

County Hospital Opens At Friona February 17

Definite plans for the long-awaited opening of the Friona community hospital were announced last week-end, with the hospital being "opened for business" on Monday of this week February 17.

Head of the hospital is Dr. Stokes, formerly of Fort Worth, who arrived in Friona the first of the week to take over the plant. A son of Judge Stokes of Amarillo, Dr. Stokes is well recognized in the medical profession, having practiced for a number of years. After graduation from the Baylor Medical school, Dr. Stokes was a private practitioner at Vernon, Texas. He was recently discharged after spending six years with the Army medical corps, in which he attained the rank of colonel. During his Army service, Dr. Stokes was for a time in charge of the Amarillo AAB hospital, and later served in the Philippines and in Japan.

Tentative discussion were also conducted in Fort Worth recently with Dr. Parsons, but as one hospital official put it Saturday, "we are not sure that he will join the local staff." J. R. Roden, who for years has served Friona as a registered pharmacist in city drug stores, is in charge of the pharmaceutical department at the hospital. Although names were not definite last weekend, hospital directors said that at least two, and probably three, registered nurses would be on hand this week.

The hospital, located in the northwest part of Friona, has been a community project for some years, halted by lack of materials during the war. Last summer, several buildings from the former Hereford POW camp were moved to the site, and have since then been completely equipped, largely with surplus Army supplies. Temporarily, some 15 beds are ready at the hospital, but officials are proudest of the plant's extra-strong X-ray machine and electrocardiograph equipment. Additional equipment and supplies will be added in the future.

Tri-State Dairymen's Association Meet

Last Saturday afternoon, the tri-county dairy herd improvement met in the county agents' office, at Clovis, for the purpose of securing a tester for this area.

The meeting was called by Dean Patterson, chairman of the association, with twelve members present, including Wendel Christian, who is president of the Farmer county dairy club, Levi Johnson, vice president, and County Agent, Ollie Liner.

It is stated that the organization will be able to secure a qualified tester by March 1st, to work in this area.

Ollie Liner, County Agent, announced that a meeting will be called by Chairman Paterson, some time in the last week in March, and that the association may be enlarged, to take in more surrounding counties.

LIGHT SNOW FALLS

A light covering of snow, measuring slightly under an inch, fell here during the early morning hours Wednesday. The fall had about ceased when The Tribune went to press shortly before noon. He assisted in loading feed at his ranch near Morgan's Mill, where he has operated the past 11 years, on the morning he was stricken. He died shortly after being removed to a hospital. Of his immediate family, only his wife survives.

Scout Drive Raises Nice Fund Locally

C. M. Henderson, chairman of the local Mens' Club, sponsors the Scouting programs in Texico and Farwell, announced today that the financial drive, staged last weekend, was very successful. While exact figures are lacking at the time, pending final reports of some of the solicitors, Henderson said that the amount raised in Texico and Farwell would "approximately be \$600.00."

He said that the contributions in Texico and Farwell were about equally divided, with each team accounting for about \$300. He expressed his appreciation for the "good work the teams have done in this important matter."

Friona Swells Polio Fund in County

Additional contributions from Rhea and Friona have swelled the infantile paralysis fund in this county to more than \$1500, it was learned here today.

In a long distance call to Friona Wednesday, The Tribune was informed that the total amount raised there during the drive amounted to more than \$262.00, the exact amount being uncertain. To this figure, the Lutheran Church at Rhea reported \$8.21.

J. R. Roden of Friona said that the town contributions at Friona amounted to \$162.00, and Supt. Holmes said that the school raised "more than \$200.00."

Figures published last week show that \$1295.70 had been previously reported, swelling the grand total in the county to well above the \$1500.00 figure.

Laymen of the church will be in complete charge of the program, with a male choir leading the congregation in singing. Judge Aldridge will discuss the subject, "Our Accountability to God."

Parmer Qualifies for Insurance on Crops

For the second year since Federal Crop Insurance was re-instated, Farmer County has qualified for insurance on both wheat and cotton, it was announced today by Harold W. Carpenter, Secretary of Farmer County ACA.

"This means," Carpenter explained, "that producers who signed applications for insurance will have policies in effect in 1947." He said that in order for the county as a whole to qualify, policies for not less than 50 farms had to be placed in the county. This figure was topped slightly before the deadline on Feb. 1st, he added.

Adds Lines

O. W. Rinehart of the Bovina Realty Company at Bovina, announced this week that he had recently added insurance and farm loans to his realty business. He said that real estate exchanges had been quite active in the Bovina section the past few weeks.

With building materials eased, the little City of Bovina is taking on quite a building spree during the last few days with at least four fairly large size jobs already underway and another in prospect.

The new building programs include the erection of one large grain elevator an addition to another, with plans being formulated for an addition to a third grain elevator. A newly former company composed of J. A. Pittman of Hereford, W. M. Sherley of Lazbuddy, and Captain G. D. Anderson, now stationed at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, made public this week plans for the erection of a new concrete grain elevator with a capacity for 200,000 bushels.

The contract has been let to the Roberts Construction Company and some of the material is already on the ground. Work is expected to get under way within the next ten days. A spokesman for the new firm said that the new elevator would be of the most modern type, equipped with electrically driven dump and lifts. An automatic scale, with a platform capable of handling large trucks with trailers, will be installed. The job is expected to be completed and ready for use when the 1947 wheat harvest gets under way.

Tentative arrangements call for Capt. Anderson to be in charge of the new business, but this arrangement is contingent on his release from the Army.

Ground was broken the past week for construction of two church buildings at Bovina, with the Methodist congregation and the Baptist organization getting about an even start on their new places of worship. Troy Fuller, who is in charge of the construction work on the Baptist building, said that the main auditorium would be 40X70 feet with class rooms on the sides, and the auditorium 24 would have a seating capacity of 250 to 300 people. The educational division of the new structure will be 24X60 and will be divided into six class rooms. A pastor's study, kitchen and inside toilets are also called for in the plans.

Details of the Methodist church building were announced and carried in this newspaper recently.

The third major building project in Bovina is being pushed by J. P. Macon, operator and owner of the Macon Elevator in that city. A new addition is being added to his elevator, which will be 22X80 feet and will rise 46 feet above the ground, which will add 70,000 bushel storage capacity to the already large grain concern. Macon said that his total storage would be increased to more than 100,000 with the new addition. This job is being done by C. C. Self of Littlefield and it is expected to be completed before the wheat harvest begins. Conveyors and chutes to be used in the building are already on hand, Macon said.

The fourth job that seems to be somewhat in the formative plans, calls for an addition to the grain elevator operated by the Bovina Wheat Growers of that city. Lee Thompson, manager of the firm was in Amarillo when a reporter called Saturday, but it was learned that he had gone there to negotiate with contractors and material men for the addition.

A number of new residences have been erected in Bovina during the past few months. With the town recently incorporated, plans are under way to provide the city with an adequate water system, and the little cowtown of Bovina is really stepping out in her glad rags.

An even 100 guests assembled at the Farwell Cafeteria last Thursday evening to enjoy the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet in observation of the first birthday of the local organization, which brought forth the prediction from the main speaker of the evening that the "Chamber might soon graduate into indoor plumbing."

C. M. Henderson, president, acted as toastmaster for the occasion and introduced the visitors after the group had joined in singing "America." Minister J. E. Randol offered the invocation.

Music was furnished by Mrs. C. M. Henderson, Woody McDermitt and Don Summers. The feed, a bountiful menu of chicken, dressing, peas, mashed potatoes and gravy, followed with a desert course of cherry pie a la mode, was served by the Farwell Parent-Teacher Association.

Members of the High School athletic squads were special guests of the Chamber of Commerce and Sam Aldridge, local attorney, paid a glowing tribute to the lads who have brought recognition to the local school this year in winning the district championship in both football and basketball. He then awarded miniature footballs to the first-stringers of the teams, which included: Captain Don Williams, Co-Captain Max Ford, Buster Herington, Bobby Hart, Warlick Thomas, Toby Booth, Donald Ford, Junior Robertson and Harry Sheets.

Following this ceremony, Coach Jack Williams presented to Supt. H. A. Clift the district basketball and football trophies won by the teams this year, and Supt. Clift, in turn, presented the awards in behalf of the school.

Aldridge took occasion to reminisce briefly when he recalled a basketball squad of the local school "back in the early twenties," that won the district and regional championship, but because of lack of funds the team was not sent to the State meet. He took occasion to pledge the present squad the money to go to State this year if they won the regional basketball championship.

New Mexico Livestock Nets 80 Million To Growers in 1946

ALBUQUERQUE.—Cash value of livestock and livestock products sold from New Mexico ranches and farms in 1946 totaled more than \$80,000,000, the New Mexico Stockman magazine announces in its February issue. The production report is based on final figures of the New Mexico Cattle Sanitary Board and the New Mexico Sheep Sanitary Board, covering last year's shipments; and cattle, sheep and hogs killed in New Mexico packing plants. Figures for dairy cattle and poultry sales are preliminary and based on state-wide reports from commercial sources. The total is up more than five million dollars over the 1945 livestock production. The report does not include value of cattle, sheep and swine produced in 1946 and retained on ranches and farms for replacement purposes.

Bulk of the gain in 1946 over the previous year is in cattle sales, which total more than sixty million dollars, about five million dollars more than in 1945.

Sheep and wool with total sales value of a little more than \$10,000,000 show a drop of nearly three million dollars from 1945, due to continued liquidation of breeding ewes in New Mexico; a liquidation that is general throughout the range states.

Sales of registered Hereford cattle and registered sheep in New Mexico in 1946 totaled \$418,000, the report

shows. Of this, \$240,800 was realized at seven association and group sales of state breeders during the year, the balance being reported sales at private treaty for which sale prices were given.

The Stockman's February issue also carries an authorized article by District 5, U. S. Reclamation Service, showing that the three United States reclamation service projects in New Mexico, the Elephant Butte, Carlsbad and Tucumcari, produced more than \$40,000,000 in farm products in 1946. Total production under the Elephant Butte irrigation system was more than \$38,000,000. The Mesilla and El Paso valley cotton crop in 1946, alone sold for more than the

\$22,000,000 construction cost of the irrigation and water storage system, the article states.

The number of veterans reported to be in on-the-job training or in schools at the end of August was 1,249,022, an increase of 8 per cent over the July 31 figure, Veterans Administration announces.

Friona Squaws Complete Perfect Season, Win 38

The Friona Squaws, coached by R. L. Bates, wound up a perfect season the past weekend, and will represent this county in the District 20 meet at Panhandle this Friday. During the 1946-47 season, the girls have won all 38 of their matched games, getting in hot water only one time, when they played Wayland Junior College girls last week. That game, Coach Bates reported, tallied up with Friona 2 points behind when only three minutes remained to play—but during the last three minutes, star Mildred Taylor got hot on the bucket, and with the help of her running mates, the Squaws racked up 11 points to win their final game.

At the district tournament, Friona is slated to first engage team from Kress, meeting them at 3:30 Friday afternoon. The Squaws drew a bye

in second round play, and if successful in their match with Kress, will thus advance to the semi-finals Saturday morning at 10. Asked as to the strength of the Kress team, Coach Bates said that Kress had downed Dimmitt and been beaten by Nazareth during the season, with both of the latter teams being heavy losers to the Friona team. Statistics thus indicate that Friona should be in semifinal play Saturday. Some 11 teams will be represented at the district meet.

Taking a look at statistics, the survey shows that Mildred Taylor, who played only 34 of the 38 games, ran up a score of 527 points. Wanda Robason is second with scoring honors, having rack up 303, while Doris Taylor, sister to Mildred, is in third place with 200, and Lunell McFarland is fourth with 118. Other scores

Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division.

Crippling conditions which may be treated are Infantile Paralysis, Osteomyelitis, Club Feet, Harelip and Cleft Palate, Burns, Curvature of the Spine, Arthritis, Bow Legs, Rickets, Tuberculosis of the Bone, Flat Feet, Congenitally Dislocated Hip, Muscular Dystrophy, Supernumery Fingers and Toes, Wry Neck, Elephantia-

After that date a penalty will be placed on all unpaid taxes.

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
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Methodist Church Members Meet
