
Automotive oils comprise 54 per cent of the sales of all lubricating oils and greases in the U. S.

The Christian has had a song put in his heart and praise upon his lips, as he joins the goodly company of the redeemed. For he becomes a member of a society of redeemers, and that is toil that keeps a man singing.

NOT rest from toil then is our high lot, for life is not worth the candle if there is no good work to be done; but rest of soul, joy in the heart, refreshment of spirit, becoming true yokefellows with the divine Friend and Lord.
