Down through Stonewall, Jones, Shackelford, Eastland, Erath, and Bosque Countries, it is evident that they have had some good rains during recent weeks, and residents there tell us things are looking better for them than at any other time within the past four years.

Like the High Plains, where we only have one crop now growing (our winter wheat), the only thing putting on any green down there is oats. But they are certainly "feeling their oats," in that part vise farm and home developcall when we ever have seen fields more verdantly green than those.

According to reports in the papers, a lot of moisture has come to deep Central and Southern Texas. If you will recall, those are the areas where the present drouth got started. It seems to be breaking up where it first got a toehold, and is moving north and northwestward. Maybe real natural moisture will even reach US before too long. Keep up those hopes!

There appears to be little hope that the price situation for grain sorghums grown in 1955 will be improved. Yet, from indications taken all around us, very heavy investments in machinery and improvements are being made in this part of the country, which all boils down to this: More people than ever before now have an abiding faith in the future of this part of the High Plains.



Starting at the Wrong End With Tax Cutting Ideas

There may be more than one way to skin a cat, but Democrats who propose a personal income tax cut of \$20-regardless of what the individual's income or situation may be-are starting at the wrong end of the thing, in our notion.

You say we aren't in favor of cutting taxes? Outside of a few treasury department officials, we don't know of a person in this country who wouldn't like to see his cut to Uncle whittled down a little bit.

Still, we feel that some of our legislators have everything backwards. The idea, it seems to us, should be to first reduce expenditures-then go ahead with cutting taxes if conditions warrant.

Take yourself for instance. If you'd like to have more money to spend on yourself, does it make sense to plunge in and poop off a lot of money on fun, and then have to borrow in order to pay the family's obligations: house payments, groceries, utilities, and so forth?

Of course not. The same principle exactly is involved in our government. If we want more for ourselves, it is foolish to take it when it then becomes necessary for the government to borrow in order to pay its obligations.

President Eisenhower is proposing huge expenditures in several fields. Aid to schools, the highway system, and a dozen other things total an additional \$30 billion. If Americans want these federal "extras" they'll have to pay for them, and it can't be done by cutting taxes. If we would make up our mind that we could get along with less associate speed with progress, and progress, to all federal assistance in this and that field, however, then we might very well see the day when a rising national income would make the reduction of taxes a reality.

Americans Don't Seem To Be Afraid of Progress

An American, it would seem, will do almost anything in the name of progress-including risking his neck daily in a different dozen ways. Perhaps it is the urge to get ahead of his fellow man that drives him to do it. And since all Americans seem to be forever in a hurry, perhaps it is the hope of saving a few minutes or hours of precious time that is responsible for his interest in what-

Spread bread with butter and cut each slice into about six strips. Arrange a layer in bottom of an 8 x 12 oiled baking dish. Cut meat (or break fish) into bite size pieces. Put a layer of meat, chopped onion, grated cheese and corn over bread. Repeat layers. Beat eggs and add salt and milk. Pour over mixture in baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) about 30 to 35 minutes. Serve at once. Six servings.

Tropical Shortcake: Mix a pound can of drained fruit cocktail with a diced banana and a cup of sweetened whipped cream. Cut a can of date nut bread into 12 thin slices. For each serving put fruit mixture between two slices and heaped on top. Six servings.

"To accomplish this we are going to have to expand production from, roughly, the acreage that is now under cultivation. It is true that we may bring some new land into agricultural use through irrigation and reclamation each year, but even though these gains may be appreciable at times, they are offset by the farm acreage which is lost as the population of the cities overflows into newer suburban developments. . .

There is the heart of our philosophy. What other part of the country will be in a better position to supply these new demands than we will be?

When agricultural surpluses have finally worked themselves out, as it appears they will within a few years, we believe we will then enter into a new and opportunityfilled era for the farmers of the High Plains.

As some of our grizzled oldtimers tell us: "This is the greatest 'Just wait 'til next year' country there ever was!"


