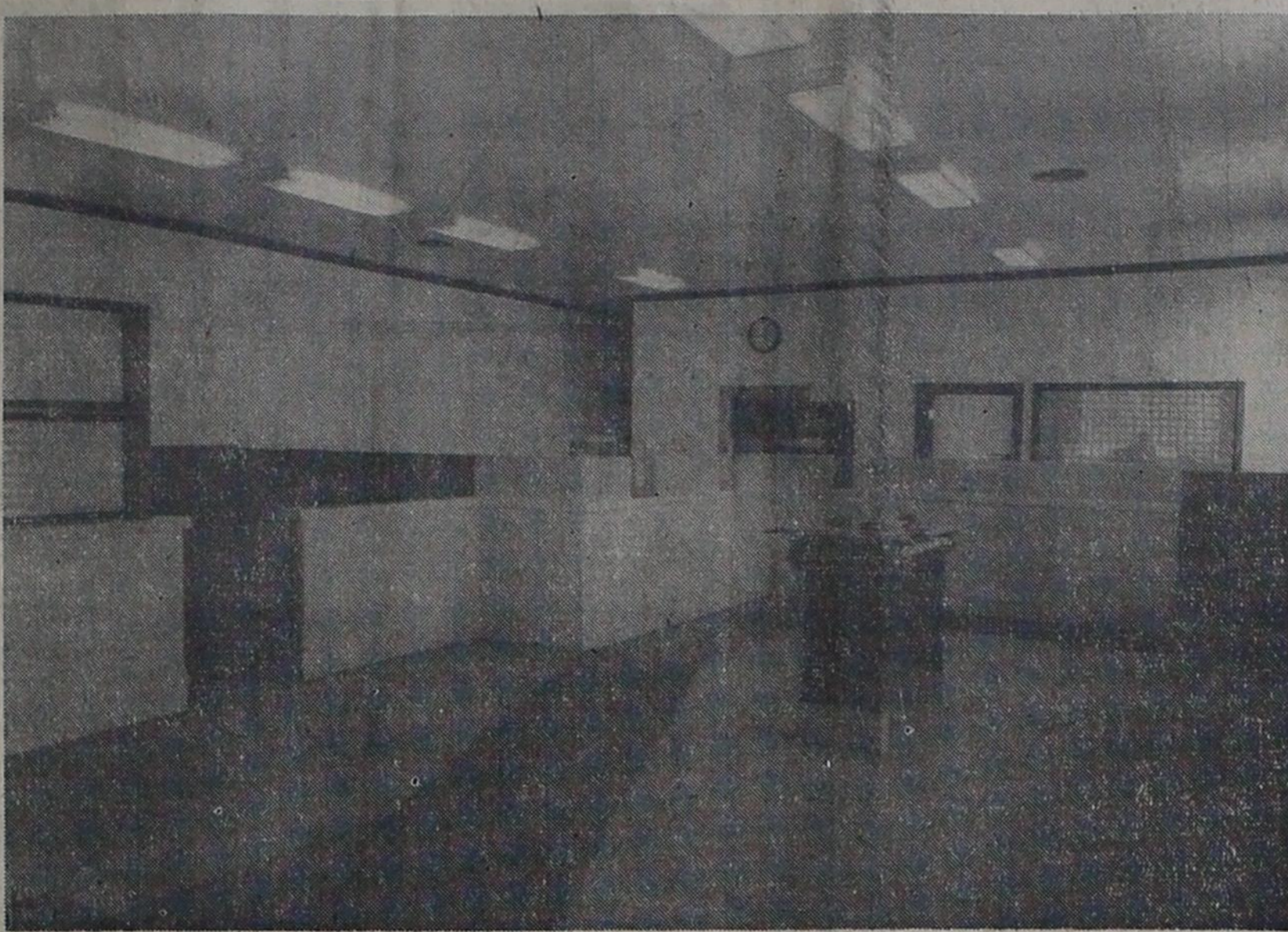

Texico Soldier Killed In Action in Korea

Pfc. Alfonzo Gonzales, 26-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Pedro Gonzales, of Texico, has been killed in action in the Korean war, according to a telegram received here last week by his wife, the former Miss Mary Cervantiez, also of Texico.

Pfc. Gonzales, who was a member of Co. I, 23rd Infantry Regiment, was killed on March 2nd, the War Department advised relatives here. After serving 14 months in the Army in World War II, Gonzales was recalled to service on Sept. 13 of last year, and had been overseas only a short time when he was killed.

He did not see overseas service during World War II. He was married to Mary Cervantiez on Sept. 9, 1950, the day he was inducted into the service for his final period of service. His wife, who made her home here since his induction, is soon to become a mother, relatives reported.

4-H, FFA Livestock Show To Be in Friona Friday and Saturday

Entries for the annual spring fat stock and dairy show held at the show barns in Friona, must be in the show barns by tomorrow (Friday) at 9 o'clock, with the exception of boys who have entries in the Dairy Show at Plainview, Texas, it has been announced. This group may have until 9 o'clock Saturday morning to get their entries into the barns.

The stock show for Parmer County 4-H and FFA boys will feature three principal divisions—swine, beef cattle and dairy cattle. A special division has been set up for fat lambs. The show will continue through Friday and Saturday.

Entries in all classes are limited to bonafide members of Parmer County 4-H clubs and FFA chapters. Climax of the two-day show will be the auction sale held at the barns Saturday afternoon.

Swine will be judged beginning at 10:30 Friday morning. Friday afternoon, at 1 o'clock beef (breeding animals) will be judged, followed by beef (fat steers) contest at 3 o'clock.

Dairy judging begins at 9:30 Saturday morning, and beef classification according to grade will be made that afternoon at 2. The sale will begin at 3 o'clock.

In the swine department classes are set up for each breed with two additional classes for cross breeds in the fat hog division. Five or more pigs of the same breed constitute a class, where there are less than five entries in a class, breeds will be combined to form a class.

One exhibitor may enter two hogs in each class, it was pointed out. Gilts that show in the fat hog class are ineligible to show in the gilt class. Fat litters consist of five or more hogs weighing 160 pounds, and up, it was explained.

Exhibitors with fat litters may also exhibit a pen of three fat hogs from this litter and two hogs can be shown as individuals. Nine classes of swine are listed.

Classes in the beef cattle department include pen of 5, pen of 3 and individuals. Classes according to grade are choice, good, commercial and utility. Breeding classes are also listed, along with special classes.

Eighteen classes are listed in the dairy cattle department. Other classes include get of sire (four animals from one bull); individual herds, 6 animals owned by one boy, and produce of dam.

There will be a class for fat lambs in the sheep department for the show.

Farwell School Census Is Almost Completed

Grand Jury Returns Four Criminal Indictments

Trustees Are Elected For Parmer Schools

School trustee elections for the county and for the four Parmer school districts were held Saturday. In county races, there was little competition with Bovina and Friona districts listing only one candidate, and Farwell listing two.

All three of the candidates elected as county trustees for the coming year were up for re-election. Others whose terms have not yet been completed are Bill Sherley, trustee-at-large, and Matt Jesko at Lazbuddie.

In independent school districts, two trustees were to be elected for each precinct. As a general rule, voting was heavy and at least four candidates were listed in each race.

From Bovina, G. F. Trimble and Joe Wilson were trustees whose terms had expired and neither of them ran for re-election. Others whose terms expired were Lee Jones and Claude Rose of Farwell; Elbert Nowell and Rinie Steinbock of Lazbuddie and D. O. Robason and Jake Lamb of Friona.

Rose and Jones were re-elected to their posts in Farwell and Rinie Steinbock resumed his trustee position in Lazbuddie. Robason and Lamb at Friona did not run for re-election.

Resuscitator Is Used To Revive Doshier Boy From Convulsions

The resuscitator of the Texico-Farwell Fire Department, only recently purchased, was credited with saving the life of Dickie Ray Doshier, 2½-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Doshier, Friday afternoon.

The artificial respiratory apparatus was applied to the child when he was overcome with a convulsion that was an apparent by-product of the pneumonia he is now being treated for in Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

The child was given a routine check-up after a sudden illness last week, and although he seemed recovered, he was suddenly stricken with convulsions and unconsciousness about 3:30 Friday afternoon. The Doshier child was rushed to Friona by Claude Rose, and Otis Huggins and Joe Helton were summoned to accompany him with the resuscitator.

Use of the apparatus while making the trip to Friona brought the boy back to consciousness, and he was again placed under oxygen upon his arrival at the hospital. Doshier reported that Dickie Ray had no discernible pulse beat before the application of the resuscitator, and was to all appearances, "dead."

Dr. Paul Spring, attending physician, credited the new piece of equipment with saving the boy's life. Early this week Doshier said that Dickie Ray is being treated for pneumonia, although he added that he is entirely out of danger now.

The local auctioneer remarked that "I would buy that resuscitator if I thought they'd sell it to me. I think it's worth the money."

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The grand jury recessed here late Wednesday afternoon after returning four criminal indictments. Their labors have not been completed and the jurymen are ordered to report back here this (Thursday) afternoon.

Court attaches gave it as their opinion that there would be at least "four or five more" indictments returned before the jurors adjourn.

Bills returned include one against Bob Pierce, charged with second offense of drunken driving; Harold Deleinn Thurman and Ernest Wright, cow theft; J. C. Broyles and Thurman, hog theft. The fourth indictment returned was against a man yet to be apprehended, and his name was not made public.

The jurymen spent some time investigating charges of burglary against three young Muleshoe men who were charged with attempted burglary of the Farwell School house.

In reporting on their deliberations, Clyde Goodwine, foreman, said, "we might have made a mistake" in not returning indictments against the trio. But Judge E. A. Bills complimented the jury in not indicting the lads.

"I am recommending that these boys be passed over, rather than no-billed," Judge Bills said from the bench.

Then, calling the lads before him, Judge Bills lectured the lads at length and reminded them of how narrowly they escaped serious trouble.

Judge Bills announced that he will return here May 28 to hear criminal cases now pending before the court, and has instructed the petit jury to report back on that date.

Irrigation Day To Be On N. L. Tharp Farm, Scheduled April 26

Irrigation day on the farm of N. L. Tharp, who is a cooperater of the Soil Conservation district, is scheduled for April 26, County Agent Joe Jones says.

The program, beginning at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, is sponsored by Parmer County Soil Conservation District and the Extension Service.

The underground concrete pipe which Tharp installed last spring will be shown. The farmer is now using the pipe to water his farm.

The cost, use and engineering of concrete pipe will then be explained by Miles Kelly, irrigation specialist with the soil conservation service at Dimmitt. Kelly was featured on the special irrigation program held at Parmer County courthouse at the first of the year. Methods of water application and water in filtration will be demonstrated by Bob Thurmond, irrigation specialist with the extension service out of Lubbock.

Thurmond will demonstrate the use of gated pipe, filler glass and canvas pipe, also other pipes pertaining to irrigation. John McFarland, who is with a fertilizer company out of Muleshoe, will bring a tractor equipped for putting down anhydrous ammonia, will demonstrate the application of the fertilizer, and will present a short discussion.

The border machine, which was built by Tharp through the aid of plans from Soil Conservation district, will be shown. The machine borders and levels the land at the same time.

A grass seeder, identical to the two the Soil Conservation district owns in Parmer county, will be on display. The seeders are rented to farmers. A land level owned by the SCS will be displayed also.

The Tharp farm is located five miles north of Farwell on the State-Line road.

Jones invites all farmers to be on hand for the irrigation day.

The accident happened, it was said, when McKinney drove his car into the rear of the panel truck being driven by Allen Irons and accompanied by Dale Long, both of Clovis. According to Everett S. Price of the Price-Electric Shop of Clovis, owner of the panel truck, Irons and Long were making a left hand turn off the 4-lane highway when McKinney hit them from the rear.

Both machines were upset, and the panel truck was considerably damaged. Irons and Long escaped with minor bruises.

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Reporter Rummages Through Ordinance List, Discovers that Texico Had Some Funny Ones

Did you Texico residents know that back in 1916, a franchise which has never been revoked was granted to build, construct, equip and operate a street car system upon the streets of Texico.

Also the ordinance which is now in effect pertaining to the purchase of dog tags in Texico, was drawn up 42 years ago, on May 26, 1908.

In the decades since the incorporation of the town of Texico in 1908, only 76 city ordinances have been passed, the very first one cited the city sanitary regulations.

Back in 1902, the lawmakers cited it unlawful to run any dray, transfer carriage, bus, etc., without paying license to the City Clerk. A one-horse wagon cost \$8 and a two-horse wagon \$10. Citizens were prohibited from racing horses or teams through the streets to exceed eight miles per hour in 1908. If they disregarded this law or drove their teams on

the sidewalk, they were subject to fine or jail.

Lawmakers became more lenient in 1915 and raised the speed for vehicles, wagons, automobiles, or motor cycles to 15 miles an hour. It wasn't until 1930 that an ordinance provided that driver's of all machines, propelled by gas, steam, and all other vehicles on a 20 mph speed limit. The first law against reckless driving and driving while intoxicated was put into effect at this time.

Then in 1931, Texico city fathers again raised the speed limit, to 25 miles per hour. It was this year that they put into effect the law which now stands, that vehicle operators must drive to an intersection to turn around.

Did you know also that property owners must keep sidewalks in good repair; neither can they place anything on sidewalks that would inconvenience the public.

Another law passed in 1908 that is still in effect in Texico is that it

is unlawful to disturb any congregation in religious worship or any lawful assemblage.

Another ordinance provides for a pound keeper to watch after unlicensed animals. Dance halls or public dances are unlawful, with the exception of fire department benefits.

The fire department was not created until 1931, when the fire zone was set up; and the office of police magistrate to carry out the laws of Texico is also reasonably recent. This office was created in April of 1931.

Jones Stresses Need In Good Pasture Care

"A good pasture is your cheapest feed," County Agent Joe Jones says, stating that the returns from an improved pasture are highest when proper care is given both the pasture and the animal that grazes it.

He also points out that young pasture plants are damaged if they are grazed too early; if plants are grazed too closely in the spring, they may not fully recover for the rest of the season.

The county agent advises farmers to permit the pasture to get a good start before beginning to graze. This practice is especially true with pastures seeded last fall. It isn't such a problem with older plants, he says.

For quick growth to give plants a good start, Jones recommends 100 lbs to 150 lbs of ammonia nitrate to the acre. In early spring, this will give the grass the "needed kick" to get started, he says, adding that it should pay for itself several times.

Discussing the use of the pastures, the county agent says that care should be taken in turning the cattle in on green pastures in the spring. This is especially true where legumes are included in these mixtures. Weight losses or even death may occur if cattle start grazing spring legumes without proper precaution. Roughage or cottonseed hulls are good to feed in connection with the young pastures to help prevent this, Jones concludes.

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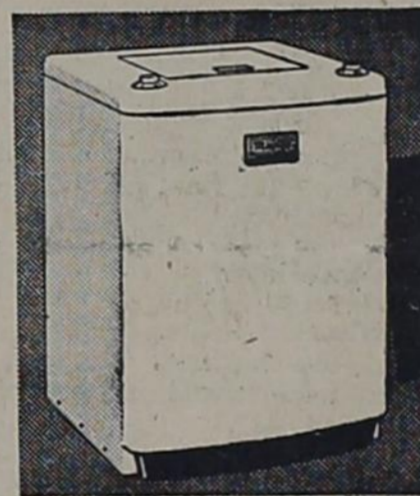
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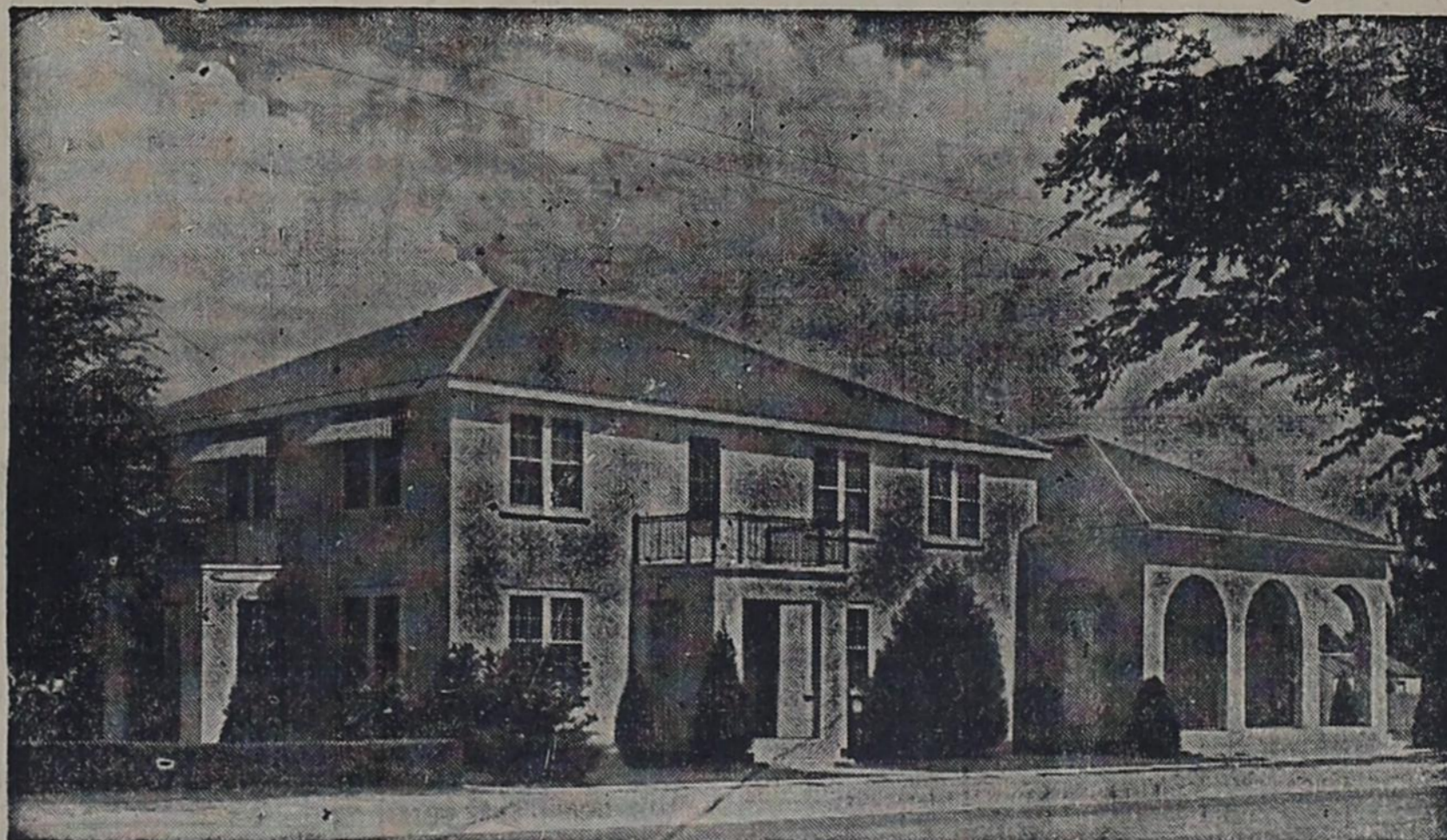

Students can earn six semester credits for the six weeks course. The main emphasis of the curriculum is on Norwegian culture—history, language, literature, music and art. Courses will also be offered on the social economic and political situation in the Scandinavian countries. The faculty includes several men recognized throughout the world—Halvard Lange, Norwegian Minister of Foreign Affairs; Haakon, Lie secretary of the Norwegian Labor Party; Dr. Karl Evang, surgeon-general of public health; Christian S. Oftehdahl, editor-in-chief of the "Stavanger Aftenblad" and Dr. Francis Bull, professor of Scandinavian literature at the University of Oslo.

Tuition for the six weeks term is \$80, the student fee, including health insurance is \$10, and the excursion fee is \$20. Six weeks board and room is \$80. Transportation space is guaranteed on the SS Stavangerfjord sailing from New York on June 12. Round trip, tourist-class costs \$360.

GEOLOGIC MAP INDEX OF TEXAS ISSUED

A geologic map index of Texas has been published by the Geological Survey, the Department of Interior announced today.

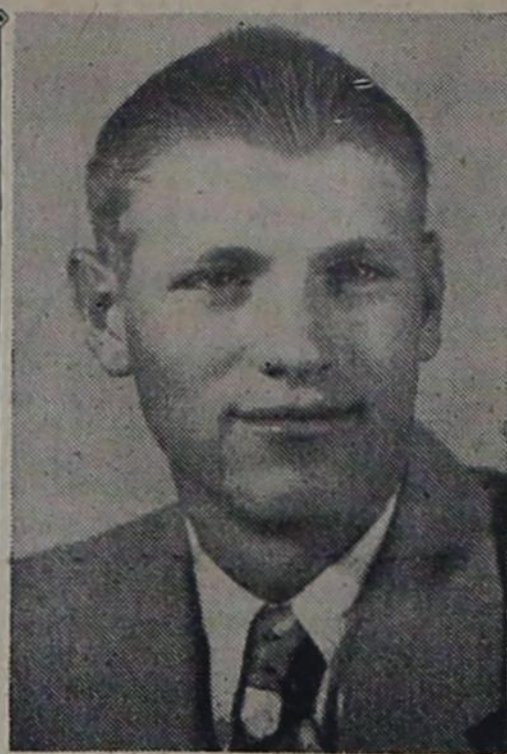
This index shows areas in Texas that have been geologically mapped and the results made available to the public since 1891, the date the Texas Geological Survey released several geologic maps in its second annual report. The scales of the geologic maps approximately 25 miles to the inch.

The outline of each area mapped and the approximate scale are shown by patterns in four colors. A bibliography printed below the index gives the sources and dates of publication of the geologic maps and the names of the geologists who did the work. About 350 mapped areas are shown on the index.

The Texas index is 28th in the State series being published by the Geological Survey to give information about areas in the United States that have been mapped geologically. It is on a scale of approximately 11,100,000 and is printed on one sheet measuring 53 by 41 inches. It was compiled by Leona Boardman.

Copies may be purchased at 60 cents each from the Distribution Section, Geological Survey, Denver Federal Center, Denver, Colorado, and at Room 1210, General Services Building, Washington, D. C. Copies will also be available for over-the-counter sale (but not by mail) at the Geological Survey field offices at 160 New Customhouse, Denver, Colorado, and 234 Federal Building, Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Engineers Map Plans For Telephone Co-Op

(From The Hereford Brand)

Engineers conducted their final studies for wire diagrams in Hereford last week for constructing the estimated 500 miles of rural telephone lines in Deaf Smith and Parmer Counties by the West Texas Telephone Cooperative.

Records at the office of Leo Forrest, director, in Hereford, indicated that the Farwell area finally got in 134 subscriptions before the April deadline. Of these, 90 were for \$50, and 44 for \$5.

Negotiations for some connecting service is limited membership in the WTTC, according to Leo Forrest, manager of the Deaf Smith county TEA.

Nazareth, Flagg and Dimmitt subscribers will probably be left out of the set-up for the present time because the cooperative could not reach extended area service or switching agreements with T. A. Singer, owner of West Texas Telephone Company in Dimmitt.

Subscribers in the Nazareth area have indicated that if they cannot get connection with Dimmitt, they will ask the board of the WTTC to withdraw from that organization and will seek to join with the Tulia cooperative.

Meanwhile, subscriptions in Bovina and Farwell have moved along fast enough that they will be included in the network to be constructed with the initial loan funds.

A request for a release of funds

to proceed with construction will be made when the diagrams have been completed by the engineers. Forrest said. The full amount, with a "hold" on the funds necessary for the Castro county work, will be sought.

Although final placing of the automatic exchanges will not be determined until after the wire centers for the various areas are ascertained by the engineers, present plans seem to indicate the installation of six of these exchanges. Their approximate locations would be:

One in the Dawn area; one in the Progressive area; one between Hereford and Summerfield; one tentatively for the Friona area; and one in Farwell areas.

Shortly after the funds are released by the REA in Washington, bids for the construction will be let, Forrest said.

In 1916 Congress granted a Federal charter to the Boy Scouts of America "to promote the ability of boys to do things for themselves and others."

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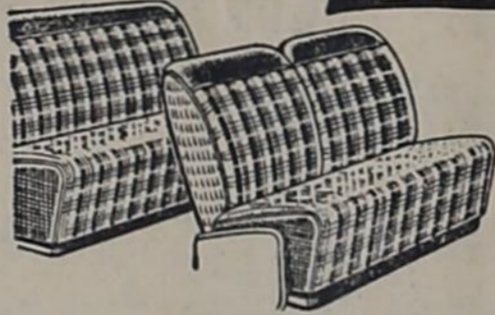
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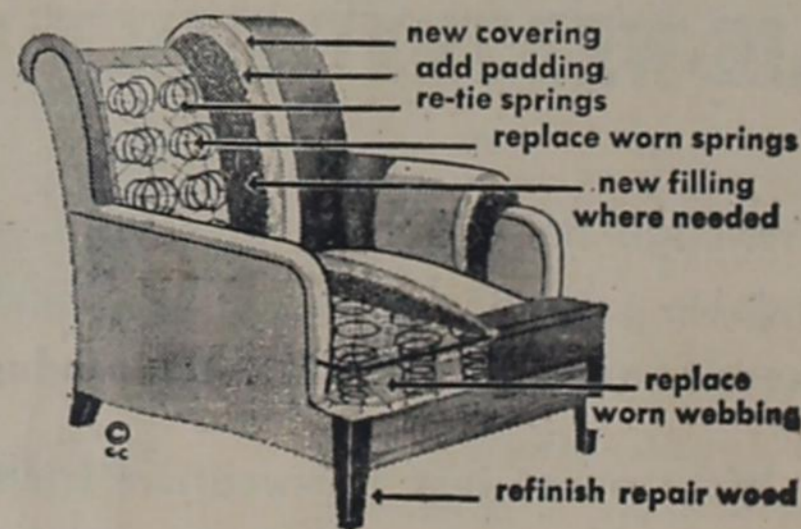

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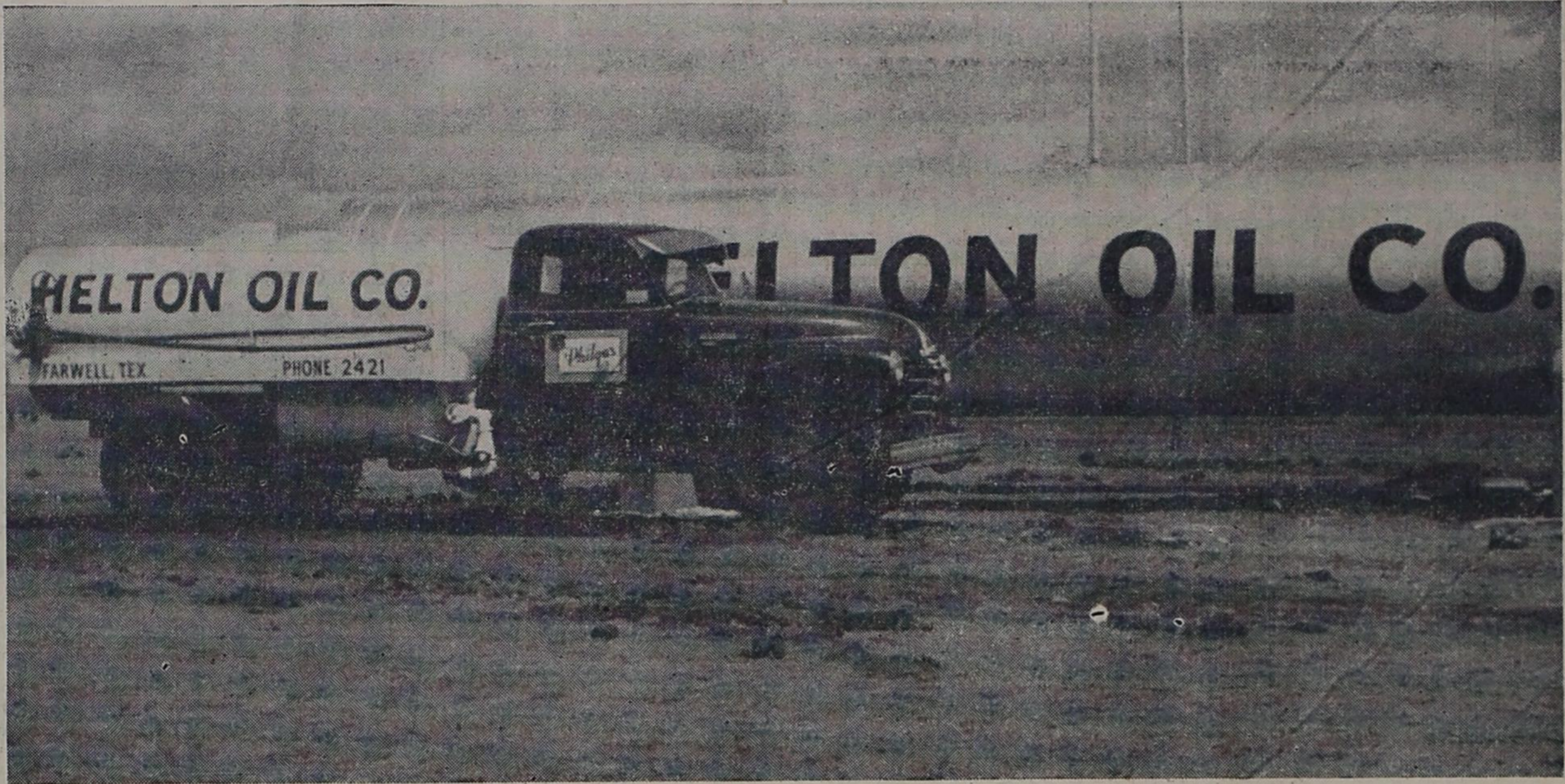

"Treating seeds before planting to prevent seed and seedling damage by soil insects is a recent development in the use of insecticides," County Agent Joe Jones says. To date, the work has been concentrated on wireworm control, but indications are that control of several other soil insects may be obtained also.

According to the county agent, the chief method of treatment to date has been with a wettable powder formulation containing 25 per cent by weight of pure gamma isomer of B.H.C. The common name for this material is Lindane. This is dusted on the seed at the rate of 3 to 4 oz. per 100 lbs. of seed before planting. A sufficient amount of material adheres to the seed without the use of water, Jones adds.

It has been estimated that 55 per cent to 75 per cent of the larger wireworms come up to the treated seed which acts as a bait and they are killed, Jones states. The treatment does not affect wireworms that are deep down in the soil and which stay down in the soil until later in the season, probably after the crop is harvested.

Listing crops on which this treatment works well, Jones cites beans, peas, and milo at 4 oz. of 25 per cent Lindane per 100 lbs of seed. Cucumber, wheat and corn require 8 oz. of the same material. The material should be available at stores handling insecticides, Jones says.

For several years, seed treatment with fungicides has been a commercial practice, and the use of an insecticide in seed treatment is the newest development. So far, the practice bids well to becoming an important item in soil insect control, seed and seedling protection, Jones points out. Work is also developing along the line of insecticide and fungicide combinations for seed treatment, Jones concludes.

Agent Jones says that good seeds could be scarce; as seeds are moving in most sections of the country, better grades could go elsewhere unless farmers buy now.

Farmers are reminded to treat seeds for smut unless it has already been done to control loose and covered kernel smuts and to help prevent seed decay. Either dust or slurry method is recommended for seed treatment.

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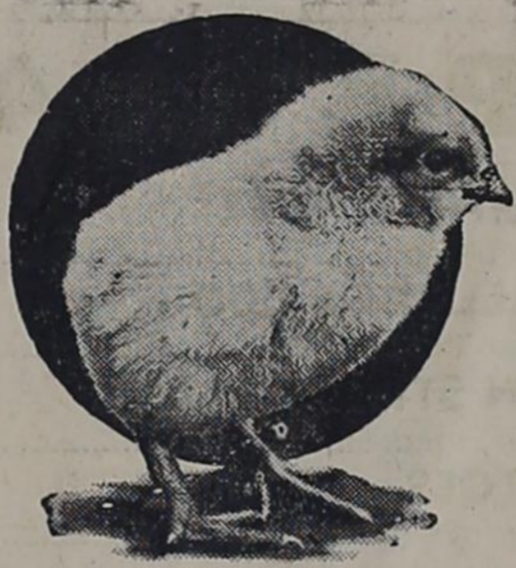

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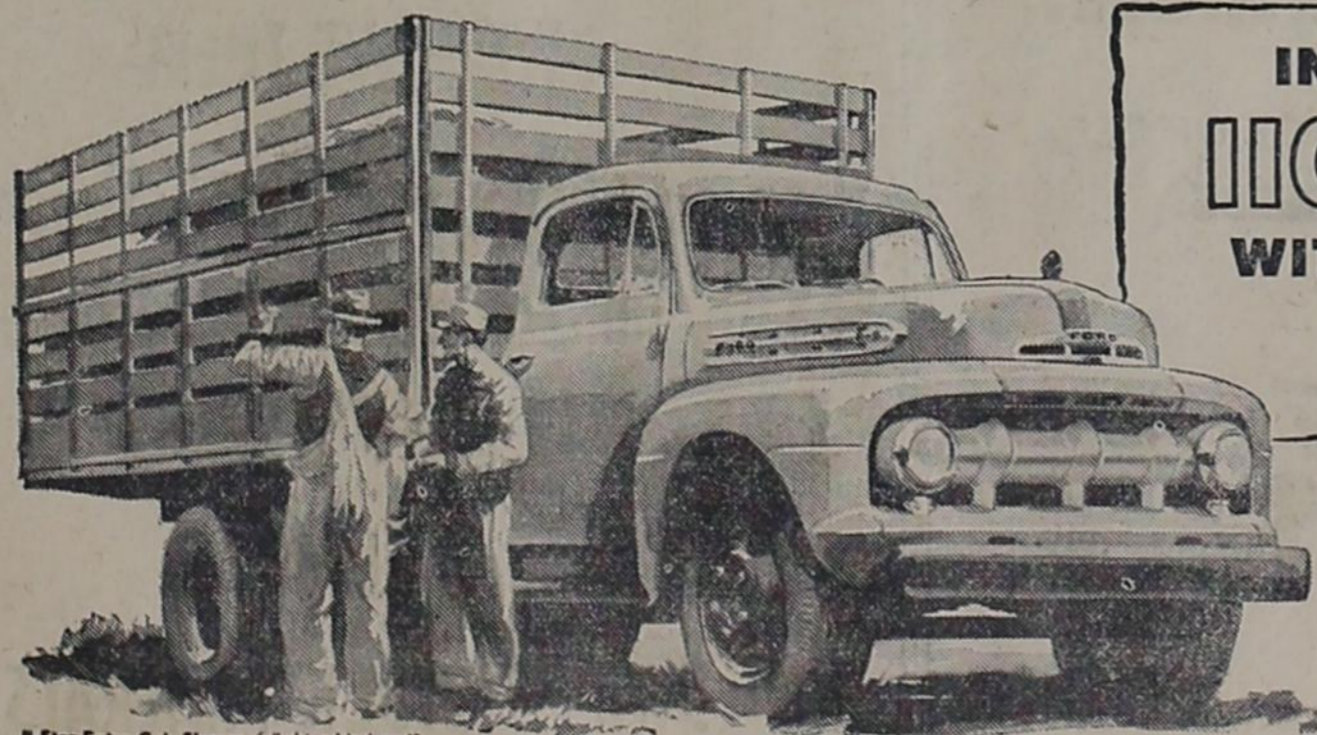

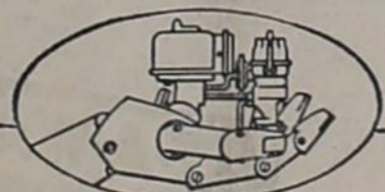

WAYNE TUCKER SNAPS STATE RECORDS, CARRIES WOLVERINES TO MEET WIN

Texico Wolverines scored 60 2/3 points to capture the Melrose invitational track meet Friday from the Rosedale Cowboys who tallied 52 1/2 points.

Wayne Tucker, Texico's cinder ace, was individual high scoring performer for the meet, winning four firsts—100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, high and low hurdles—and a second in broad jump. In winning the 100 yard dash in 10 seconds flat, he broke the state record of 10.2.

He also managed to shave off a like amount from the state record in high hurdles by speeding them in 15.2. 15.4 is the present state record.

The crack Wolverine foursome of Robert Tucker, Jimmy Horton, Arlye Crooks, and Wayne Tucker showed its heels to opposition in the mile relay to smash through to win the event in 1:43.9. Rosedale finished second, and the Melrose squad came in third.

Fawell Track Team Makes Outstanding Show at Dist. Meet

Fawell's cinder men came down home stretch with flying colors for the District 10-B track and field crown Saturday afternoon. It was the season's greatest meet for the Steers, as they finished almost 40 points ahead of any other district team.

Final score for the meet was 72 2/5 for Farwell, Bovina 33 1-5, Friona 30 1-5, and Lazbuddie, 12 1-5. Although Adrian, Vega, and Wildorado were eligible to enter men in the meet, the Parmer County teams were the only ones out for the senior track and field events.

Jerry Pool, senior mainspring for the Steer thinclads, had the best

afternoon of his career, entering in four events, and drawing down blue ribbons for all four.

He won the 100-yard dash, the 440 dash, the 220 dash, and the broad jump. In three events, the old records were broken, and in the other, the record was tied.

The two standout performances of the diminutive senior were in the broad jump and the 440. He soared 20 ft. 6 in. in his preliminary attempt to set a new record. The old one was 17' 5".

Pool sliced 2 1/2 seconds from the old 440 record with his 53.7. His time for the 220 was 23.6 compared with 24.6 last year, and he ran a 10.4 in the 100, slow time against his previous marks this year of 10.1. Still, he was not crowded for a first.

John Christian was good for lots of Steer points, also. He took three first places by himself, and was a team member on the winning 440-yard relays.

Christian ran a 16.3 in the 120 high hurdles (old record 17.4); a 24.5 in the 200 lows (25.3); and jumped 5' 3 1/2" in the high jump. The lanky Farwell cinder man ran out of competition in the jump, as he has bettered this mark considerably several times this year.

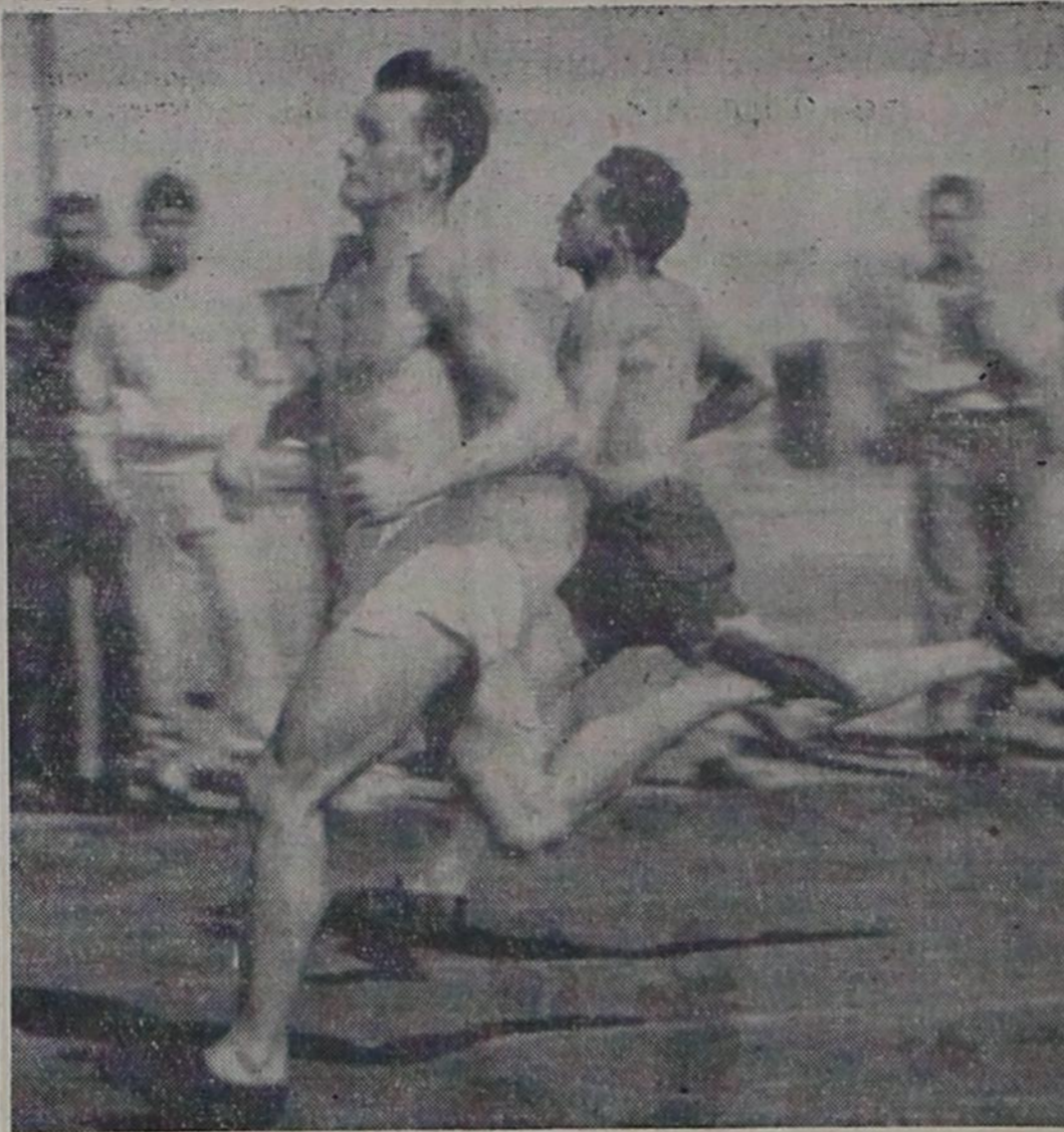

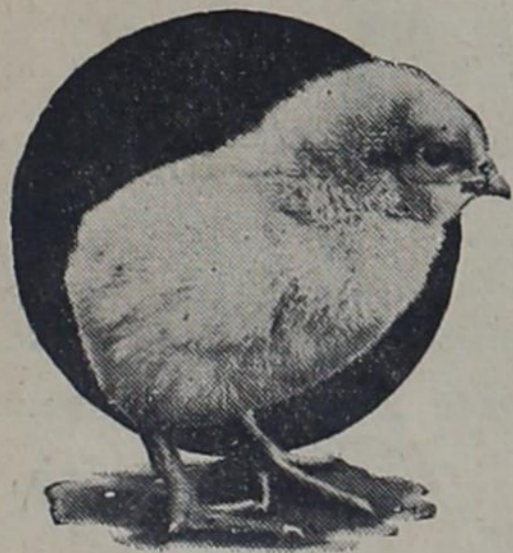
