Stockholders of the Parmer County Community Hospital, Friona, Tuesday night heard a report that indicated how busy that institution has been during the past year.

During the year just ended, there were 834 hospital patients admitted, there were 149 babies born, and there were about 15,000 clinic patients. During the year, the hospital showed a net profit of \$21,826.64.

Most important, a drive was launched for the erection of a new hospital building, and that dream is now becoming a reality, with construction under way at this time.

The meeting was opened by B. Buske, president of the board of directors. The opening prayer was led by M. B. McKinney, minister of the Sixth Street Church of Christ.

After the welcome address by G. B. Buske, an audit report was given by Bill Curtis of Amarillo. He gave a detailed report of the financial affairs of the hospital for the year. Jimmy Baxter gave a general report of the operations for the year.

We All Help Pay For This Baloney

The next time you send in the federal government's tax bit from your pay check, consider these few items, gleaned from the Hoover Commission's reports. Maybe it'll make you mad enough to write your congressman, but we doubt it:

Although a Navy manual estimates that canned meat and poultry have a "keeping life" of 24 months, a stady of 14 Naval supply depots showed: 79-month supply of canned beef and gravy, 75-month supply of canned ham chunks, and 719-month supply of canned hamburger.

To go with every pound of its 60-year supply of canned hamburger, the Navy had on hand nearly a gallon of ketchup.

Poor military stock management resulted in an B1/2-year supply of dry-cell batteries-a short life

America was developed and has grown strong on the principle of free enterprise. Yet our Federal Government owns and operates 342 laundries; 62 meat-cutting plants: 102 bakeries; 280 cafeterias and canteens; 346 post exchanges; 3 clothing manufacturing plants; 2 shoe manufacturing plants, and 4 coffee roasting plants.

Nearly one-fourth of the more than two million federal civilian employees leave the government service each year, running the taxpayers about \$500 per person in replacement costs. The Hoover Commission has recommended better personnel practices, which, if they reduced turnover just from 25 to 20 per cent, could mean an annual tax saving of almost \$50 million.
