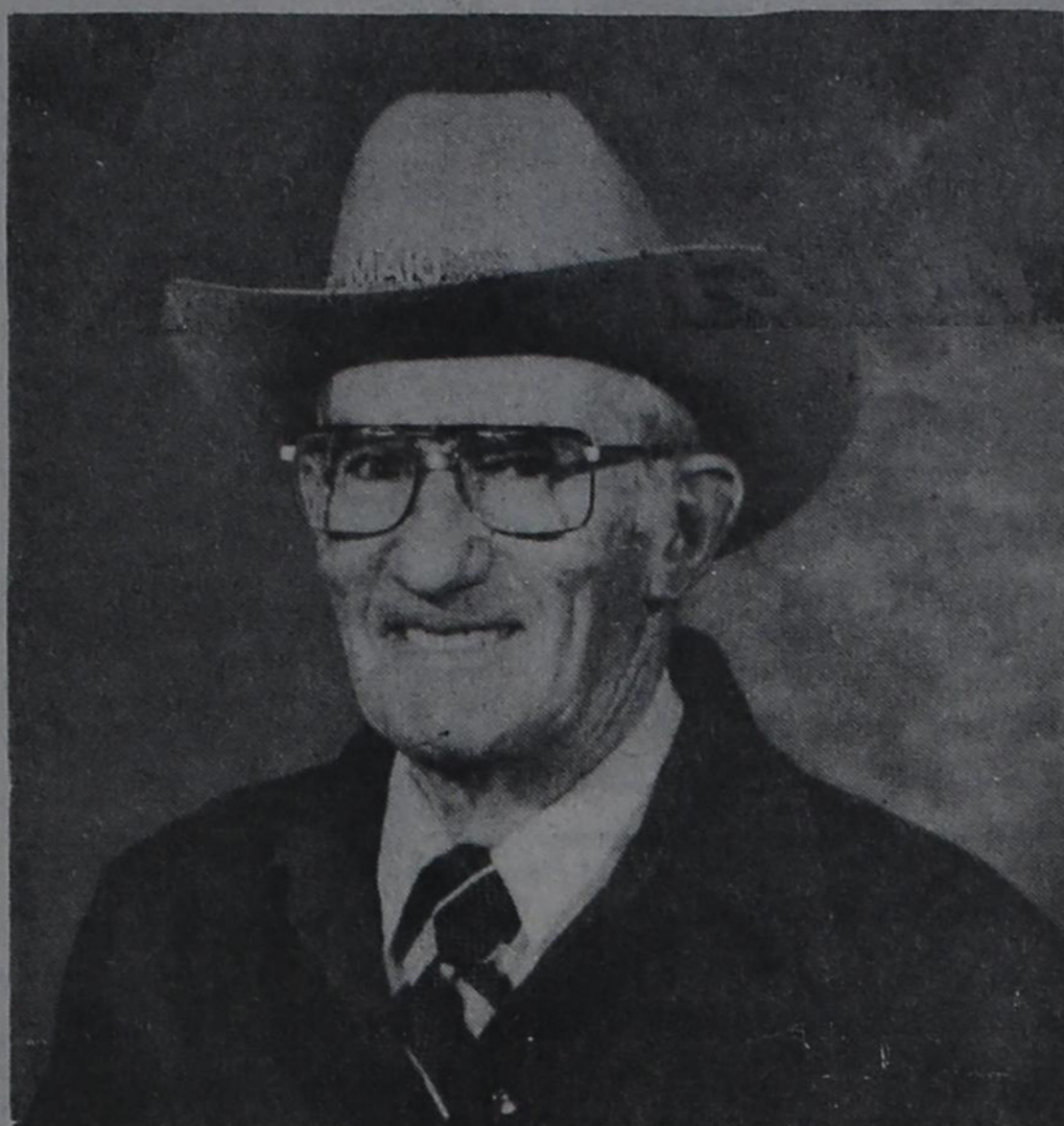

Judge Smith is FFA charter member

Justice of the Peace Albert Smith came to Farwell in 1926 with his parents Edie and Dora Smith.

He was born in Long Branch, Texas, just south of Dallas. It is no longer there.

He attended Farwell School. His favorite teacher was Mrs. Overstreet, who taught English. There was only one schoolhouse for everyone.

There wasn't much time to have recreation although Clovis had a picture show. Smith had a 1925 Model T Ford to run around in.

Smith has been an FFA charter member since 1928. He was awarded the "Lone Star Farmer." He had to keep records on projects, activities in chapter.

Smith met his wife, Carolla, when she came to live with her oldest brother after her folks had died. Her oldest brother had married one of Smith's cousins. The Smiths married in 1936.

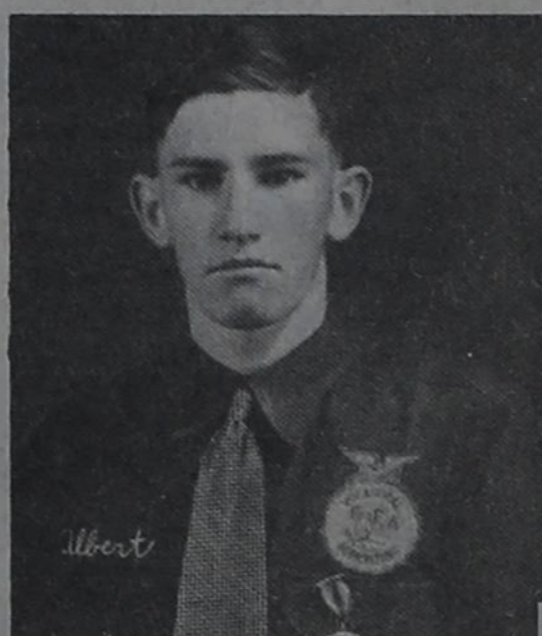
They grew wheat, corn maize, cotton, barley and rye. They also raised hogs and cows. At one time they had a dairy and sold milk in town to individuals; plus delivered to homes.

The Smiths have three sons -- Eddie and Arlin, both of Farwell, and Maurice, of Clovis. The boys played baseball and went to the National Finals in Pennsylvania after winning state.

Smith enjoyed coaching Babe Ruth baseball over the years and was involved in football and track.

As a youth, he played shortstop, first base and left field. He had a chance to go to Texas A&M but did not have enough money for uniforms.

He has been Justice of the Peace for 6 1/2 years. His job is to set bonds, marry people and act as coroner.

He attends two schools annually, one in Amarillo, a 20-hour school, and a 40-hour school in San Antonio. At these schools, he learns new law changes, serving papers, and handling violations.

For the past 30 years, Smith has been on the Curry County '42' Mens league. Smith said the league started in 1948. Smith has been secretary for the last several years.

There are about 100 men who meet every Monday to play '42'. Some of the men from Farwell are Martin Kube, T.J. Kittrell and Ricky Ketcherside, Smith said.

Asked how Farwell has changed, Smith noted the streets being paved, buildings and schools being enlarged.

When asked about hobbies, Smith said, "I like '42' and carpentry."

Asked about anything funny over the years as JP, he said, "A fellow once received a speeding ticket. When I asked him about it, he said he was in a hurry to get gas."

On Dec. 29, Albert and Carolla Smith will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary.

Farwell sanctioned as Sesquicentennial community

More than 400 persons crowded into the Farwell High School auditorium Monday night to participate in the official ceremony sanctioning the city as a Texas Sesquicentennial community.

Lee Storey, the state district director for 90 counties in West Texas, said he was stunned by the large turnout. He noted that he has been involved in ceremonies in much larger communities but without half the participation.

At the ceremony, Storey presented Farwell with a certificate from the state Sesquicentennial Commission designating Farwell "as a Texas Independence Community."

More than 2,000 communities in Texas are expected to participate in next year's Sesquicentennial.

Storey presented the certificate to City Councilman Curtis Smith, standing in for Mayor Walter Kaltwasser.

Storey then presented a state Sesquicentennial flag to Farwell. And he gave a special pin to Liz Phillips, chairman of Farwell's Sesquicentennial Committee, for her work on behalf of the state's 150th anniversary.

Commissioners change decision on voting booths

The Parmer County Commission voted Monday to rescind an earlier decision to allow voting booths to be used for the November election.

The vote to rescind was 2-1, with one abstention. In favor of rescinding were Tommy Williams and Ray McGehee. Opposed was Ernest Anthony. Abstaining was Robert White.

Basically, the commissioners voting to rescind were unhappy that the decision was being forced on them by the federal government, which has mandated the use of voting booths.

The voting booths were ordered recently when the commissioners voted to get them. County Clerk Bonnie Warren said they are expected to arrive before Tuesday's election but will not be used by the voters.

In other business, the commissioners:

--Approved a contract with pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann. He will be paid \$100 a month as a retainer.

--Decided not to join the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Center. The dues would have been \$2,207 annually. The Parmer county judge, due to law, uses a Plainview facility.

--Received bids for a new car for the sheriff's department from (including trade) Friona Ford, \$11,418, and Reeves Chevrolet, \$12,220. Friona Ford's bid was accepted.

--Received five bids for a used tractor for Precinct 2. The bid of Thomas Rhodes of \$12,500 was accepted. It was not the lowest bid but contained the equipment that Williams wanted, it was reported.

--Scheduled the next meeting for Nov. 8, moved up three days due to the Veterans Day holiday.

Proceeds will be for the trip to Sandy Lake Festival in Dallas.

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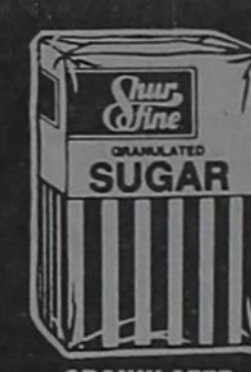
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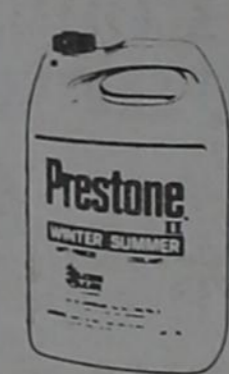
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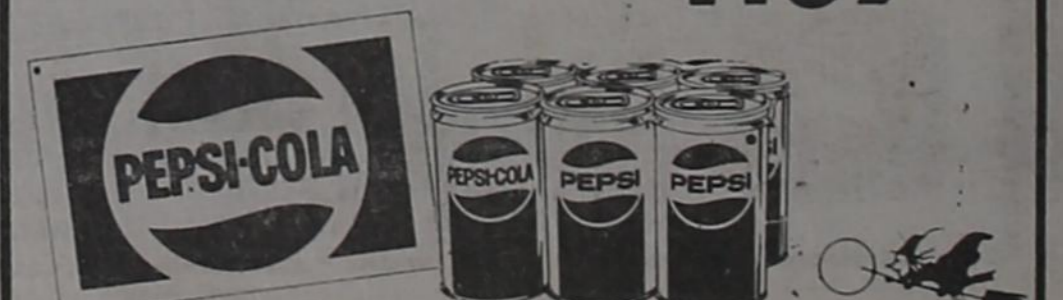
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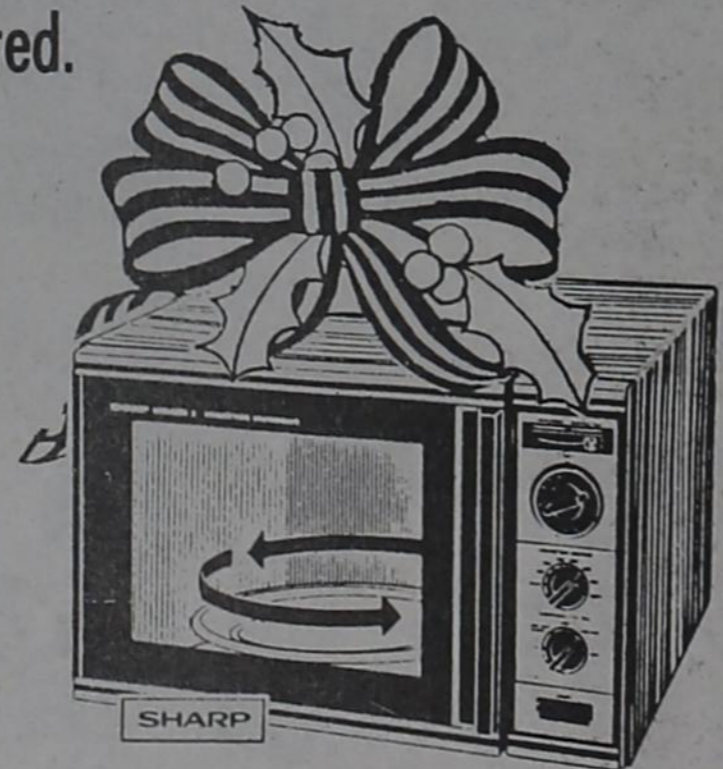
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Texico hosts volleyball tourney

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Here's Tuesday's ballot

Here's the ballot for Tuesday's election. Listed are the Constitutional Amendments in the order they are on the ballot:

No. 1 - "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

No. 2 - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

No. 3 - "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

No. 4 - "The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

No. 5 - "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

No. 6 - "The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

No. 7 - "The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

No. 8 - "The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by

No. 12 - "The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

No. 13 - "The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the State by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

No. 14 - "The constitutional amendment to provide for:

"(1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County.

"(2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall counties."

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

In the third quarter, Lazbuddie scored on Gonzales' kickoff return. Meanwhile, Nazareth put 9 points on the board.

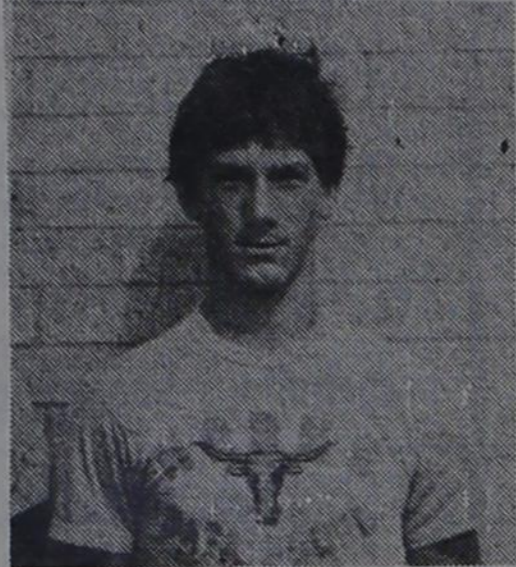
In the fourth quarter, the only scoring was by Lazbuddie - Lust's 15-yard pass to Gonzales.

Lazbuddie was successful on one of its extra-point attempts - a pass from Lust to Gonzales.

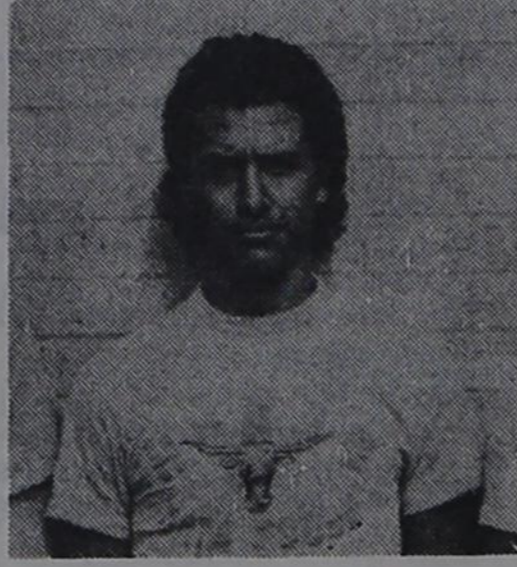
The other individual statistic for Lazbuddie showed David Schacher rushing 6 times for 22 yards.

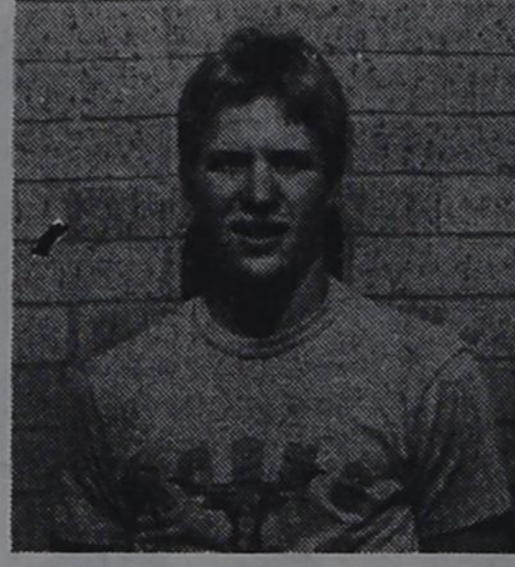

Use natural materials for holiday decorations

Fall is the time to collect plant materials that can be used in dried holiday arrangements.

"Cones and nuts make good base materials," says Fred Widmoyer, Extension horticulturist at New Mexico State University. "The natural colors can be used to advantage, or a variety of effects can be achieved using spray paint, glue and glitter."

Ribbons or moss can add decorative touches between the crevices.

Fresh flowers and foliage can be included if they are inserted into water tubes or picks.

Styrofoam wreaths, balls and other shapes make decorating easy, too. Many of the handicraft stores now have a good selection. By using hot glue and an ice pick, materials are easily applied.

"If you are using small foam forms, be sure to keep your mater-

ials in proportion," Widmoyer says. "In some cases, cones and nuts may be cut into smaller segments for interest and shape."

The horticulturist suggests using the seeds of peach, plum, apricot, pecan, black walnut, hazel nut, screw beans, mesquite and pistachio in decorations.

"You might consider exchanging

fruits, cones and nuts with your friends around the state or in other states. It's a good way to bring friendship closer during the holidays," Widmoyer says.

Vying for the second spot are Texico and Hagerman. Texico's district record is 2-1-1. So is Hagerman's. If Texico defeats Fort Sumner tonight (Friday) and Tatum beats Hagerman tonight, then the Wolverines go into the playoffs.

Pheasants mean dollars to Panhandle farmers

Is it possible to charge a pheasant hunter from \$1,500 to \$3,000 to lease one section of land with a 30 acre playa lake on it and a 40 acre corn or sorghum patch adjacent to the lake?

According to recent research done by the Department of Range and Wildlife Management at Texas Tech University, it is possible for farmers living in prime pheasant range to demand these prices.

For several years now, Chamber of Commerce offices representing various communities on the Southern High Plains of Texas have been receiving inquiries from many large companies, corporations, and private individuals interested in leasing farmland for pheasant and waterfowl hunting.

In an effort to help area farmers realize the benefits derived from managing their land for wildlife and

leasing it to hunters, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District and Friona Chamber of Commerce are co-sponsoring a Pheasant and Waterfowl Management Seminar.

Speakers will include: Dr. Loren Smith of the Department of Range and Wildlife Management, Texas Tech University; Chuck Cosper, Game Warden, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; James Higgins, Texas Waterfowlers Association; and Bob Welch, President, Friona Chamber of Commerce.

This meeting will be held Nov. 8 at the Friona Community Center at 9 a.m. Anyone interested in wildlife management and fee hunting is encouraged to attend. For more information you may contact the Friona Chamber of Commerce or the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

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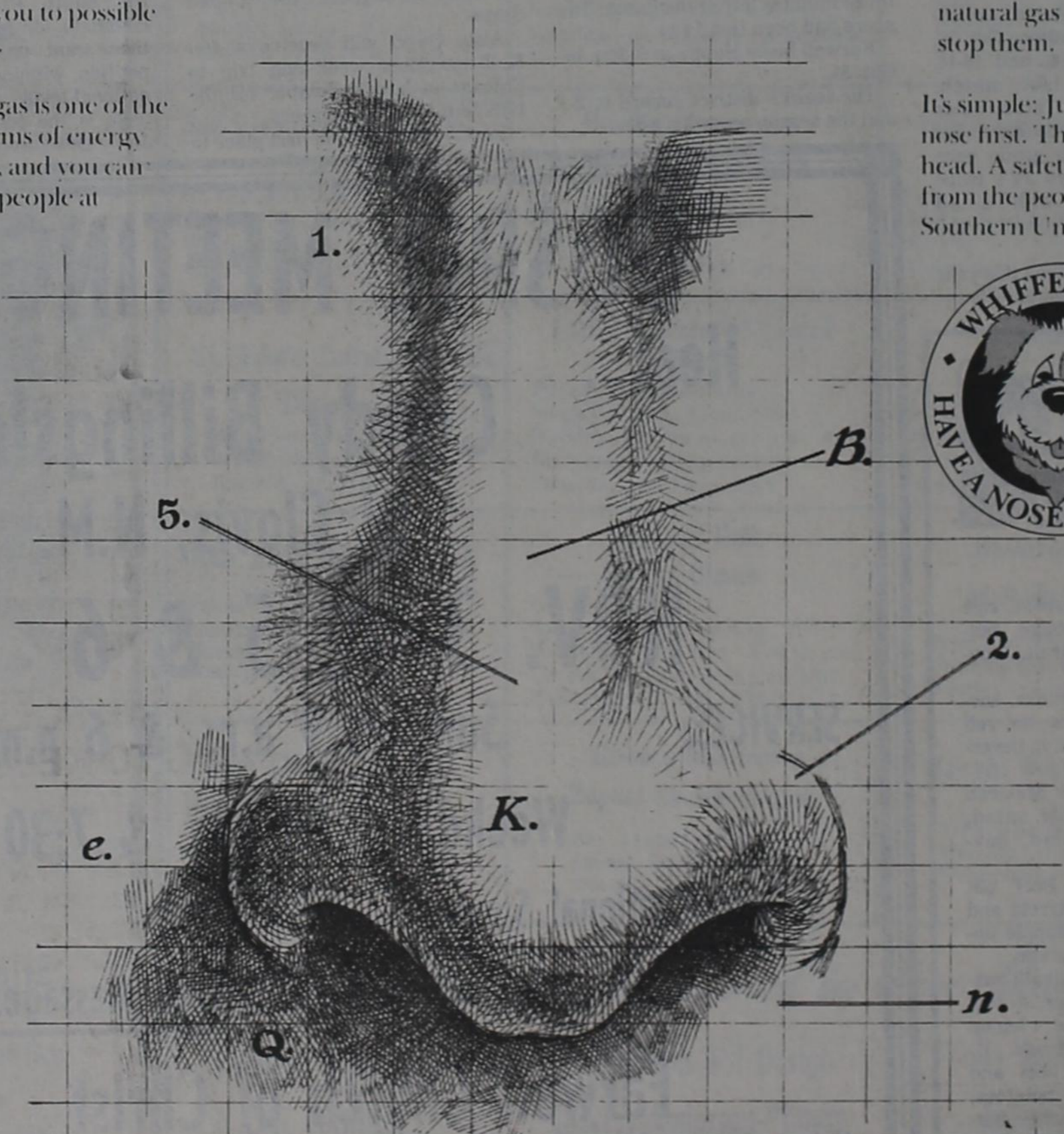

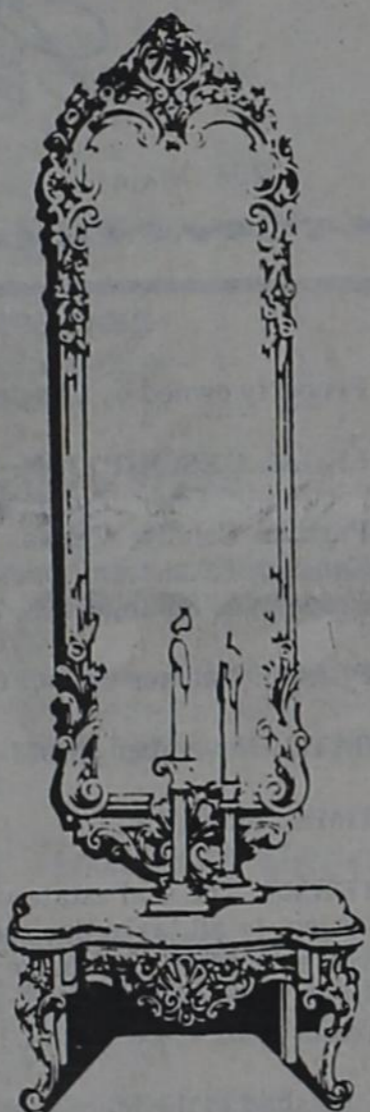

What this means is that our athletes are winning on and off the playing field. Why is their percentage pass rate higher than the average? Because the coaches, whose own performance is evaluated each week when their teams compete, worked with their players in tutorials and helped them make the grade. My office advocated this kind of teamwork in a "play book" mailed each Texas coach, and I think we have found a winning formula that produces results.

As parents, teachers, coaches and students, we can improve the pass rate during the second grading period if we extend the same attention and "scholastic coaching" given our varsity athletes to every child experiencing difficulty in the classroom.

Discovering this key to academic achievement is no less significant to

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

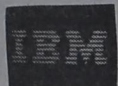

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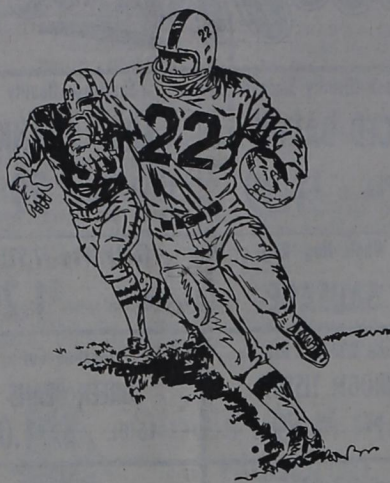
