Texico Opens Up

The first settlers began to find their way into what was later to become the city of Texico in 1902, with the building of the Belen cut-off by the Santa Fe. Will Roberts of Hereford was the first Texico merchant, Taylor recalls. This outlook is based upon the total overall materials authorized by the War Prodution Board for making, planting, tillage and harvesting equipment during the year. Comparably, it is about 80 per cent of the 1940 production, a year in which manufacture was relatively large.

According to information from the War Food Administration to the A. and M. College Extension Service, sufficient tonnage of carbon steel has been authorized to manufalturers to meet the entire machinery and repair parts schedule for domestic use.



State Headquarters for Selective Service permits draft-age farmers in this area to accept war jobs during slack seasons without affecting their deferement classifications.

Because men are urgently needed in vital war industries in this area, farmers and farm laborers may accept temporary jobs under the following conditions as cited in a Headquarters memorandum of Dec. 6th to all local boards, WMC Area No. 6:

- (A) They remain in their seasonal accupations for a periol of not less than 8 months of the year;
- (B) They become engaged during the off-seasons for farming operations in

some occupation in war production or in support of the war effort; and

(C) Upon the reopening of the season in which they may pursue their normal seasonal occupation they return to their seasonal occupations that constituted the basis for their original deferement and sume their status as necessary men therein.
