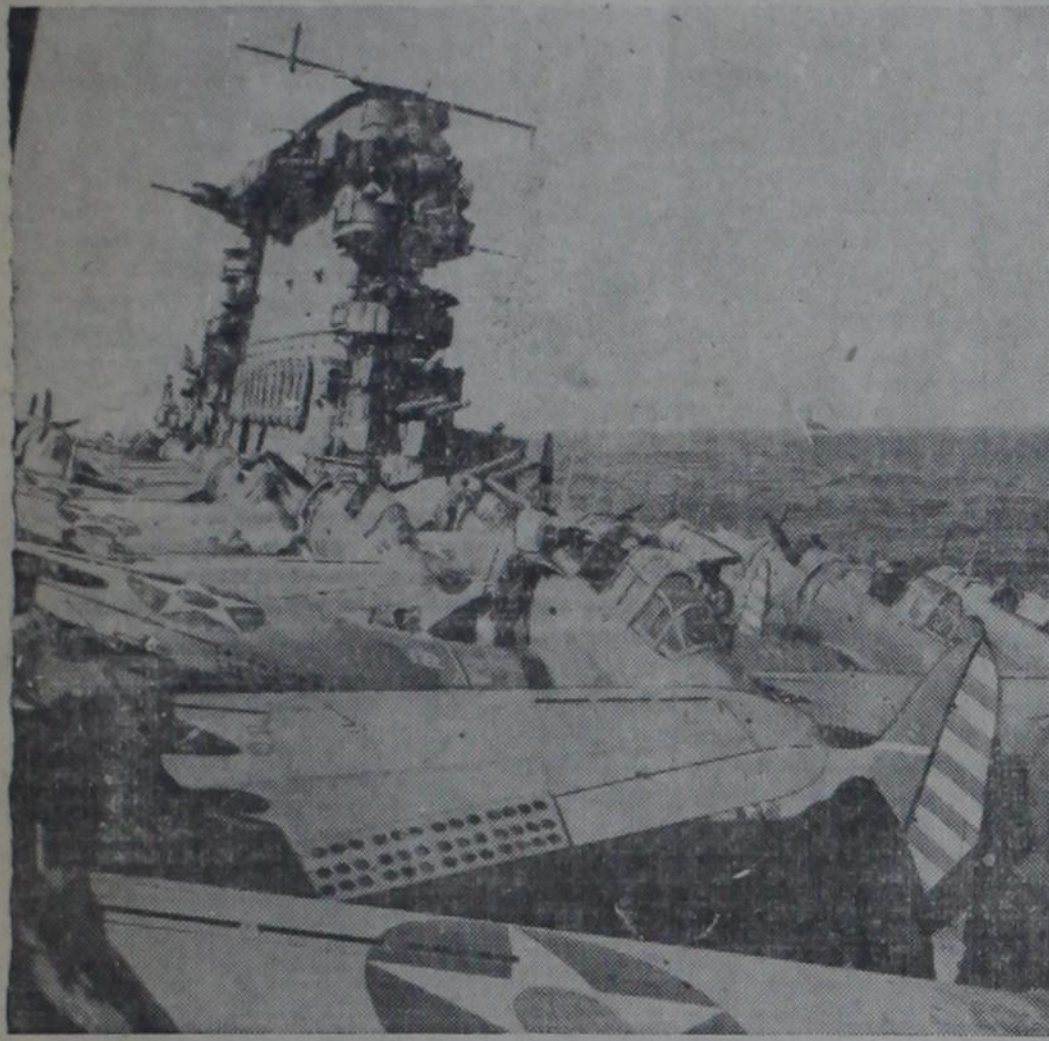


## REGISTER AT SCHOOL HOUSES MONDAY

### Over 75 Attend First Aid Class Meeting

More than 75 persons—mostly women but with a few men sprinkled in—were in attendance at the initial meeting of a First Aid class, which is being conducted in Bovina by Clarence O. Smith, certified Red Cross instructor.

This was even a more generous response than had been hoped for in Farmer county. Mrs. Florence Wallace, chairman of the AWVS, said when interviewed today.

Since the gathering on Monday night was the first of its kind, some time was spent in discussing the organization, with the announcement being made that classes would be held twice weekly, Monday and Friday evenings, at the Bovina school building, beginning promptly 8:30. Persons who attend the class are urged to be on hand a little before 8:30, as the class will begin on time.

#### 20 Hours For Course

In order to receive a certificate for the work done, students must complete 20 hours of training. However, Smith said, in case of unavoidable absence, he would assist the absentee in "catching up" outside of the regular class hours in order that he or she might complete the work with the remainder of the group.

At the first meeting, the instructor spoke principally on basic training in case of injury, stressing various points which "practically everyone knows, but is liable to forget in moments of stress". Since the prescribed manuals had not arrived, Smith announced that for Friday evening he would prepare mimeograph or chart work, in order that the class might make satisfactory progress.

Following this class, Smith has announced that he will conduct an advanced course. This course must be taken by persons wishing to go on for special training and receipt of a teachers' certificate, he added. After this advanced class, it was believed that other "beginner" groups would be trained over the county.

#### Registration Not Compulsory

Mrs. Wallace made one statement emphatically, calling attention to the fact that the "registration" asked for before the class was a government procedure. "This registration of women—or men—who are interested in taking first aid training does not in any way mean that they will be subject to call by the government to serve at other points," she said.

"At present, this registration is being used only as a means of determining how many persons in the county would like to receive the training, and who may not be able to attend classes outside their home communities. It does not mean that it is a government registration, placing you subject to call for work," she specifically pointed out.

### Interscholastic League Events Will Be Held

A change in the announcement that no literary events would be held as a part of the interscholastic league program this year was made this week, with Supt. J. T. Carter stating that the county school officials had voted to go ahead with the activities.

In this connection, the meeting places for the various events have been set, but no dates announced, he added. Points for the contests are: Track and field, Friona. Playground ball, Oklahoma Lane. Volleyball, Lazbuddy. Literary events, Bovina. One-act play, Farwell.

### Infantile Paralysis Fund Surpasses Hope

Final tabulations on the drive conducted in Farmer county to raise funds for the benefit of the infantile paralysis fund surpassed the expectations of R. C. Hunter, county chairman.

Hunter released figures this week showing that Parmer county contributed a total of \$230.51. Hunter said that he would have been pleased with half that amount.

According to Hunter's figures, Farwell accounted for the largest share of the fund, with a total of \$117.20. Friona turned in \$57.36, and Bovina contributed \$55.95.

### Judge Razzes FSA Heads

County Judge Lee Thompson, appearing before a meeting of Farm Security Administration officials at the court house here Wednesday evening, took advantage of the occasion to take the FSA bunch to a little razzing.

He left his hearers wondering if his utterances were of a serious nature or whether he was just joking.

Anyhow, he evidently left the FSA heads something to think about when he cited that five employees were used in the local office to handle 130 loans, and added that the local banker probably had twice that number of loans, handled unassisted.

Concluding his remarks, the county judge hurled the challenge that the whole set-up was being used to give out "a bunch of white-collar jobs".

Arrangements were completed this week for a large contingent of selectees to go to Lubbock next Saturday, where they will be given their Army exams on Sunday. A special bus has been chartered for movement of this group of men. The bus will leave the office of the local board at 4:30 p. m., on Saturday, Feb. 21.

(Editor's Note—Selective Service regulations forbid the publication of the number and names of selectees, filling calls and quotas. For that reason, the number of men being sent to Lubbock and to induction stations cannot be given.)

### Mrs. Stevens Resigns, Accepts Amarillo Job

Mrs. Jewel Stevens, who for the past three years has had charge of the primary department of the Farwell school, tendered her resignation on Monday, effective that day.

She was released from her local contract by officials in order that she might accept an offer in the Amarillo school system, which is a considerable advancement in her profession.

Mrs. Stevens has an enviable record for her work in the local school, carrying, in addition to regular duties, special kindergarten classes during the summer months. She and her son George, moved to Amarillo Tuesday afternoon, and she began her work there this (Wednesday) morning.

Supt. J. T. Carter stated that until the local board was able to contact a new teacher, Mrs. Carter would act as substitute.

### New Supervisor Arrives For Farm Security

Jess Coleman, formerly of the Childress office, arrived here the past Thursday to take over the duty of supervising the Parmer county Farm Security Administration office, previously in charge of Frank Seale.

Mr. Coleman has been connected with the FSA for four years, all of which time was spent at Childress. The family is residing in the small residence recently vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Ermon Miller.

Mr. Seale, former supervisor, is now marking time pending his call for induction. He has been a member of the local force for the past three years, the first two of which he spent as assistant supervisor. For a little over a year, he has been supervisor of the local office.

### Goodwine Resigns As Member Local Board

Clyde Goodwine, member of the Parmer County Selective Service Board, has tendered his resignation to Governor Coke Stevenson, and asked that he be relieved at once.

Mr. Goodwine, in his letter to the Governor, explained that since he would be within the age limits of the Selective Service law, as amended to include all men between the ages of 20 and 44 for military service, he felt that he had rather not pass on the classification of registrants hereafter.

He has asked to be relieved by Feb. 16, the date for the third registration.

It is understood here that the Friona Chamber of Commerce will submit a recommendation to the Governor for Mr. Goodwine's successor. Just who that will be is not known here.

Mr. Goodwine has been a member of the local board since shortly after it was organized in October, 1940, succeeding C. E. McLean, who resigned shortly after taking office, when he was barred because of being within the age limits of the Selective Service Act.

Under the new regulations Mr. Goodwine was not barred from continuing as a member of the local board, but expressed himself as choosing this course rather than taking the chance of being unduly criticized.

### Cotton Stamps Go To Red Cross Work

Mrs. Minnie O. Aldridge, treasurer of the Parmer County American Red Cross, today announced that the local chapter had been presented with \$50 worth of cotton stamps by the Capitol Freehold Land Trust.

She said that the stamps were being exchanged for unbleached muslin which will be used in making up hospital garments as a part of the sewing program of the local chapter.

### Schools to Close for the Day

The Parmer County Selective Service Board today announced its readiness to proceed with the third registration of the county's man power, in accordance with a proclamation issued by President Roosevelt, on Monday, February 16.

The local board today advised the State Selective Service headquarters in Austin that details for registration here were complete.

Board members, however, explained that as yet supplies had not been distributed to the various chief registrars throughout the county. This will be done before the close of the present week, it was said.

All schools of the county will be closed on registration day, and members of the school faculty will be used as registration clerks, according to plans previously made and announced.

This procedure will also be carried out in the Texico schools, Supt. L. A. Hartley has announced.

Registration booths will be open at the various school houses from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m., with no time out for the lunch hour.

Board members today estimated that there would be between five and six hundred men in Parmer county who would come within the age limits of the forthcoming registration. Men who have registered in either of the previous registrations will not be required to register again.

### Board Meets Tuesday

The local board will meet on the morning of Tuesday, Feb. 17, for the purpose of assorting the registration cards and giving serial numbers to all cards accumulated on Monday's registration. Board members cautioned registrants about the importance of accuracy in giving their home address. "The home address," one board member explained, "is the location of the registrants' local board, and once a registrant is assigned to a local board he will remain under the jurisdiction of that board hereafter."

Emphasizing that the Selective Service registration on Feb. 16 will complete the inventory of America's potential military manpower, Gen. J. Watt Page, State Selective Service director, today pointed out that it affects every male resident in Texas between the ages of 20 and 45 years, with a few exceptions made by Congress.

The requirement, General Page explained, is that all male persons not previously registered, who attained their twentieth birthday on or before December 31, 1941, and who have not attained their 45th birthday on or before Feb. 16, 1942, must register as of their home address between 7 a. m. and 9 p. m., on Feb. 16. In other words, all unregistered men who were born between Feb. 17, 1897, and Dec. 31, 1921, must register.

Men between 21 and 36 years of age who registered in 1940 and 1941 are not required to register again, the director explained.

While anyone who is unavoidably away from his home on Feb. 16 may register at the registration place most convenient on that day, Gen. Page said, he urged all Texas registrants to make every effort to register with their own local boards to avoid possible confusion in the future. Any person who must register while away from his home, he cautioned, should be careful to specify his HOME ADDRESS so that his registration card may be forwarded promptly to his own local board and to insure that he will be included in its potential manpower to fill calls for quotas.

Special registrars also will be provided to register men who cannot appear at a designated registration place because of illness or other incapacity.

Providing that the two teams split the matches arranged for this weekend and a third game becomes necessary, the place of meeting will be decided by the flip of a coin, officials have agreed. On the other hand, should either team take both skirmishes, a third contest would not be arranged.

Despite the fact that they were forced to conduct workouts the first of the week due to the illness of Coach Jeff Hooper, the locals were looking forward to the games with Springlake with ill-disguised eagerness. At present, there are no injuries handicapping the squad, and it was believed that all regulars would be raring to go.

## Of Interest to Farmers

It has been reported to this office that some producers of the county are threshing cane and sudan from their "layout" land and others are selling cane and sudan from "layout" land, with the buyer threshing it. The threshing of cane and sudan from "layout" land is a strict violation of the regulations and anyone who threshes cane or sudan from such land will be considered to have violated this regulation, regardless of whether a producer threshes it himself, or sells it to someone else and the buyer threshes it.

The State office has experienced considerable difficulty in getting the crops of cane and sudan classified as "layout" land by the Washington office, and the continued practice of violating the regulations by threshing this cane or sudan will result in Washington office disallowing

cane and sudan on "layout" land. For this reason, it should be of interest to all farmers to see that no one threshes cane or sudan from their "layout" land. It should be kept in mind that cane and sudan may be handled in any manner the owner desires with the sole exception of threshing it. Several producers have inquired if it would be all right to thresh cane and sudan provided it was fed on the farm. The regulations do not provide for it to be threshed regardless of the ultimate disposition of the crop; consequently cane and sudan cannot be threshed for ANY reason regardless of the disposition of the seed.

This word of warning is given so that any producer in the county who does thresh cane or sudan will understand the position of the county committee in penalizing producers for this violation.

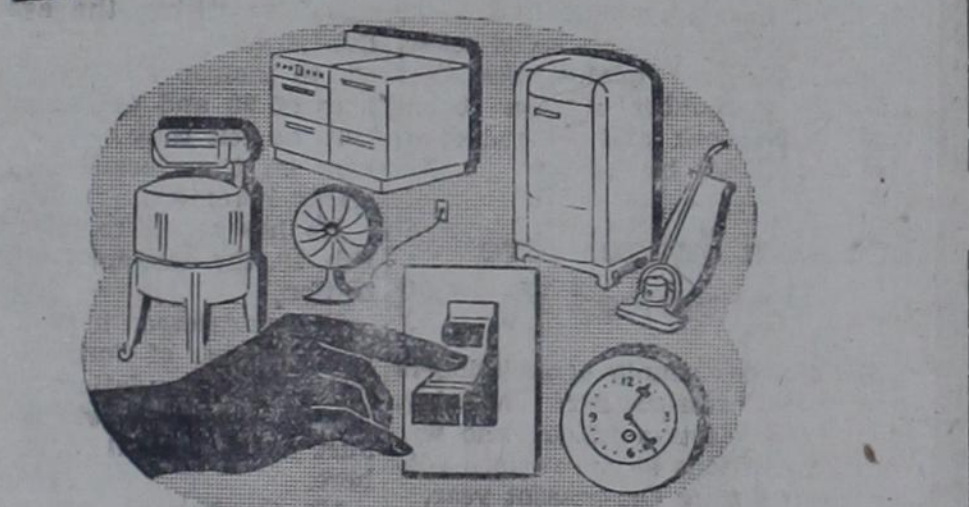

The first of these meetings will be held in the FSA office on Thursday of this week, he went on to say, at which time some ten borrowers of the organization have been asked to appear and loan booklet forms will be begun.

On February 20th, a group of initial borrowers have been asked to appear at the office at 9:30 a. m., it was announced, Coleman stating that new and old borrowers would meet at different times.

This arrangement has been made, Coleman said, due to the necessity of reducing driving usually incurred when supervisors visited separate farms over the county.

At these meetings, both standard and "Food For Freedom" loans will be discussed and arrangements made for such services, Coleman said further, in stating that no special meetings would be held to accept applications for the latter type loans, new to the FSA this year.

### Should Settle

Coleman also asked that all borrowers who have not settled for grain and other crop loans should do this at their earliest convenience.

The supervisor urged that borrowers who have been requested to attend the meeting on Thursday make it a point to be on hand.

## Predicts Further Pinch In Tire Rationing Deal

"We ain't seen nothin' yet," declared John Armstrong, chairman of the Farmer County Rationing Board, on his return from Lubbock last Friday, where he attended a meeting of the tire rationing boards of this section, presided over by J. Doyle Settle, assistant rationing administrator.

Armstrong said there was not a possibility that passenger car tires would be available for motorists for many months to come. Even ministers, who according to press releases, would be allowed to purchase new tires, are out of the picture. The only passenger car tires to be rationed in Farmer county in the immediate future will be to doctors, nurses, veterinarians, and peace officers.

### Regulations Clarified

Clarification of some of the regulations with reference to the use of truck and trailer tires is contained in a telegram received here by the tire rationing board, which places on the eligible list practically all trucks used in the transportation of farm products and feed for livestock.

Trucks placed on the eligible list for new tires include (1) hauling feed and water from farm to farm to feed livestock; (2) hauling produce, livestock, milk from farm to market, but not to ultimate consumer; (3) trucks used in transportation of farm products, but not to ultimate consumer; (4) trucks contracting at will for transportation of farm products, provided any other use of truck must be stated in application; (5) trucks used to haul feed, salt, etc., from market to farm; (6) farm trailers used in transportation of farm products but not to ultimate consumer.

Armstrong said that new regulations are being made as the tire rationing program "feels its way along", but said that it was his observation that instead of lightening up the rationing program was getting more stringent. Asked what might be the ultimate objective of the program, he declined to say, except to opine that "it might get pretty tough".
