Some speculation was being indulged during last week relative to the safety of the large acreage of barley planted in this area. Some expressed the belief that the subtemperatures experienced last week might have winter-killed a large portion of the crop. Observing farmers, however, among them Olan Schleuter, reports that his barley crop was killed to the ground last year but it came out and produced 40 bushels to the acre.



#### Information Lacking On Gas Station Hours business.

John Armstrong, chairman of the Parmer County ration board, stated today that he had received "exactly nothing" concerning new rules governing the hours service stations may operate, as revealed last weekend in a news release.

According to the reelase, stations may offer service only 12 hours per day, or may elect to remain open 24 hours some days, providing they are not in operation more than 72 hours per week.

All stations are subject to the rule with the exception of those which habitually service transport vehicles, and gasoline may be sold by these operators only to "T" card holders after the regular 12-hour day.
