



People are believing such partisan hogwash and are pulling back from the market place. This in turn creates a decline in general business activity. F.D.R. said it 40 years ago when he said, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself." The Watergate mentality is not satisfied with their past triumphs in upsetting the will of the people but are determined to destroy Mr. Nixon's successor by creating a false depression and inflicting unjustified economic woes upon the United States for purely partisan purposes.
