The first load of 1946 wheat to come to Farwell was brought in last Friday by Lary Winkle, north of town, and sold to the Henderson Grain & Seed Co. It tested 62 and had a moisture content of 12.38. The Winkle field is producing 12 to 15 bushels.

Organizations Seek To Halt Certificate Abuse

Under WAA regulation, any evidence of irregularity in the acquisition of surplus property is reported to the Department of Justice. Investigation is thereupon taken over by the FBI and prosecution by the Department of Justice.



A. All National Service life insurance policies contain a provision for The waiver of payment of premiums, upon application by the insured, during the continuous total disability of the insured which continues or has continued for 6 or more consecutive months provided such disability commenced subsequent to the date of his application for insurance, while the insurance was in force under premium-paying conditions and prior to the insured's 60th birthday.

Q. What are the requirements for a pension payable to World War II veterans for serviceconnected disabilities?
