Less Birds This Year - -

Pheasant Hunting Season Planned For Dec. 14-29

Pheasant hunting season will open on Saturday, Dec. 14, and will run through Sunday, Dec. 29. The season is set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

According to Parmer County Agent Mack Heald, bag limit will be two roosters per day. No hens will be allowed.

"Pheasant hunting this year will be difficult because of so much cover on the ground," Heald stated. "The fields will be dry enough to walk through if we don't get any moisture through mid-December," he commented.

Pheasant hunting areas are found all over Parmer County, with the best opportunities afforded around the Black community, the Rhea area, around Oklahoma Lane and in the southern part of the county, Heald said.

There will probably be less birds to hunt this year than in past years, Heald stated. "We haven't seen near as many birds this year as in the past," he said.

Reasons for the short pheasant crop this year could be due to several factors. Jack Patterson, Parmer County Game Association official, surmises that the county's pheasants didn't have a good hatch this past spring.

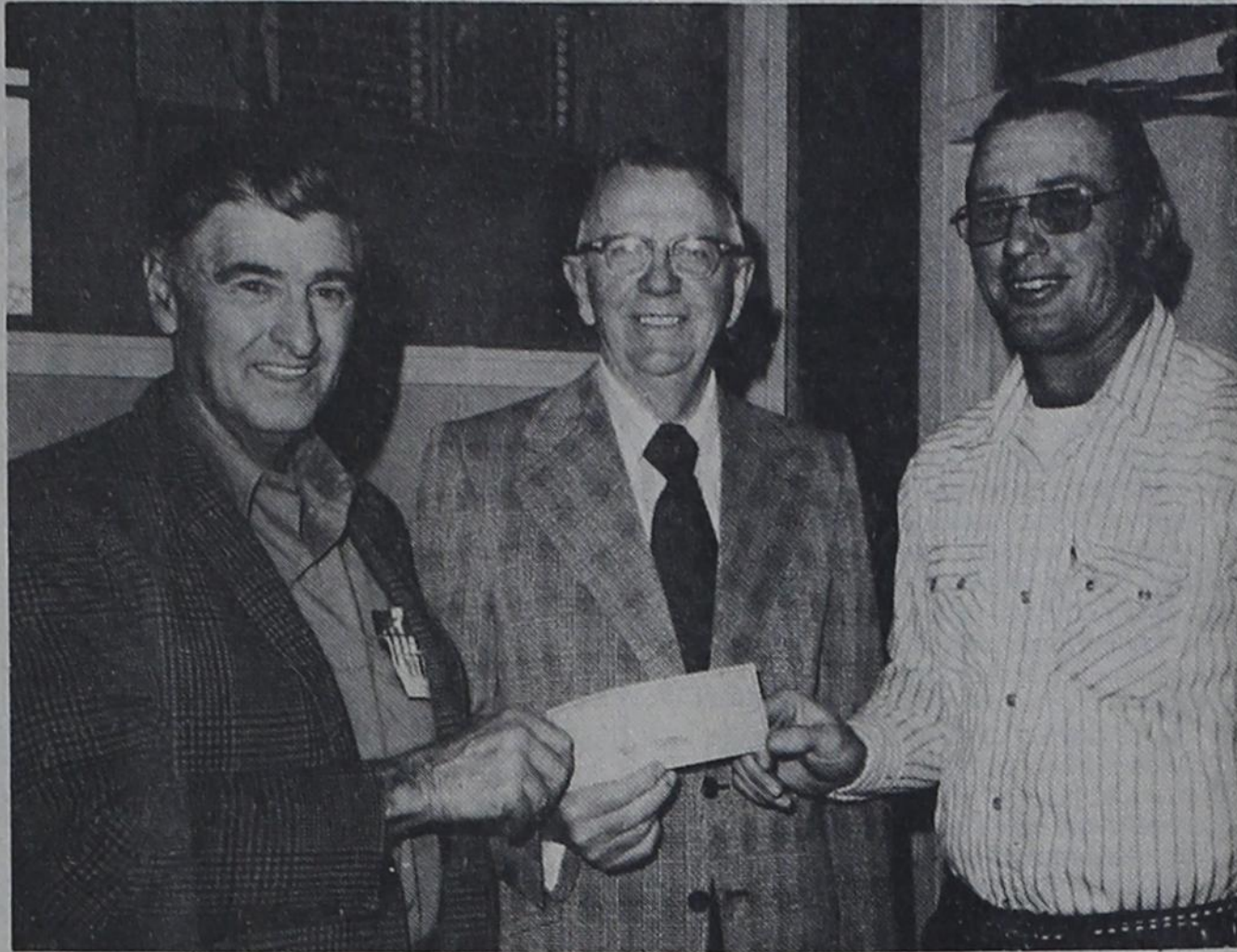
Opinions vary as to why the hatch was poor. "It might have been caused by the drought, or it might have been the spray we had to put on the wheat," Patterson said. Because of the extremely dry winter, wheat farmers were obliged to spray their crops two or three times.

In his opinion, Patterson stated that this year's pheasant crop will be less than half

the size it has been in recent years. The tremendous pheasant crop of last year was primarily due to one of the wettest winters in history, Patterson concluded.

Parmer County Extension

Agent Jana Pronger states that numerous bulletins are available in the Extension Office that tell how to skin, dress, prepare, cook and freeze wild game and wild game birds. Menus are also available.

Rep. Barnard Discusses Texico's Port Of Entry

Members of the Texico Board of Trustees met Tuesday, Nov. 26, at 6:30 p.m. at the Texico City Hall with several guests in attendance, including Representative Barney Barnard.

Representative Barnard headed the agenda and appeared before the Trustees to advise them to voice their opinions on the proposal that the Port of Entry be converted into a tourist rest stop and information center. Rep. Barnard advised interested persons to communicate with their Santa Fe representatives.

The Board of Trustees passed Ordinance 190 regarding the sewage general obligation bonds for \$13,000. This Ordinance stipulates the rules and regulations in paying off the bonds.

Larry Parks and Troy Ramsey, representing the Eastern Plains Planning Council, discussed Texico's Extra-Territorial Zoning Ordinance. The Trustees tabled action on the ordinance, pending the review by Texico City Attorney Harry Patton.

Trustees requested that City Clerk Clara Wiehl ask planner Don McLean of Albuquerque to be present at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees to discuss the new city park, which the City of Texico is in the process of obtaining funds for.

Another guest, Lee Romo, requested that the city allow him to do dirt and caliche street repair work. He will submit an estimate of cost to the Board at the next meeting.

Raymond Cantu requested

information on the opening of Hereford Avenue west. The avenue has been surveyed, but in order to get it opened, the Trustees will have to consult with the Curry County Commissioners. Following the survey, it was learned that a building extends about 37 feet into the right-of-way.

Trustees opened bids for the selling of the old emergency panel vehicle. The three bids received and amounts included: W. W. Hagler, \$505.00; Mickey Fenn, \$500.00; and Bill York of Pueblo, Colo., \$1,005.75. The Board accepted York's bid and will apply the money toward the purchase price of a new emergency vehicle.

Billy Hammit, Texico city employee, requested permission to attend a water and

sewer shortcourse in Las Cruces Jan. 13-17. The Board approved his request.

In other action, the Board opened bids to repair each end of the Texico City Hall building. All bids exceeded \$1,500, therefore, the Board is required by law to advertise for bids. Action was tabled pending the drawing up of specs by attorney Patton.

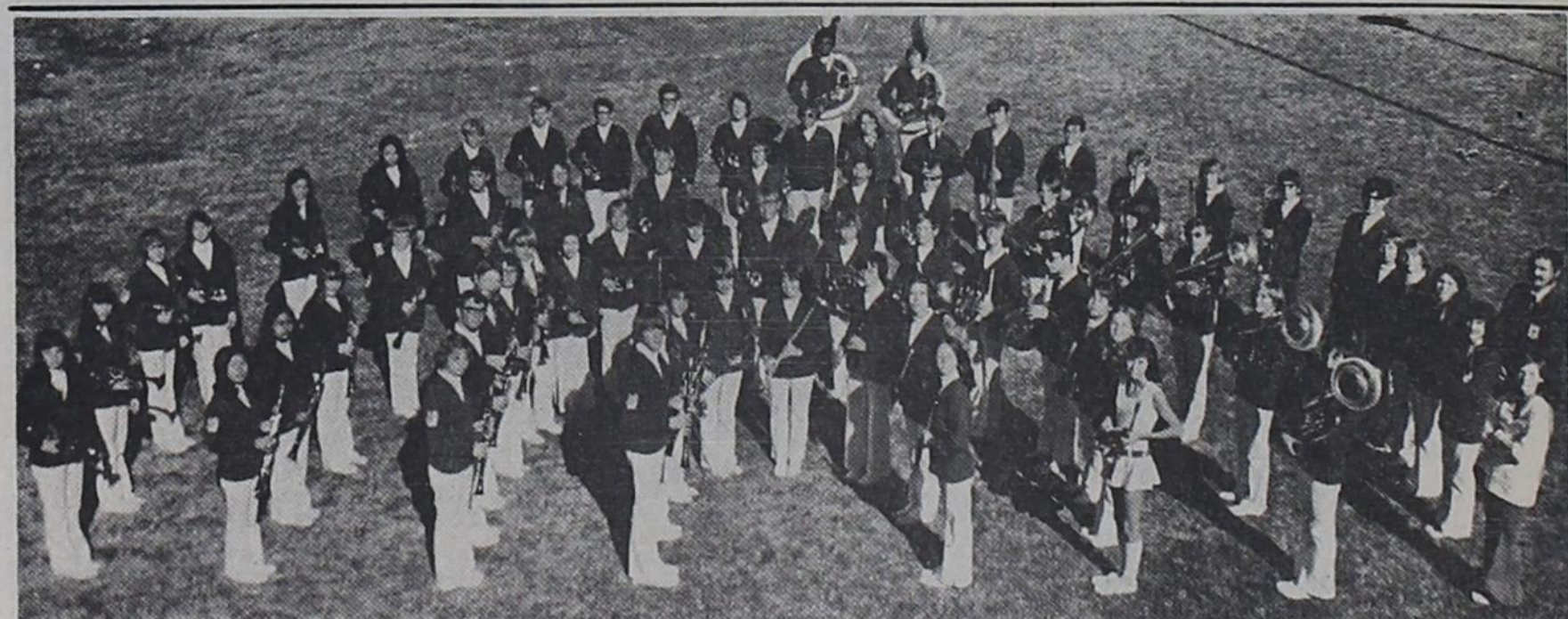

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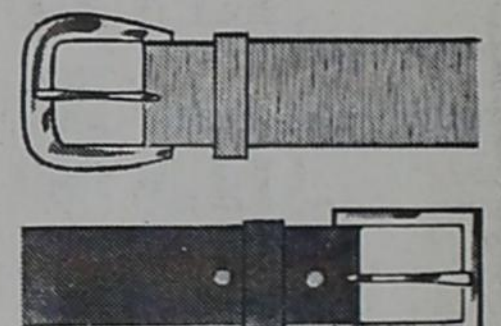


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Steerettes Defeat Sudan In Overtime

The Farwell Steerettes played host to the Hornets of Sudan in competition Tuesday, Nov. 26, and defeated their visitors in overtime play 40-37.

Farwell took the lead early in the game and never turned it over to the Hornets. When action ended for the first quarter the Steerettes led by four points, 10-6. Farwell popped the net for an additional 14 during the second period and gave up 12 points to Sudan. Halftime score showed Farwell's lead widened to six points, 24-18.

When play resumed in the third quarter, the Hornets outscored the Steerettes by one point; nine for Sudan, eight for Farwell. But Farwell maintained the lead 32-27 when the final period of play opened. Once again Sudan racked up more points than Farwell but could not take the top figure on the scoreboard. Farwell put in four while Sudan came up with nine points to end regulation play at 36-36.

An overtime period was instituted and Farwell rallied to hold Sudan to one additional point while the Steerettes pumped in four to take the game, 40-37.

Scoring for the Steerettes was led by Sharon Booth who shot for 20. Kathy Booth was second highest scored with 16 points and Sheryl Woods and Kathy White both added two points each to the Steerettes' scoring effort.

Saron Booth hit nine for 19 in the field goal department for 18 points with a shooting percentage of 47. She pumped in 50 percent or two for four attempted free throws.

Kathy Booth made 31 percent or five of 16 attempted field goals and was on the mark for six of 10 free throws for 60 percent. Sheryl Woods made one for three, 33 percent, of her attempted field goals and Kathy White put in one of five, 20 percent, of her field goal attempts.

Rebounding for Farwell was led by Lori Norton and Terri Boling who came up with six rebounds each and each was credited with two stolen balls. Rebounding for four and one stolen ball was Sharon Booth

while Pam Erwin picked off three rebounds and stole the ball twice.

Sheryl Woods was credited with two rebounds while Karen Foster, Estelle Embry and Joi Meeks were each credited with one rebound.

Team statistics show 16 of 43 attempted field goals hit for 43 percent and eight of 15 free throws for 53 percent. Total rebounds numbered 26 with stolen balls totaling 10.

"We looked ragged in some areas. Perhaps it was because Sudan played a rough type of game and it's sometimes difficult to do the things you are supposed to do under these circumstances," commented Steerette Coach Gayle Nicholas, continuing, "Nonetheless, we still could use some improvement in several areas."

The coach commended Terri Boling as "perhaps our outstanding guard because of her improvement on the boards" and Coach Nicholas also stated that Sharon Booth had a good night.

Friona Chieftains Scalp Farwell Steers

The Farwell Steers played host to the Friona Chieftains in Varsity basketball action Tuesday, Dec. 3, losing to their visitors 97-31.

Eight of 15 field goals were good by Christian for 53 percent and he hit 50 percent, one for two, in the free throw department.

Roberts was on target for two of two, 100 percent, in field goals and Woods hit two of five for 40 percent. Hardage popped the net for 17 percent, one of six field goals, and Robertson was credited with one of three free throws for 33 percent.

Rebounding for the Steers was led by Jones with nine. Grabbing seven off the backboard were both Curtis and Green. Other rebounders were

Roberts, five; Christian, four; Robertson, three; and Woods and Hardage each picked off two rebounds.

Statistics show the Steers hit 30 of 72 attempted field goals for 42 percent and 12 of 17 attempted free throws for 71 percent. Total rebounds numbered 39.

In commenting on the Farwell-Sudan clash, Farwell Steer, Coach Vernon Scott stated, "We are having good passing and good shooting but our defense is poor."

The coach commented on individual players by stating, "Lesley Curtis is doing a good job of bringing the ball up court, passing and shooting. Gene Christian has been shooting 'great'."

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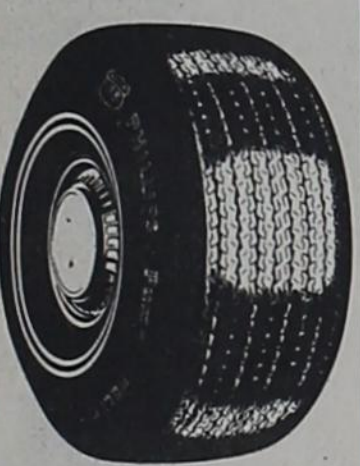
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Senior Citizens Observe Thanksgiving At Dinner

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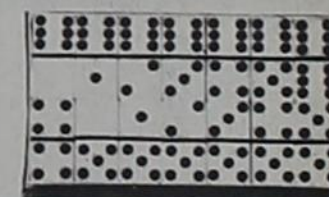
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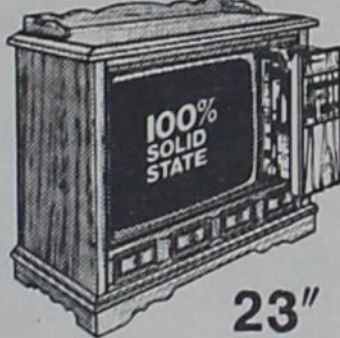

ALWAYS ABOUNDING

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, *always abounding* in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58).

We should note carefully that the Apostle Paul here addresses only his brethren in Christ, those who have truly been born again - born into the family of God.

Furthermore, he sent this appeal to Christians everywhere: to "all that in every place call upon the name of Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Cor. 1:2). He knew that there is a tendency among all believers to be tempted to abandon the work of the Lord through discouragement or carelessness, so he pleads with us to be "steadfast" and "unmovable," reminding us that our labor is "not in vain in the Lord."

How we need this exhortation! We do not soon abandon our businesses or homes. We toil on in spite of difficulties and obstacles, and when the outlook is darkest we of-

ten work the hardest. Sometimes our bodies suffer for it, but we do not immediately give up.

And how much more urgent is the work of the Lord! Souls are perishing all about us for whom Christ died. It is our plain duty to pray for them and tell them of His love. It is our responsibility to toil and sacrifice that they may hear and believe the good news. What shall we say when some day we stand before our Savior if we have been satisfied merely to know Him ourselves? And what will He say?

Let us then be up and going, "always abounding in the work of the Lord." Life is too short to fritter away the precious moments God has given us to proclaim His saving grace. Let us tell them, then, by lip and by life, by our testimony and by our behavior, that "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners" and that "we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).
