

This was done after hearing from a number of involved property owners concerning their feelings, pro and con, on the subject.

Lamberson, who is single, will occupy the quarters Reeves asked that each board of school trustees in districts subject to extremely cold weather to develop an emergency policy to be effective during January, February and March to govern the scheduling of the school day in the district during periods of extremely cold weather. The policy would provide that when, in the judgment of the board, extremely cold weather conditions require an adjustment of the daily schedule, the schools may operate on a four-hour midday schedule or the schools may be closed for the entire day at the discretion of the school board.

Schools operating on the four-hour midday schedule during the emergency period will be recognized by Texas Education Agency as meeting all state standards and re-

Nor will schools be closed because of extremely cold weather, during periods of time not to exceed five days, lose Foundation Program benefits nor be required to make up the days lost.

The superintendent also said that if and when Daylight Saving Time goes back into effect, schools in Farwell will not begin until 10 a.m. as the schools will operate on Central Standard Times.

Also approved during the school board meeting was the purchase of two new school buses, to be delivered prior to the opening date of the fall school term in 1974.

Opening the meeting, Mayor Patschke said he would ask the City Engineer, Bob Lydick to explain the costs of the project and how the price was calculated; City Attorney Charles Aycock to explain the legality of the project and emphasized that the city commission would give each person present the opportunity to address their

He explained that immediately following the hearing, after he hearing was declared officially closed, the commission would consider the evidence and determine a ruling as to whether or not the paving project would be accepted. The project was unanimously ac-

Engineer Lydick said the city would pay for all intersections and one tenth of the cost of paving with the individual property owner in the paving project area responsible for paving and gutter, and nine-tenths of the paving cost.

Legality of the project, according to Aycock, was the official adoption of the ordinance by city commissioners and publication of the legal notice and bid notice in the newspaper and notices sent by public mail.

First person to address the commission was local contractor, Bill Nance.

The contractor quoted a number of figures on lot prices. He told the group that the lowest he paid for lots was \$10 per foot for unpaved lots; and had paid \$10.66 where there was strip paving with a top price of \$12 per foot for good strip paving.

Nance further quoted \$13.33 for a corner lot was the highest he had paid with strip paving all around. However, he noted that the lowest he had paid for paved lots with curb and gutter three years ago was \$20 per foot and he understood the present price for a comparable lot was \$25 per foot. According to Nance, Farm-

ers Home Administration and Federal Housing Administration both turn down unpaved lots for commitments, although they will give a commitment where there is strip paving. Representing the Farwell

Jana Pronger, Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent, again approached the commissioners court to seek an increase in travel allowance for her department. She had appeared before the commissioners with a similar request last month. This month, she was joined by County Agent Mack Heald.

Citing figures of a combined mileage traveled for the duo during the first 11 months of 1973, Heald explained to the commissioners that with a mileage of 45,289 miles, the combined total of \$1,000 (or \$500 per agent) for a year was not sufficient for upkeep and

Both agents asked for an adjustment similar to several counties cited as having duplicate situations as Parmer County.

Heald suggested a set amount per year to facilitate bookkeeping instead of a credit card such as is issued county agents and home demonstration agents in several counties. Both reported the state only

Contributions Asked For New Ambulance

In an attempt to replace a 1959 Chevrolet, being utilized as an emergency service unit by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department, a major effort is underway in Texico to get enough contributions to purchase a new ambulance.

Although the present emergency service vehicle is in use, members of the fire department told the Texico Board of Trustees during a meeting Tuesday night that the emergency service is receiving more and more calls and they do not think the vehicle will be serviceable much longer.

With no charge being made for the emergency service, funds are not available to replace the aging vehicle or to add necessary life-saving equipment, such as stretchers, bandages, splints, backboards and other items.

Recent compliments upon compliments received by the fire department fail to compensate for the great lack of equipment, according to a member of the fire department. The spokesman said it is rather embarrassing to have an emergency unit that dies or fails to start properly or gives trouble when there is an emergency call.

One solution, or possible solution to the problem was proposed during the meeting. Texico residents will receive with their water bill a solicitation for a \$1 contribution to be used toward the purchase of the new equipment. Trustees were in complete agreement that larger contributions would be most welcome, but they will ask only for a \$1 voluntary contribution to build up funds to purchase the equipment.

Figures immediately available showed it would take someting like \$4,000-\$4,500 to purchase a vehicle and from \$2,000-2,500 to properly equip it for emergency service.

Texico residents are invited to comment on their thoughts in a way to acquire a new emergency service unit. They are asked to call or see Texico City Secretary Clara Wiehl with suggestions, or any member of the Texico Board of

Trustees or Texico Volunteer Fire Department.

In other action, Howard Billingsley was named to fill the unexpired term of Don Caillouet, who recently resigned as Texico Fire Chief.

Fire Department elections are held on July 1 and Billingsley was approved by trustees to serve until that time.

For best results, Welch suggests preparing the soil several weeks before planting. This allows the soil to settle and chemical fertilizers to dilute so they will not burn tender seedlings. The flower beds should be raised enough to insure good drainage during

prolonged wet periods. "When starting plants from seed, the soil should be kept moist, particularly during the

out the horticulturist.

A light mulch of straw, hay, pine needles or similar material can be a big help in retaining moisture, preventing soil packing, and maintaining even moisture levels.

Welch suggests planting seed closer than for spring planting to insure a sufficient number of plants even if part of them are winter-killed. "A close stand of seedlings seems to have more chance of survival from winter cold.

Well-rotted manure is an excellent soil conditioner and fertilizer for gardens, says Welch. Chemical fertilizers offer no soil conditioning qualities. Peat moss, gin trash, compost and other organic matter are essential for successful gardening and should compose at least 20 per cent of the garden soil by volume.



In Chapter 3 of St. Paul's letter to the Romans he declares that God has set forth Christ as a satisfaction for man's sin and that redemption is obtained by faith in "His blood," or His payment for sin at Calvary, entirely apart from works, religions or otherwise (Rom. 3:21-26). But in this same passage he states

that "remission" concerns the "sins

that are past" (Ver. 25). What does

he mean by this? Some have taught from this verse that when a sinner turns to God for salvation all his sins are forgiven up to that time and now that he is saved he is henceforth responsible for himself. But this would mean that God saves men by His grace only to turn them over again to their own weak and sinful natures. If this were the case, the converted sinner would be lost again the same day,

> for what Christian believer is wholly free from sin? Paul rather looks back here at past ages and declares that we now know and proclaim that men like

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ENITH

like Moses, David and Daniel (who lived under the law) were actually saved by the redemption wrought by Christ, although this was still future in their day. In other words, Christ died, not only for sins which we have committed, but also for the "sins which are past." The believers of past ages simply believed what God told them then, and God counted them righteous (Gen. 15:6) on the basis of Christ's coming payment for sin. We have the same truth set forth

in Hebrews 9:15, where we are told that Christ's death availed also "for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first covenant," i.e., the law. How blessed we are to live at a

time when God's plan of salvation has been fully revealed, and that we can now look to the Lord Jesus Christ and exclaim with Paul: "He loved me, and gave Himself for me!" (Gal. 2:20).
