We are now in our country's Bicentennial period and are witnessing a number of patriotic displays and pageants. Many of us probably will be called upon to participate in patriotic programs where our National Flag will be displayed. Most of us are woefully ignorant of the proper procedures for displaying the national emblem and also for rendering the proper courtesies to the flag.

The following information on this subject is taken from an official publication of the United States Marine Corps. We suggest you save this information for future reference.

HOW TO DISPLAY THE FLAG

Laws have been written to govern the use of the flag and to insure a proper respect for the Stars and Stripes. Custom has decreed certain other observances in regard to its use.

All the Services have precise regulations regarding the display of the National flag, which may vary somewhat from the general rules below.

Respect your flag and render it the courtesies to which it is entitled by observing the following rules:

1. The National flag should be raised and lowered by hand. Do not raise the flag while it is furled. Unfurl, then hoist quickly to the top of the staff. Lower it slowly and with dignity. Place no objects on or over the flag. A speaker's table is sometimes covered with the flag. This practice should be avoided.

2. When displayed in the chancel or on a platform in a church, the flag should be placed on a staff at the clergyman's right; other flags at his left. If displayed in the body of the church, the flag should be at the congregation's right as they face the clergyman.

3. When displayed over the middle of the street, the flag should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street, or to the east in a north and south street.

4. When displayed with another flag from crossed staffs, the flag of the United States of America should be on the right (the flag's own right) and its staff should be in front of the staff of the other flag.

5. When it is to be flown at half-mast, the flag should be hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-mast position; but before lowering the flag for the day it should again be raised to the peak. By half-mast is meant hauling down the flag to one-half the distance between the top and the bottom of the staff. On Memorial Day display at half-mast until noon only; then hoist to the top of staff.

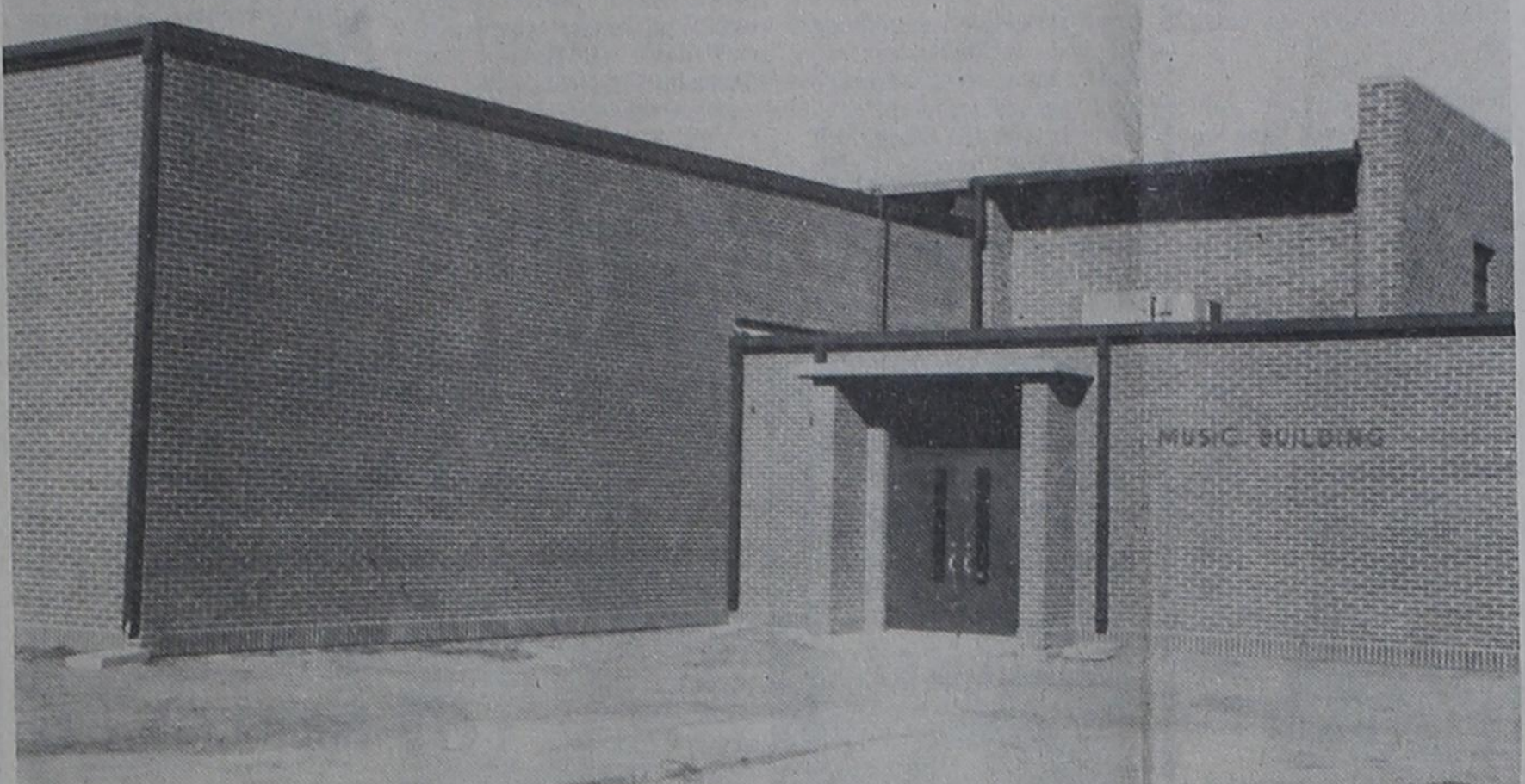
6. When flags of states or cities or pennants of societies are flown on the same halyard with the flag of the United States of America, the latter should always be at the peak. When flown from adjacent staffs the Stars and Stripes should be hoisted first and lowered last.

7. When the flag is suspended over a sidewalk from a rope extending from house to pole at the edge of the sidewalk, the flag should be hoisted out from the building, toward the pole, union first.

8. When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at any angle from the window sill, balcony, or front of a building, the union of the flag should go to peak of the staff (unless the flag is to be displayed at half-mast).

9. When the flag is used to cover a casket, it should be so placed that the union is at the head and over the left shoulder. The flag should not be lowered into the grave or allowed to touch the ground.

10. When the flag is displayed in a manner other than by being flown from a staff, it should be displayed flat, whether indoors or out. When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window it should be displayed in the same way, that is, with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street. When festoons, rosettes or drapings are desired, bunting of blue, white and red should

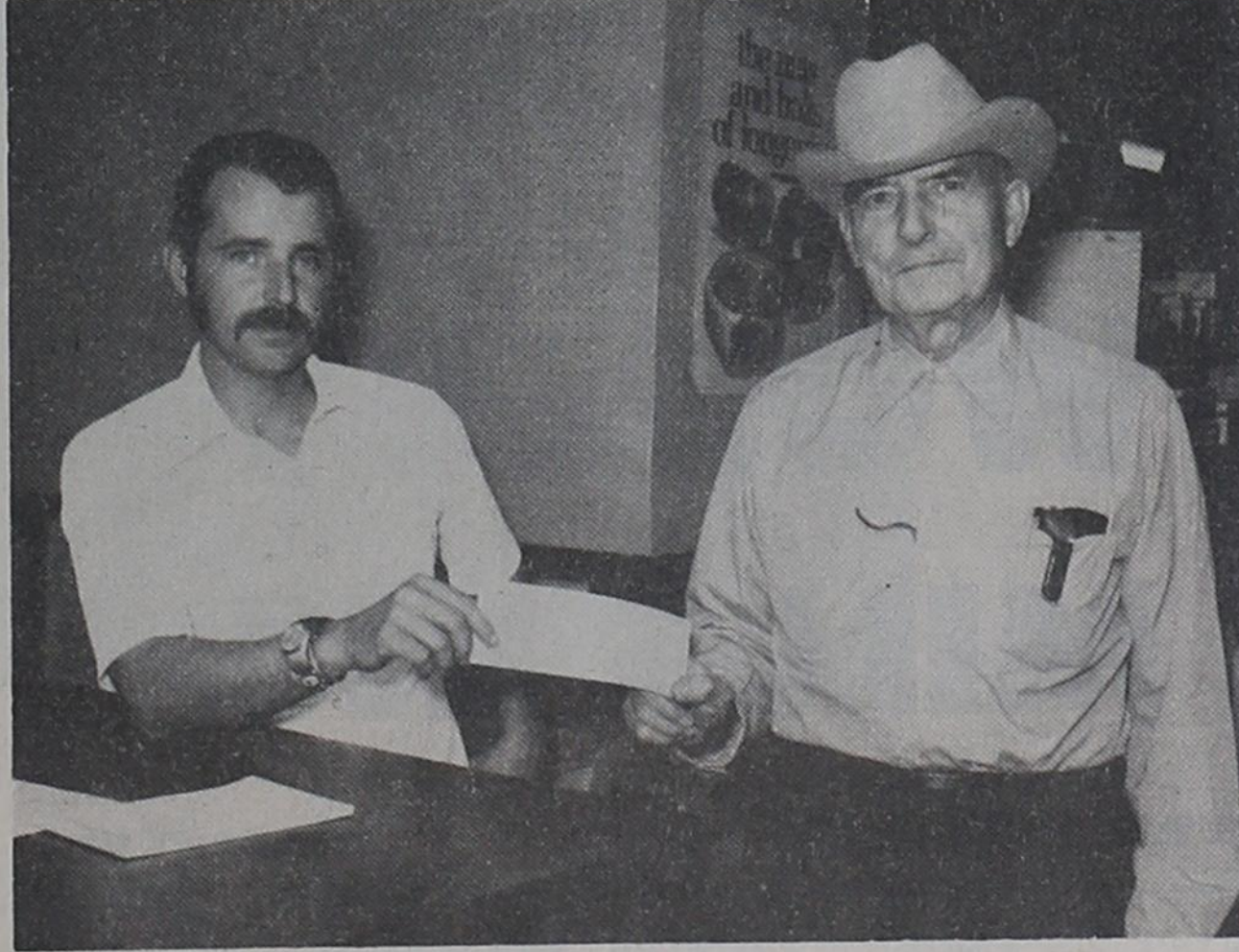

September 27 & 28**

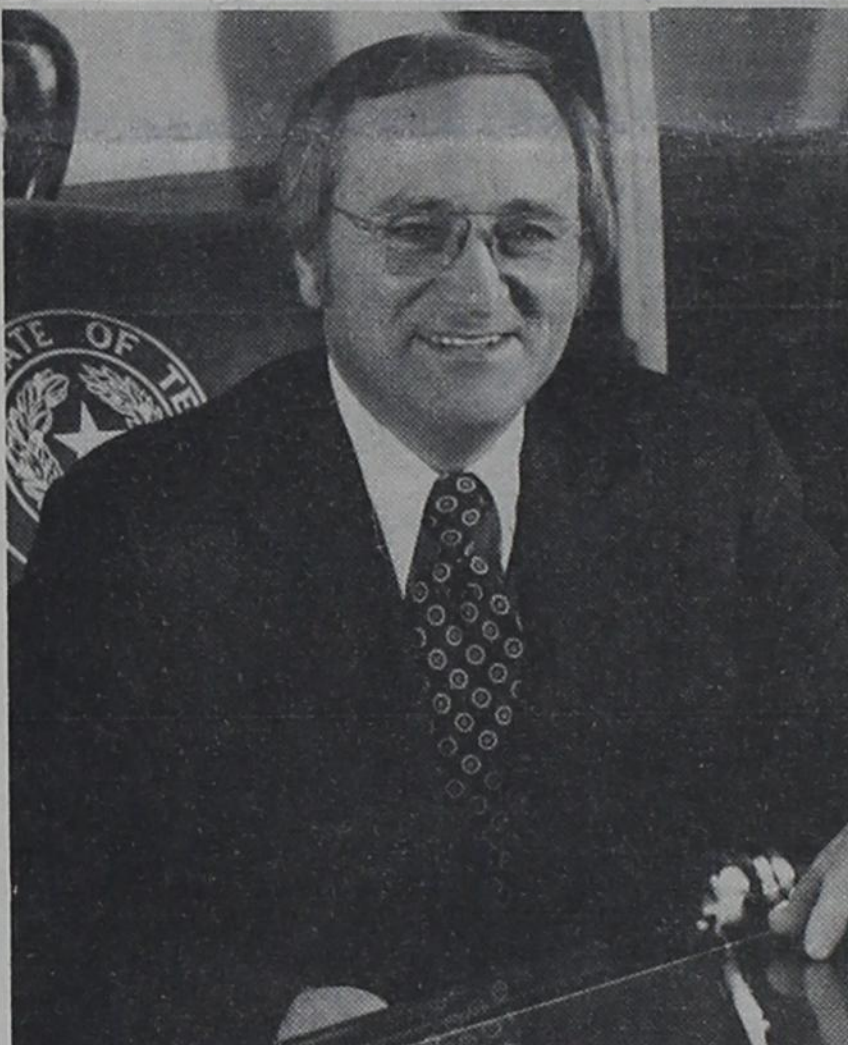

The Roughnecks "drilled" the Steers for a 26-6 loss. Mike Goettsch scored the only touchdown for the Farwell Steers. During the first quarter he scored on the second play from the line of scrimmage on a 62-yard run. Points after touchdown failed and Farwell led, 6-0.

Sundown's scoring came in

The Steers were penalized for a total of 40 yards where Sundown was penalized for 45 yards.

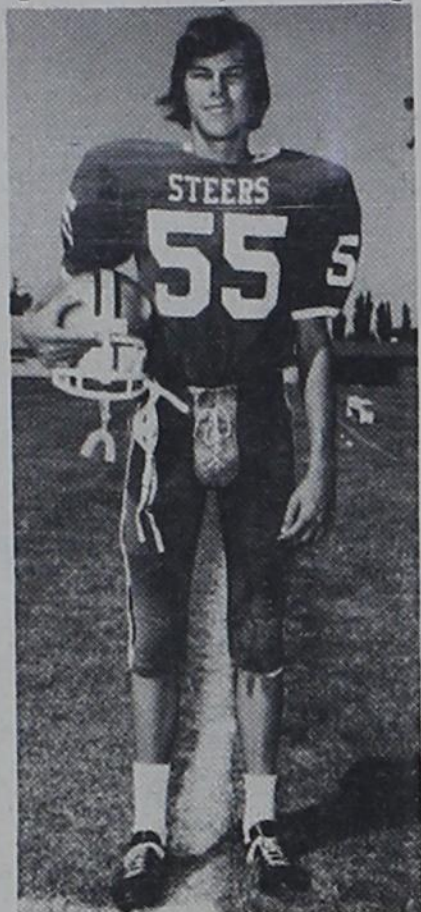
Cantu played a fine game for us," stated Jennings. "Also, Richard Yruegas did a good job."

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Wolverines Shutout Longhorns For Win

The Lazbuddie Longhorns came to Texico last Friday only to exchange the ball back and forth for almost a whole game until Texico's Chris Eshleman intercepted the ball in the last 35 seconds of the game to give Texico an 8-0 lock on the scoreboard.

The first quarter started with the Longhorns taking the ball on their own 20-yard line. For the most part, the first quarter was a contest of offense. Each team made good yardage but was unable to score. After the kickoff, the Longhorns proceeded to carry the ball nine yards for a third down which put the ball on Texico's 40-yard line.

The ball was then turned over to the Wolverines and Tommy Galvan and Spencer Turner alternated to carry the

ball back down the field. Then quarterback Steve Turner gave Steve Askew the ball to carry through the middle, gaining three yards. THS now alternated from the quarterback carrying, to passes, and back to ground plays with the backs carrying. Texico received a penalty for clipping, which Lazbuddie declined.

The Longhorns took possession of the ball to complete a 12-yard pass only to be stopped by the Wolverines and once again lose possession on Texico's 27-yard line. The Wolverines were also unable to move the ball and at the end of the first quarter the game stood scoreless.

Lazbuddie began the second quarter with a 6-yard loss on a series of plays. Texico's Galvan then gained nine yards in two plays with Steve Turner carrying it over for a first down. The Wolverines were unable to sustain their drive and Lazbuddie regained the ball. Again, the Wolverines regained control when Steve Turner intercepted a pass. Texico gained 17 yards in four plays, followed by a penalty of 15 yards for clipping. Texico then took to the air with two complete passes, one completed pass to Steve Askew for three yards, and another incomplete pass. At half-time the score stood 0-0.

The third quarter began with Texico receiving. The Wolverines mounted a 45-yard drive before being forced to punt. Shortly after getting the ball, Lazbuddie fumbled and Texico's Larry Rolan recovered it. Again, the Wolverines could not sustain a drive. Lazbuddie took to the air and connected a pass to take them past Texico's 30-yard line. Texico made a goal line stand to prevent the Longhorns from scoring. The clock ran out on the third quarter with the score still 0-0.

Fourth quarter action started with Texico's Barry Lindley sacking the Longhorn quarterback for a 10 yard loss. On the next play the Longhorns fumbled and the Wolverines recovered. With a hard drive, Texico gained 55 yards in 10 plays. The Wolverines were close to a touchdown, but the ball was fumbled for a loss of yardage even though the home players regained the ball. With 1:36 seconds remaining in the game, Texico attempted a field goal which was blocked, and Lazbuddie took control of

the ball. Lazbuddie's Ricky Wall ran a lateral to their 20-yard line where he was brought down by Chris Eshleman. With the clock running out, the Longhorns started passing. On the second down, Eshleman inter-

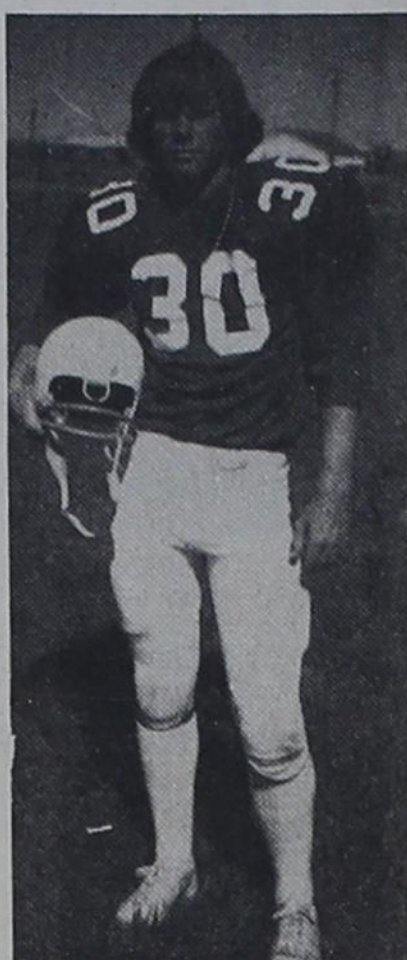

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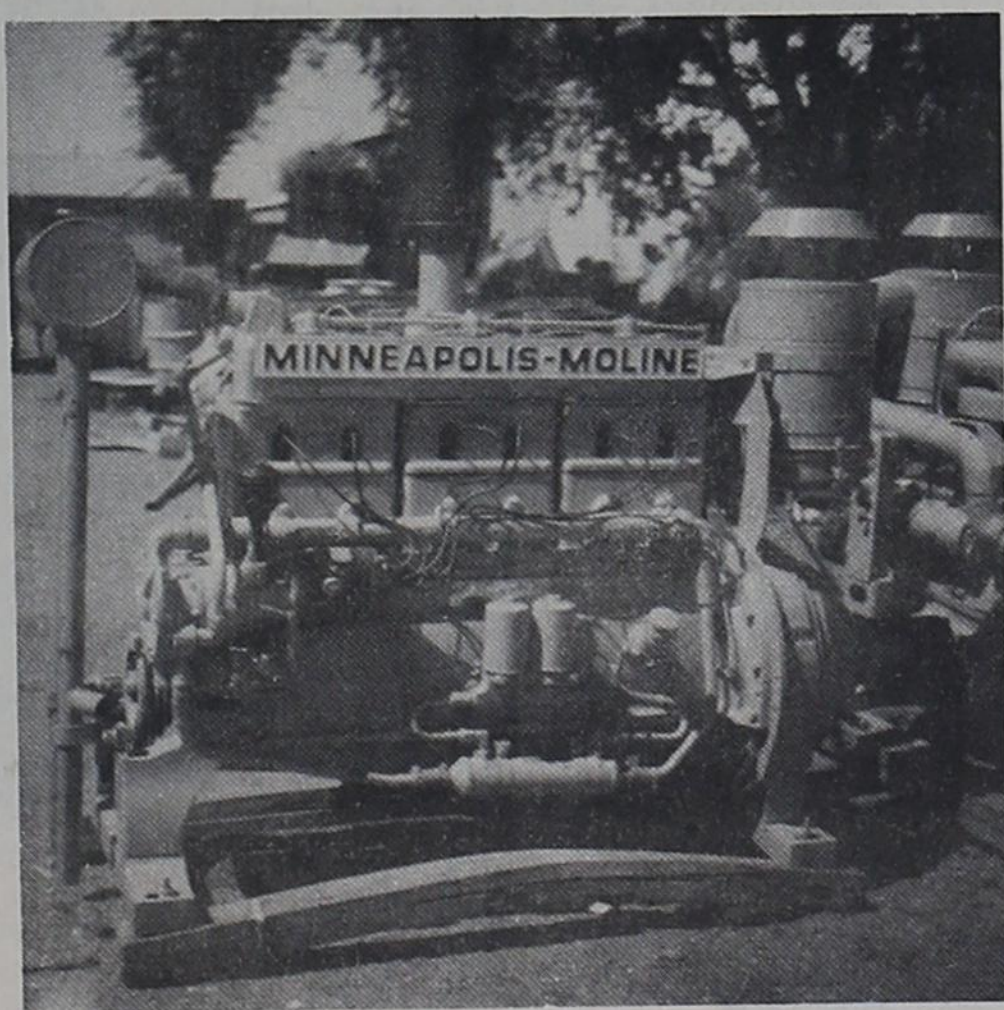
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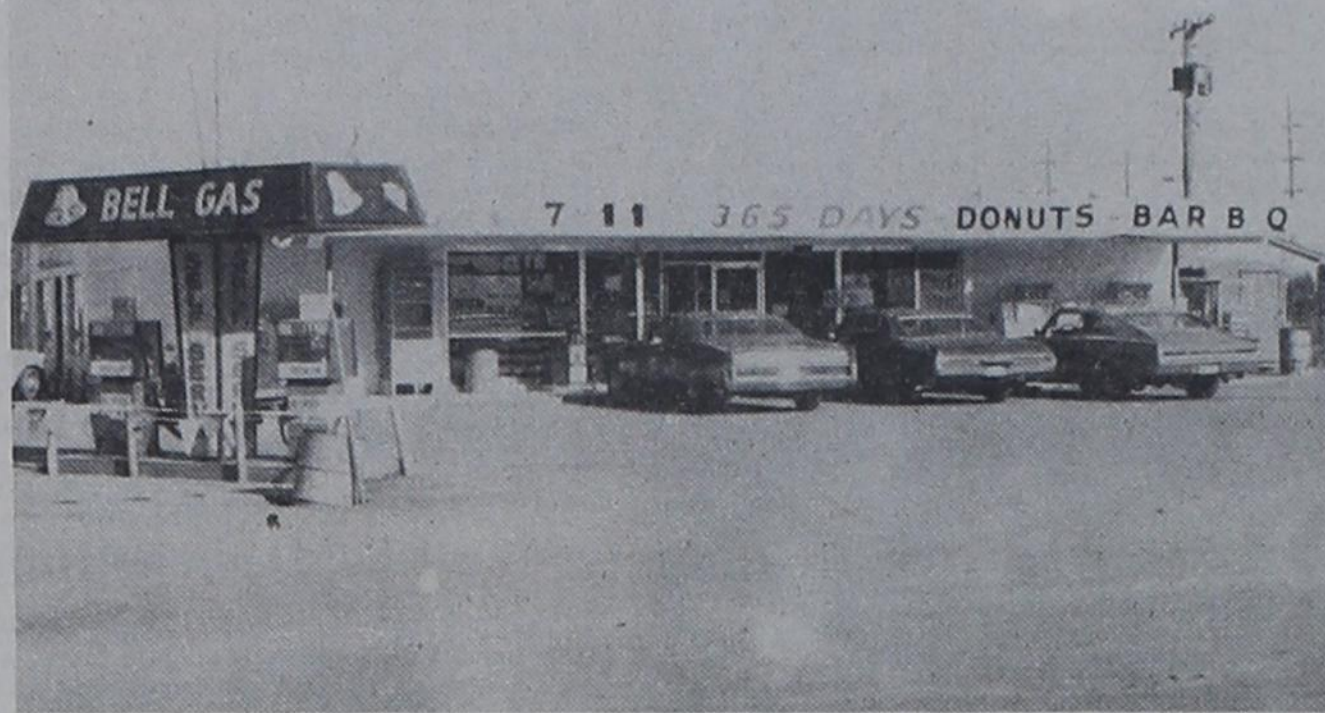
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Billingtons To Mark Fortieth Anniversary

Home Economist To Give Demonstration

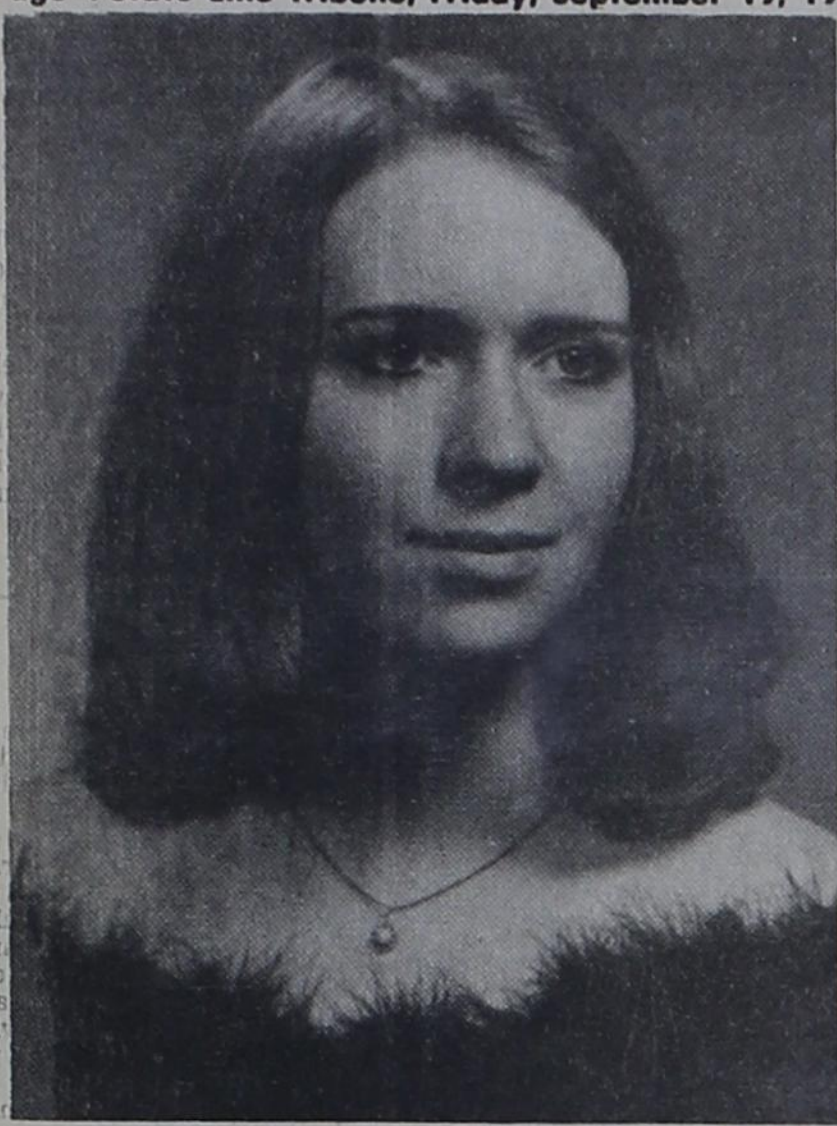
In keeping with a money-saving back-to-school theme, a series of programs will help Texas homemakers discover the secrets of smart meat shopping and imaginative menu planning.

Local authorities immediately contacted Santa Fe officials investigating the matter.

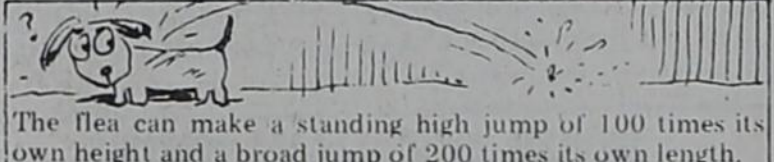

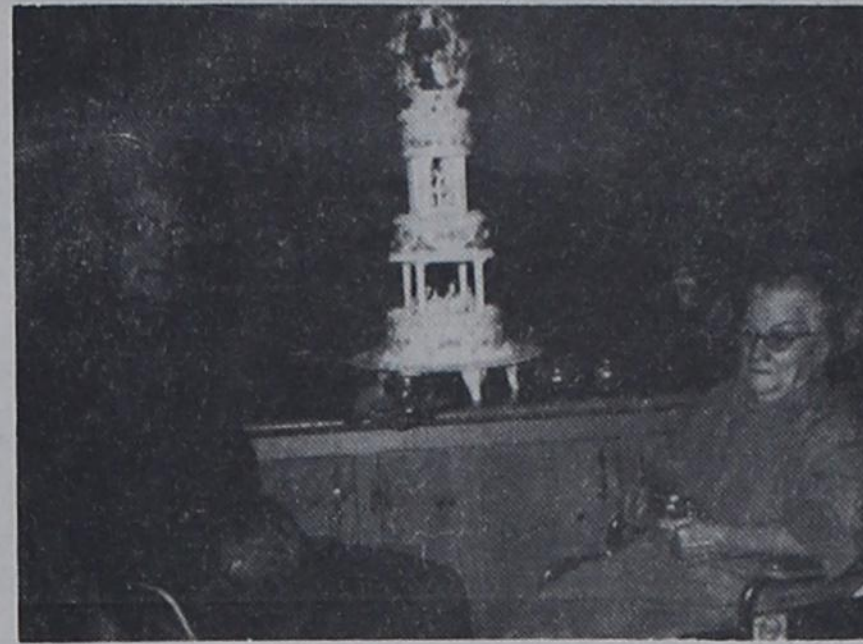

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS (S.J.R. NO. 11) SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:
Provide that the powers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three distinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly attached to either of the others.
Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:
Continue the present structure of the legislature consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of representatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are continued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commission is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in even-numbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of three-fifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.
Article IV, The Executive, is amended to:
Continue the present status of the governor and all other statewide officers, and include the commissioner of agriculture as an executive department officer. The governor is limited to two consecutive terms. The governor is authorized to designate chairmen of state boards, and to remove gubernatorial appointees to state agencies for cause unless the removal is vetoed by the senate. The article mandates the legislature to provide a new governor-elect an appropriation so the governor-elect may organize an office prior to inauguration, and permits the legislature to grant powers of fiscal control to the governor. All governmental agencies, with several exceptions, have a life of not more than ten years unless extended by the legislature, and, at the regular session held in odd-numbered years, the governor shall submit to the legislature a report on the organization and

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efficiency of the executive branch.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the SEPARATION OF POWERS, LEGISLATIVE, AND EXECUTIVE PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective January 1, 1976, except Article III, Section 5, which becomes effective January 1, 1981.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the judiciary provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article V, The Judiciary is amended to:
Establish a unified judicial system consisting of the supreme court, court of appeals, district courts, and circuit courts. Existing county courts and county judges are continued until otherwise provided by law. All judges (except municipal judges), district attorneys and district clerks must be elected by the people. The supreme court and the court of criminal appeals are merged into a single court of last resort, and this supreme court is authorized to provide for efficient administration of the judicial system and to balance case loads. Individual rights for a trial by jury and appeal by the accused are continued. The state is granted the right to appeal in criminal cases in limited circumstances, and the legislature is permitted to establish methods of appeal to the courts from decisions of state agencies.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the JUDICIARY PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the voting and election provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections, is amended to:
Provide for registration and qualifications for voting including voter residency requirements to be established by law. A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years of age and who meets the registration and residence requirements provided by law is a qualified voter unless the person has been convicted of a felony and for that felony is incarcerated, on parole, or on probation, or unless the person is mentally incompetent as determined by a court. Voting by the people in all elections must be by secret ballot, and the legislature shall provide by law for residence, registration, and absentee voting

requirements, for the administration of elections, and for the protection of the electoral process. The general election for state and county officers is to be held in even-numbered years on a date prescribed by law.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the VOTING AND ELECTION PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VII, Education, is amended to:
Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax of ten cents on \$100 valuation is continued as the source of revenue for the fund. The ten cent higher education tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Permanent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the EDUCATION PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the finance provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article VIII, Finance, is amended to:
Provide that state taxes may be levied and collected only by general law and to prohibit any state ad valorem tax on real property or tangible personal property except the ten cent tax provided for in Article VII and a

tax of two cents on the \$100 assessed valuation to provide funds for the State Building Fund. Provides that all real property and tangible personal property must be taxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedication of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The "pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber production. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legislature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, nonprofit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natural history resources. Taxpayers are provided a new method of correcting inequitable tax assessments by paying ad valorem taxes under protest and suing for a refund in a district court. State debt may be authorized by law only if approved by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature and submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the state voting on the question. Public funds and public credit may be used only for public purposes and no public funds or public credit may be used to influence the election of a public officer. The article prohibits a retail sales tax on agricultural machinery, feeds or parts, fertilizer, food, except food sold by restaurants for immediate consumption. An assessment voted by marine food or agricultural producers on their product sales is not a tax if provision is made for the individual producer to receive a refund of the assessment when the producer does not desire to be assessed.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the FINANCE PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976, except Article VIII, Section 2, Subsections (b) and (c), which becomes effective January 1, 1978, and Article VIII, Section 6, Subsection (c), which becomes

effective January 1, 1979.

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the local government provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Government, is amended to:
Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county offices are retained and four year terms of office are provided. The voters of a county may create additional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the LOCAL GOVERNMENT PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective on September 1, 1976.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT
Revising the general provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article X, General Provisions, is amended to:
Provide the basic requirements relating to public officeholders such as the official oath and residency requirements. The provision defining the separate and community property of spouses is retained, and the protection of a homestead from forced sale is continued. The legislature is required to protect certain personal property from forced sale. Current wages for personal service are not subject to garnishment. A private corporation may not be chartered except under general law, and no bank may engage in business in more than one place in this state. The legislature must provide for the regulation of bank holding companies. The present system of local-option elections for the prohibition or sale of alcoholic beverages is continued. The legislature is required to prohibit lotteries and gift enterprises but may permit certain bingo games and raffles. The presently existing provisions for retirement benefits of teachers and other public employees are modified to allow the state to con-

tribute more than 10%. A policy that the quality of the environment of the State of Texas is to be protected is established, and the legislature is required to implement and enforce this policy. No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years, unless the removal of water is sufficiently replaced to the point of removal from outside the state or is on a temporary, interim basis. The seaward beaches of the Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged lands belonging to the state are held by the state in perpetual trust for the people, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest, the rate under the contract may not exceed six percent a year. Discrimination against handicapped persons is prohibited, and a goal of the state is established to provide every resident access to adequate, comprehensive health care.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment revising the GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION."
If adopted by the voters, will become effective September 1, 1976.

ACCEPTED

In Ephesians 1:6 the Apostle Paul sings a doxology, as it were, "to the praise of the glory of God's grace, wherein He hath made us accepted in the Beloved" (Eph. 1:6).

In the story of the Prodigal Son it is touching to see the Father accept his wayward son back to his bosom — and so generously! He does not merely admit him back into his home; he clothes him with his best robe, puts a ring on his hand, shoes on his feet and kills for him the fattened calf so that they call all to "eat and be merry" in celebration of his return.

But the prodigal was after all the Father's son, whereas Paul bids us "Gentiles in the flesh" to remember that originally we were "without Christ...aliens from the commonwealth of Israel...strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world" (Eph. 2:12).

Hence it is even more touching to contemplate God's gracious acceptance of us who were not sons but "aliens" and "enemies" (Col. 1:21).

The word "accepted" in the above passage actually comes from the word "grace" (Gr. karis) with which the verse begins: "...His grace, wherein He hath engaged us in the Beloved One."

Thus God looks upon us now with delight; He delights to favor and bless the believer because He sees Him in Christ, His beloved Son.

This passage reminds us how God once broke through the heavens to declare: "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" (Matt. 3:17). And now He is delighted with us and blesses us with "all spiritual blessings in the heavenlies" because we are "in Christ," the "Beloved Son". Not that we have attained to this position. Far from it, for "HE hath MADE us accepted"... HE hath engaged us in the Beloved.

What is an annuity? How does it apply to insurance?

Literally, an annuity means an amount payable at regular intervals. Annuities and life insurance have functions which are directly opposite. Life insurance protects the beneficiaries while the annuity provides income to the insured. An annuity is a guarantee between a life insurance company and an individual, using assigned rates and mortality tables, whereby the company agrees to pay a specified income to the annuitant. Effectively, there is an annuity built into every life insurance policy... with settlement options in which you may take the cash value of the policy at time of retirement as an annuity, receiving a monthly income for life.

ed. If it is displayed on such occasions, do not allow the flag to fall to the ground, but let it be carried aloft to form a feature of the ceremony.

Take every precaution to prevent the flag from becoming soiled. It should not be allowed to touch the ground or floor, nor to brush against objects.

The flag should not be dipped by any person or thing, with one exception: Navy vessels, upon receiving a salute of this type from a vessel registered by a nation formally recognized by the United States, must return the compliment.

When carried, the flag should always be aloft and free - never flat or horizontal.

Never use the flag as drapery of any sort whatsoever. Bunting of blue, white, and red - arranged with the blue above, the white in the middle, and the red below - should be used for such purposes of decoration as covering a speaker's desk or draping the front of a platform.

Do not use the flag as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything. Never place upon the flag, or attach to it, any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or drawing of any nature.

No other flag may be flown above the Stars and Stripes, except: (1) the United Nations flag at U.N. Headquarters; (2) the church pennant, a dark blue cross on a white background, during church services conducted by naval chaplains at sea.

9. When carried in a procession with another flag or flags, the Stars and Stripes should be either on the marching right, or when there is a line of other flags, in front of the center of that line.

10. When a number of flags of states or cities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs with our National flag, the latter should be at the center and at the highest point of the group.

11. When the flags of two or more nations are displayed they should be flown from separate staffs at the same height, and the flags should be of approximately equal size. International usage forbids the display of the flag of one nation above that of another nation in time of peace.

The flag should never be displayed with the union down except as a signal of dire distress.

Do not use the flag as a portion of a costume or athletic uniform. Do not embroider it upon cushions or handkerchiefs nor print it on paper napkins or boxes.

A federal law provides that a trademark cannot be registered which consists of, or comprises among other things, "the flag, coat-of-arms or other insignia of the United States, or any simulation thereof."

When the flag is used in unveiling a statue or monument, it should not serve as a covering of the object to be unveiled.

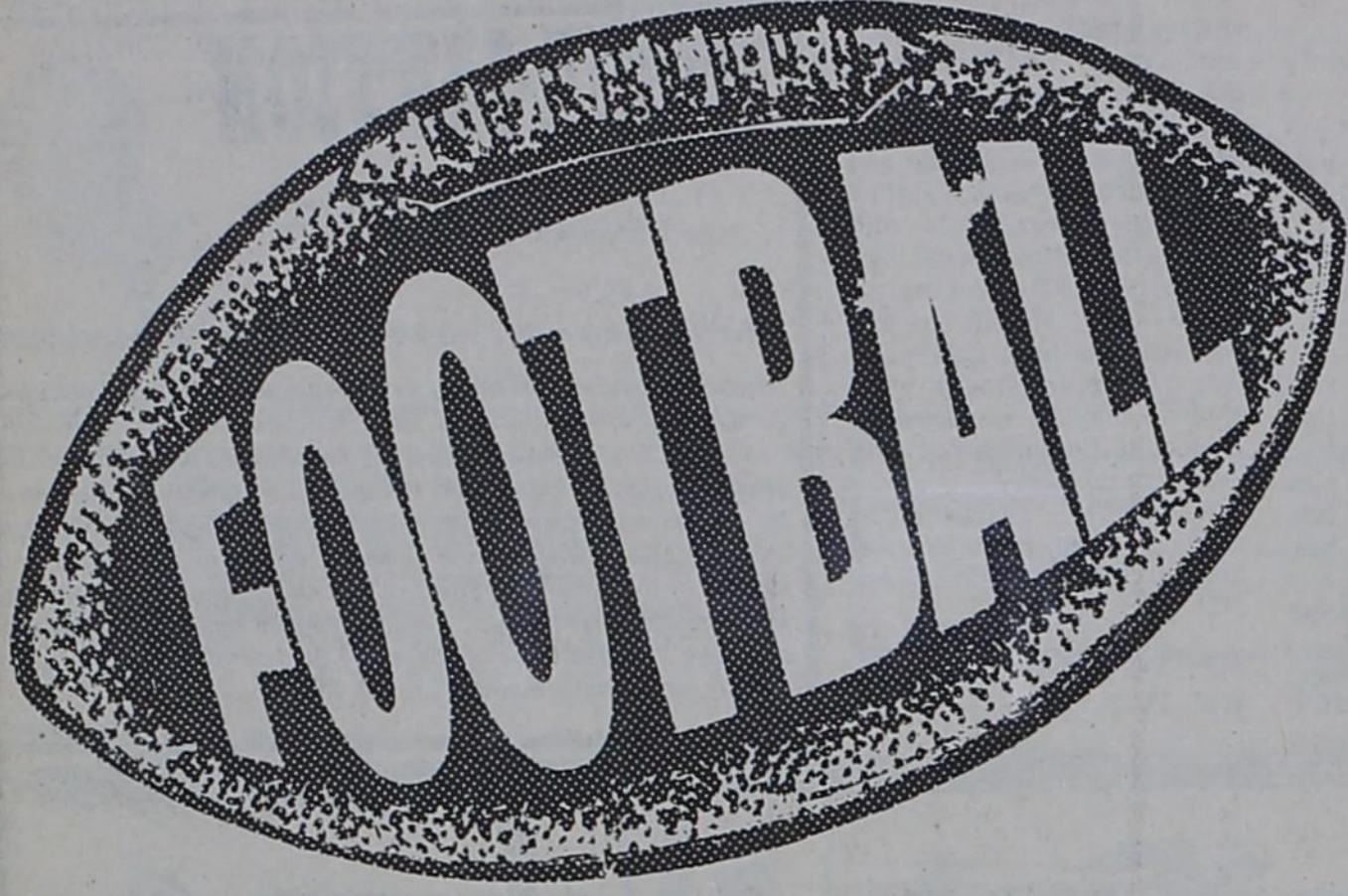
