The Texico-Farwell Little League is currently hosting one of 1974 Little League Area

Clovis Evening Lions. Action was to begin at 7 p.m. MDT on the east field of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club Ball Park.

Friday (tonight) the local All-Stars will compete in second game action during the tournament. First game will get underway at 6 p.m. with Friona facing the winner of the Clovis Southern-Clovis Evening Lions clash. At 8 p.m. All-Stars representing the Texico-Farwell Little League will see action when they meet Bovina. Completing the tournament schedule will be game action between the winners of the Friona and Texico-Farwell games. Action will begin at 7 p.m. MDT Saturday, July 20, and the District Tournament

contender will be determined when the final scores are tallied.

According to Jim Walker, president of the Texico-Farwell Little League Association, no admission will be charged to those wishing to attend the tournament and members of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club will be manning the concession stand. We expect a good crowd of local people to turn out for the games. We're going to have a good tournament with some pretty good clubs playing," Walker commented.

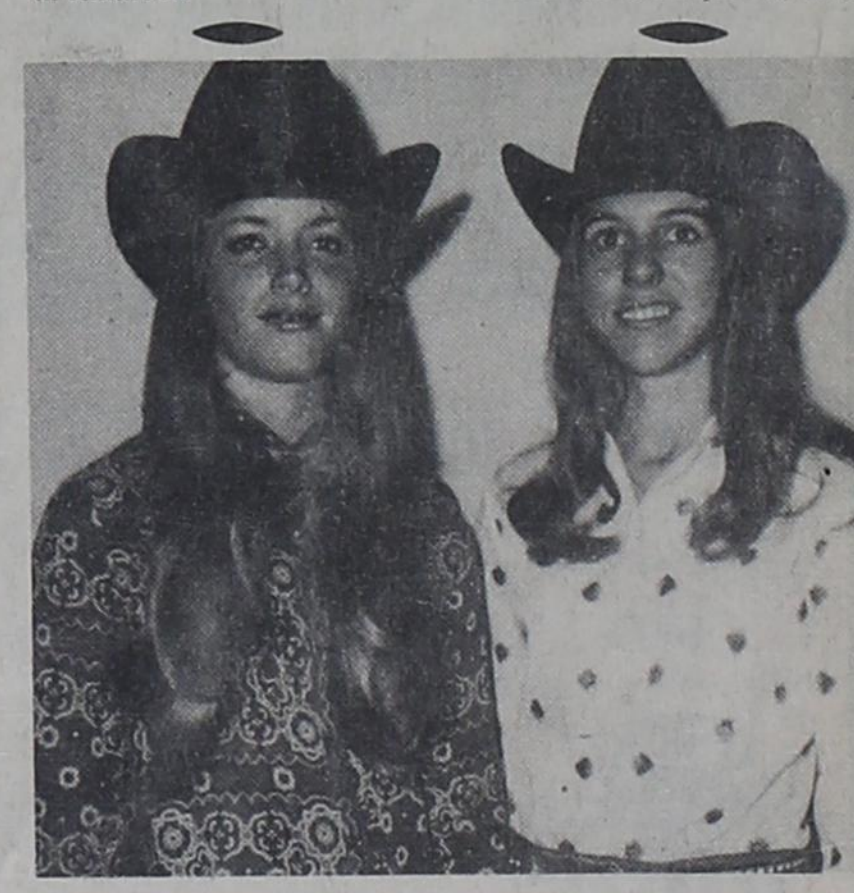

PURELY PERSONAL

Sorry signs of the times: We notice the high fence which the contractor is putting up around the site of the new Law Enforcement Center. I suppose this is to keep the thieves out until they can get it built to keep the thieves in.

J. Paul Getty, John D. Rockefeller and other assorted oil tycoons became billionaires in the petroleum industry. Lately the Arab Sheiks have become billionaires via the world-wide demand for petroleum. The rise of the latter class of oil magnates has in an indirect way opened the door to a whole new field that could likewise produce a few billionaires. This is in our High Plains cattle feeding industry.

The person or company that can come up with, and market, a product of some kind that will fatten cattle to the present market specifications without the feeding of grain will be a billionaire.

We predict that the feeding of grains to cattle will come under increasing pressure in the years ahead, and that in less than a decade this practice will either become uneconomically sound or be prohibited by law.

It can be uneconomically sound to use grain in cattle feeding rations because of a growing world-wide shortage of food and a continued rise in the price of cereal grains. Land formerly producing non-cereal grains will be converted to a cereal grain crop.

Parmer County has switched from grain sorghum to corn for economic reasons in just the last two or three years. Farmers, as with any other business, will produce that which makes them the most money. This switch, for economic reasons, could limit the production of cattle feeding grains as the cereal grains go into the export trade.

Another limiting factor in feeding grain could be the federal government, requiring by law the production of export cereals to balance the tremendous dollar drain of our purchases of foreign petroleum. The Arab states are already amassing frightening amounts of our currency and are planning on investing it in our economy. Japan is, for example, acquiring vast holdings in the United States. Can we allow other countries to also buy us out?

A basis for the government to intervene in grain production is being laid by a subcommittee of Congress that is now saying that the amount of grain we currently use to feed cattle annually could be used to feed another 600,000,000 of the world's hungry each year, and that it is our duty to feed these people.

This sounds like poppycock but Congress has a track record of putting today's poppycock in to tomorrow's law. Therefore, unless our energy shortage is solved internally - that is, no buying of foreign oil - our cattle industry could wind up being the victims of our own unwise actions.

This is where the oil boys may unwittingly make the next billionaire. Find a substitute for grain in livestock feed and a large share of the country's riches will be yours. Wouldn't it be wonderful if old newspapers turned out to be the ideal cattle feed? On the strength of this we would be happy to sell our interest in the Tribune for a few million, give or take a few bucks.

In the unwise action department, it looks like the striking National League Football Players Association is making a great run for the gold-plated homehead award. Our coffee shop barometer has registered several favorable comments of the first televised game of the new World Football League. Last week's game may not have had the technical perfection of a NFL game but the element of equal competition was there to provide spectator interest.

Really, spectator interest is aroused if the two contestants are fairly well-matched, be this in the NFL or at our local Little League park. Most viewers prefer spirited action and a close game to technical perfection and a lopsided contest.

Look out fellas, the underdogs and cast offs have always held a special niche in our society.

will include barbecue, potato salad, beans, onions, peaches and iced tea.

A Chamber spokesman estimates that approximately 400 pounds of beef will be prepared to accommodate the hungry crowd. The meal will be served by volunteers from the Chamber of Commerce. Price of the meal will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children.

There will be a Sidewalk Art Show Thursday from 1 to 5 p.m. in downtown Farwell on Avenue A. While parade viewers are waiting for the parade to begin, they will be able to visit the display and see all types of art work.

Topping events for the opening of Border Town Days will be the initial performance of the rodeo. Gates will open at 6 p.m. CDT each evening of the rodeo, July 25, 26 and 27. Admission prices have been set at \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students. Children under seven years of age will be admitted free. Programs for each performance of the rodeo will be sold for 25 cents each.

The Farwell Community Arena Association office will be opened Monday and will be manned thereafter until the rodeo. Plans are to open the office at 10 a.m. each day.

According to Frank Doshier, Jr., treasurer of the Farwell Arena Association, who accepted rodeo entries, as of Tuesday noon, he has registered 150 participants on the books.

"The entries are coming in real strong," he stated, "and we are expecting many more." Deadline for entering the rodeo was Thursday, with the books closing at 10 p.m. CDT.

Officials for this year's rodeo are Herb Williams, announcer; Terrell Rucker, flagman; Jearl James, judge; Don Randolph, judge; Ed Whotten, pick-up man; Ray Davis, stock contractor; Mack Heald and Tommy Lovelace, timers; and Joyce Doshier and Sandra Dorris, assistant secretaries.

The Board of Directors of the Farwell Arena Association includes Darrell Norton, president; Mitz Walling, vice president; Bob Chadwick, secretary; Frank Doshier, Jr., treasurer; and Mitz Walling, arena director.

Rodeo competition this year will be divided into six age categories, according to Doshier 12 and under girls, 12 and

under boys, 13-15 girls, 13-15 boys, 16-19 girls and 16-19 boys.

Entry fees will be \$6.00 for each event plus a \$4.00 office charge for the 12 and under group. For the 13-15 age group, entry fee will be \$11.00 for each event plus the office charge. Competitors in the 16-19 age group will pay a \$16.00 entry fee for each event and the office charge.

Doshier expects the rodeo purse to amount to between \$7,000 and \$8,000. AJRA members will get all their money back, with the exception of the office charge. Pay is on the first six places and the number of entries in each event will determine the amount of money in that particular pot.

Girls 12 and under may compete in barrel racing, flag racing, pole bending and break-away roping. Boys in the same age group may enter barrel and flag racing, break-away roping and steer riding.

Entrants in the 13-15 girls group may participate in barrel racing, pole bending, break-away roping, ribbon roping and goat tying. Boys 13-15 may enter tie-down roping, steer riding, ribbon roping and barrel racing.

In the 16-19 girls group, contests will include barrel racing, pole bending, break-away roping, ribbon roping and goat tying. Boys in the same age group may compete in steer wrestling or bull dogging, bull riding, bare back bronc riding, tie-down roping and ribbon roping.

Buckles will be awarded first place in each event in each age group, stated Doshier, and trophy buckles will be presented to All Around Cowboy and All Around Cowgirl.

Two added events this year, according to Doshier, are girls goat tying in the 13-15 age group and girls goat tying in the 16-19 age group.

Friday, July 26, at 8 p.m. will mark the second performance of the AJRA.

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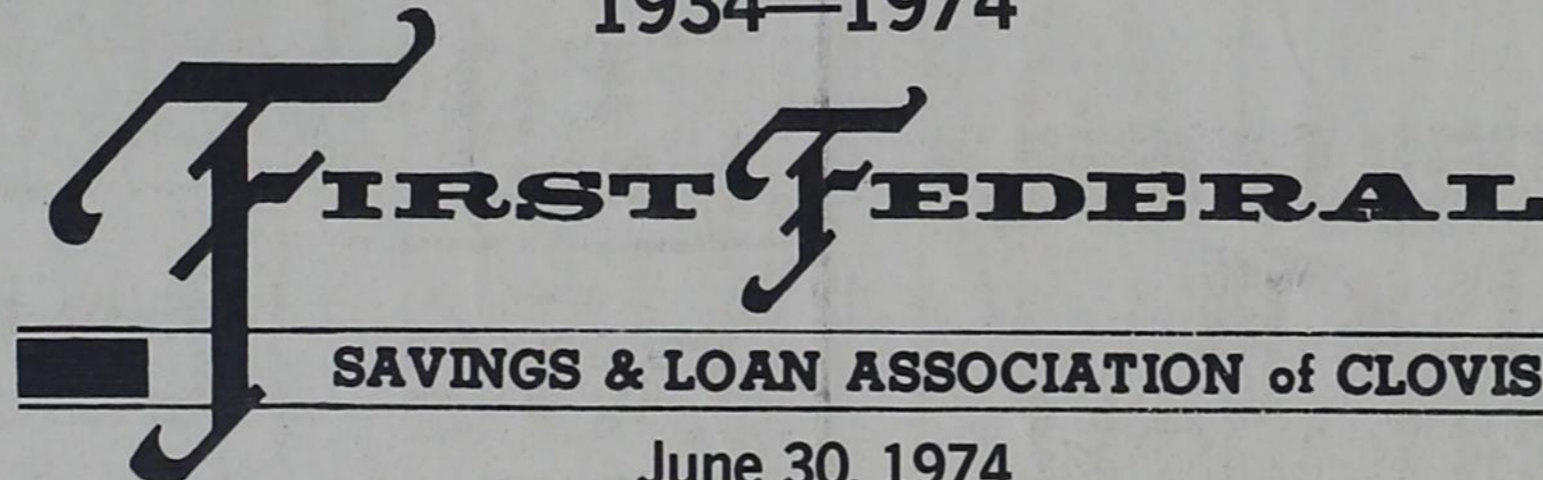

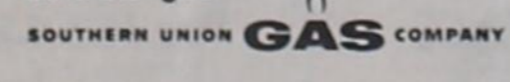

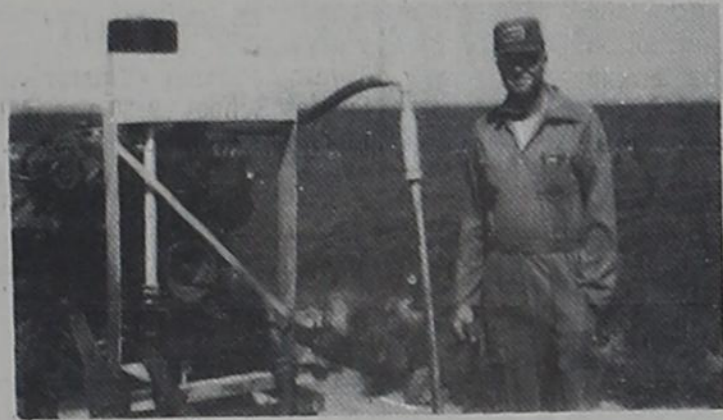

School District Slates Bond Issue Sept. 3

The Texico Board of Education will present to the qualified registered voters of the Texico Municipal School District a bond issue in the amount of \$150,000 in order that a new junior high school may be constructed, which will include six classrooms, rest-rooms and a music room.

The bond election has been scheduled for Sept. 3 at the Texico City Hall. Quinn and Company of Albuquerque have been retained as financial consultants and Randall Kilmer of

Clovis will be the architect for the project.

"It is most important that all voters realize that the district has been allotted \$125,000 from the Capital Outlay Fund that does not have to be refunded," stated Texico School Superintendent, A. D. McDonald.

Therefore, the district, in effect, if the bond issue passes, will have available \$275,000 to build the building, but will only have bonded indebtedness increased by \$150,000.

According to McDonald, "the

district really needs a music room since the building where it is now housed is inadequate for the total music program, especially since our band is growing in numbers and quality."

In addition, the district needs six classrooms to facilitate the removal of the seventh and eighth graders from the high school building and the sixth graders from the elementary school. The high school has approximately 50 students more than the building can com-

fortably accommodate, according to McDonald. He also stated that the seventh and eighth graders are too young to be housed with the high school.

McDonald further commented: "It is the opinion of the Board of Education and the Administration that the passage of the bond issue would take care of the growth of the Texico School District for a period of eight to 10 years. Therefore, the support of the community and the passage of

the bond is most important."

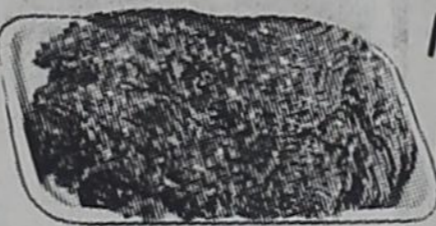

Container Plants Need Extra Hot Weather Care

If you think it's hot outside, just consider those container plants on your patio and in your yard.

"Container plants need a little extra care in hot weather," says Everett Janne, landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Heat generated by the sun inhibits root growth in containers when soil temperatures hit the upper 90's for a span of a week or so."

Such temperatures -- and higher -- are commonplace on fully exposed patios during the summer months and result in choice container plants being lost each year. Janne notes that the sun-loving geranium is an often-abused container plant. It does beautifully in cooler weather but will not tolerate excessive heat in the soil ball or root zone.

The type of container also affects the amount of heat to which the plant is subjected. Dark colored containers ab-

sorb more heat than light or white pots. Wood is a good container material because it is a poor conductor of heat.

"Provide shade for container plants and group them together so that they will shade one another," suggests Janne.

Check plants daily to determine their water needs. The smaller the container, the more frequently the plant needs water. Daily watering may be necessary during hot days. "Plants can be cooled with a water spray," says Janne, "unless the water is high in soluble salts."

Before going on vacation, the horticulturist advises moving plants to a shaded area and getting a neighbor to water them regularly.

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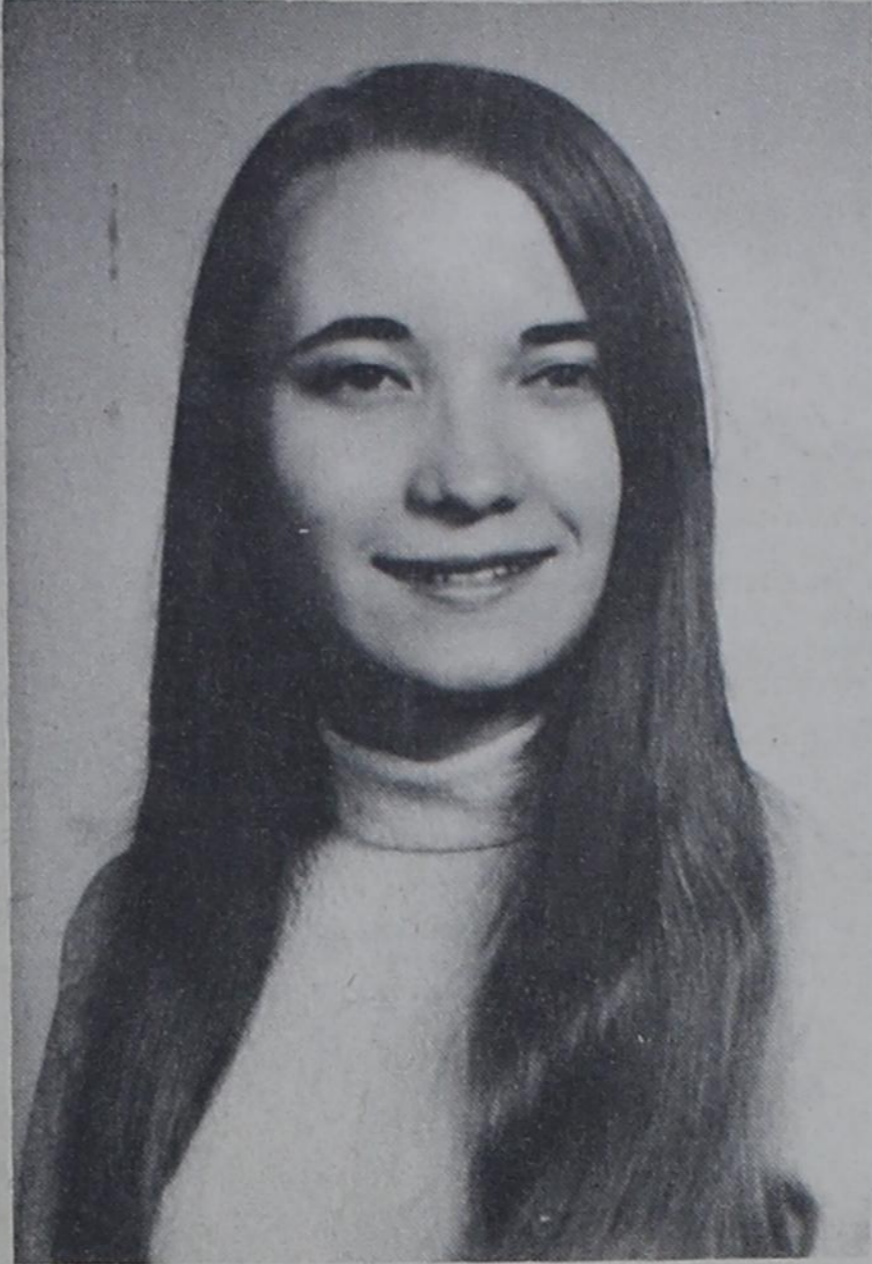

hamburger cookout the evening of Saturday, July 20. The event will begin after all players are off the golf course, around 8 p.m.

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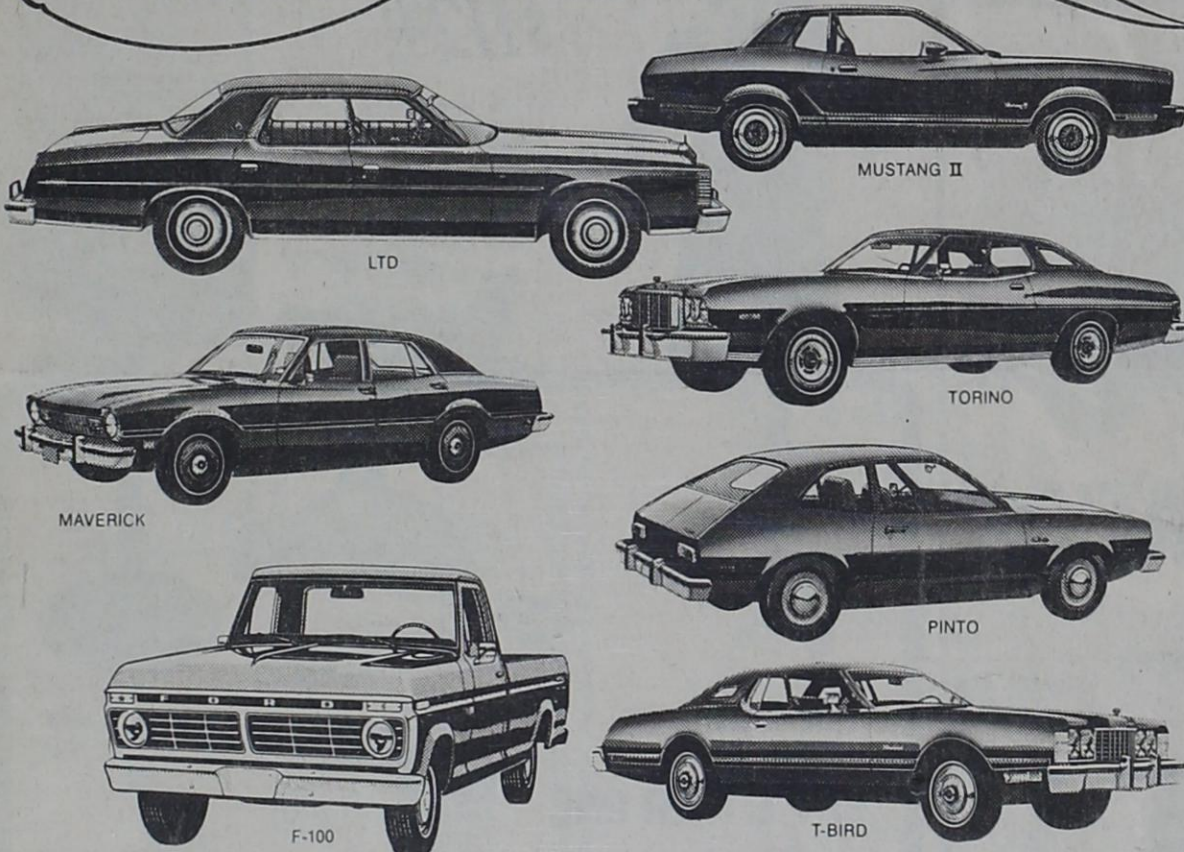
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
