C-C Issues Resolution **Urging 90 Percent** Parity Sorghum Loans

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce has issued a resolution suggesting that government attention be brought to a proposal that grain be given 90% of parity loans, as are now allowed on several other farm commodities.

April Holiday Is Famed For Battle—and Eggnog

This month, on the 21st, the Lone Star flag will be flying on public buildings all over Texas in commemoration of the 118th anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto, where early

Texans won independence from Mexico, but-

The same day also will mark the 108th anniversary of another momentous occasion-an eggnog party the like of which probably has not been equalled anywhere on or out of the pages of history, a party that was held in honor of the aforementioned San Jacinto victory.

The eggnog affair took place in the vermin-infested Perote Castle near Mexico City where 75 Texas patriots were facing an uncertain future as prisoners of the Mexican Central

government.

Men Caught at Mier

They were men who had been captured in 1842 while making a somewhat foolhardy raid against Mier, Mexico in retaliation for a Mexican attack on San Antonio, Texas-an attack which the Mexicans had made, in turn, to retaliate for an expedition the Texans had sent out for the purpose of taking Santa Fe, New Mexico, from the Mexicans.

It was the custom in those days, just as it is now, for people to celebrate momentous occasion with plenty of eggnog; and as April 21, 1843 approached the Texan prisoners at Perote asked their warden for permission to stage the party-which, they told him, was to be in honor of a Texas 'Saint's Day.'

Mescal and 'Mule' Milk

The Mexican commandant, apparently a dense fellow who had forgotten the significance of April 21, gave his consent. He even went so far as to furnish the main ingredient for the nog-30 gallons of mescal, that highly potent liquor produced

by the maguey cactus.

Colonel Thomas Jefferson Green, one of the leaders of the ill-fated Mier expedition, was appointed mixer of the nog, and after stirring 30 dozen eggs and a big loaf of brown sugar into the 30 gallons of mescal, he suddenly realized that since there were no cows in the vicinity of the prison he lacked one of the main ingredients-milk.

But that didn't stop the Texans. There was a big bunch of jennets (or 'jennies') at the prsion, and the Texans, after milking dozens of these long-eared little animals, managed to get

20 or more gallons of milk to mix with the mescal.

Party a Great Success

Historical documents, both Mexican and Texan, record

the party as a great success.

A diary kept by Colonel Green relates how the prisoners sang far into the night to the accompaniment of the pounding of chains on the hard stones of the prison floor, and how their jailors broke up the party only when the Texans quit singing and began imitating hoot owls.

Even some of the Mexicans joined in the festivities, not realizing until too late that they were helping their prisoners celebrate a military victory in which they had been the losers.

The largest collection in the state, they show old wagon trails, proposed railroad routes, settlements, and United States army posts.


> One of the maps shows New Mexico extending to a territory known as "New France," now called Canada. Another has the state covering most of the Southwest.

Noah Rose Was Cameraman For Southwest's Frontier

Hamilton Rose is one of the world's most famous photographers - because nowhere in the world of sepia and shadow is there another exactly like him.

Noah Rose, who has just started his 78th year in Texas, is the last remaining cameraman of the old frontier-the archivist of the outlaw and gunfighter-and his collection of old-time western photographs, which he keeps in his home at 4014 W. Houston St., is distinctive unto itself.

He has more than 3000 negatives -some that he took himself, others that he collected and preserved while wandering over the state in the 1880s and 1890s.

Born In 1874

He is known to nearly every writer of Western lore, because it has been the rule that only from the N. H. Rose Collection could they obtain pictures of the characters about whom they write.

The dean of Southwestern photographers was born in Kendall county, Texas, in April 1874; and by the time he was 12 he was hand setting type on the old Menardville Monitor at a salary of \$2 a month. He was also 'teaching' typesetting to a young friend. Marvin Hunter, now the well-known Texas historian of Bandera.

It was about thi. time that young Noah became interested in photography and he started out with a tin camera he obtained by selling subscriptions to the Youth's Companion.

Studio In Tent

The hobby fascinated him, and soon he was playing hookey from work to take pictures of hangings, shootings and other social events of the time. He set type on the Ballinger Banner in 1889, and during the '90s he worked on papers in Mason, Sonora, Del Rio, Eagle Pass and other West Texas towns.

But he never deserted his hobby. At intervals he would take time off from printing to travel over West Texas as a tent photographer of the famous Rose pictures. with a bulb-action camera, 'shooting' cowboys, rangers, country weddings and what-not. And during this time he developed the art of

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. - Noah making excellent prints from faded ancient photos and tin-types-which started his now famous collection and brought him to San Antonio to set up business in 1921.

During his tent-photography excursions Mr. Rose found himself extremely popular because of a newfangled contraption he carried in his trunk - a big-horned Victor talking machine.

Held 'Concerts'

"It was the first one seen in many of the towns," he recalled the other day," and I had 50 records, mostly on the funny side, that delighted everyone who heard them. That talking machine really brought me and my business into the limelight in those early days."

One time, at Eagle Pass, the manager of the Maverick Hotel got Mr. Rose to set up the Victor in a hotel window, and the photographer recalls that his 'concerts' filled the street with people every evening for several weeks. He nearly wore out the 50 records.

"When I was working country places like Sabinal and Frio Canyon," said Mr. Rose, "people would ask me to bring the Victor to their homes, and then they would call in all the neighbors for a party. Later I had people tell me they could hear that talking machine as far away as a mile down the canyons as night."

New Book Coming

During the last few years hard luck has pursued the state's most famous photographer. His home was flooded and many of his precious negatives were water-soaked.

Then, just as he had moved into a a new, home, and all seemed right with the world, his wife fell sick and died. Mr. Rose's grief resulted in a stroke which kept him abed for some time, but now he is up and about again.

Right now he's looking forward to the fulfillment of a long-cherished dream-publication of a book to be called 'The Album of Gunfighters', which will contain more than 300

Collaborating with him in the work is his friend Marvin Hunter of Bandera-the lad he taught to set type back in 1888.

50 Years of Medicine Life Span Upped 19 Years

A fifty-year renewal of its charter has been granted the State Medical Association of Texas, first chartered by the State on May 1, 1901.

The doctors of medicine in Texas first banded together in 1853 to further the causes of scientific medicine and to develop better health laws and practices.

By 1901, organization was sufficiently complete to justify a charter, and now, as the first charter expires, the Association has active members in every county.

The half century between the two documents, the first signed by five distinguished pioneer Texas doctors, all now deceased, and the second, submitted by the present officers o fthe 6,000 members association, is measured by amazing strides in the alleviation of human suffering and a startling lengthening of human life.

Dr. W. M. Gambrell, Austin, president of the Association, points to a record which no other nation

in the history of the world has ever matched.

The first fifty years has seen your life-span lengthen 19 years; it has seen typhoid and diptheria practically wiped out as killers; it has seen the three once great killers of children-whooping cough, diptheria, and scarlet fever-practically eliminated.

It has seen the discovery of the sulfa drugs and the advent of the wonder "antibiotics" such as penecillian, aureomycin and others, whose multifold uses are still being explored.

In 1900, according to Dr. Gambrell, the average span of life was 49 years. Today, it is a little better than 68 years. If the trend holds, it adds another year to your life every 20 months of medical research, and conceivably by 1975, the life span could reach 90.

It takes from 300 to 1,000 years to build an inch of topsoil under natural conditions.

Milk in Frozen Storage Coming

How would you like to buy milk the way you buy frozen orange juice?

Latest experiments show that it is possible to produce frozen concentrated milk that will remain good for drinking several months after it goes into storage, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reports.

Advantages of such a product over whole milk would be the saving in storage space, both in home refrigerators and other storage points, a greater variety of uses, and a longer keeping time.

Also, it would be another means of preserving milk from a period of surplus production to one of scarcity. This would help keep prices more stable to dairymen as well as to consumers.

Reducers should keep in mind that no one food is fattening. You gain weight when you eat more than your body needs, no matter what foods are eaten.



New Mexico Area Now Chili Bowl

LUNA COUNTY, N.M. - This section of New Mexico is rapidly acquiring a new title-'Chili Bowl of the Southwest.'

It all started during the first days of government cotton control when a few farmers, casting about for some way to use idle land, took a gamble and began planting the hot red peppers which have such a varied use in native dishes.

Now, in communities where only a handful of farmers formerly raised the chilis for their own use, lots of people are raising them on a commercial scale-and doing right well with them.

Just as an example—one farmer, F. C. Lopez, planted five acres and although a late frost damaged the first blooms he harvested 13,500 pounds and 1,200 pounds of red, for a total sales value of \$1,042.

From a commercial standpoint Luna County growers have learned *that it is not profitable to raise chilis in small quantities because of the lack of available markets in the section, but as County Extension Agent Seldon Baker has pointed out the demand for chili peppers is steadily growing as they are used by more and more Easterners.

As a result the Luna County Farm Cooperative was started so that farmers would be assured of a market after harvesting their crops.

This section of New Mexico is particularly adaptable to growing the plants. It has a 220-day growing season and, although rainfall is usually less than 10 inches annually, there is plenty of underground water than can be tapped for irrigation purposes.

Ever Sprint a Footrace With a Tornado?—Here's How

STILLWATER, Okla.—The next time you see a tornado bearing down on you, don't grow pale and collapse. Instead, start running.

Chances are good that you can outrun it, says William E. Hardy Oklahoma A. & M. College meteorologist.

"Don't run away from it; run at right angles to it," Hardy advises. "A twister ordinarily is only a few hundred feet wide. If you can get as much as six hundred feet from a tornado, you are probably safe."

Avoid Shacks

Hardy also suggests staying out of small or weak wooden shacks or sheds during a tornado.

"You stand a better chance out in the open, providing you can find a depression of some kind to lie in," he said, "Remember, it isn't the tornado itself that does the most harm. It's the flying debris, often traveling two to three hundred miles an hour, that causes the most damage."

Staying down below ground level, and away from barns or buildings that might collapse, increases chances of survival. Hardy also suggests that cars be abandoned in favor of the wide open spaces.

Stay Out of Cars

Cars are comparatively light to a twister, and are liable to be smashed up. The best thing to do is to drive out of the path of the storm, but if that cannot be done, drive the car under a strong overhead structure if possible and get out and into a gully, culvert, or depression of some kind.

Contrary to popular belief, the cellar of a house is not the best place to go during a tornado, the meteorologist declares. If the twister hits the house, it will likely deposit everything inside right in the lap of anyone in the cellar.

Little Warning

There is no sure way to tell when a tornado is coming, Hardy says. The weather-signs closely resemble those of a bad thunder-storm, and any thunderstorm can turn into a twister if conditions are right.

"Constant work is being done to perfect a method of tracking and forewarning an area of a tornado, the meteorologist states.


Experiments are being conducted at all times to establish a working plan whereby residents

of tornadic area can be assured of a reasonable preparation period before a twister hits."

Grim Frontier Tales Retold in New Book

A book that will be of interest to all historically-minded Southwest-erners is C. L. Sonnichsen's "I'll Die Before I Run," a lusty account of gunplay and violence on the old frontier, and a full story of the great feuds carried on by the Texas pioneers.

Here is the story of men who would brand anything with a hide on, from a tamborine to a buffalo, and who stood up "for their rights" at the point of a gun.

The book has its beginning in the early 1840s, when the word "cowboy" gave off a heavy odor of wildness and sin, and when most settlers carried the law in their own hands—or, at least, in their holsters.

Here is chronicled the gang wars, pistols fights, ambushings, vigilante doings and blood feuds between families that continued well into the memory of Southwesterners who are alive today.

Among feuds dealt with you'll find the Regulators and Moderators of East Texas, the famed Taylor-Sutton affair, the Lee-Peacock troubles, and the fracas between the Jaybirds and the Woodpeckers.

There's blood and thunder to spare in this volume. It's the story of rugged individualists who fought and died—but never ran.

It is published by Harper & Bros., New York, at \$3.50.

LIFE IN FAR WEST UNDER NEW COVERS

A book which has been described as the peer of Mark Twain's classic "Tom Sawyer" and "Huckleberry Finn" is again available to American readers, a century after its first appearance in 1848... It is

George Frederick Buxton's Life in the Far West, an account of pure adventure among the mountain men, fur traders, and trappers of the West before settlement.

It's a companion volume for "Ruxton of the Rockies," recently published by the O. U. Press.

A Restless Race

Often used as the basis for novels and other fictional writings, "Life in the Far West" remains the most vivid account, and perhaps the most authentic, dealing with the restless men who made the American fur trade great. The new edition by the well-known Colorado historian, Le-Roy R. Haflen, contains a for e-word by Mae Reed Porter, discoverer of much new material on Ruxton.

Although he was an Englishman, Ruxton considered the American West his home. He personally lived the life of his heroes, traversing much of the wilderness country beyond St. Louis, jumping-off point for the Indian domain beyond.

Hardy Trappers

Through two hardy trappers, Killbuck and La Bonte, he describes the events of the times. In their own language, he relates savage hand-to-hand battles with Indians, periods of near-starvation followed by feasts on such wilderness culinary delights as buffalo "boudins" and beaver tails, and passionate Mexican fandangos and drinking parties when mountain men gathered for a rendezvous in New Mexico to dispose of their furs.

Ruxton died in St. Louis in 1848 just before he was to start on another expedition to his beloved Rockies. Had he lived to write more, it is likely that his name would have been attached to a city, a state, or even a national monument. As it is, the "father of Westerns" is buried in an unmarked

grave in St. Louis.

Help Seedlings See the Light

Seeds sown in the open garden encounter many dangers. They or their seedling plants may be attacked by insects and diseases, drowned by floods, eaten by birds, injured by animals, or buried alive by a crust which forms on the soil through which they cannot pene-

By dusting the seed with a disinfectant, the moulds and fungi which cause disease may be prevented; and this is especially advisable in sowing early when the ground is

If there is any suspicion that the soil may crust above the seeds, it will be wise to use a special soil to cover them,

If your garden contains clay, a hard rain may compact it sufficiently to imprison the seed. The tiny sprout often faces an impossible task in attempting to break its way to the sunshine.

The illustration shows two bean seedlings, one of the varieties most likely to suffer from crusty soil. The bean seed swells with moisture, and a sprout emerges which pushes

the seed itself-twice as large as when planted-through the soil surface. This takes enormous power, and it is no wonder that a compacted or crusty soil may prevent it.

If you have a compost pile, there is no better way that you can use the humus from it than in preparing a special soil with which to cover seed. This should be mixed with sand, half and half.

In addition to making sure that the seed sprouts will be able to emerge, this loose soil will hold moisture and keep the soil beneath it from drying out. It is therefore especially desirable in hot weather.

Good Reading Important In Proper Training of Child

A college diploma isn't necessarily in the family recreational picture a passport to enjoyment of reading. Many people with neatly framed sheepskins, admit ruefully that they seldom read for pleasure.

Champion Rifle Marksman Retires at 82, Undefeated

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.—A. Toepperwein, one of the shootin'est men the world has ever seen, has gone into retirement at the age of 82 after reigning as king of rifle marksmen for more than 60 years.

Toepperwein, who toured the country for many years putting on exhibitions for Winchester, was a cartoonists for the San Antonio Express at the turn of the century, and even then he was renowned as a sharpshooter.

He became nationally famous in 1906 when he broke 72,491 aerial targets out of 72,500, breaking the former world record held by Doc Carver with 60,000 out of 60,650.

It is estimated that during his career he fired in excess of three million rounds of ammunition in exhibitions.

Toepperwein's wife "Plinky," who died in 1945, also was a great marksman. She had never fired a rifle at the time she married the champion but within three weeks was shooting a piece of chalk from between her husband's fingers.

Once Mrs. Toepperwein broke 1952 clay pigeons out of 2000 in three hours and 15 minutes of shooting time.

-Who will be the next champ nobody knows. Τοεpperwein's 1906 record still stands, unchallenged.
