

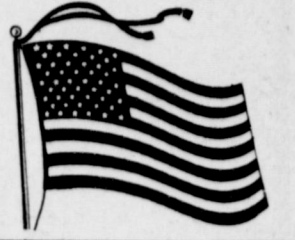

## Irrigated Wheat Should Be 'Top'

"Yes, we are becoming quite concerned because of the cool temperatures during the last week to 10 days in this area," responded County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley, to a question asked about crops planting in the area. "Low temperatures, which are unseasonably low at night, and in some instances, haven't warmed up that much in daylight hours, has slowed the growth of corn and alfalfa and has prevented cotton producers from planting," he continued. "That is, I am speaking about irrigated land. "Dryland farmers can't plant at all without some type of moisture, from two to three inches, in fact, will be necessary before the dryland producers can even begin to plant cotton."

**IRRIGATION 'GOOD'** Tanksley estimated that approximately 40 percent of county farmland is irrigated, which would include some 120,000 to 130,000 acres.

He said that approximately 30,000 acres, plus, of irrigated land is used for corn production; 10,000 acres in alfalfa; 30,000 acres cotton; 30,000 acres, plus, in grain sorghum; 10,000 acres in wheat and 5,000 acres of irrigated land in other crops.

According to the county agent, the number one vegetable in production in the county would be potatoes with nearly 1,000 acres being planted this year. Other predominant vegetables would be carrots, the number two vegetable in production in Bailey County, followed by onions and tomatoes. Cucumber production is down, mainly due to the lack of labor for harvest, and noted that very few peppers are produced in this county on a commercial basis. There would probably be some acreage for commercially-produced cabbage, he added.

**LOW MOISTURE** Noting that since last October, around two inches of moisture has been recorded in the area, he explained that the cut-off date for planting cotton is June 5, and if moisture, or the lack of moisture, prevents producers from planting before the cut-off date, the dryland farmers will be looking at some other "quick" crop in order to produce anything this year. Mentioned as a potential is sunflowers, which appeared on the South Plains in recent years as a "drought-type, quick-crop".

The Agricultural Extension Agent stated emphatically, "We do have a drought, and there is no dryland wheat. In 1975, there were no dryland crops due to no moisture and the crops for dryland farmers, as well as irrigated farmers, were hurt in September, 1975 due to an early cold situation. "The last three years has not

been good for dryland farmers," he added. Cont. on Page 2, Col. 5. **'Irrigation' Main Topic For Meeting**

"When are you going to water your corn? grain sorghum? or cotton? How much water is needed to make maximum profit?" asks Spencer Tanksley of the County Extension office. These questions and many others will be answered, said the agent, at the upcoming Irrigation meeting to be held on Monday, May 24, at 8:30 p.m. in the Muleshoe City Hall Council Chambers. This educational event is being sponsored by the Agricultural Committee of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Speakers will include: Marvin Sartin, Farm Economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service who will speak on "Economics of Farm Irrigation" and "Market Value of Crops."

An Irrigation Specialist, Leon New, of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Lubbock will discuss the "Water Requirements of Corn, Cotton, Grain Sorghum and Alfalfa."

"Irrigation Management Services" will be the topic of Wayne Keese, Irrigation Specialist from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station. The planning committee for this meeting feels that it is a very timely event and one that should provide the latest information on irrigation to the producer, according to Tanksley.

There will be no charge made for interested individuals to attend this meeting and further information is available at the County Extension Office

## Small Group Protests Telephone Rate Hike

With only a handful of people present, members of the Muleshoe City Council met Thursday evening with Rad Richardson, local manager for General Telephone, from Littlefield.

According to Mayor Kenneth Henry, the 8 p.m. Public Hearing was to get opinions from the Muleshoe users of services of General Telephone regarding a possible rate increase.

General Telephone has asked for a rate increase, which if granted, will go into effect in September. The increase will affect both business and residential telephones in the area served by the company.

The company has asked for a fifteen percent increase, which would also include raising the cost of pay telephones in the

area served by General Telephone from 10 cents to 25 cents per local call.

Mayor Henry questioned Richardson about the delay in getting telephone repairs to respond when trouble calls go in at the telephone company office in Littlefield. According to reports received, one man said he had reported trouble with his telephone last June or July and was still waiting for a repairman.

"I would suggest," said Richardson, "that if you do not have a repairman contact you the same day you call in, that you call again."

"We get more compliments than complaints on telephone repair service in Muleshoe," he continued.

Richardson was also questioned closely about little or no pay telephone service in Muleshoe and responded by telling the group that most pay telephone problems came from vandalism, from slugs, stealing receivers, which, according to the telephone company manager, are used in vehicles for CB radios, and from theft of necessary

In response to a question from Bob Finney, Muleshoe City Council member, Richardson told the group that it was suggested that all two and four party lines would be converted to private lines within the next three to five years in order to comply with a requirement of the Public Utility Commission.

"Why do you advertise so extensively about your great service," asked Council Member Clarence Christian, "When a person has telephones and is paying for their telephone, they expect to use them?"

Richardson said there is a trunk line problem in Muleshoe, which is under study at this time, as he apologized for the inconvenience caused by the present cable construction in the west area of Muleshoe.

He also once again confirmed the date for direct distance dialing to become a reality in Muleshoe on October 27 of this year, and added that probably some time next year, there will be a test of push-button dialing instituted locally, also. He said that studies have indicated that very few people like or are interested in push button dialing so it will be instituted on a trial basis with selected individuals.

Councilman A.V. Wood questioned the difference in rates billed for different businessmen and richardson promised to do some checking into the billing system.

Finney said, "Modern advancement in telephones is fantastic, they work ninety percent of the time, but the other ten percent causes problems. We have come to expect 100 percent

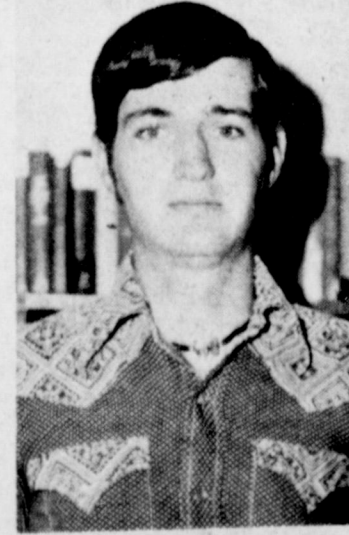

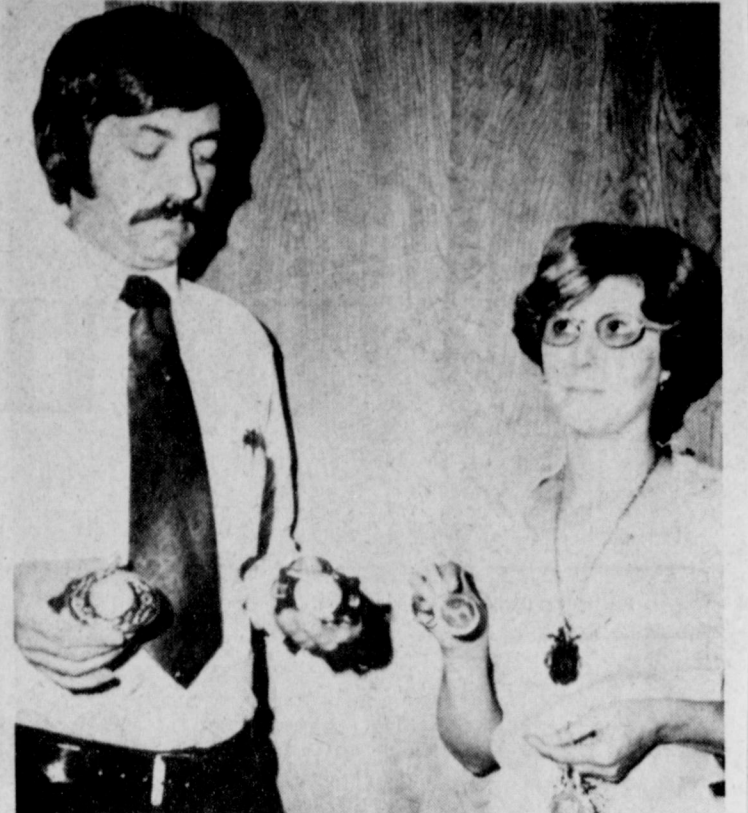

**WHEAT 'VERY GOOD'**  
 "Irrigated wheat looks very good and we are looking at very good yields," continued Tanksley. "with irrigation, the water has made the wheat a potential to have top yields, barring natural disaster such as a major hail storm or something like that."

Corn has had a good emergence, he continued, with approximately 99 percent of the corn planted, and now at a good stand. Some 10 percent of grain sorghum has been planted, and only 15 percent of the cotton has been planted at this time.

Tanksley concluded, "If we get from two to three inches of rain, very soon, it will not be quite too late for dryland producers to plant some type of crop, but they will be hurting."
