A general meeting will be called April 27 and the directors will submit their project to the other Chamber members and the city.

Huggins succeeds O. C. Sikes as head of the group. Davis, past vice president, has had charge at meetings for several months, however, due to Sikes' health.

Engineer Will Inspect Draw Dam Site

Hopes rose anew for the proposed dam across Running Water Draw north of Clovis again this week, with the announcement from T. J. McFarland, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, that he will accompany Engineer Bill Broadhurst here "in the near future" to survey the site.

A hydraulic engineer has been sought by members of the Curry County GPA and other interested parties, since it is only necessary

for the location to be pronounced "feasible" by some qualified authority before \$175,000 in state funds will be released for the project.

In a telephone conversation with The Tribune, Tuesday, McFarland indicated that he really had his hands full at the present time working on the Canadian River dam project. He insisted, however, that the interests of this part of the country would not be overlooked, and it was his hope that he would be able to come here soon to look

over the proposed dam site.

The dam, which would back up a 600 surface acre lake if constructed according to present plans, would be located about three miles east of the Clovis-Grady highway where it crosses Running Water draw some eight miles north of Clovis.

All individual comments received by The Tribune have been in favor of the proposal. Most of these comments have come from residents of Parmer County. Opinion has been asked from such

groups as the Farm Bureau, but a stand on the issue from them cannot be expected until the matter has time to be thrashed out in meetings says Bruce Perry, president.

Support from Texas residents has been asked by the GPA, and that group has sought to indicate the advantages of having a lake where it is proposed.

They have hoped to get the support of Texas farmers who are depending more and more on underground water for irrigation.

Seepage from the lake would replenish the supply for wells to the southeast of the reservoir, they believe.

In addition, it is pointed out that it is now necessary to drive around 100 miles to find the recreation afforded by a lake on public property. The site north of Clovis is ideal in all respects, they believe.

An accumulation of public opinion on the subject will be printed in next week's issue of The Tribune.

C-C Sends Second Letter to Benson

Surprised but gratified with the interest that was displayed following a letter written to Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson March 3 concerning the bankrupt Henderson Grain Company of Farwell, several Farwell businessmen agreed to another communication this week, and expressed the hope that continued effort on their part will hasten the opening of the elevator for business this summer.

Dear Sir:
We wish to acknowledge the prompt answer from your office following our letter of March 3 relative to the Henderson Grain Company bankruptcy. We did not anticipate the interest that has been shown in this matter, and we find we have even more support in our position than we had originally estimated.

We should like to repeat that our main interest here is still the re-opening of this business on a basis that will be beneficial to our community. We understand that facilities at the bankrupt firm have been approved for storage of 5,000 tons of cottonseed meal. The trustee in charge of the operation of the company has reported that \$3,500.00 a month will be taken in and added to the estate from this storage.

While it is gratifying for us to observe that the idle storage buildings of the firm are at last to be put to use, we are still firmly of the opinion that what the community needs is to have this business back in operation as a normal stabilizer of the grain market, buying, selling, providing competition in business, and offering the service of a 1,000,000 bushel storage capacity to farmers of this area.

The trustee has stated through the newspapers that he doesn't intend to go into the "hazardous" business of buying and selling grain. We cannot help but wonder why all the grain men in this area

don't get rid of all the hazards connected with the grain business. We are fairly certain that any man who could make \$40,000.00 a year simply by storing commodities for the government would do so, and stay on vacation most of the time.

After the community had supported the Henderson firm for a number of years, it strikes us as being a shame that the management should turn its back so completely on the friends of the company. No employee of the management is a member of the Chamber of Commerce. No one takes the most minor part in civic activities. The trustee resides in Lubbock, 100 miles away from the business, and his assistant lives in Clovis, 10 miles away from the business, commuting to and from the business. To our knowledge, no local merchants are patronized by these employees.

While the business was under private ownership, the insurance premiums came to around \$20,000 a year. Although we have not inquired, it is our assumption that the business is still insured. Where are these policies written? Not in Farwell.

Mr. Benson, is it not possible for something to be done to correct these abuses? We businessmen of Farwell have been patient for two years now, hoping that the new administration and the traditional American idea of square-dealing would bring about the re-establishment of our biggest local business.

Community Work Day Is Planned For Farwell Park

Mrs. Roberts emphasized that while the Woman's Club is the sponsoring organization, members need the help of all citizens to further the park project. "We hope that the different organizations of the community will assist in obtaining equipment for the park by taking it as a project and adding needed items," the president added.

Purpose of the work is to have a "beautiful park that everyone will enjoy all summer".

Drive-in Opened in Farwell Thursday

Farwell's first drive-in cafe was put into service Thursday morning as the City Cafe added drive-in facilities, Esther McCloud, operator, reports.

Plans for the drive-in addition to the cafe have been in the making for some time. A parking area was recently leveled and given a caliche topping on the east side of the building, providing adequate car space for patrons.

The window through which cars will handle the outside business was put in on Wednesday, with workmen knocking a hole in the outside wall and finishing up the service entrance.

Derrick Slates Sale For Tuesday, 7th

Edgar M. Derrick announces that he has sold his farm, one mile west of Bovina and is moving to California, with the result that an auction sale will be conducted at the place on Tuesday, April 7th, beginning at noon.

The livestock consignment is the largest of the sale, with around 30 animals being listed, including 15 purebred yearling Angus heifers. All heifers have been vaccinated for T. B. and Bang's disease and the cows have been tested.

A good lot of equipment and various miscellaneous items make up the remainder of the auction which will be cried by Col. Dick Doshier, with Orval Francis as clerk.

Despite recent blasting sandstorms, wheat fields in Parmer County and the near-by portions of Curry and Bailey counties are looking exceptionally good, according to reports.

This is particularly true of the area which was formerly known as Fairfield, south of Texico, and on down to old Locust Grove and West Camp. Farmers in this particular section report that during the early March showers they received .70 of an inch of moisture one week with .80 coming the following week, to give the crop a big boost.

Sam Randol says of his south-of-town field that the "wheat is tall enough to hide a jack rabbit" and Olen Schleuter, on the north side of Texico, adds that he is still grazing his acres.

M. C. Roberts, Texico feed and seed dealer, reported the first of the week that most dry-land acreage he had seen was looking good, having made a fast growth with the advent of warm weather.

W. S. Menefee, of the Lazbuddy community, was in on Wednesday and reported that fields in his vicinity were well covered, while Nelson C. Smith, Farwell rural mail carrier who goes out toward Oklahoma Lane, brought in the same favorable report.

The terrific sandstorm which whipped the far northern edge of the county a week ago Friday is reported to have done some damage around Rhea and north of Friona, but fields in this immediate area went unharmed.

Irrigated spots, of which there are several in the county, are generally reported to be ahead of the dry-land fields, and such wheat is now in the softening stage.

County Agent Joe Jones estimated that not more than 70,000 acres were sown to wheat in Parmer this past fall, with many irrigated farms going the cotton and grain sorghum route.

Heavy snows which were received over the area last November and December, followed by lighter falls since the first of the year and a fairly general rain during March, have boosted the prospects for the coming harvest, is the general consensus of opinion.

Paving Program Still Looks Good

Indications that the residential paving program in Texico will be a reality this summer are mounting this week, according to LeRoy Faville, Chamber of Commerce president, who said on Tuesday that growing interest in the project is being seen.

Two meetings have been sponsored by the CC recently, at which contractors have been invited to speak about costs of such a program to local residents. "It seems likely that the 32-foot street with curb and gutter will be the one approved," Faville added.

Plans now are to get started on signing up those interested in the project, to see just exactly how the proposed paving will stack up, officials revealed. They added that if a certain percentage of property owners okayed the cost against their property, a paving zone can be declared by the city commission.

"We want to get this part of the work behind us so that if the paving is approved, contracts can be let and the work started," Faville said this week.

School trustees for all districts in Parmer County will be elected on Saturday of this week, April 4th, when the annual elections are held in the various polling places. Deadline for filing names with County Judge A. D. Smith passed last week.

With two vacancies to be filled, seven names are on the ballot at Friona. They include Paul Fortenberry, Clyde Hayes, Dick Rockey, Reve Sneed, Wesley Foster, Bruce Parr and W. S. Crow. Explanation of terms occur for G. Cranfill and Clyde Hayes.

Three names will appear on the ballot for county school trustees: J.L. Shaffer of precinct 1, Friona; Joe Wilson of Precinct 2, Bovina; and H.Y. Overstreet of Precinct 3, Farwell. Hold-overs are Bill Sherry and Matt Jesko.

From Bovina, candidates filing with the county judge are: H. D. Bradshaw, Harry Charles, Walter Verner, C.M. Huggins, Troy Fuller, Elmo Dean, J.D. Stevens and Wendol Christian, with three vacancies to be filled.

The Farwell board nominees are C.C. Christian and Dick Gerles, both up for re-election.

Two vacancies occur on the Lazbuddy board: Clarence Mason, Claude Watkins, J.B. Young Jr. and Conrad Nelson are candidates.

Boys Show Green Thumbs

Not to be outdone by garden and yard enthusiasts who have come down with acute seizures of spring fever during the past few days, the Farwell FFA boys have succumbed to the lure of the soil and are in the throes of great plans on their 20-acre farm on the outskirts of Farwell.

Recently, it was onion planting which occupied the chapter members, with the boys putting in one acre of the odiferous member of the vegetable family.

And this week, Director Robert (Prof) Morton said today, the lads will put in an acre of sweet potatoes. Later, as the season develops, an acre will be devoted to peanuts, a similar amount of tomato plants; blackeyed peas will go into five acres, to be followed by permanent pasture in August; and general garden crops of various kinds will be planted on two acres.

What remains of the farm not under cultivation when all this activity is completed will go into grain sorghums, Morton added.

The boys have high hopes, as is the case with most gardeners, of seeing their crops come to a bountiful harvest during the summer months, and the vegetables will be sold, locally as far as possible. All money derived will go into the chapter fund, which will be devoted to establishment of livestock on the farm.

"We'll water as much and as far as possible," Morton said this week in discussing the garden and sorghum prospects. He added that



the farm boasts an irrigation well, then said with a wry grin, "the pump is about worn out, which will limit what we can do."

Asked about just who would get the job of caring for and harvesting the various crops during the summer, Prof grinned and allowed that the boys who will be first-year ag students next year will probably get the biggest end of the detail. He pointed out that

most of the boys now enrolled in ag are kept busy at various paying jobs during the vacation months, while the younger 'comers' are "a bit too small for that".

Looking toward a small-scale model farm in the future, chapter members plan to get a start on livestock this fall, Morton said. "We'll probably start with hogs, as that doesn't take quite so much initial cash outlay," he added.

Henderson Bankruptcy Still Makes News

Again, we have the matter of the Henderson Grain Company bankruptcy before us. It is a subject which is unfortunately too big to overlook, even though it has dragged on so long that a great

many people are growing tired of hearing of it.

Again this week, this newspaper is publishing a letter from several members of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, who are doing their best to encourage an early re-opening of the big grain firm which means so much to the local economy.

In fairness to those persons who are connected with the present management of the bankrupt business, it should be said that the letter printed in this issue was not as enthusiastically received by the Chamber membership as was the first one. Some well-intentioned businessmen were startled by the reaction which resulted from the March 3 letter, and are wary of "starting any trouble" as they put it.

All well and good, gentlemen. Nobody wants trouble when it may be easily avoided. But the idea of getting this business back into operation is such an important one to the prosperity of this region's economy that we feel inclined to pursue the subject a little further, even though we are well aware that mistakes will be made.

The trustee who is seeing to running the business at the present time called the editor by telephone last week, and spoke with him at some length. He stated that he would like to have an opportunity to sit down and talk over with the editor the situation as it was with the grain company. He indicated that he would stop by the offices of this newspaper last weekend for an informal visit.

We would have been happy to entertain him. As a matter of record, we still are. However, he did not come to see us; he did not even extend to us the customary business courtesy to call and say he would be unable to come (as we would have done if we had been in his shoes). In a story carried in the Lubbock Morning Avalanche March 24, this man is reported to have said that he is in Farwell "at least once or twice a week" to attend to the business. We hope he can find time to come in and chat with us.

Until he does, we have no recourse except to assume that he does not desire to assist us in our effort to get back into operation the largest business this community has ever had.

It asks, among other things relative, for acceptable NEGOTIABLE warehouse receipts to be provided by CCC through licensed warehouses. This resolution was presented in the interest of preventing recurrence of such individual losses as those in the recent Farwell and Sudan area

cases. We like the sound of HB 559, concerning rehabilitation and educational facilities for alcoholics. It places the cost where it belongs: on liquor dealers and drinkers, excluding those who do not choose to sell or drink the products that establish the need for rehabilitation.

Rhea Farm Bureau meets Friday night, April 3, at 8:00. They will enjoy a couple of good pictures, "What Price Freedom?" and "How NOT To Conduct a Meeting". Everyone is welcome and there will be some business and plenty of refreshments.



As was promised last week, the biggest development since we have been supporting the Running Water Draw dam project materialized this week and is duly recorded on the front page—where it should be.

However, this column can be useful, we think, in keeping readers posted on the behind-the-scenes angle. For the over 1000 new homes into which The Tribune went this week, let us bring you up to date:

The Curry County Game Protective Association has long had a plan to dam up the draw. The idea has met favor with the New Mexico legislature, and \$175,000 has been appropriated for the dam. But that appropriation money has "strings" to it.

The funds will not be turned loose until the site is surveyed by a qualified authority, preferably a hydraulic engineer, and pronounced practical. It now appears that the engineer will be available in the near future, and the man is quite likely to be a fellow named Bill Broadhurst.

Bill has long been familiar with water problems peculiar to our area. He has been affiliated with four major oil companies in his private work. Commencing May 1, he will be an employee of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, and will lend his talents toward developing and preserving the vast resources of underground water.

New Rules Listed For Interscholastic League

Shelby Jobs today reports new rulings in the Texas Interscholastic League. Following are the rules as they have been sent to him:

The state executive committee has authorized the League to submit a special referendum to all schools for the purpose of choosing the Football Substitution rule for the 1953 season. Texas high schools will decide whether they adopt the old 1952 liberal substitution rule (sometimes called the free substitution rule) known in most circles as the two platoon system. The NCAA collegiate rule restricts liberal substitution. If adopted, six-man, B, A, AA, AAA and AAAA schools will use it in the fall of 1953. Ballots were mailed out March 26 and must be returned to Austin by April 4.

Member schools will ballot in April on whether to abolish spring training altogether or adopt a limited period.

The old rule of spring training limits schools to 30 days of training.

Question 1. Limiting spring football practice to twenty-one days and permitting fall football practice to begin one week prior to the first Friday in September, provided no games are to be played by the second weekend after the fall training period. (Effective September 1953.)

Question 2. Eliminating spring football training entirely, permitting fall football training to begin the second Monday prior to the first Friday in September, provided no games are played until the third weekend after the beginning of such football practice. (Effective September 1954.)

If either rule is passed, it will not mean that football practice can begin in the fall of 1953 prior to September 1.



License plates sales at four o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the office of Collector Chas. Lovelace totaled 2425, a big increase over the 1952 sales.


"And they're still coming," added Alvena Cox, deputy.
