**City Commission Has Meeting Wednesday**

The Farwell City Commission had a regular meeting, Wednesday evening of last week, taking up various business details, Bob Anderson, one of the group, reported today.

The commission voted to write letters to all local residents who have not taken advantage of city sewerage, urging them to hook up on the lines now serving Farwell. At the Town Hall meeting held on Monday night, opinion was expressed to the effect that it would be advisable to pass an ordinance requir-

ing all property owners to connect with the city sewerage lines, but the commission meeting Wednesday favored using this as a last resort, officials report.

Hook-ups to the sewer system, voted on a bond issue some months ago by local residents, have been exceedingly slow, and city officials are expressing their concern over indifference of property owners. "Naturally," they point out, "it will cost money to make such a connection—but the bond issue was approved, the money secured and expended for such sewerage, and we are going to have to pay off our indebtedness one way or another."

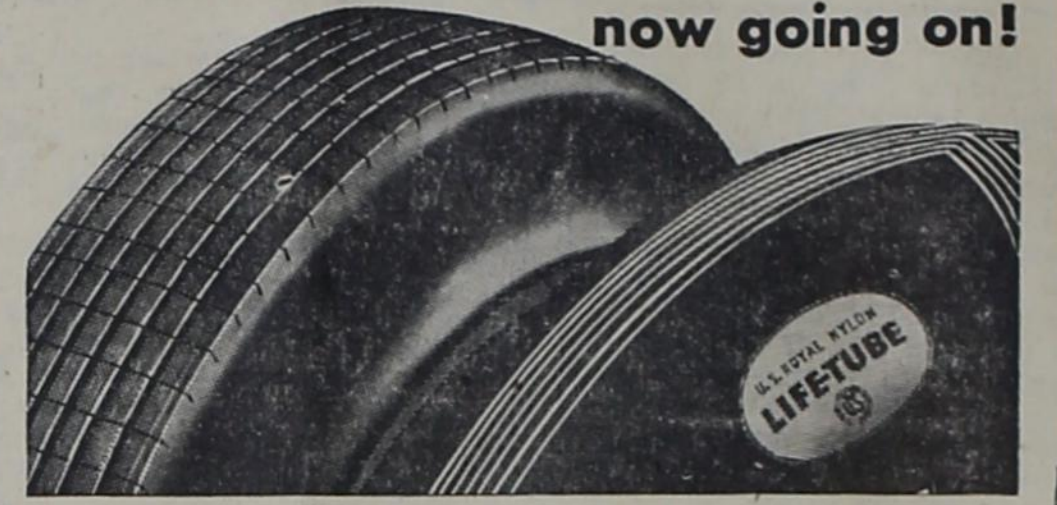

**HERE'S WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE NEW TEXAS "SAFETY RESPONSIBILITY LAW"**

- 1** *Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952.* On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved in accidents. It affects all drivers and motor vehicle owners (except Federal, State, County and City-owned cars).
- 2** *What Must You Do After An Accident?* Under existing laws, you must file a written report to the Department of Public Safety if your car is involved in an accident where there is a death, an injury or property damage in excess of \$25. Under the new law, a written report must be filed *within ten days* if your car is in an accident resulting in death, injury or property damage in excess of \$100.
- 3** *You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But . . .* If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the Department of Public Safety security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover all claims growing out of an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you cannot establish financial responsibility for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license plates are automatically suspended.
- 4** *It's Easy to Establish Financial Responsibility* with a motor vehicle liability insurance policy. If you do not now have such a policy, call your local insurance agent today. He is a qualified insurance counselor who will be happy to advise you concerning your needs.
- 5** *What is the Minimum of Your Liability?* The law permits each driver to establish the following minimum limits of liability: up to \$5,000.00 for injuries sustained by one person; up to \$10,000.00 for all personal injuries resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000.00 for property damage. You do not have to establish such liability but it is the easiest way.

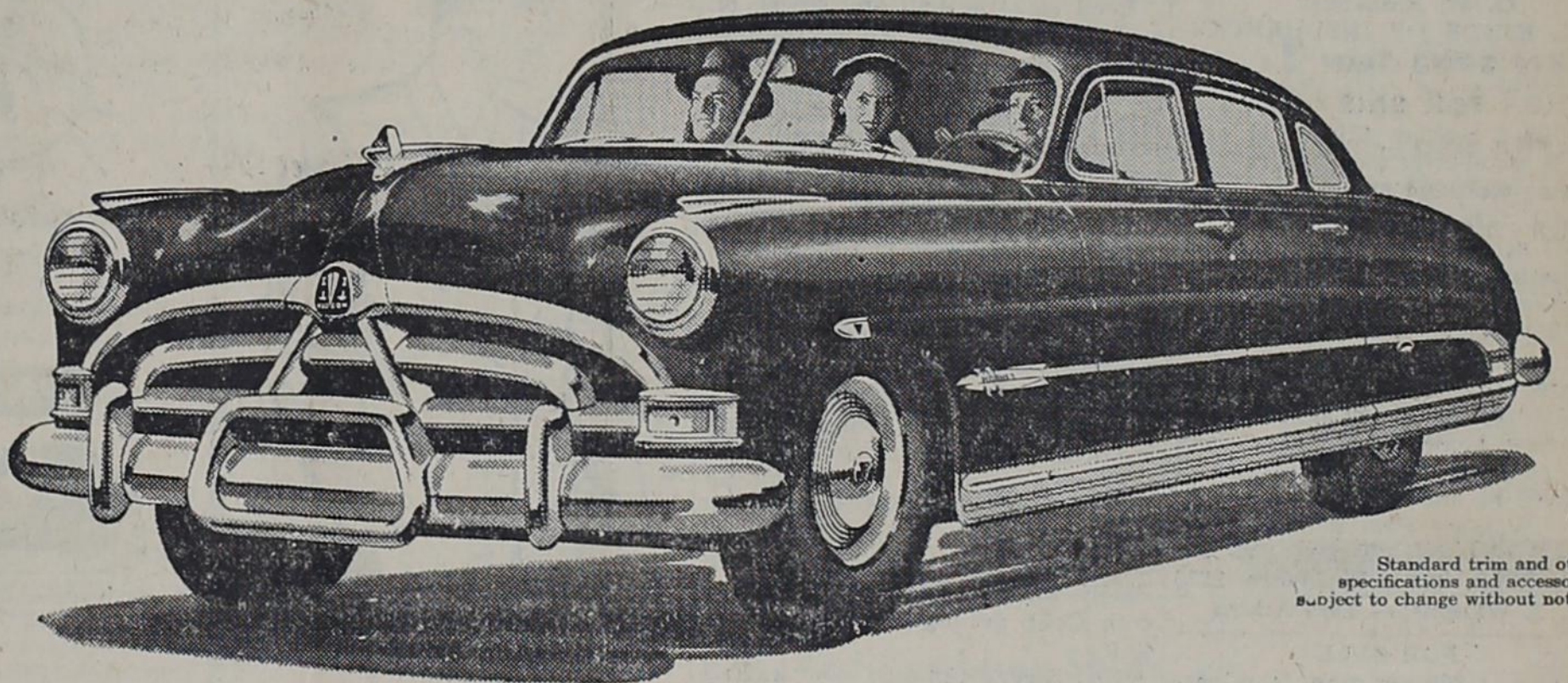

However, comparison of the games played between the two county teams and Petersburg, a conference rival, indicate that the Steers will have to be up and going if they are to stay abreast of Bovina this weekend.

Coach Tommy Hestand on Tuesday reported that one change might be expected for Farwell, with Dial expected to be back in the lineup at left end, although this was not definite.

Tentatively, the lineup includes Coburn and Dial at the end positions; Herington and Pipkin at tackle; Pense and Vaughn as guards; Dollar over the ball; and Norton, Roney, Barber and Jordan in the backfield.

Lovelace, Parmer County sheriff, to the buried pocketbook.

"Old Josh", who founded the little town of progress in 1908 and was known to have dealt considerably in real estate, was believed to have had considerable cash money. But his alleged slayers never located the money, although they admitted returning to the old man's shack and searching the premises. However, on Oct. 31, Morris Hicks and Clyde Henry, appointed by Robt. C. Howell, administrator of the Blocher estate, succeeded in uncovering fruit jars that contained in excess of \$9,000, buried in the ground floor of the old man's cabin.

Previously, Sheriff Freeman had found a fruit jar in the shack that contained \$190 in currency.

Blocher's alleged slayers were taken to Austin last month, where they were subjected to a lie-detect or test. Officers have not revealed the results of this test.

## Hallowe'en Prank Is Costly To Feeders

Whether it was a Hallowe'en prank or a malicious act on the part of unknown parties, the results have been the same to Triplett & Pringle, cattle feeders of Bovina.

Bob Pringle, manager of the firm, admitted that he had no way of determining the exact loss, but said that it would amount to "thousands of dollars."

On Hallowe'en night, between the hours of mid-night and 5 o'clock a. m., unknown parties entered the stock feeding pens and proceeded to open the gates that connected 16 feeding pens, where 1600 head of cattle were in the process of being finished out for prime beef animals.

All cattle were thrown together without regard to their development as finished animals, with the result that most of the animals were "thrown off their feed" and the consequent heavy shrinkage of the entire herd.

Pringle estimated that the shrinkage amounted to not less than \$3,000, in addition to expense of sorting

ing the stock out and returning them to their proper pens, which required three days to accomplish. "Then we don't know whether we have sorted them properly or not," Pringle said, explaining that no identification marks were kept on the stock.

Pens containing 3400 head of calves and young animals were not molested, Pringle said.

Graham is a member of the board of The General Department of United Church Men; executive director of the National Laymen's Fellowship of the Congregational Christian Churches, and as to profession, an attorney. He is to address a community-wide men's meeting at 3 p. m., at the Congregational Church, to which all men are cordially invited with a special invitation to men of all brotherhoods and other church groups.

His subject is to be, "What Men Can Do Together." There will be special music by a male quartette, the Congregational orchestra, and general singing preceding the talk.

Graham's experience in business, law, government service, management and teaching lie back of his energetic lay leadership. He is a member of the United States Supreme Court Bar, the United States Court of Appeals in Washington, D. C. and the courts of his home state of Kentucky, and city attorney in his home town of Pembroke, in addition to serving as vice president of the People's Bank.

Government work of 13 years has included a special confidential assignment in Puerto Rico during World War II. He also held posts in the department of commerce and the office of censorship.

In 1948, Graham visited Europe and Great Britain, conferring with laymen in twelve different countries. He was the first lay worker from America to visit the vocational training centers for Christian laymen in Europe. While in Italy he had an audience with Pope Pius XII and conferences with the "Waldensian" (Italian Protestant) leaders.

As executive director of the Congregational Christian Laymen's Fellowship, he goes from coast to coast addressing men's gatherings.

In addition to addressing the community gathering for men, Graham will meet with the Congregational Churchmen following the community meeting; will be the speaker at the 11 o'clock worship at the Congregational church and will be a special guest at the church family night to be held at 7:30 that evening.

## CONSERVATION NEWS

By BILL KENNEDY

Dr. M. F. Green of Muleshoe is a new cooperater with the Parmer county S.C.D. His farm is located 4½ miles northeast of Farwell. Dr. Green is interested in improved methods of water application. Parmer SCD technicians were called on to plan out row guiders, ditch links and to locate three irrigation wells. Points to be considered in the design of any irrigation system are:

1. What volume of water can be made available?
2. How will water be delivered to areas to be irrigated?
3. How fast will the soil take water?
4. How much water will the soil hold?
5. What depth of soil can be removed in needed land preparation?
6. What crops are to be grown?
7. What type and size of equipment will be used in irrigation farming?
8. What are the economic returns expected?
9. Is there proper provisions for removal of excess rainfall?

### PLANS IRRIGATE PASTURE

Ten miles north of Muleshoe Floyd Templar has a quarter section of irrigated land. Templar wants to put in six acres of irrigated pasture next spring. He does not prefer to bench level for this pasture unless there is danger of scouring. The districts limitation on running water straight up and down the hill is 5 tenths of one foot per 100 feet. This applies to most soil types.

A lot of Parmer county people are missing a lot of fun if they have not seen the dog races which take place just north of Templar's place. The next races will be Sunday November 11 according to Templar.

Rabbits are trapped and turned loose for bait on the dog tracks, if the dogs are not fast enough the rabbit gets home safely by running into a wire cage.

It is a 30 minutes drive from Friona on the Friona-Muleshoe Highway.

### 362 LAKES IN COUNTY

Parmer county has 362 lakes, Deaf Smith county only 368, and Castro County, 716. This is by actual count from aerial photographs. This information was called for by the Soil conservation survey supervisor in Lubbock. It will probably be used in research toward underground water recharge. 33,000 acres in the three counties are unfit for cultivation because of the lakes—10,000 of these are Parmer County.

### CLOVER DOES WELL

A Castro county farmer runs 40 cows and 40 calves on 17 acres of Madrid clover for 44 days. Madrid clover will do as well in Parmer County.

## Increased Service To Disabled War Vets Planned By Auxiliary

Welfare of disabled war veterans will continue to be a major interest of the American Legion Auxiliary during the coming year, Mrs. Howard Looney, Rehabilitation Chairman of John T. Wilkerson Unit of the Auxiliary, predicted today as the Auxiliary went forward with enrollment of members for 1952.

Three wars within the last 35 years have given the United States the largest number of disabled veterans in its history, Mrs. Looney pointed out, as she described the expanding program of the Auxiliary for their welfare and rehabilitation. She said:

"Already many of the wounded, sick and injured of the Korean War have been discharged from service and have taken their places in the ranks of the war disabled alongside of disabled veterans of the two World Wars. It now would be possible for a grandfather, his son and grandson, each a veteran of a different war, to occupy beds side by side in a Veterans Hospital. War demands a heavy human price which must be paid in bitter installments of suffering and hardship dragging through long years after the shooting is ended.

"To lighten the burden for those fated to pay this price, and for their wives, widows and children, is one of the great purposes of the American Legion Auxiliary. Our trained volunteer workers serve regularly

in the veterans hospitals, bringing comfort, cheer and aid to the patients. Our members go into the homes of veterans with aid for families left in need by a veteran's disability or death.

"With the number of the disabled increasing, we have need for more members to give their support to this work. I hope every eligible woman will come into the Auxiliary now and help us increase our service to those who have given health and strength for the defense of America."

The Auxiliary will sell poppies November 10th.

Practice games have been slated for the locals as a prelude to the opening of the conference season in the near future.



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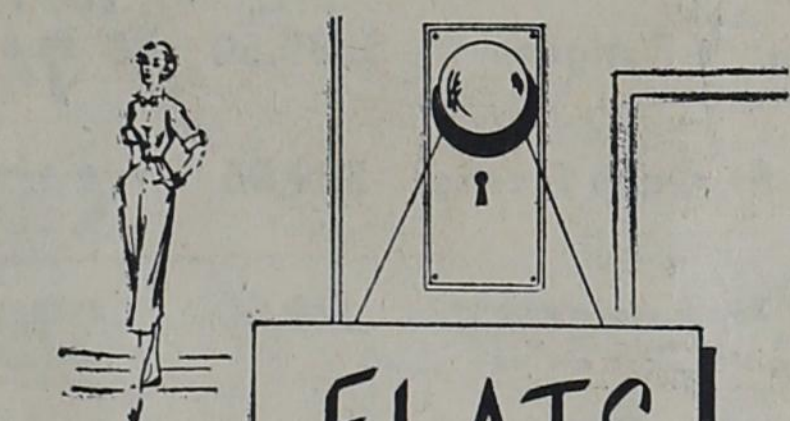
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**Hallowe'en Party
