
How General Rommel Was Shot

Harvesting at Standstill in North Part

While most farmers of Parmer county have completed the harvesting of their fall crops, reports here the first of the week indicate that it will likely be several weeks before some crops in the north end of the county would be out of the

With the exception of threshing operations, practically all farmers of the county located south of the Amarillo highway have completed their farm work, while those located north of the highway are still a long way from the end of the year's

This is particularly true in the extreme north end of the county, where heavy rain and snow early last week caused a suspension of operations until the fields dry up sufficiently to permit combines to operate. Pete Hoffman, of the Rhea community, reports 6 to 7 inches of snow throughout that section, rendering harvesting operations impossible for many days.



Bangs Disease Cost Outlined By McElroy

Brucella Abortus. (Bangs' disease or contagious abortion), costs stockmen heavy losses in cattle, reduced milk production, loss of calves prematurely, as well as endangering human health, according to Lee H. McElroy county agent. Cattle infected with this disease may transmit the germ in raw meat, dairy proings, causing undulant fever. Unfortunately, there is no specific remedy for use against this disease in animal or in man.

Symptoms of this disease, though well known, cannot always be diagnosed by a premature birth. The only certain diagnosis for the disease in animals is the agglutination test, which must be run by a laboratory. Cattle having Bang: disease usually become immune in the second or third year after they have had the disease. 




