## No Election On Road Levy Before Next Year

There will be no election called in Parmer County this year to settle the question of placing a 30-cent levy upon the \$100 valuation to be used for county road work, county officials revealed here today.

This announcement came following receipt of the Attorney General's opinion that such an election would not be legal until after Jan. 1, 1951.

Since the state ad valorem tax of 30 cents on the \$100 valuation is to be abandoned after Jan. 1, 1951, some agitation has been going the rounds in the county to call an election with the view of voting a tax for an equal amount to be used in county road work.

Some plans had been advanced with the view of submitting this issue to the voters in the general election on November 7, with the idea of saving the expense of a special election.

County officials contacted here today expressed the belief that there was a strong probability that a special election would be called after the first of the year. "Every taxpayer I have approached on the subject was in favor of it," one official said.

### Duncan Resigns To Move To Oklahoma

Rev. Murphy Duncan, pastor of the Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church for the past 16 months, surprised his congregation Sunday morning with the announcement of his resignation from the local pulpit, coupled with the statement that he was going to Maysville, Oklahoma.

He will conclude his work here next Sunday, preaching at both morning and evening hours. According to present plans, the Duncan family will leave for their new work on Tuesday of next week.

District Supt. Carl Clements of the Clovis District, could not be contacted this week, and church officials have not been advised as to Rev. Duncan's successor. The only announcement coming from Dr. Clements was conveyed through the pastor to the effect that the Texico-Farwell work "would be taken care of."

Maysville is in the Ardmore District, some 12 miles from Paul's Valley, Okla.

### Tax Collections For Year Open

Tax payments for the current year are now due and payable at the collector's office in Farwell.

Attaches at the collector's office reminded taxpayers that taxes for the year 1950 became due on Oct. 1 and may be paid at any time before Jan. 31, 1951, before they become delinquent.

As an extra inducement for early payment of the current year's tax, a discount of 3 percent is being offered during the month of October. This applies only to state and county taxes, it was stated. The discount drops to 2 percent in November and to 1 percent for payments made in December. No discount will be allowed after Jan. 1, 1951.

1950 taxes not paid before Feb. 1, 1951, will begin to draw interest and penalty.

### Overweight Trucks Showing Decrease

The number of overweight trucks clearing the Texico Port of Entry has shown a marked decrease since New Mexico highway officials began their crack-down recently.

Last week only seven drivers were hauled into court for overweight violations, compared to 33 offenders the previous week.

Justice of the Peace Sam Lewis, in whose court the complaints were filed, said that five of the offenders entered pleas of guilty, and two forfeited their bonds of \$30 each.

Lewis Meeks, who has been employed at the Billington Barber Shop the past several months, has received his call to report back to the Army for duty. He plans to leave here Tuesday for Camp Hood, Texas. Meeks entered the reserves when he was discharged.

According to the report, these people have joined with hundreds of other Texans in proving that "Texas takes care of its own handicapped children."

Almost 75,000 Texas club women and members of Parent-Teacher groups have voiced support of the Foundation.

### Baptist Minister Called To Service

Rev. O. O. Holladay, who has been pastor of the Texico-Farwell Baptist Church slightly more than two years, received his call to report for duty in the Army Tuesday, and immediately began making plans to that end.

He is to report to Robins Field, San Antonio, today (Wednesday) giving him less than 48 hours to be there, where he will be assigned to the 14th Army Air Force as a chaplain. He stated Tuesday afternoon that he would be sent to Pennsylvania for a 45-day briefing course, after which he would be located "semi-permanently" at Las Vegas, Nev.

Rev. Holladay enlisted in the reserves upon completion of his work in a seminary, where he finished his studies for the ministry. He was called on Sept. 23, but succeeded in getting a postponement until today.

Mrs. Holladay and daughter will go to the home of her mother at Vernon, where they will remain until her husband is permanently located.

In leaving his church work so suddenly and unexpectedly, Rev. Holladay said that his resignation would be in the hands of his board of deacons when they meet Wednesday night, effective next Sunday. He has done a great work here, and it is with sincere regret that he is called away.

"Tell the people that I have enjoyed my work here, and thank them for their loyalty to leadership," Rev. Holladay said in a parting message.

### Congressman Guill Appears At Bovina Night Of Oct. 12

In an appearance hearded strictly as non-political, Congressman Ben Guill of the 18th Congressional District, will give a report of his stewardship in a county-wide meeting to be held at Bovina on the night of October 12th.

Arrangements for Congressman Guill's appearance here, the first in Parmer County since he was elected to Congress in a special election last May, were completed last Friday when Mickey Ledrick of Pampa, who is Guill's campaign manager, met with representatives of the Farm Bureau and the Bovina Chamber of Commerce.

"We want Congressman Guill's appearance here to be absolutely non-political; it is to be simply a report of your congressman to the people," Ledrick said, adding that Mr. Guill will not mention politics in his appearance.

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce will act as co-sponsor of Mr. Guill's appearance and will attend the local details of meeting, which will be held at the Bovina school auditorium, starting at 8 p. m.

Congressman Guill, who was elected to succeed Gene Worley in a special election last May, holds the distinction of being the first Republican congressman elected from Texas in 25 years. Since going to Washington some six months ago, Guill has made an enviable record for himself, and has recently been named as a member of the powerful Agricultural Committee, one of the most important posts in congress, so far as the Texas Panhandle constituency is concerned.

At the conclusion of Congressman Guill's report, a public forum will be conducted and the congressman will attempt to answer any questions that may be propounded by persons in the audience.

### Work Started On Bovina Paving Job

The Texas Construction Company of Lubbock, was scheduled to begin work on Bovina's new paving job on Tuesday of this week, County Commissioner C. L. Calaway informed The Tribune on Saturday.

Six blocks of new paving, which will conform to the specifications of the Texas Highway Department, are to be laid in the vicinity of the school house. Calaway said Saturday that due to the lateness of the season, it was possible that only the 8-inch caliche base would be laid at this time, with the blacktopping to be spread later.

The deadline for spreading seal-coat topping is Oct. 15 in this region of the state, Calaway pointed out. He added, however, that the job will be completed "if the weather doesn't get too cold."

The six-block paving project will take off from Highway 86 in the south part of town, run north three blocks to the school property, thence east 3 blocks to connect with the business loop of Highway 86.

The paving is being done with funds from the road fund of Precinct 2. School authorities will also share in the program to the extent of providing parking aprons directly in front of the school property.

### Lariat Farmer First With New Grain Here

Chas. Kersey, who farms south of Lariat, was the first to market new feed here this year, arriving at the Roberts Seed Company in Texico with his initial cutting on Wednesday of last week.

Kersey reported that he had cut four acres of an irrigated patch and gathered 11,650 pounds of threshed grain from the small field, which is slightly less than an average of 3000 to the acre.

The moisture content was 14.4 percent, Mr. Roberts reported.

Grain men here said that a steady flow of grain from irrigated fields could be expected here from now until frost when the big push will get under way in earnest. Practically all dry land fields will be left until frost in the hope that they will mature beforehand.

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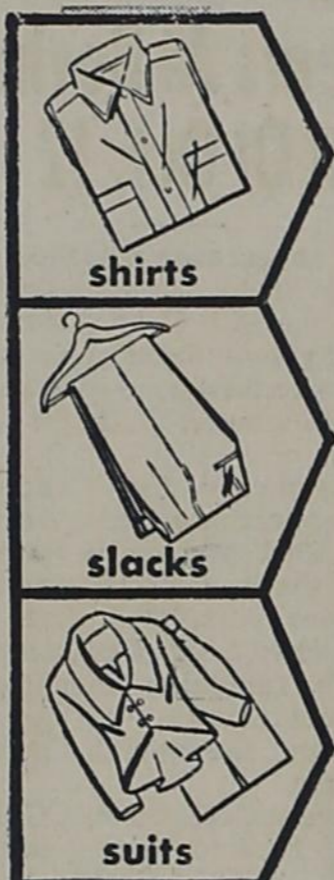

## CAMP URGES FARMERS TO PAY IN ADVANCE

The grain sorghum loan rate announced for this county is for grain sorghum stored on the farm, Joe Camp, PMA secretary, advises. A deduction of 20.5 cents from the announced county rate, \$1.80, will be made where grain sorghum is stored in a commercial elevator, unless the storage is prepaid and so indicated on the warehouse receipt.

Farmers can net around 5 cents a hundred more by paying in advance, Camp says. The storage charge per day amounts to .08913 and the producer has the first 10 days free, he then pays storage from the 11th day through March 31.

According to a release from B. F. Vance, chairman of the state PMA committee, 20.5 cents reduction is made on the assumption that the grain will have been in storage 230 days when the loan matures.

Sometimes, farmers gain by pre-paying the storage and securing the full county loan rate on their grain. Camp advises growers to check with the PMA office.

Bro. Holladay stated that the church had a good revival, twenty-two members were added to the church roll.



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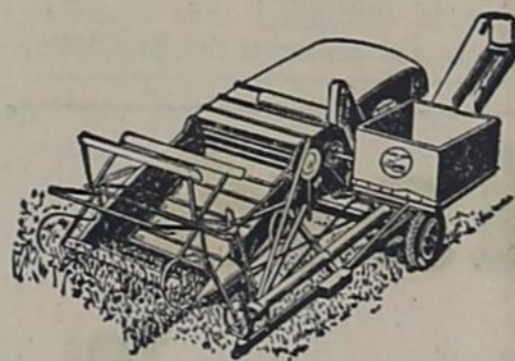

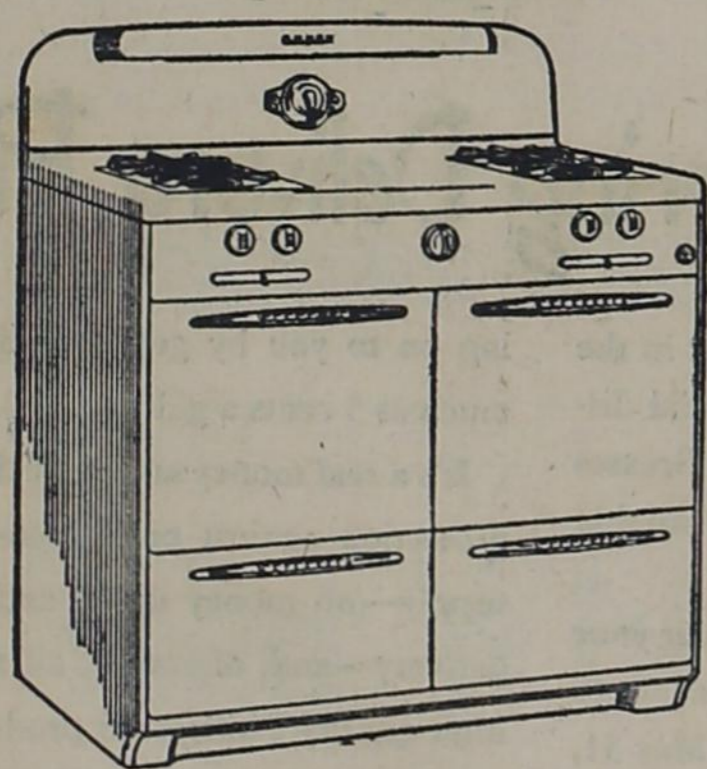
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**FHA GIRLS WORK TO BUY DISHWASHER**

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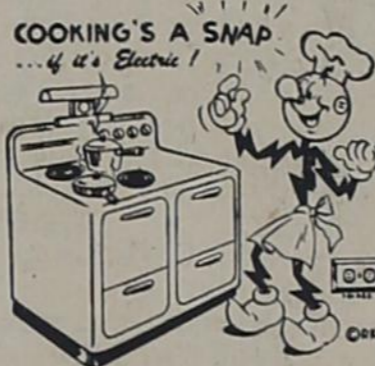

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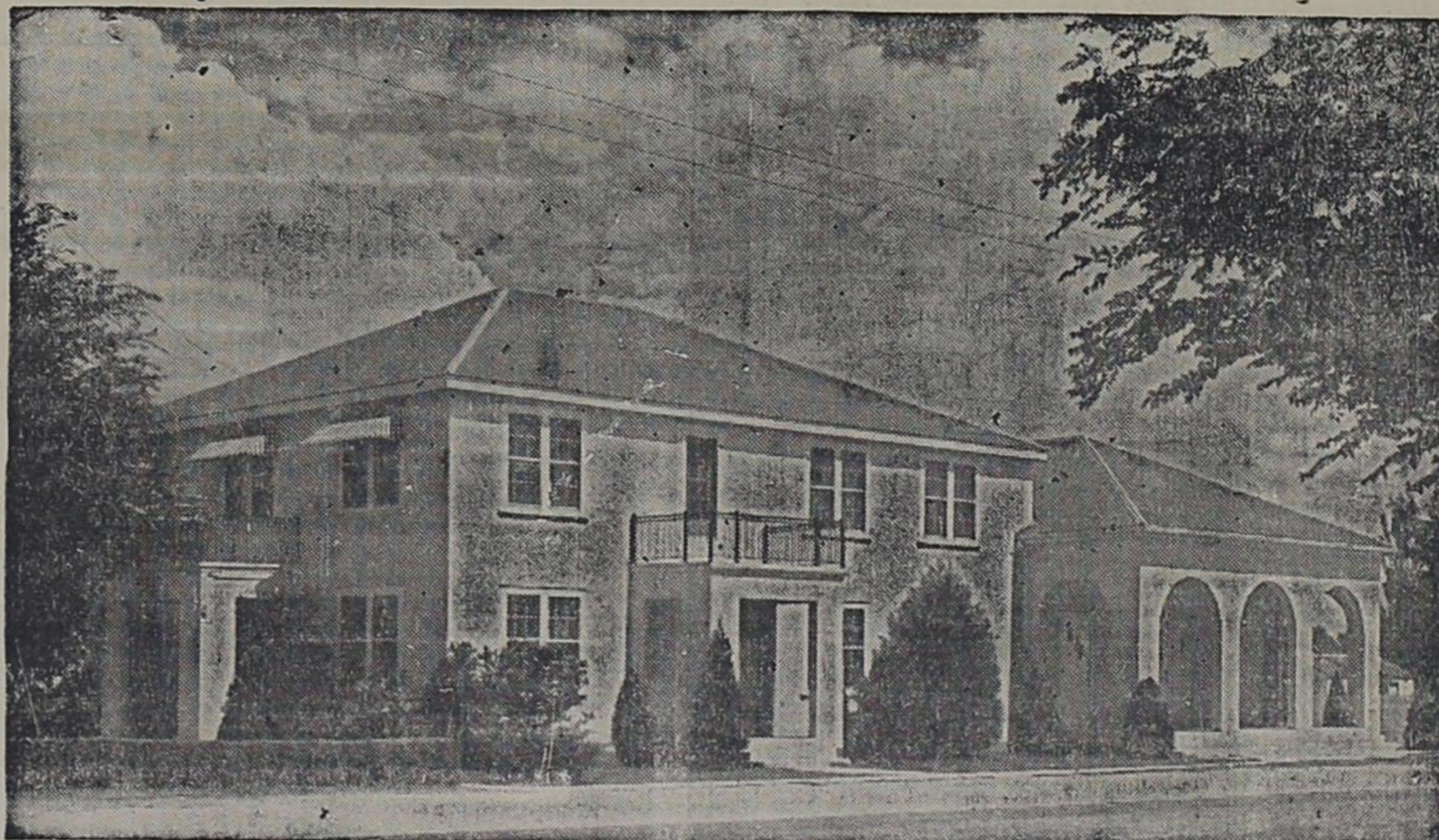
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
