Mayor-elect M. C. Roberts of Texico, has projected a rather amazing idea that might have far-reaching possibilities. Certainly, his ideas are worth considering.

He comes forth with a proposal to build a swimming pool in the Twin Cities, which, in his opinion, could be erected with little or no cost to the public.

Briefly, here are his ideas: Get the grounds donated by the school system; have a county road machine do the excavation work; Roberts' trucks would haul the sand and cement in the amount of \$500 worth free; get warped lumber donated for the concrete forms, to be used later for dressing rooms; get the water donated by the Waterworks Co.; let the life guard also act as the custodian, who would receive all the bathing fees as his salary.

Sounds fantastic, but it might have possibilities. I pass it along to the public for something to think about in serving a long-felt need for the community.

T. E. Johnson in the Amarillo Globe-Times, wants to know why the automobile insurance rates are going up now since automobile insurance in Texas is mandatory?

Johnson points out that coverage on Amarillo cars is to be hiked from \$31 to \$40, and in the rural areas the jump is from \$26 to \$35.

For the information of our contemporary columnist, I might say that the reason for the hike is simply because the big insurance companies that are chartered to do business in Texas, have the people by the "ying-yang" (whatever that is) and we are helpless to do anything about it.

When you sum it all up, Johnson, it simply boils down to this: the insurance companies name and control the Insurance Commission of the State of Texas. Whatever the insurance boys want, they merely pass the word on to their controlled Commission—and, presto, they get it, while the public—you and I—pay the bills!

It's just that simple. How long we will tolerate such robbery is something else. Until an aroused public demands that the members of the Insurance Commission be elected officials, there is little or no relief in sight.

America has prospered on the idea of free enterprise, and it has always been an accepted policy of reduced prices on increased volume. But not so with the insurance companies. When they get a strangle hold on the public, such as mandatory automobile insurance, the rates are immediately hiked.

Small wonder that insurance companies are able to build sky-scrapper buildings in all the major cities of Texas. They do it with the rates that are gouged from the insured. Easy!

Otis Huggins was in again today making an earnest plea for residents of Texico-Farwell to clean up the vacant lots about their premises. He said the fire trucks had made four runs during the past few days to put out grass fires that were threatening property.

Speaking in behalf of the department, Huggins said that the boys would rather make a dozen "dry runs" than to fight one fire, but it is unfair for these volunteer men to make these runs when it could all be avoided by a little cooperation on the part of the residents.

Some people seem to treat water as though it were as plentiful as the air that whips across these plains in the spring of the year. It is no uncommon sight to see water pouring down the bar ditches from irrigation pumps that have been left unattended. Better save the water, boys.

Ran across an old-time Texico resident while attending the press meeting in Amarillo last week. He was J. Claude Wells, now editor of the Memphis Democrat.

Wells was employed as a printer on the old Texico Trumpet back in 1907-08. He said that he and his wife lived out a homestead 7 miles northwest of Texico. He rode back and forth to work on a bicycle. That is, when he didn't walk and push his bike in the face of a high wind.

Wells recalled a time when the editor of the paper wrote up a certain Texico citizen, blaming him for his wife's death by suicide. The enraged citizen didn't like the write-up and came into the printing office—six shooters an all—to have a settlement with Editor Loomis.

## Street Paving May Begin Next Week

Actual work on paving some sixteen blocks of streets in Farwell is scheduled to get under way next week, in the opinion of Mrs. Owen Jones, representative of the E. & E. Contracting Co., who was here the first of the week.

Mrs. Jones said that the equipment and crew was scheduled to be moved here early next week and would start work on the five-block loop in the south part of town, where weather conditions stopped operations early in March.

With the exception of five property owners all the contracts have been signed up and turned in on the Third Street project, Mrs. Jones said, adding that she felt confident that "these can be worked out."

Paving of Second Street began to move into the questionable category this week when it was revealed that some dozen property owners along that street were withholding their contracts, and Mrs. Jones was becoming somewhat skeptical about closing up this particular street.

She pointed out that as a general rule where a paving program is once launched, it usually influences hold-outs to turn in their contracts, and she was hopeful that such might be the case here.

## Shower Planned For Displaced Family

Plans were announced early this week by the members of the St. John's Lutheran Church at Lariat for a general shower honoring the Albert Hannemann family, to be held at the church Sunday afternoon, on April 20th.

The Hannemann family arrived in Parmer County recently from Germany and are now located on the Melvin Treider farm near Lazbuddy. They are displaced refugees from their former home in Roumania, where they were caught under the heel of the German invasion, to be followed by the Russian oppression.

When they arrived in America they had a very limited list of personal belongings in addition to the clothes they wore. The object of the shower is to provide the family with clothing and household items to help them get a new start in life.

Persons having useable items which are not in use are asked to gather them up and present them to this unfortunate family, consisting of father and mother, one girl, age 18; a boy, 15; and a little girl, 10.

Members of the Lariat Church are preparing a course of light refreshments to be served during the afternoon to the visitors.

# Texico Voting Questioned

## Junior Stock Show This Week, Friona

Cash awards will be given winning entries in the Parmer County Junior Livestock show slated in Friona this weekend, at the fair grounds. The award money of about \$400 was derived by donation.

Though original plans called for elimination of cash prizes, it was decided by Friona Chamber of Commerce last week, that the prizes would stimulate interest.

Livestock will be moved into the barns Thursday evening or before 9 o'clock Friday morning. Stanley Anderson of Texas Technological College of Lubbock will supervise the judging. Calves will be judged in competition and will be graded as good, choice and fine.

Four divisions include the fat calf group, beef cattle, dairy cattle and swine. According to a report here today, show officials expect 200 entries in the fat calf division; 40 beef cattle; 40 dairy cattle; and 100 swine.

FFA boys and 4-H club members will show animals the two days. A sale will conclude events at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Bill Fliptin and Dick Doshier are auctioneers.

Farm Bureau directors have baled hay for bedding for the cattle.

## Schools Of County Name New Trustees

Voters in the four consolidated school districts of Parmer County went to the polls last Saturday and elected school trustees who will serve for the next two years.

Along with the local school trustees in each district, two county trustees were named. Matt Jesko was re-elected as county trustee of Precinct 4 by the voters of Lazbuddy, and W. M. Sherley was returned to office as county trustee at-large.

In Farwell, the voters elected three without opposition. They were A. W. Gober, L. L. Norton and Partin Austin. Voting in the Farwell box was unusually heavy considering the fact that no office was being contested. Sherley lead the ticket with 130 ballots for county trustee at-large.

With two to be elected at Bovina, Arnold Hromas and Amos Steelman were chosen over Eddie Redden and Clarence Weems. Sherley also led the ticket in that box.

From a field of seven candidates, the voters of Lazbuddy selected Archie Tarter, Frank Hinkston and Virgil Teague to fill the three vacancies. Matt Jesko was re-elected precinct trustee and Sherley as trustee at-large.

C. V. Potts, George Jones and Roy Clements were named by the Friona voters to fill the three vacancies there. Sherley also lead the ticket with 131 ballots for trustee at-large in that box.

## Wheat Making Last Desperate Stand In Struggle to Survive

Dryland wheat fields over this section entered the critical stage during the past week in efforts to survive the onslaughts of continued dry weather and an unusual spring season of high winds and blowing sand.

Insects are also reported to be contributing their efforts in destroying the wheat that has withstood the dry, windy weather up to this point.

The combination of dry weather, high winds, warm weather and insects have lessened the prospects for the struggling fields; and only an abundance of moisture in the immediate future can save the crop, farmers reported early this week.

"There is still a good deal of good wheat left," one farmer said this week, "but it can't last long with this kind of weather," he added as he braced himself to stand up in a high wind on a local street corner.

## Kefauver Leads In Lazbuddy Straw Vote

In a straw vote conducted at Lazbuddy in connection with the school trustee election last Saturday, Senator Kefauver, (Democrat) led the field of nine candidates.

The Oklahoma Lane youth crashed into the rear of a Canadian semi as it pulled onto the highway after checking in at the port. Christian said he had decelerated approaching the station, but failed to see the truck until too late.

Deep cuts and bruises were received on the face of Christian and his nose was broken. His car, a 1951 Ford Victoria, reportedly was demolished.

Provisions were made the first of the week to have him transferred to Amarillo for treatment, but it was not known whether he had been moved.

## Garbage Ordinance Is Considered By Council

The Texico town council held a lengthy meeting Monday night considering a new ordinance that would regulate garbage disposal in the city.

The new ordinance was drawn recently by an attorney and submitted to the council for approval. Town Clerk Freeman said that the council members discussed the provisions of the ordinance at length and finally concluded to give it further study before acting on its adoption.

The only other business to come up was the payment of current bills Freeman said.

## Fire Boys Extinguish Grass Fire Monday

Texico-Farwell fire department was called out Monday at noon to extinguish a grass fire south of the Farwell water tower, it has been reported.

Fire sirens, which were ordered to be installed on the automobiles of department members, have arrived and are already on some of the autos.

The results of the Texico municipal election, held on Tuesday of last week, is being questioned which could mean that both the bond issue and the selection of new officials could be thrown into a "cocked hat."

District Judge E. T. Hensley Jr., has ordered a recount of the ballots and has designated Mae Hood, district clerk, to represent the court. The ballot boxes are to be opened in the District Court in Clovis this (Thursday) morning at 10 o'clock.

In ordering a recount of the ballots, Judge Hensley stated, "A recount and canvass is to be made in open court. The ballot boxes will be opened and the ballots retallied and examined as to whether they are in accordance with the law. The county clerk will be present and have the official registration certificates as they existed on the date of delivery to the (Texico) town clerk."

Texico officials, whose duty it was to have the election returns canvassed after the polls had closed, reported that there were 167 votes cast, and that 60 of the voters who participated in the election were not properly registered as required by law.

All candidates, election officials and the canvassing board have been notified of the recount and are invited to be present. Members of the canvassing board will be required to be present.

Mayor Orval Francis said in a statement today that his only interest in the recount was to see that there had been no irregularities in the voting. "We most certainly are not contending that there were any fraudulent intentions on the part of the voters nor the election judges; it was, in my opinion, just a case of not being familiar with the election laws," he stated.

Mayor-elect M. C. Roberts issued a statement in which he said he was glad a recount had been ordered. "It is certainly my sincere desire to have any question of the validity of the election cleared up. I am ready to assume duties of the office to which I have, in my opinion, been elected."

Mrs. Ruby Stone, registrar for the Texico precinct, issued a statement in which she says that the ballots were all cast by legally qualified voters, explaining that she had not had time to forward the registration certificates to the county clerk in Clovis.

In last Tuesday's election, the voters elected M. C. Roberts as mayor, and named Joe Helton as a new member of the city council. They also approved a \$12,000 bond issue for water extensions and improvements. If irregularities are found to exist in the voting, it could mean that both elections would be declared invalid.

## 720 Acre Farm Goes Under Auction Sale

Col. Dick Doshier will have charge of the sale, clerks will be Vernon Symcox and Orval Francis. Terms will be offered on the farm with all other items going for cash.

To every Christian, Easter has a very significant meaning and is celebrated accordingly. There are many customs observed on Easter by people all over the world. Many feel that these customs overshadow the real meaning of Easter and yet, most customs only serve to uphold the reverence and joy of the Resurrection.

Easter Sunday occurs on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the vernal equinox and may fall on any date between March 22 and April 25.

Appropriately marked by the blossoming forth of life anew in the spring, the holy festival of Easter is observed in many branches of the Christian Church to commemorate Christ's resurrection.

Many customs, beautiful and quaint, have been and still are observed in churches and in homes as an expression of joy because Christ arose from the dead. Churches have special services for this closing of the forty days of Lent and flowers of white, especially Easter lilies, decorate the altars as a sign of purity and light.

The sending of Easter eggs is a custom thought to have originated with the Persians, the eggs being symbols of new life. Coloring them red typifies the blood of redemption; others have no special significance.

Another custom, the presence of the Easter "rabbit" in the festivities, may be traced to the old belief that rabbits lay eggs on Easter eve. This superstition is thought by some authorities to be of Teutonic origin, and is the basis of many stories for children.

The name Easter comes from the Anglo-Saxon word, Eostre, a goddess of light or spring whose festival was celebrated in April. The name of the festival in Greek, French, Italian, and other languages, is taken from the Hebrew word, pesach, meaning passover and as used by the first Christians, Easter is considered a continuation of the feast of the Passover, at which the paschal lamb, the symbol of Christ, was sacrificed.

The flower most commonly used as the Easter Lily is a large trumpet lily native to Japan.

Thus, as long as the true meaning of Easter is embedded in the hearts and souls of Christians, Easter will remain a living symbol of Christ's resurrection.

**Livesay Trial Site No Decision Yet On**

District Judge E. A. Bills, who was here Tuesday, said that he had not as yet determined where he would transfer the Thomas C. Livesay case for trial.

Livesay is now in the Swisher County jail at Tulia awaiting trial for his part in the fatal beating of Joshua Blocher, 85-year-old Progress recluse, last August.

His case was moved to Tulia on a change of venue, ordered by Judge Bills, after his trial in Farwell resulted in a mistrial when only three jurors were accepted from a 120-man special venire. In Tulia a mistrial also resulted when a jury could not be obtained.

Judge Bills said Tuesday that no other attempt would be made to get a jury in the 64th Judicial District, "where the case has received so much publicity." He went on to state that he would likely transfer the hearing "down off the caprock," mentioning Anson, Albany, Graham and Seymour as possible sites.

**LETTERS from Our Readers**

(Editor's Note: Major David Sides, a Parmer County boy, is asking aid from his friends, so he may help a group of poverty stricken people in the Philippines, where he is stationed. Printed below is a portion of a letter, written to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Sides, of Bovina.)  
Did I tell you about the Balugas, a group of negritos who live right outside the fence around the Clark Air Force Base? The Balugas are the aboriginnes of the Philippines. They are most friendly to the American soldiers here at Clark. They are the people selected to guide our soldiers when we were re-taking the Philippines.

The Negritos are small people. The men and women are about 4 feet tall and probably do not weigh over 75 lbs. Their babies are the tiniest things you ever saw. Everyone in the Philippines gives these little negritos a wide berth. The Huks avoid them religiously, knowing that if they tangle with the negritos, its too bad for the Huk arrows.

I've been out to see these little negritos a couple of times. They are a poverty-stricken lot of people. They are much in need of clothing and medical supplies especially. Since they have always been our friends, I cannot understand why we do not help them more. I've written Gladys asking her to send me all the old clothes the kids have outgrown. I hope she is able to send me a few parcels.

If you know of any families around Bovina whose children have outgrown their clothing and want to be sure it is put to a good mis-

sionary cause, if you will have them mailed, parcel post or express it to me, I'll appreciate it very much.

## Friona Chiefs Squeeze Past Opponents To Win District Track Crown Here Saturday

Friona's hard-running Chiefs showed surprising speed and strength here Saturday as they pulled away from the pursuing host Steers for a 10-B district crown. Friona and Farwell were closely matched throughout the meet, and the championship was not decided until the last event.

The Chiefs edged the Steers 59-57. Vega and Adrian trailed with 13 each. Neither Bovina nor Lazbuddy registered points.

In a sense, the district track crown is only a token championship. Friona proved the Chiefs were the best team in the district, but the team as a whole will not represent this district at the regional meet in Eubuck two weeks hence.

Every contestant who placed first or second in any event (excepting relay teams) will have a berth at the regional meet, regardless of the school he represents. Only first place relay teams will go to Lubbock.

Records fell like rain in Saturday's meet. The Chiefs shattered four themselves. Friona's mile relay team (Robbins, Robinson, Jordan, Dixon) ran a 3:49.3 to beat the old 3:54.3 considerably. Rex Pool's 4:54.6 in the mile was an afternoon highlight.

Other Chief record-breakers: pole vault—Ben Jordan, 9'7" (O.R. 9'6"); High Jump—Darrell Robbins, 5'6" (O.R. 5'3 1/2"); low hurdles—Doyce Barnett, 21.6 (first event).

New marks set by Farwell: shot—Vernon Willard, 38 3/4" (O.R. 35'9"); Mile run—Rex Pool, 4:54.6 (O.R. 5.4) discuss—Vernon Willard, 112'4 1/2" (O.R. 106'7").

Juniors Beat Friona  
The Yearlings moved along into an expected championship, beating

out Friona 24-20. Vega, the only other team really in the race, got 14 points, and Lazbuddy captured 2. Farwell also won in the grade school events, with 29 points to better Bovina's 21. Friona won 15 and Vega 1.
