Border Banter

Time to act is now

This is another one of those tough columns to write. I'd much rather stay with the easy type, the light humorous ones. However, a columnist ought not fear tackling the trickier ones. So here goes.

First, let's start off with Pomper's First Law of Government. In a democracy, government doesn't act; it reacts. What I'm saying is that it's very difficult for government, whether it be a City Council, County Commission or the Congress of the United States, to act on a particular topic until that topic becomes a major problem.

This, in my opinion, is the major weakness in our republican form of government (but, as we all know, it's still better than any other kind many has devised). So we have to live with the fact that government is rather short-sighted and unable to plan effectively to combat long-range problems.

That's life. And this is why folks in Parmer County may be in for a real financial beating a few years from now. Until the problems become really severe, only then can government step in.

Have you been reading the weekly columns from John Grigsby, the Farwell School Superintendent, the past couple of months? What John is saying is that he expects taxes to jump up if Farwell wants to keep its current school program intact. The bad news may hit as early as next year.

How to stop that? Personally, I favor increasing the tax base. This is why I have supported the formation of a local economic development unit -- the one that both the Texico and Farwell city councils backed by unanimous 5-0 votes.

But when the organizational meeting of this unit was held, no one from Texico appeared (although councilman Doyal LaRue had called earlier to say he couldn't make it). Two councilmen from Farwell (Martin Kube and Curtis Smith) appeared but because no one had a key to City Hall and the fact that the mayor was absent the meeting was called off.

Do you detect a lack of enthusiasm? I believe it's because there is no current severe economic problem that would ensure strong representation by local officials.

Or am I wrong? Did you read last week's article about those folks meeting to discuss the long-range extension program in Parmer County? Their primary concern was -- you guessed it -- economic development.

Folks pointed out at the final meeting of this group how hard times were and how government needed to provide diversification here.

I fully agree. But after the meeting I said that I doubt seriously the County Commissioners will jump on this. Times will have to continue to get harder before government can "react," I said.

I hope the folks on the governmental units don't personally take my comments as a slap toward them. It's just the way it is. Government basically is a committee system and it's awfully hard for a committee to act on a long-range problem; support generally doesn't appear until the problem becomes immediate.

A good example is the water problem in Texico. With one of the three wells gone and another about to go dry, the council has taken emergency steps to seek a state loan. Rationing might be needed for a short period but a new well will be dug shortly, one way or another.

Since the problem is immediate, a governmental unit can act quickly. And, hopefully, this is one problem that can be solved easily.

Seeking economic development is not so easy. It's not something that can be achieved in a period of a few weeks. It takes months and years. So if you want to sidestep a tax problem coming down the road in a year or two, now is the time to act.

That's the Catch 22. It's important for government to act now to stop problems from happening two or three years from now. But government doesn't take action until the problem reaches a severe point -- two or three years from now.

Here's what I think ought to be happening:

The Parmer County Commissioners should call for a joint meeting with officials of Friona, Bovina and Farwell, plus the county's four

Merchants participate in BTD giveaway

Texico water grant to be recommended

The Texico City Council got some optimistic news Tuesday night involving its well water problems.

Texico has had three wells pumping water for its residents. Two months ago, one went out. A second one may run dry soon, leaving one. The one is sufficient for water use in the homes, but rationing may be needed for outside water use.

So Texico has placed a request on the July 22 agenda of the state Board of Finance for financial help. A new well is estimated to cost about \$50,000 and would take two weeks to get operational.

Tuesday night, City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian announced that the state Director of Finance and Administration will recommend to the Board of Finance that Texico receive a \$50,000 grant (meaning it doesn't have to be repaid as in the case of a loan).

The recommendation also will say that Texico would have to pay for the well's engineering fees, estimated about \$10,000.

If the recommendation is approved, it means Texico would have to put about \$10,000 instead of the \$50,000 for a state loan.

Texico officials, such as Vane Doshier, are expected to attend the Santa Fe hearing July 22.

In other business, the council discussed weed problems in the city. Instead of the city having to buy equipment to cut property owners' weeds and then charging them for that service, it was suggested that city residents who already have shredders could be used.

So the council voted to have a list kept at City Hall of persons with shredders. That way, once a property owner receives a letter from the city notifying him that he must cut his weeds, if he can't do it himself then he can call City Hall and get a list of persons he can pay to do it.

To get on the city list, persons will be required to pay a \$7.50 business license.

The council also discussed a problem it was having in the personnel department. Recently, it had appointed councilman Butch Tharp to be personnel manager for the city. However, the law says the mayor, John R. Hadley, has the power to hire and fire.

The council noted that both posts

need to be defined better, especially concerning who has what authority. The council voted 3-1 (Tharp opposed) to abolish the personnel manager's post until this could happen.

The council also: --Set the next meeting for July 23, since the state Board of Finance hearing is on July 22, its regular meeting date.

--Approved the budget. No tax increase is called for, but the sales tax was hiked by the state.

--Approved insurance coverages for 1986-87, up about \$400. Clovis Insurance will handle the general liability, \$4,296, and Durham Kinyon has all other coverages, \$9,059.

--Met with three members of the new planning and zoning commission -- Charlotte Pierce, Lewis Cooper and Jim Burrows. Not present were the other four members -- Oran Jay Autrey, Bob Spears, Bob Lydick and Vane Doshier.

City Attorney Duane Hamar explained how to go about setting up the commission and an organizational meeting is set for Aug. 5.

--The Clovis Zoo plans to have a

Moisture block system to be explained

One of the most commonly used soil moisture monitoring tools is the moisture block used with a conductance meter.

Most gypsum around two stainless steel electrodes with lead wires trailing. Soil moisture blocks are installed after crop emergence and are buried in the root zone soil profile.

Four blocks can be installed in the same hole at one foot intervals. Wires from the buried blocks are connected to a stake at ground surface.

These wires are connected to a small, hand held resistance meter for readings. The meter measures electrical resistance and displays it as a percent of field capacity value.

Moisture blocks help the irrigator determine what is occurring in the

root zone soil moisture profile and see from what depth his crop is extracting moisture, as well as how much moisture is being extracted.

The system has a relatively low cost and allows measuring the same field location throughout the season.

New blocks must be installed each growing season, because gypsum dissolves, and the wires are usually destroyed during land preparation and planting activities.

This system can be seen at the Irrigation Field Day on July 15 at 9:30 until 3 p.m. It will be held on the Glen Lust farm, three miles east of Clays Corner.

Texas Republic won't help Mexican Federalist forces

1839: MONDAY, JULY 8. Lieutenant Edwin Ward Moore today submitted his resignation from the United States Navy to become Commodore of the refurbished Texas Navy. The Texas Navy has six ships on order from a Baltimore shipyard. One has already been delivered, and the other five are expected later this year. In addition, the Navy has the steamship Zavala and a receiving ship, the Potomac.

Commodore Moore will be 29 years old next week. He has been a member of the U.S. Navy since he was 14. He has seen much service in the Gulf of Mexico, and is fluent in Spanish.

Commodore Moore was an officer aboard the U.S. Navy sloop-of-war Boston when she put into Galveston harbor last year, and it is believed that he was offered his present position at that time. He is considered aggressive and ambitious, and no doubt the challenge of commanding the Texas Navy in its war with Mexico has a greater appeal to him than the slow progress of a career in the U.S. Navy, which is currently reducing its personnel.

1840: FRIDAY, JULY 10. Secretary of State Abner S. Lipscomb has announced that the Republic of Texas will not provide military aid to Mexican Federalist forces attempting to overthrow the Centralist government. Federalist leaders have been "unremitting in their efforts to induce our government to aid them," he said. "To affect this, they are ready to grant whatever we would ask. We have rejected all their overtures."

Texians generally are sympathetic to the Federalist cause, which seeks greater autonomy for Mexican states and a return to the liberal Constitution of 1824, suspended by the present dictatorship. Before independence, Texas itself took this position. Various Federalist leaders have spent considerable time in Texas during the past two years, trying to enlist support. President Mirabeau B. Lamar has taken no official action, partly because he does not wish to jeopardize the possible success of peace negotiations now being conducted in Mexico City by his agent, James Treat.

In addition, the Texas government was disturbed when Federalists last January organized a so-called Republic of the Rio Grande, theoretically comprised of the northern states of Tamaulipas, Nuevo Leon and Coahuila. It claims its northern boundary to be the Nueces River, whereas Texas maintains that its boundary with Mexico is the Rio Grande.

The new republic was organized by delegates who met at the headquarters of General Antonio Canales, at the Orevena Ranch on the north side of the Rio Grande. Colonel Antonio Zapata of Guerrero, who owns a large ranch on the Texas side, was also present. They organized a government, with Jesus Cardenas, a lawyer of Reynosa, as President and Canales as commander-in-chief. They named Laredo as their capital. It is on the Texas side of the Rio Grande, but has always been a Mexican garrison. However, they decided to maintain headquarters at Guerrero, because a printing press was available there. Inauguration ceremonies took place there on January 29 amid great festivities.

The new government immediately sent a letter to Jose Antonio Navarro of San Antonio, asking for his help in establishing relations with Texas. Their success would depend in part on Texas, the letter said. Navarro refused, stating that Texas did not wish to "inter-meddle

in the domestic quarrels of the Mexicans." He addressed his reply to "The President of the Free Frontier States of the Mexican Republic," rather than using the term "Republic of the Rio Grande."

Federalist revolts have been taking place throughout Mexico since late 1838. Many have been quickly put down, but they still continue in Yucatan and Campeche, and in Mexico's northern states. The Federalists took Tampico in October, 1838, and declarations for a return to the Constitution of 1824 have been issued in other northern cities, including Guerrero, Reynosa, Meir and Laredo.

Numerous Texians have been involved with the Federalists for various reasons: sympathy for their cause, promise of payment for soldiers at about \$22 per month, promise of a share in the captured booty, and promise of land should the Federalists be victorious. Some of the Texas leaders include Colonel Samuel W. Jordan, Captain Jack Palmer and Captain John T. Price.

President Lamar has been concerned that soldiers of the Texas Army might be tempted to desert. On March 14 he issued an "Address to the Soldiers of the Army," emphasizing that fidelity to one's country is "the first great principle of all duty," and threatened that "the punishment of death" would be meted out to all future deserters. As to those who have deserted previously, he offered a pardon if they returned to the army.

Last winter General Mariano Arista, commander of the Centralist's Army of the North, with headquarters in Matamoros, moved toward Guerrero. General Canales retreated to Presidio del Rio Grande, some 75 miles up-river from Laredo on the Mexican side. Arista advanced to Laredo and

crossed the river there. It is reported that as he crossed, he said: "O famous Rio Bravo del Norte, God only knows whether after this campaign in Texas, I shall recross you."

However, there was no campaign in Texas. He recrossed the river, and at Morelos, some 28 miles south, on March 24, a detachment surprised Colonel Zapata, who had only 30 men with him. A sharp battle ensued, and all but one of Zapata's men were captured, with six killed. The one who escaped was a Texian, Martin K. Snell. Among the captured were Zapata and another Texian, Budd Edmondson, who was engaged to Zapata's daughter.

General Canales, who was nearby with some 300 troops, rushed to rescue Zapata, but too late. He was himself attacked the next day by

General Arista's main army of some 1,300 men. Canales suffered a disastrous defeat. Most of his men were killed, including some Texians. He and a few others managed to escape.

The next day, March 26, Arista, incensed at the Texians fighting for Canales, proclaimed that all foreigners who enter Mexico for the purpose of attacking it would be "treated and punished as pirates." On March 28, he ordered a court-martial of Zapata and 22 prisoners, including Edmondson and other Texians. They were convicted of treason against the Republic of Mexico, and executed the next morning. Zapata's head was cut off and carried to Guerrero, where it was stuck on a pole opposite his house and remained there for three days, in the sight of his wife and children, as a warning to the citizens of Guerrero.

General Canales and about 150 survivors of the shattered Federal-

ist army crossed the Rio Grande, picked up officials of the refugee Republic of the Rio Grande, and moved toward the interior of Texas. A new seat of government was set up at Lake Espantosa on the Nueces River, about 80 miles north of Laredo.

President Cardenas of the Republic of the Rio Grande went to Victoria, and General Canales to San Antonio, to recruit Texian volunteers. Both petitioned President Lamar for help, and Canales went to Austin to see him on April 24. He was received kindly, but Lamar made no commitment.

The Federalists have established a camp on Coletto Creek between Victoria and Goliad to recruit and Train Texian, Indian and Mexican rancho volunteers. Cardenas and Canales have embarked on a campaign to gain support throughout Texas, and in general have been well received. They were feted in Victoria, where one citizen proposed a toast to the flag of Texas

flying over the Sierra Madre Mountains in northern Mexico. Many are not pleased, however. The Houston Telegraph and Texas Register called it "too bold and daring an invasion of the territory of Texas."

General Canales now disclaims any design on Texas territory, stating recently in an address at Bastrop that "we are fighting for liberty, both civil and religious." We are now following in the footsteps of Texas," he said, "and wish to establish a government of our own independent of Mexico, and modelled after your own." He has been very successful in his appearances. Said an observer at Bastrop: "Canales and his compatriots are all educated men, very intelligent, and gentlemanly in manners, and must make a favorable impression wherever they go." There are some, however, who consider Canales an adventurer seeking personal aggrandizement, and believe that he would quickly join the Centralists if they made him a

suitable offer. Canales and other Federalist leaders have recently returned to their camp on Coletto Creek. Their forces at present are understood to include about 140 Texians, about 300 Mexican rancheros, and about 80 Carrizo Indians. Colonel Sam Jordan, who served with Canales previously, is reported to be rejoining him with some 110 men. In addition, Colonel William S. Fisher is expected to bring in about 200 men, and Colonel Juan N. Seguin of San Antonio about 100 more.

General Canales will thus soon be in a position to renew his campaign in northern Mexico. In addition, he is attempting to make contact with the Federalists in Yucatan. Their current leader is General Juan Pablo Anaya, who spent considerable time in Texas last year. He is a former associate of Canales. The Texas Navy's steamer Zavala is scheduled to leave for the Yucatan port of Sisal later this month with dispatches from Canales to Anaya.

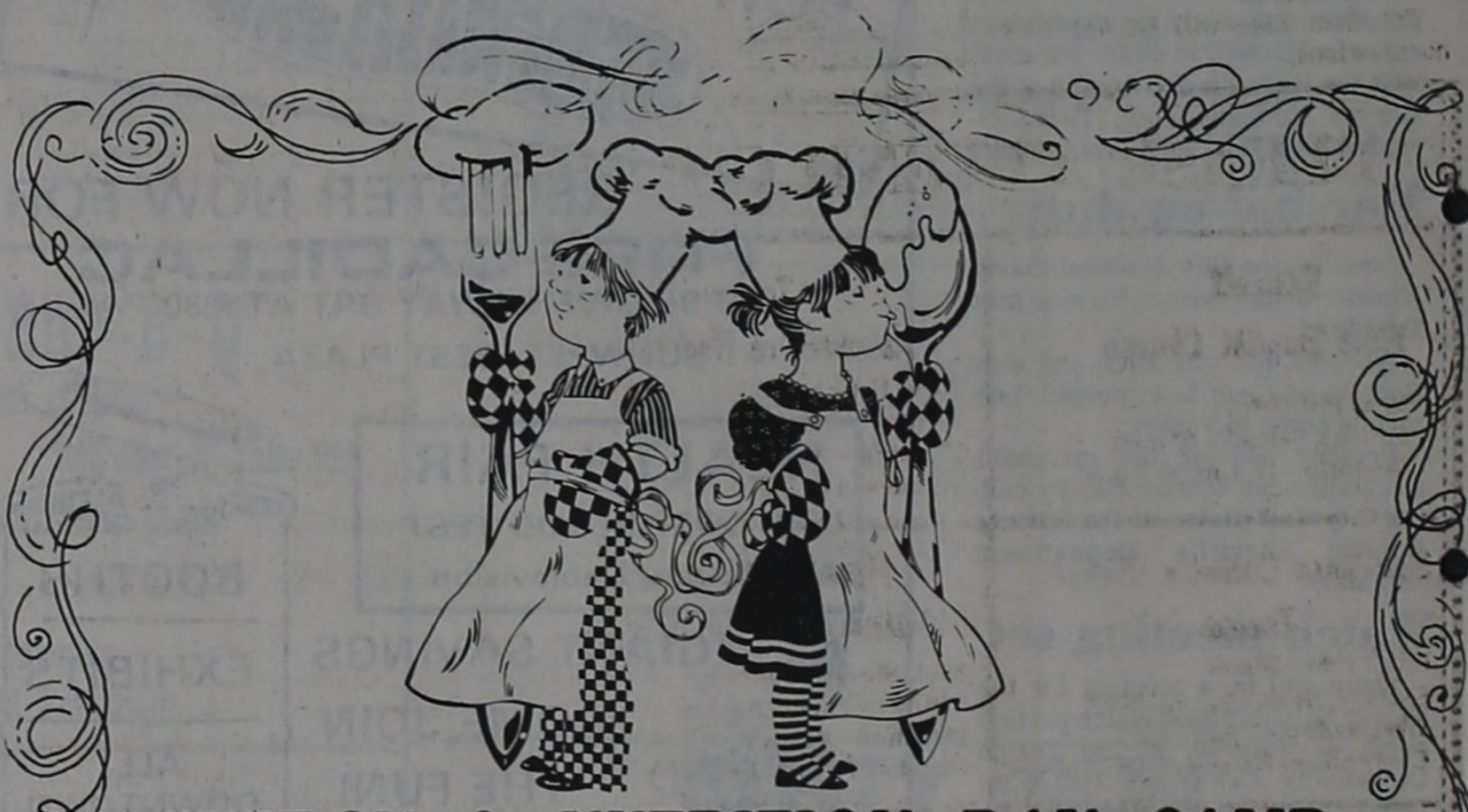
Charles Aycock, the scoutmaster, and Steve Stephens, the assistant scoutmaster, planned to be with the

Reception to honor Sophia Hromas

A 95th birthday reception honoring Sophia Hromas will be held in the First Baptist Church fellowship hall in Bovina July 12 from 3 to 5 p.m.

Mrs. Hromas has resided in the Texico, area since 1919, and is a longtime resident of the Oklahoma Lane and Bovina area.

Hosting the celebration are her children and families, Arnold Hromas, Galen and Judy Hromas, Darren, Matthew and Lisa all of Bovina; Jerry and Charlotte (Hromas) Wilburn, Shannon, Keeley, Lori, Jodi and Melanie all of Hereford; W.E. and Ernestine (Hromas) Lovell, Bill, Diane, and Judi, and Randal and Trenna Skaggs all of Fort Worth.

Mrs. Hromas now resides at Prairie Acres in Friona.

Here's a history of Ernest and Sophia Hromas when they first arrived (Ernest died in 1973): We arrived in Texico, on snowy Nov. 19, 1919, from Wills Point, Texas. We traveled in a Model T Touring car. Everything was sold in Wills Point and all our worldly goods were put in the car—a little bedding, a feather bed, can goods and some cash. Our daughter Ernestine was 4 and Arnold was 2. (Our last child,

Evelyn, was born in 1922.) It took 3 days to make the trip. We arrived in Texico on Thanksgiving Day and stayed in the Texico Hotel owned by Mrs. Murphy.

Our reason for being here was that Ernest Hromas decided he wanted land of his own. He had heard about West Texas, so he boarded a train to "go west." He met Mr. Sam Lawrence, a land agent for the Capitol Reservation Lands in Sweetwater, Texas. They arrived in Farwell and stayed at the Farwell Inn Hotel, which burned

down Dec. 17, 1919. It was located just south of the present park. Mr. Hromas was looking for 160 acres and was shown 2 probable sites. He chose the northeast quarter of a section 6 miles south of Bovina—10 miles east of Farwell. The price was \$30.00 an acre purchased Nov. 1, 1919.

"We rented a 3 room house and bought a bed, mattress, 4 chairs, and a stove. We lived there until December 26th (a little over a month). We had finished building a barn on the new farm which was 14'x18' with a car shed on the north and a horseshed on the south. The barn had a loft, also. We lived in the

barn until 1925 and then moved into a 2 room washhouse. We lived in it until the new home was finished in 1929. This house had six rooms, including a bath. We had nearly 1,200 square feet for \$1,200.00 cash money. The whole family pitched in and worked on this."

We started farming with one walking plow, a sod planter, and 4 horses. One team of horses cost \$250.00 and another team cost \$124.—the cheaper pair turned out to be the better. The first year we were able to break and plant only 14 acres, but made a very good crop. Seven inches of rain fell that year. For the first several years, the first rain came exactly on May 14th.

We raised kaffir corn and crooked-head maize. We harvested it with a pocket knife or heading knife. We could hand head 5 wagons loads a

day. The horses were trained to "giddy-up" and "whoa" to allow for this hand work. It took around 45 days to harvest our crop.

After the first year of sod planting, the land had to be listed twice—single bottom pulled by 4 horses. We always started listing in March and could do about 6 or 7 acres a day. After the crops were up, they had to be cultivated with a go-devil. Our go-devil was an Avery brand. There were not many weeds to speak of until about 1925, then the careless or pig weeds started to make trouble in our crops.

We bought a F-20 International Farmall tractor from Mr. Hartwell in Bovina in 1929. It was equipped with a two row lister-planter and cost \$850. The tractor and plow continued to be used until we quit farming in 1953.

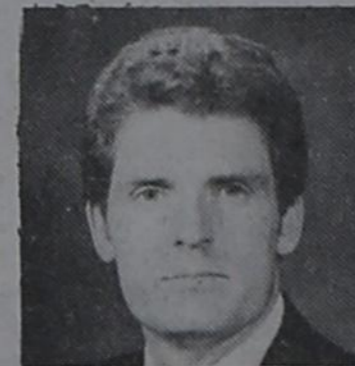

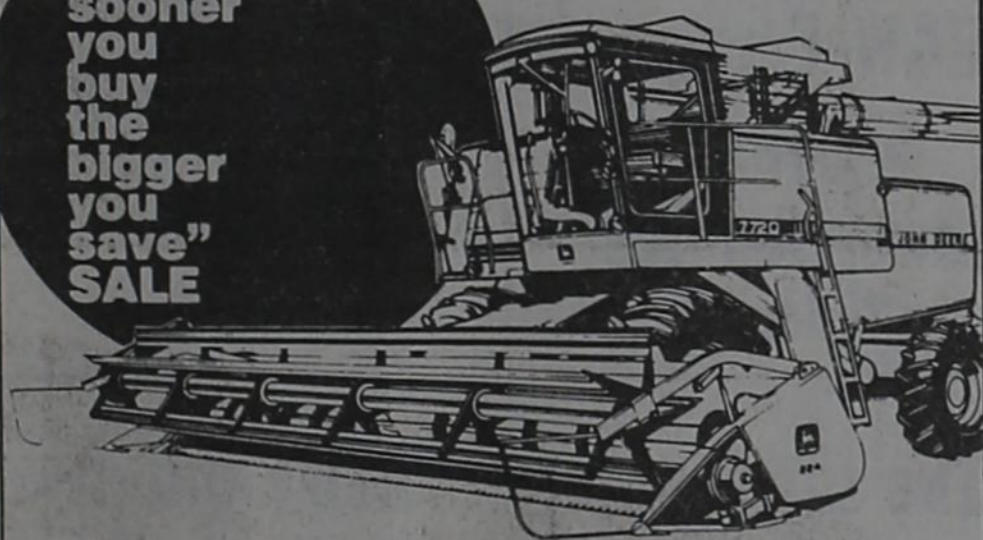
