Well, we have sat around and done nothing about the eradication of flies and mosquitoes until we have of least one case of infantile paralysis in Farwell. Whether or not flies and mosquitoes are directly responsible for polio, we are not in a position to state definitely. The best guide we can go by on this score is the advice of the department of health, which has repeatedly stated both these insects may be responsible. Recently, a meeting of local citizens suggested an assessment be placed against every water meter in the Twin Cities as a means of raising funds to carry out a health program. Naturally, there has been some objection to such an assessment, but we have failed to find a single person who has come forth with a better suggestion for raising and maintaining a permanent health fund. Neither have we found a single individual who does not agree we need to rid our community of disease-carrying insects as well as cut the weeds. But the fact remains that WE ARE DOING NOTHING. The heath of our citizenship - especially our children, who are the most susceptible to polio-is the most important thing we need to think about. Let's get behind a workable health plan of some kind. Personally, we are in favor of the meter assessment plan. But if you have a better, workable plan, where all the citizenship will share in the program, let's hear from you. Something must be done and at once let's face that fact and then gird ourselves to the task!

The Parmer County Commissioners Court, in session here Monday, issued an order for a special election to be held Saturday, August 13, at which time voters of the county will either approve or reject a bond issue in the amount of \$800,000 to be used in construction of a series of hard-surfaced farm-to-market roads in the county.

Previously, on May 28, voters of the county turned down by a margin of eight votes a bond issue in the amount of \$1,150,000 for a road program in the county.

The overall program calls for approximately 140 miles of paved roads to be distributed among four precincts of the county. Final allocation of the number of miles to be placed in the various precincts of the county will be determined by distribution of funds realized from the


4-H Rifle Club Is **Organized In Texas**
