There will be few men under 26 years of age left on the farms of Tarmer County if the new Selective Service repulations, as interpreted by State Director J. Watt Page are complied with by local boards.

Few Deferements In

This was the conclusion reached here last Thursday, when the Parmer board, in a special meeting to talk over classifications, heard Capt. B. C. Caldwell representative from State Selective Service headquarters.

Capt. Caldwell, speaking in behalf of the State Director, gave an interpretation of the new regulations to mean that unless it could be definitely shown that the farm on which a boy under 26 years of age was employed would go out of production, such a man should be made available for the armed forces.

He pointed out that already more than 90% of the men under 26 now engaged in industry are soon to be be asking too much of the men in agricultural pursuits.


### TWO TRAINING COURSES

The University's Industrial Teacher-Training Bureau will operate the extension school, jointly with Texas A & M and the State Department of vocational training.


Students-who will use workshop, dormitory and dining room facilities formerly used by NYA projectmay obtain credit at either the University or A & M for work completed.
