

Announce Plans For Sears Hog Awards

Sears-Roebuck and company again this year will award eight registered Chester White gilts and one registered Chester White boar to the Parmer County 4-H boys. In order to qualify for one of these pigs, the boys will write and submit an essay entitled, "The Value of Produce on our Farms". The essay is to have a maximum of 500 words.

Essays must be in the hands of the County Agent by May 1, and must be written on notebook paper, written in ink, and must contain the boys name, address, and name of the 4-H Club.

Essays will be judged by a committee and pigs will be awarded as prizes on the basis of 40 per cent for best essay showing knowledge and information that the contestant has on the subject, and 60 per cent on his ability to successfully complete the demonstration.

Each essay is to be accompanied by an agreement blank signed by the contestant and his guardian. In this agreement, the boys agree to feed, care for, and breed the sow pig under the direction and supervision of the county agents. He further agrees to return either \$15.00 or the best gilt, with certificate of registration from the first litter to the county agent for distribution to other 4-H Club boys the coming year.

The boy receiving a boar will only be required to breed the 8 gilts on the program free of charge. Boys that receive and develop these pigs to the best of their ability will show them this fall at our county show, at which time the Sears-Roebuck Foundation will award prizes to each county winner.

In 1948, prizes will be given to the boy that presents the heaviest litter of pigs 56 days of age in each store area. Prizes will also be given to the boys in each store area who do the best job with their boar pigs. All pigs will be distributed to the winners of the essay contest on a date to be announced later.

Winners of last year's contest are: Lloyd Kriegel, Farwell, Glenn Hromas, Bovina, James Wech, Muleshoe, James McKinney, Bovina, Jerry Jones, Texico, Kenneth Bridges, Bovina, Ross Jefferson, Bovina, and Bobby Englant, Bovina.

Hicks Farm Sale Is Scheduled April 15th

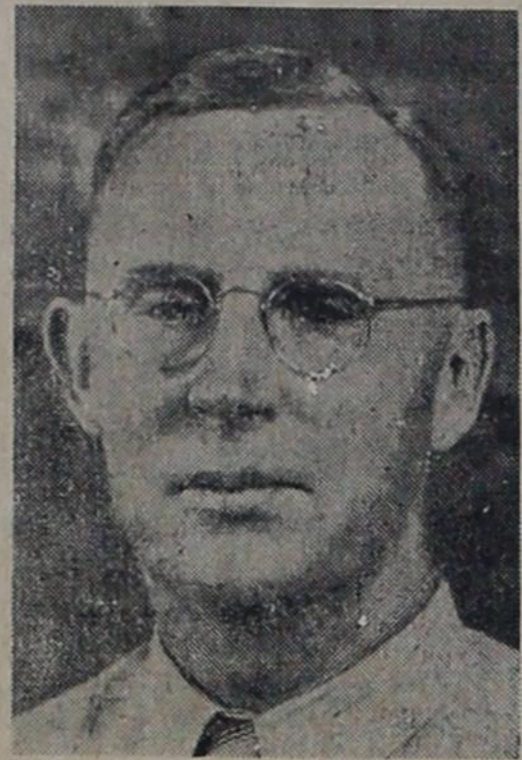

Chamber Commerce Discusses Future

Farm Bureau Aims For Farm-to-Market Roads

The local unit of the National Farm Bureau Association of Curry County met, last Monday night, at the Texico High School, with a goodly number of members present and several new ones joining, at the meeting.

This was the second meeting for the local unit of the Association, having been organized March 7th, of this year, it is still in its infancy. John Hadley, president of the unit, stressed the fact, that one of the objectives, for which they have to work is to increase the membership.

The main discussion of the meeting, was the Farm-to-Market Roads. Max Meador and Frank Phelps, members of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce, were present, and gave some interesting points on the road situation. Meador stated that Clovis was ready to assist in the work of getting better Farm to Market Roads and told the Bureau members his experience in the past of working for more and better roads.

Meador stated that generally, there are two roads, and classed them as primary and secondary, the primary being the Federal Highways, and the secondary the state and county roads of which the Bureau is most interested in at present. Meador said that there are several roads in Curry County that are slated for graveling and black-topping. He touched the point of how money was allotted for the improvement and building of secondary roads, and suggestions were made on how to go about getting more and better Farm-to-Market roads.

A road committee was appointed by John Hadley, to begin work on the matter, of finding out what roads the Organization wanted and where they would be most beneficial to the farmers, in general, then apply for the improving and building of them. The committee consists of: Gene Lovelace, C. H. Whitener, Joe Blair, Edd Muckelroy and Claude Curry.

C. M. Henderson was present and told his experiences, in working on a similar project, of getting twenty miles of Farm-to-Market Roads in Parmer County, and gave his idea of how to go about it.

District Conference In Session Here

With a good representation of the twenty-seven churches in the district, the annual meeting of the Clovis District Conference got under way at the local Methodist Church Tuesday afternoon.

Following a business session during the afternoon, delegates and visitors were served lunch by the Wesley Guild in the basement of church. Bishop W. Angie Smith preached at the evening services.

Banquet Honors Grid Boys and Pep Girls

An occasion which probably did more to promote good will and a sense of good sportsmanship between schools which have long been athletic rivals was the large banquet held last Friday night at the Farwell school, honoring football boys and pep squad members of Oklahoma Lane, Bovina, and the local boys and girls.

Scene of the banquet was the school cafeteria, located in the basement of the main building. Mixed numbers were drawn for seats at different tables in order to mix up the school members instead of one school sitting as a group.

The program moved on with the singing of the different school songs and several special numbers given by individuals from all schools represented. Don Boles, member of the Clovis KICA Radio staff, was guest speaker of the evening. His principal thought of the evening centered around a standard of life that young people should live by. Boles warned of the evils of alcoholic drinking in the lives of young people and advised that they wait until they are at least 35 years of age before they try a drink of alcohol. He stated that he thought there was no danger of being harmed to any degree by alcohol at that age because the individual would have developed a sense of self-respect which he does not now have.

Following Mr. Boles' talk, the entire group repeated the Lord's prayer, led by W. O. Cherry, Supt. of the Bovina schools.

About 150 people attended the banquet. Mucic for the occasion was furnished by the "Music Makers"—Mrs. C. M. Henderson, Donald Ray Summers, Wody McDermit, and Bob Sudderth.

READY SOON

Contract For 4-Lane Highway Promised

Gov. Mabry of New Mexico has given a definite promise to the Clovis Chamber of Commerce that the much agitated four-lane highway between Clovis and the Texas-New Mexico state line in Texico will be built this year.

The Governor wired the Chamber last Thursday that the project had been approved in Washington and that the contract for building the road would be let before June 30 of this year. It is expected that the work will be completed during the present year.

Previous announcement has been made that all the necessary right-of-way has been obtained with the exception of a few hundred feet in East Texico, where the four-laner will connect with State Highway 60 at the Texas state line.

Attended Easter Pageant

Earl Roberts returned home the first of the week from a trip to Oklahoma points, where he visited with relatives, and attended the Easter Pageant in the Wichita Mountains, northwest of Lawton, one of the outstanding outdoor reenactments of the Resurrection story staged in the nation. Roberts says there were more than 20,000 people present to witness the scene this year, which began at midnight and continued until sunrise. The thousands of spectators stood in a drizzling rain to witness the show.

To Attend Press Meet

W. H. Graham, publisher of The Tribune, expects to be in Amarillo Friday and Saturday attending the annual meeting of the Panhandle Press Association. The convention will be held in the Herring Hotel, concluding at noon Saturday.

Fists flew and the assembly was thrown into a general state of confusion Monday night at the regular meeting of the Texico Town Council, when A. C. Green, Texico Fire chief, hurled a lie charge at O. S. Allred, port of entry chief.

City Marshal J. J. Spurlin, who was present at the meeting, intervened after a few blows had been exchanged, order was soon restored and the meeting proceeded. The run-in came as a climax of allegations circulated the past few weeks over the actions of Chief Green in handling certain monies belonging to the Texico Fire Boys Fund, and repeated by Allred in the meeting.

Following the rucus, Green offered his resignation as chief of the fire department, but the Council adjourned late in the night without taking action on Green's proposal.

Figures released at the meeting revealed that only "approximately \$100" remains unpaid on the city's new fire truck received here only a few weeks ago. This sum, it was explained, remains in the form of an overdraft at the Security State Bank.

Considerable discussion centered around the manner in which the Fire Boys Fund should be handled. Some of the citizens insisted that all money of the fund should be handled through the Town Clerk W. L. Freeman, while others took the position that the fire boys should be allowed to handle the fund, with the understanding that an accounting of the receipts and disbursements be made available to the public at any time. The latter proposal prevailed.

Odus Huggins, clerk of the Fire Department, read from his minute book an action taken by the Department on March 3, whereby that Department passed an order that hereafter no monies would be disbursed until voted on and all checks to be signed by the Chief and at least one member of the Department.

Some thirty interested citizens of Texico and Farwell were present at Monday night's meeting.

ACA News

Harold W. Carpenter, Secretary

The new Bindweed Control Committee organized in Amarillo by a group of broad minded farmers is the first serious step taken toward eradicating a fast spreading threat to West Texas agriculture.

It was agreed by this group that the new organization would have as a director, one man from each county in this locality. It was suggested that the Commissioner's Court, the County agent and the AAA meet and select a man to serve as a director. B. E. Roberson of Summerfield was selected to represent Parmer County and the first meeting has been called for April 15th at Amarillo.

Just what the outcome of such an organization will be, we don't know. Science has progressed by leaps and bounds during the war years and several fairly dependable weed killers have been put on the market and labeled as a fool proof, quick kill. All advertising matter of this sort has been proved erroneous. 2-4-D has been known to kill bind weeds completely under some conditions, and under other conditions seems to have only stimulated the growth. Atleicide will completely kill all growth of bind weed above the ground, but the roots will survive and the first shower will bring them up again.

Your secretary has successfully killed bind weed with 100 per cent salt, but that method is far from practical. Areas where salt is applied in the spring of 1944 has produced neither bind weeds or crops since.

At least we have an organization aimed at the control of bindweed and Parmer County has a good man as a representative. We can't help but look ahead and predict a similar organization developed to effectively combat Johnson Grass in the near future.

According to B. F. Vance, Texas Director of the PMA, three acres of tillable land is needed to adequately feed and clothe one person. Due to erosion and mis-management of the soil, the United States can't only claim two and a half acres per person and this number is declining every year.

Think hard about the above statement before you straighten out your

rows or make a bow hazard of your summer tilled acreage by too much use of the one-way.

We have not been informed of any new developments concerning the proposed Soil Conservation Service District for Parmer County. Land owners are still invited to come in and sign the petition toward an election.

There is only a limited time left to turn in for payment for summer fallowed acreage. The deadline is May 1st and no request can be granted after that date. The grounds need plowing anyway. If you've noticed that the ground is already covered with little tumbling weeds, not only a good sign that the growing season is about here, but that you need to back up and hitch on to the old lister.

Farm Cash Income Is On Upgrade In Texas

AUSTIN—In terms of dollars and cents income, Texas farmers have started 1947 off with a bang compared to intake in 1946. Farm cash income for February was 11 percent above the level recorded in February a year ago, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Compared to January, however, farm cash income dropped 3 percent to place February's seasonally-adjusted index at 241 compared to 217.3 registered in February 1946. (Base: average month, 1935-39 equals 100).

The lower Rio Grande Valley district is the only one recording a January-to-February dollar-value increase (5 percent) in farm cash income. Decreases ranged up to 50 percent drop reported by the Trans-Pecos district. Average decline, not adjusted for seasonal variation, was 16 percent, which became a 3 percent dip after allowing for the expected January-to-February slump.

Compared to farm cash income in February, 1946, only two districts—the Trans-Pecos and the Lower Rio Grande Valley, turned in declines. Significant increases ranged from 9 percent upward, led by the 67 percent gain in the Western Cross Timbers district. Other important hikes were made by the East Texas Timbered Plains (52 percent), Northern High Plains (48 percent), Coastal Prairies (38 percent) and Black and

Grand Prairies (38 percent). Actual income recorded in February was \$54,228,000, which makes a total of \$118,436,000 for the year to date. This leads the January and February total for 1946 by more than \$12,000,000. Largest district income for February was registered in the Lower Rio Grande Valley where a total of \$9,938,000 was turned in.

Questions And Answers For Discharged Vets

Q. Can the beneficiary or the family of a veteran make premium payments on his National Service Life Insurance if the veteran doesn't care to do so?

Yes, but the insured veteran has the right to change his beneficiary or beneficiaries at any time without consulting with or receiving the approval of anyone. He may also surrender his permanent NSLI policy for cash at anytime.

Q. I am drawing retirement pay at present. Can I receive subsistence allowance while going to school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?

A. You are entitled to draw retirement pay and still receive the full amount of subsistence allowance while in school or training. Retirement pay is not considered income from productive labor and therefore is not to be included by the veteran in his estimate of earnings filed with Veterans Administration.

Q. I obtained a G. I. home loan in June, 1945, and now would like to know if I may obtain a further loan under the amended G. I. Bill?

A. Yes. Evidently your guaranty under the original Servicemen's Readjustment Act was \$2,000; therefore under the act as amended in December, 1945, you are eligible for a further guarantee of \$2,000 on a real estate loan, or \$1,000 on a business or on-real estate loan.
