Graduation Activities Begin Here on Sunday

Graduation activities in Texico-Farwell get underway here this Sunday, May 3rd, and will continue through the middle of the month, a checkup of the calendar reveals.

Texico seniors are first on the list, slating baccalaureate services at the Methodist church on Sunday evening at 8 p.m., and then following up with their commencement exercises on Thursday evening, May 7, at 8 o'clock, at the school auditorium.

Slipping in between senior events will be the grade graduation exercises, on Wednesday, May 6th, at 8 o'clock.

Across the line, Farwell plans baccalaureate for Sunday, May 10, at the school, beginning at 8:30; commencement will be Friday, May 15.

Ground Is Broken For New Church

Groundbreaking for the first unit of the Farwell Baptist church plant came at the site south of the local courthouse on Monday morning of this week, with workmen rapidly cutting the ditches into which the fcundation for the 40x90 foot building will be poured.

Spokesmen for the congregation reported Tuesday afternoon that no contract for the work had been let, adding that donated labor is being supervised by Charlie Hromas and Bill Garrett, who also have liberty of hiring whatever He's Got The secialist labor may be required.

The structure is to be a twostory frame affair, with brick veneer, with the ground floor being used for an auditorium until a sanctuary is built, while the upper story will be blocked off into some 18 or 20 classrooms. Officials added that they did not have a drawing to display of the unit as yet, explaining that Engineer Dewey Horton, of Amarino, is finishing up such work this week.

Cost of the unit is expected to run around \$30,000, it is estimated. Members pointed out that by "doing a good bit of our own work and being free to shop around for materials needed, we feel that we can build a satisfactory unit for that amount."

With weather conditions permitting, work on the initial unit of the plant is expected to be concluded within some ninety days, officials said.

Mrs. Leggit will confer with the Extension Service at College Station, officials indicated, to see about funds available to complete salary tinancial arrangements.
