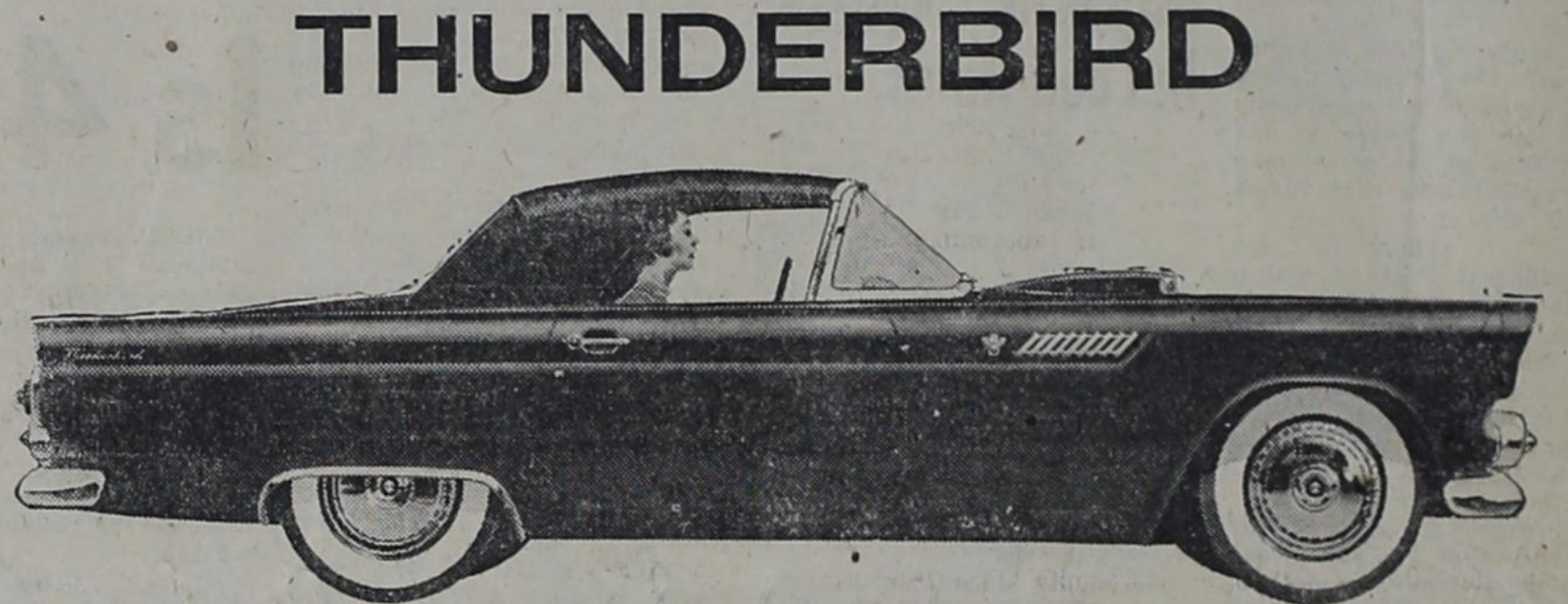
Attendance Sunday was 162 in Sunday School and 82 in Training Union.

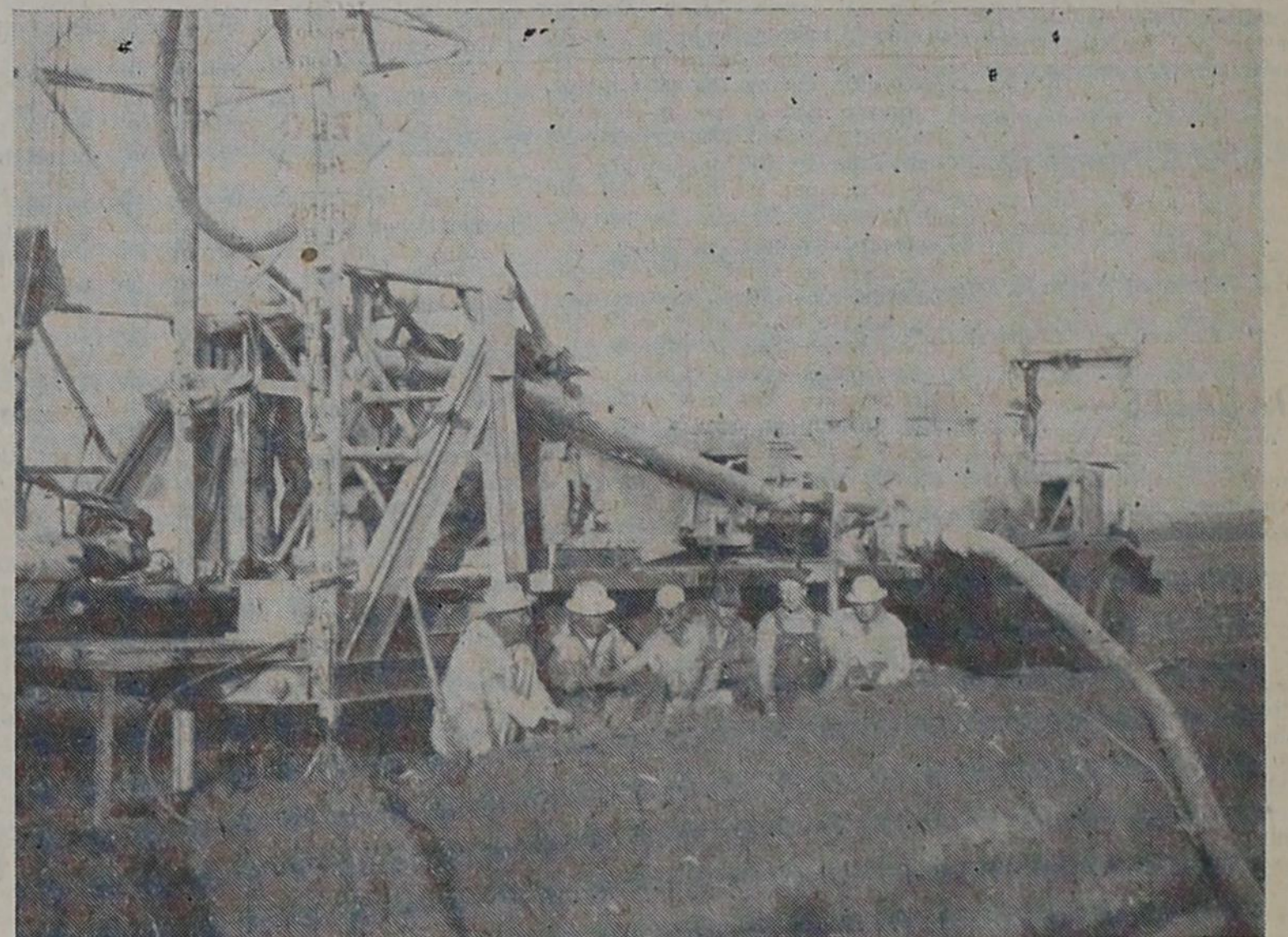

recovering water is necessarily greater here, there is reason to believe that we have a much larger reservoir to draw upon than do many other parts of the district.

Thus, in the long run, our water, though harder to get, is of far greater value inasmuch as it will last for many years to come.

This theory is not wholly of our own thinking, as others close to the farm picture, including reports from drillers, seem to bear out this line of reasoning.

One thing that we have pretty well given up (even though some others still believe it) is the faint hope that the water from which we draw upon has its source in the mountains of New Mexico, and will replenish itself from that area when taken out here in the Plains.

There seems to be no evidence at all to support this argument except that the water under us headed in a southeasterly direction, indicating that it may have come from the northwest.

We imagine that you, as we, will be most eager to hear what the hydrologists of the district discover in their survey.

New Farm Program Sponsored by FB

A national farm program designed to eliminate surpluses and discriminatory acreage controls will be recommended to the American Farm Bureau Federation, according to A. J. Ellison of Bovina, president of the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

The plan was approved at the Texas Farm Bureau's convention Nov. 10, in Galveston, Ellison said. It will be up for consideration by the AFBF at its national convention Dec. 12-16 in New York City.

Under the Texas plan, acreage control would be set up on the basis of a farm's total tillage acreage. The present law places control on the individual commodities. According to the plan, the percentage of acres to be retired from production would be determined by the over-all over-production of all agricultural commodities in this country.

The percentage of acres responsible for surpluses would be taken out of commercial production. According to President Ellison this has been found to average from 5 to 15 per cent of the nation's total cultivated acreage. If the percentage amounts to 10 per cent, then each farmer would be required to divert 10 per cent of his tillable acreage from production, he explained.

A farmer would have to comply with this provision in order to be eligible for price supports. Good soil conservation practices would also be required for the idle acres. This would be encouraged by soil conservation payments.

Under the plan, a system of price supports would be instituted to encourage the shifting of production from crops in surplus to supply crops in short supply, Ellison said.

The Texas Farm Bureau believes that its plan, if administered fairly, would enable farmers to earn full parity for their crops with a maximum of freedom in their operations. Since the government would be concerned with pricing only a small percentage of acres on each farm, the cost to the tax payers would be much less than for the present farm program.

There is a big change in the picture of last year and now. The yield is better, the grades are much better, the price is slightly better, and the weather has been little short of ideal.

Three additional gins added to the area within the year made quite a change in the harvesting picture. Up to one-half of all the cotton harvested within the county was estimated to have been ginned in areas to the south and east in 1953.

Ginners this year, however, have a more even distribution of the work, and it is estimated that five percent or less is leaving the county in trucks to be ginned.

Some gins have fallen behind as much as 600 bales this year, but the picture is better than last year, when one gin stepped in and bought cotton before it had been ginned, stacking about 2000 bales of it on the ground to keep it from going elsewhere.

Such emergency measures are not foreseen for this year, and the peak of the harvest is considered by most to be past.

Local Credit Union Starts Operation

Operation of the Friona Credit Union was begun this week, following a visit from Field Supervisor Erland, out of the Dallas office. A charter had recently been granted the newly-organized loan business.

As in the case of locally-owned credit unions over the area, shares will be sold to interested individuals, with a greater number of shares meaning that the Credit Union will have a larger amount of money available for loaning purposes. Interest on loans operates on a sliding scale, depending on the amount of the loan still remaining to be paid.

Local directors pointed out that, as the project is still in its infancy, no large-scale loans could be made, with maximum amounts to be set for approval to individuals.

Irrigation Tempo Shows Yearly Rise

Winter's upswing in one farming activity in this area—spotting and drilling of irrigation wells—is being noticed, according to reports at the office of Raymond Euler, where well drilling permits are issued, and at the Soil Conservation Service office, whose technicians are usually called on to assist farmers in outlining watering projects.

Steve Bavousett, head of the SCS office, said on Monday that he and his crew were getting numerous calls to assist in planning irrigation facilities, while Euler's office reported that a total of 22 permits for new wells were issued at the committee meeting of last week, and indications were that this many more would be pending for the next meeting (tonight.)

At the same time, farmers are turning considerable attention to installation of concrete pipe for use in irrigation fields. Bavousett's records showed a number of such projects in this immediate area, including Leo McLellan, Owen Seamount, Duward Bell, Rene Sneed, and Steve Struve, whose combined outlays of pipe would approximate "around four miles."

Irrigation specialists have been stressing the use of concrete pipe for some time, pointing out the fact that the savings in evaporation and seepage off-balance the cost of installing such a system.

Some irrigation wells have been turned on recently, with farmers putting water on wheat fields, it is reported. Dryland farmers are hoping for some wet weather—and as is usually the case, cotton producers are holding out for a few more days of dry weather, to finish up their yearly harvest.

There will be further news items in regard to the homecoming and also plans are under way for mailing letters of invitation. Any ex-student or teacher interested in obtaining a supply of these letters is asked to write Mrs. Landrum or Mrs. Williams and the supply can be returned to them.

President Landrum is also asking that any and all ex-students having any old news items, old annuals, school pictures or school trophies that might be of interest to all ex-students and teachers to please bring that collection with them for display during the open house session.

It is hoped that all interested students will help spread the news around, and help to make this a memorable occasion for Friona High School.



We're spending a few days in the mountains around Colorado Springs this Thanksgiving season. We are being told and reading that traffic forces of this area are making a concerted effort to enforce safety regulations, including staying within the speed limits posted and driving without intoxication. We think they're both efforts worthy of complimentary consideration, particularly with regard to intoxicated drivers. The minimum fine for conviction of this offense is \$300. There is no way of avoiding the consequence. The reason for adhering to the rule is that 24 persons from Fort Carson have died in traffic accidents since the beginning of the year. Liquor is proven to have been too prominent a figure in these fatal accidents.

Though we are proud of this positive action toward prevention of accidents, we hope it will not be after a number of new tragedies on our Farmer County roads that sincere, definite efforts for prevention will be made. We see nothing wrong with the practice here in Colorado Springs of listing on the front pages of local papers names of traffic violators with charges against them. There might be those who would call this "smearing" in these days, but we would just ask: Who provides the smear material, if that is what it is? Anyone obviously endangering the lives of innocent pedestrians and autoists is not worthy of reputation protection. The public has a right to know who it is meeting.

With the recently announced reduction of \$55 in the fare for a man and wife on the Texas Farm

Bureau Train to New York the 7th of December, we hope to hear of more Farmer people going. We know of about 20 each from Deaf Smith and Castro and Bailey Counties who are going. Can there be that many from Farmer?

You members who belong to Parmer County Farm Bureau will soon have an opportunity to enjoy canter and other catastrophic protection through the economic channel of Blue Cross. There should be two hundred or more new families carry this protection right away.

Still in the third quarter, Meadow retaliated as Langley passed to Lockett for 21 yards and a score, and the latter booted another point after.

Bovina's final successful effort to score was early in the last quarter as Ezell broke into the clear for a 59-yard run. It was the brightest moment for the home team.

Dale Andrews, Meadow fullback, ended scoring for the afternoon with an 8-yard dash for paydirt.

A large holiday crowd attended the game.

Meadow will now take on Matador for the regional crown—the highest in class "B" ball. Matador squeezed by Stinnett last week 14-13 to win their bi-district trial. The game will presumably be played this weekend.

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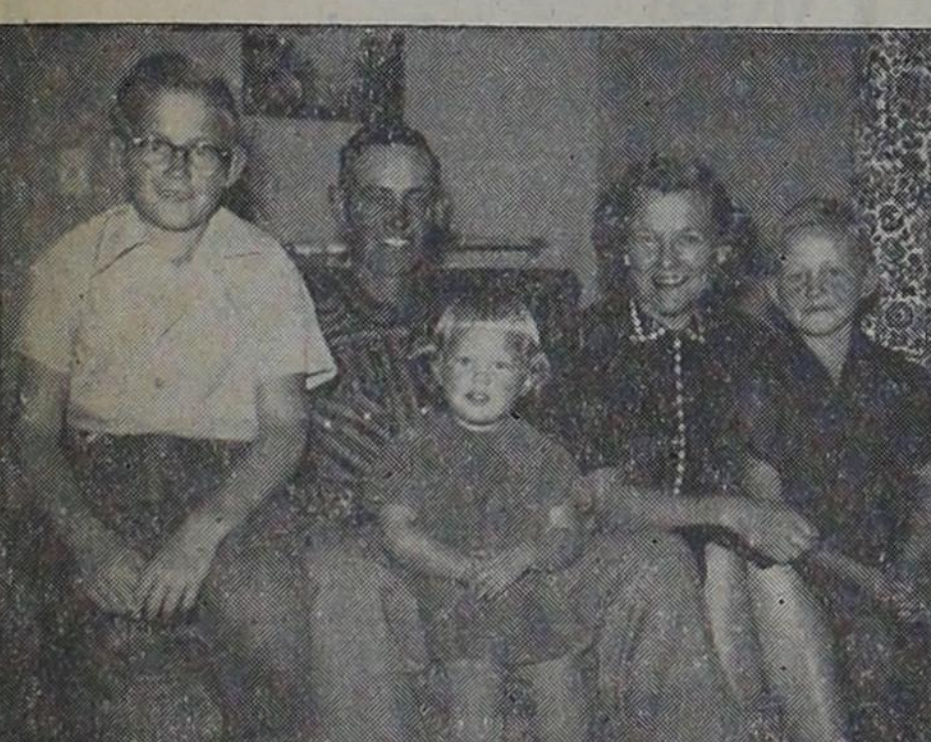
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BOVINA BUTANE SERVICE PRESENTS KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS
