



6 inches high and 21/2 to 3 feet apart. After bedding, open a row in the bed 4 or 5 inches deep with a plow or hoe and apply 5-10-5 or 4-12-4

commercial fertilizer at the rate of 5 or 6 pounds per 100 feet of row. Chop it in, mixing it with the soil until particles are no longer visible. It's a good rule to buy fertilizer on the basis of putting down one pound for each pound of potatoes planted. The WFA reports that the largest supply of certified and war-approved grade seed potatoes in history is available for planting this spring. Rosborough says that although certified seed is first choice, use of warapproved seed is recommended

where certified potatoes are not obtainable. In case neither is available, it will be well to disinfect the seed by soaking for one-half hour in a solution of one ounce corrosive sublimate dissolved in eight gallons of water, then spread out to dry. This will protect against serious



Another important factor in the program of control is a ready supply of the most commonly needed insecticides. If rotenone is obtainable, it can be used to destroy cabbage worms and beetles which suck the juices from plant leaves and stems. If it cannot be had, cyrolite or lead or calcium aresenate may be substituted in dealing with the leaf eaters, and nicotine sulphate for the juicesucking bugs. A small amount of paris green will be needed to make bait for cutworms, sow bugs, grasshoppers, mole crickets and wingless May beetles. Spread it near the base of plants in the late afternoon.

Gregg says that plant lice are probably the most common and destructive of pests. They attack most vegetables, especially turnips, radishes, mustard, cabbage and similar plants, and control measures should begin as soon as they appear. Rotenone dust or nicotine sulphate as a dust or spray give best results. But since lice are killed only when hit by the insecticide thorough application on both sides of the leaves is



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
