Fourth Annual Penny Anderson Golf Tournament Set July 20-21

Joe Lamberson, golf professional at Farwell Country Club, is accepting entries for the fourth annual Penny Anderson Partnership Golf Tournament and, as of Tuesday afternoon, reports 10 entries.

Lamberson said he expected to receive more entries as time for the tournament approaches. Dates for the tournament

are Saturday and Sunday July 20 and 21 at the Farwell Country Club.

"Everyone is invited to come out and play," states Lamberson, "and the golf course is in very good shape."

Entries may be called in to Lamberson. He stated that entrants must have a certified handicap from a golf profes-

sional as a requirement for entry.

Shotgun starts will begin at 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. each day of the tournament. The entry fee of \$40.00 per team will be returned as gift certificates for merchandise in the club to the first, second and third places in each flight.

Teams will be flighted by the handicap of the partner with the lowest handicap, with the first 50 teams accepted. Any person may declare for the championship flight.

Players and wives will be honored at a pool party and hamburger cookout the evening of Saturday, July 20. The party will begin after all players are off the golf course, around 8 p.m., according to Lamberson.

In other action during the summer at the club, Lamberson reports that the dates of Aug. 1-2 have been set for the Ladies Partnership tournament. Entries are being accepted at the Farwell Country Club.

The 1974 baseball season ended for the Minor, Major and Sandy Koufax Leagues

with Citizens Bank and Tide Products topping the Minor and Major leagues, respectively, and with the naming of 1974 All-Stars. Citizens Bank rapped

12 opponents for a 12-0 season record and the first place slot while Tide Products downed a series of opponents to receive the honor as champs.

League season play came to an end for the 120 participants with action at the Texico-Farwell Lions Club Ball Park Thursday, July 4, when the final two games of the season

were played. Climaxing a successful season for the "Tide Tigers" was a recorded win over Worley Grain and Aldridge Insurance dropped Kelly Green, 9-8, to add their final win to the 1974 record books.

At the conclusion of season play July 4 the Minor League was led by Citizens Bank followed by Interstate Fertilizer,

Plans Made - -

Border Town Days Committee Meets

Members of the 1974 Border Town Days planning committee met in a called session Tuesday evening at Clara's restaurant to finalize plans for some phases of the eighth annual Border Town Days celebration.

Following discussion of the parade, barbecue and rodeo, those present set starting time for the parade at 4 p.m. CDT Thursday, July 25, which will kick off the annual affair. The parade will begin on the west edge of Texico and proceed east down Highway 60-70-84 to the Farwell Community Arena.

The committee has scheduled the annual barbecue to begin immediately following the parade. Site for the barbecue will be the Farwell City Park and time has been set for 5:30 p.m. CDT. Price of the meal will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for children.

It was also decided at the meeting that rodeo gates will open at 6 p.m. CDT Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 25, 26 and 27. Admission prices have been set at \$1.50 for adults, 75 cents for students and children under seven years of age will be admitted free. Programs for each perform-

ance of the rodeo will be sold for 25 cents each. No free passes will be provided for rodeo workers. Only contestant passes are to be awarded by the arena association.

Also on the agenda was a report on the Border Town Days Queen Contest. A spokesman for Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority, sponsor of the contest, related that only three entries had been received at meeting time. They are Lori Norton, Vicki Snodgrass and Lee Ann Williams.

Final item of business on the agenda for the evening was the naming of Mrs. Tommie Snodgrass to serve as new secretary for the Border Town Days committee.

Excitement, Fun, Entertainment On Tap For Border Town Days

Excitement, fun and entertainment will be the bill of fare for those persons who plan to attend the annual Border Town Days Celebration July 25-26-27. Numerous events have been scheduled in both Farwell and Texico as both cities join in cooperation for the annual event.

Entertainment will range from rodeo performances, to a parade, barbecue, queen's contest, a reunion of four classes from Farwell High School, an "old settlers" reunion and numerous visitors and family get-togethers.

The kick off event for Border Town Days 1974 will be the annual parade July 25 at 4 p.m. CDT with a galaxy of floats, pretty girls, fire trucks, riding clubs and other assorted entries. A story on the parade will be found elsewhere in this edition of the Tribune. Fred Chandler will serve as parade marshal with Bill Thigpen, deputy marshal.

Immediately following the parade will be a barbecue in the Farwell City Park. Sponsored by the Farwell Chamber

of Commerce, the barbecue will be served with potato salad, beans, onions, peaches and iced tea.

According to Chamber secretary I.W. Quickel, Adolf and Henry Haseloff will prepare an estimated 400 pounds of beef. Serving the meal will be volunteers from the Chamber.

Topping the events on July 25 will be the first performance of the rodeo, beginning at 8 p.m. CDT in the Farwell Community Arena. Sponsor of the rodeo, which will also be held July 26 and 27 at 8 p.m. CDT, is the Farwell Community Arena Association. The gate will open at 6 p.m. each evening.

Rodeo entries must be post-marked not later than July 18

and the books will close at 10 p.m. CDT the same day, according to Frank Doshier, secretary-treasurer of the Farwell (Continued On Page 2)

Groups Encouraged To Submit Parade Entries

Fred Chandler, parade marshal for the Border Town Days Parade is accepting entries for the parade from "anyone interested in participating," including riding clubs, organizations, social clubs, civic

groups, businesses, etc. An entry in the parade may be made by contacting Chandler at 481-3343. He is encouraging all entries to be submitted by July 23; however, he states, "late entries will be wel-

comed." Serving as deputy parade marshal will be Bill Thigpen of Texico.

The parade will begin at 4 p.m. CDT, with entries assembling on the south side of the highway in the west end of Texico. From the assembling point, the parade will proceed down the highway, across the railroad tracks and terminate at the road to the Farwell Arena Association.

Leading the parade will be the Farwell and Texico fire trucks. Several groups have already signed up for the parade, according to Chandler and more entries are encouraged. "All float entries possible" will be accepted, according to Chandler.

Chandler has received entries from the Oklahoma Lane 4-H Club, the Deaf Smith County 4-H Horse Club, Texico Chamber of Commerce, some local businesses and other groups.

Although plans for judging entries are still tentative, plans are to give trophies to the visiting riding clubs and prizes for first, second and third place float entries.

Special Bond Election Called By Texico City Commission

Texico City Commissioners meeting Tuesday evening at the Texico City Hall passed a resolution calling for a special election for the City of Texico on Saturday, Aug. 31, for improvement of the sewage disposal facility and for repair of the municipal street system.

Issuance of bonds in an aggregate amount of \$36,000 will be submitted to registered voters in separately stated proposals. Each proposal will be voted on separately.

Every registered voter in Texico is eligible to cast a ballot in this special election. According to City Clerk Clara Wiehl, the polling place will be City Hall and the voting hours will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. MDT.

In other business Commissioners approved an audit contract for 1973-74 to Ribble Holoman, CPA in Clovis, in the amount of \$624. The police report, given by Texico Marshal Micky Fenn, was approved for the month of June in the amount of \$230. Commissioners also passed a resolution to balance 1973-74 budget for the City of Texico.

Four visitors appeared before Commissioners to request something be done about the sand in water lines. Those appearing were Mr. and Mrs. Carl Parks, Mrs. Laquita Stephens and Mrs. Sylvia Burgett.

In other action, bills were approved for payment. Commissioners attending the meeting were Mayor Manford Turnbough, Vane Doshier, Bill

Christian and Ruby Goforth. City employees attending were Micky Fenn, Billy Don Arnold, Billy Hammit, Clara Wiehl and Dan Buzzard, city attorney.

A clearer look at the aims of some organizations is in order. On second thought, we are not sure whether we should look at their aims or should correct their choice of words that they use to state their position on their demands for wage increases. This is in reference to the oft used word "entitled". We note that recently the teachers' representative in a nearby community said that his group was entitled to a 10 percent or so wage raise because the cost of living had gone up that much or more.

We agree that the cost of living has gone up, for everybody. We do not agree that this "entitles" anyone to a wage increase. An "entitled" wage increase is justified only in two ways. Either by a corresponding increase in productivity of the worker or that the employer is enjoying an unusual margin of profit that can be shared by management with the worker.

If the premise is accepted that a certain group in "entitled" to a wage increase because other wages for other groups have gone up, we are saying that a particular job or profession should receive a certain proportional wage on a scale comparing all jobs and wages. This, badly put, is communism where in all wages, jobs, skills and professions are told by the state what their niche in society will be.

However, under another name this system of job relativeity is being tried with a modest degree of success in a major country of the western hemisphere. For several years now, Brazil has had what is called "indexation" wherein all jobs, prices, goods and services are "indexed" and a ratio of worth is assigned to it. We do not know much about the political results of this idea but understand that it was instituted by Brazil in an attempt to halt or slow their rampant inflation.

In our view, this success is relative. That is, in the last several years Brazil's inflation rate has dropped from an annual 30 to 40 percent to around 10 percent. A 10 percent devaluation of your currency per year is hardly a resounding victory but it does beat quadruple that amount all to pieces.

So, all major union groups that use the term "entitled" are either degrading the free enterprise system or being very sloppy with their choice of words. We prefer to think it is the latter.

To our asking friend in Colorado: The 28 cents added to our out-of-area subscription rate is sales tax. We are not sure that the State of Texas is "entitled" to it but they darn sure are going to collect it.

It is difficult to tell how much rain has fallen in Farwell recently by the old "eyeball" method. A fairly accurate "eyeball" gauge for us in past years was "Cap's Pond" on First Street. With the improved drainage resulting from our recent paving program, this and other water collection points have disappeared, leaving us with only a few damp spots where we used to have small lakes. Also with the extreme dry conditions that have prevailed, half-inch rain is soaked up so quickly by the ground that there is scarcely a visible wet spot by which to form a good guess. Well frankly we can do without our old rivers and lakes in town but would be glad to have a frog strangler every week from now to fall. Think rain and pay the preacher - it's bound to keep coming.

We heard a pithy remark at one of the meetings we attended recently. A very busy person remarked that, "Everyone should occasionally do something for which they do not get paid." With the upcoming Border Town Days celebration getting closer, a lot of people will have an opportunity to put this bit of philosophy into action. Get your name on a work list. You will feel better for it.

Community Arena Association. Contestants should mail entries to Frank Doshier, Route 1, Farwell or to the Farwell Arena Association, Box 593, Farwell.

Rodeo contestants will compete for a purse totaling between \$7,000 and \$8,000. Pay is on the first six places and the number of entries in each event will determine the amount of money in that particular pot, according to Doshier.

Age categories for competition will total six and include 12 and under boys and girls, 13-15 boys and girls and 16-19

boys and girls. Entry fees will be \$6.00 for each event plus a \$4.00 office charge for the 12 and under age group, \$11.00 for each event plus the office charge for the 13-15 age group, and \$16.00 for each event plus the office charge for the 16-19 age group. Doshier stated that AJRA members will get all their money back, with the exception of the office charge.

Buckles will be presented to first place winners in each event in each group and trophy buckles will be awarded to All Around Cowboy and All Around Cowgirl, according to Doshier.

Girls 12 and under may compete in barrel racing, flag racing, pole bending and break-away roping. Events for boys 12 and under will include barrel and flag racing, break-away roping and steer riding.

Entrants in the 13-15 girls group may compete in barrel racing, pole bending, break-away roping, ribbon roping and goat tying. Boys in the same age group may enter tie-down roping, steer riding, ribbon roping and barrel racing.

Open to girls aged 16-19 will be barrel racing, pole bending,

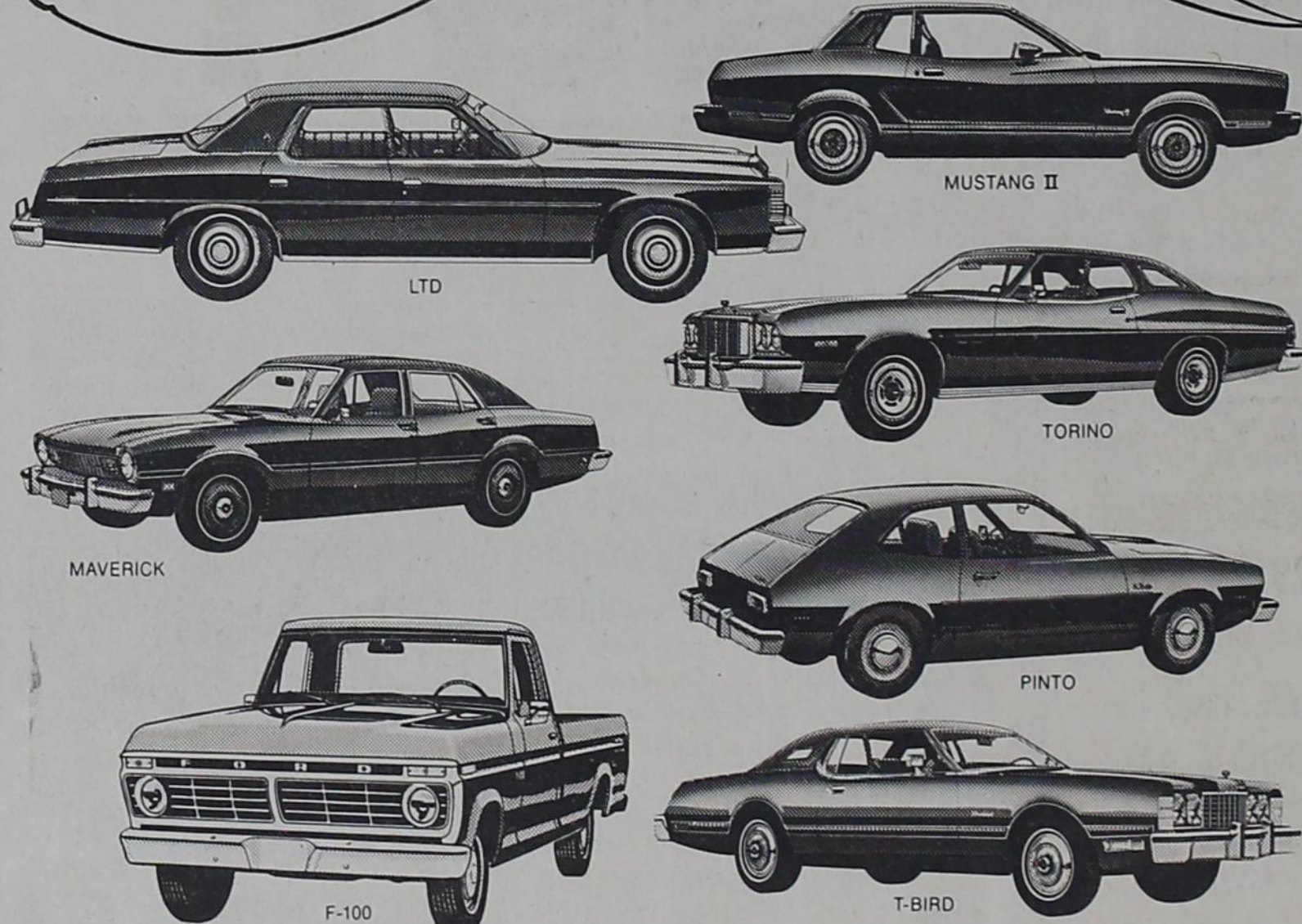

The Chamber decided to enter a float in the Border

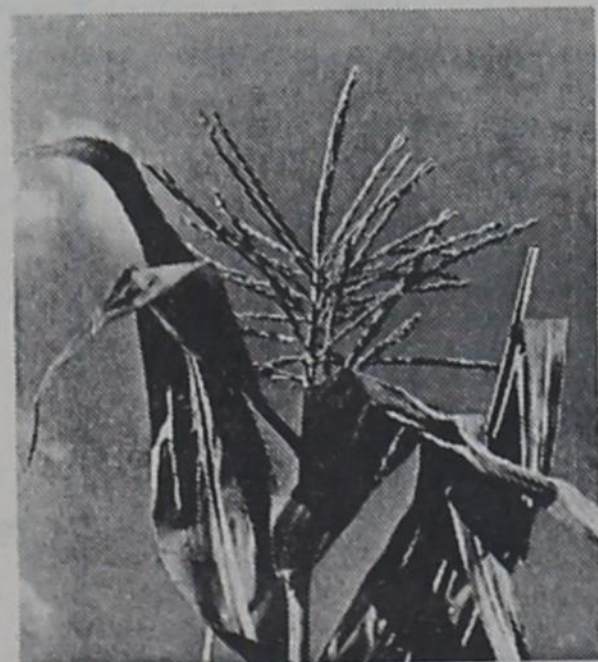

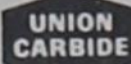

She was born near Duncan, Okla., and when she was four years old she moved with her family to Portales. She has one brother and one sister, who both live in Lubbock. She attended grade school in Portales, but graduated from high school in Clovis.

Her husband, Ralph, has worked for Gifford-Hill for many years, and is currently a salesman for that firm. "Ralph and I met on a blind date," Lucille said. "We discovered that we had lived in Portales at the same time when we were small, but we didn't know each other." They were married in 1951. Ralph was in the navy, so the lived in California. Two weeks after his discharge from the navy they moved to Farwell, and have lived here ever since, except for a brief time in Portales.

Their family consists of three boys named Steve, Johnny and Jimmy, and a dog named Edgar. The boys each play an instrument - Steve plays the trombone, Jimmy plays the saxophone, and Johnny plays the bass guitar. CHICKEN ENCHILADAS
1 medium onion, chopped and sauteed in butter
1 small can green chiles
1 can mushroom soup
1 can chicken soup
1 can cheddar cheese soup
2 c. chicken (or 1 whole chicken, boned)

1 pkg. broken tortillas
Mix and top with grated cheese. Bake at 300-325 degrees for 30-45 minutes.

CHERRY SALAD
1 large carton Lucky Whip
1 can Eagle Brand milk
1 can cherry pie filling
1 large can crushed pineapple
1 c. cocoanut
1 c. miniature marshmallows
Combine and chill.

BROWNIES
Cream 2 cubes oleo and 2 c. sugar.

Add 4 eggs, one at a time beating well.
Mix 10 T. cocoa with enough water to form a thick paste. Add to first mixture.
Add 1 c. flour and 1 tsp. vanilla.

Checking the construction of newly purchased garments may save much time and expense later.

Spend a few minutes initially with a new garment and you will have extra hours of confident wearing pleasure.

Some guides for checking new garments follow:

If stitches are too loose in the hem or too visible on the right side, remove the stitches and re-hem, either with a suitable thread or by using a fusible.

Thread dangling threads into a needle. Bring them inside the garment and fasten securely.

Reinforce loose buttons, snaps and hooks and eyes before they become missing items.

Prolong the life of a poorly constructed machine-made buttonhole by going over it with a buttonhole hand stitch or machine zig-zag.

Reinforce sleeve and crotch seams with a second line of machine stitching 1/8 inch inside the seam allowance using short stitch length, thread and needle appropriate for the fashion fabric. Narrow or crooked seams need this same treatment of a second line of stitching.

Reinforce underarm seams of raglan and kimono sleeves with seam tape. Strengthen pockets, or plaquets with a few firm hand or machine stitches placed in prime areas of stress.

Iron-on patches or interfacing on the inside can reinforce areas of hard wear such as knees, elbows and seats of pants.

THE CAPTAIN OF OUR SALVATION

Years ago a man of God was asked to preach at the funeral of a young soldier whose parents were unsaved.

During the course of his message the preacher sought to impress upon his hearers the basic fact that "the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

This greatly upset the parents. After the service they complained: "This is embarrassing. Our boy was not a sinner."

The truth was that shortly before his death this young man had done what every true, born-again Christian has done. He acknowledged himself to be a lost sinner and, trusting Christ as his Savior, had been so gloriously saved that his parents were mystified that he could be so happy in the face of death.

But for the "new man" the death of the body is the vestibule through which he is ushered into the blessed presence of "the Captain of our Salvation," the One who "by the grace of God tasted death for every man" that He might "bring many sons to glory" (See Hebrews 2:9,10).

This is why we read in Hebrews 2:14,15:

"Forasmuch, then, as the children (of Adam) were partakers of flesh and blood, He (Christ) also Himself likewise took part of the same; that through death He might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil.

"And deliver those who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage."

No wonder St. Paul's simple message of salvation was: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

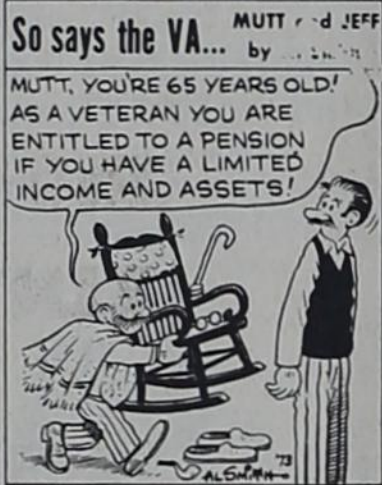

INVESTIGATING SCOTLAND YARD

One of the more arresting facts about Scotland Yard, the famed police force, is that it is only nominally connected with Scotland. The name Scotland Yard, according to the Teacher's Scotch Information Centre, is derived from an old palace in which Scottish royalty was housed when visiting London before the two countries became one kingdom.



On the site of this palace were built the offices of the first Commissioner of Police for the Metropolis of London. It became so widely known that, when it was necessary to move headquarters to new and larger premises, New Scotland Yard was chosen for the new address.

Scotland Yard today is in fact the Police Force of London, and with two exceptions it has no national status. The exceptions are that the Yard keeps a complete record of all known criminals in the country; and it maintains a special branch of under 200 men who carry out such duties as guarding royalty, cabinet ministers and distinguished foreign visitors, as well as watching undesirable aliens. Case solved.

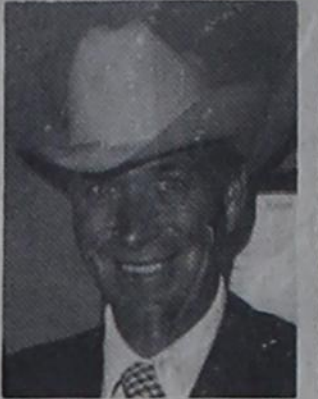
