Fewer, Not More, Subsidies Are What We Really Need

The hue and cry set up at Dalhart last Thursday by a group of hard-hit ranchers from five Southwestern states may snowball into what will amount to just another tentacle on the federal octopus. And whose fault will it be? The taxpayers themselves.

It is difficult to believe that the thinking of any group could so completely reverse itself in a period of less than one year, but that seems to be the case, because over 500 beef producers from Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Colorado have broken tradition for the cattleman and gone looking for a federal handout.

It is a fact that the system under which the cowman today produces beef is unlike that of any other industry. He is forced to purchase his "raw goods" such as feed, equipment, and labor, at prices which are virtually static because they are price-supported. Then, when his product is ready for market, it is sold at whatever happens to be the prevailing notion of the meat-eating public—the world over.

Sometimes this system doesn't really work too badly. The past 15 years, it has worked marvelously well—for the cattleman. The trick was to keep the supply just under demand, thereby guaranteeing a high price.

Speculators in cattle have been remarkably successful in so doing. They might still be were it not for the burned-up ranges in the Southwest which forced beef off to market in droves.

Contrary to what a lot of people believe, the present rock-bottom price cowmen are getting is not the fault of the government. The cattleman produced himself out of lucrative prices—it's as simple as that.

But deciding how to remedy the situation is not so simple. The rebel cattlemen that have formed the United Livestock Producers Association cry out for a price support program. They feel justified in doing this, since, as has been pointed out, everything they must buy is supported in one way or another.

But in the long run, a price support program is not the answer. Price supports do not solve the matter of supply and de-

mand. They only tend to encourage over-production and waste. Price supports will mean CONTROL—and that is about the last thing we ever thought the cowman would admit he wanted.

Rather than seeking subsidies, we think the cattleman should seek to de-subsidize things which they must buy. Of course, this will take some doing.

If the American cattle industry was permitted to buy grain from other countries, instead of only the domestic supply which is pegged at an arbitrarily high price, they would go a long way toward solving their troubles.

There is a faint hope that the Department of Agriculture next year will introduce a brand new price support plan for grains, as well as other commodities.

Under the new plan, farmers would still receive allotments and supports on certain portions of their production, but they would be free to produce as much as they please over and above their allotment on the condition they market it at the prevailing world price.

We have with us, then, the first ray of hope that the economically absurd socialistic method of regulating farm production is going to be changed. In time, we might see the end of all controls.

But not if there is to be eternal agitation from the people for more and more subsidies—more and more control.

We admit, Mr. Cattleman, that every other industry IS subsidized. But, instead of getting on the federal slop trough, this newspaper wishes you would use your present uncomfortable position as an arguing point—the strongest we have ever had—for a return to a sensible farm program.

We are sorry to have seen the hot-headedness exhibited at Dalhart last week, when men who spoke out against controls were booed and hissed at. The gravity of the beef program should not be minimized, but we hate to see it so dramatized. The vice-president of the new ULPA popped off and offered a resolution that Secty. Benson be fired from office.

Cool thinking would have produced a lot more good, even if it wouldn't have been half as exciting. If the new group won't try to throw its weight around, and make some heads roll, it will be able to make some sober, down-to-earth recommendations to the administration, which, believe it or not, is ready to listen.

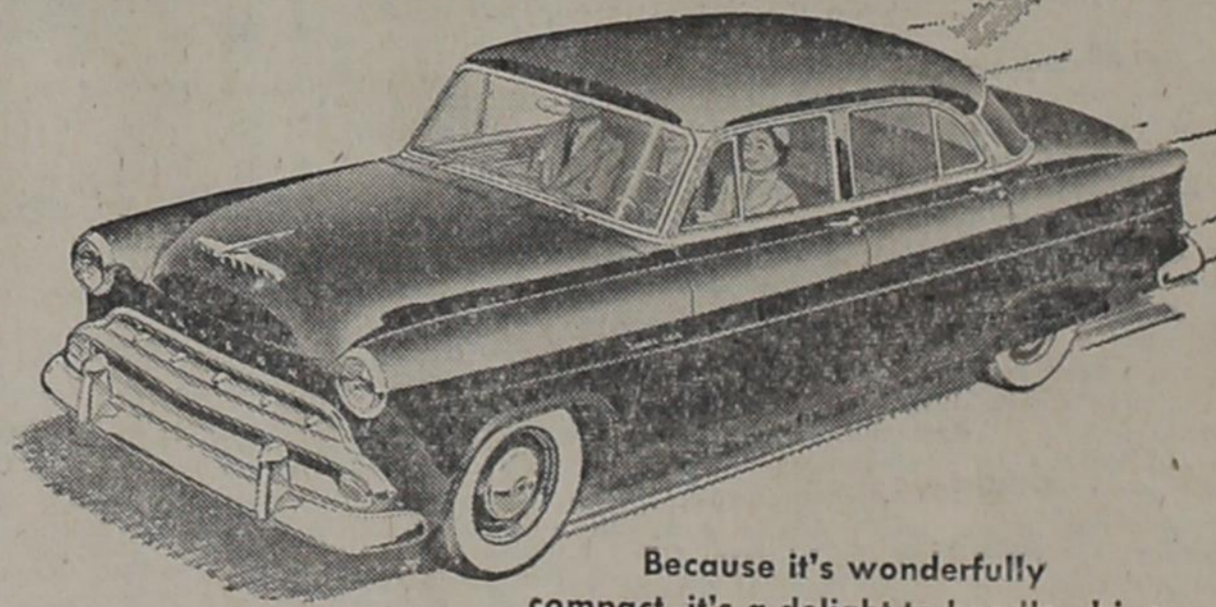

Visit Here from South America; Will Leave For Indonesia Soon

The Benton Grahams contemplate a move from one continent to another with as little fuss and bother as you and I would in moving just across the street. Or, so it seemed when this reporter interviewed the family here Monday.

Mr. and Mrs. Graham and their four daughters of Colombia, South America, are currently visiting in the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. N. Graham of Farwell.

Graham is employed by an oil company, and works on the basis of two years' work with two months' vacation. However, after the vacation is over, he will not return to South America, as he has accepted a job with a company in Indonesia. Work there will be on a three-year basis, with six-months vacation. Graham will make the five-day trip to Sumatra, Indonesia, in September, by plane. The trip for Mrs. Graham and the children, however, will require 38 days by boat, after a visa is received. This process takes about three months, and it will probably be six months before full preparations can be made for the move. The climate is even more tropical there than in South America, and since there is no school system there, Mrs. Graham will have to teach the girls by the Calvert, or mail order system, under which papers are sent to Maryland to be graded. The South American schools which they attended also used this plan.

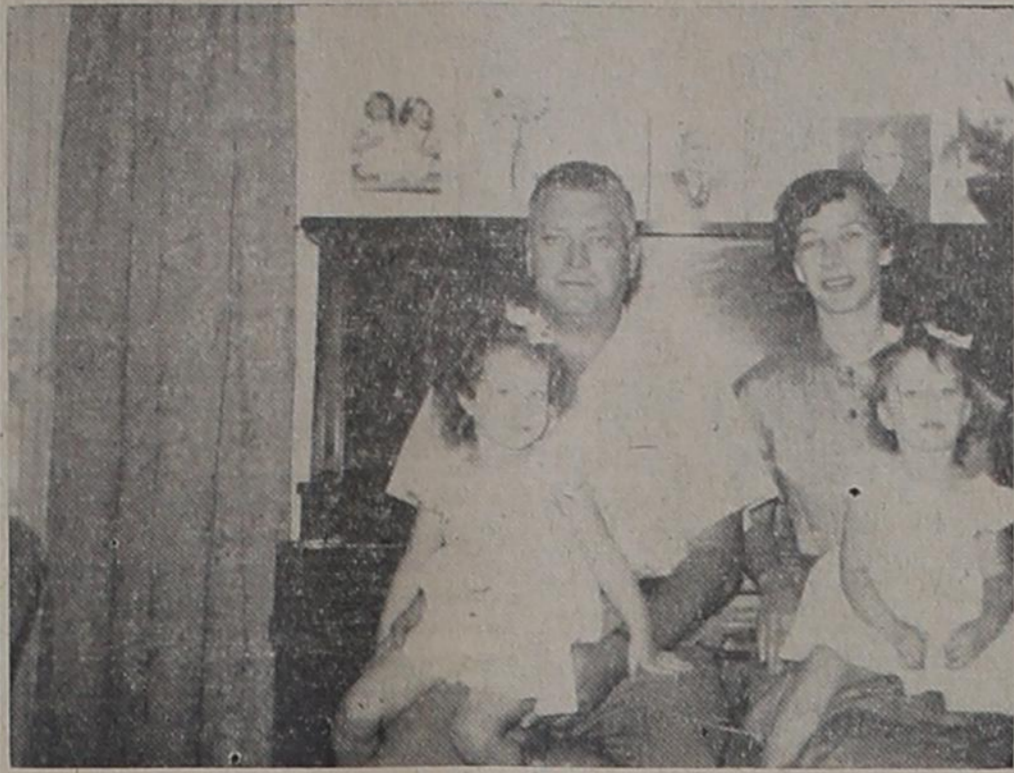
Benton was graduated from Farwell High School, and attended Texas Tech in Lubbock for one year, before taking the job that sent him to South America in 1938. While there, he met and married Pauline, whose parents were also in the oil industry.

Pauline is no novice at the business of living in various countries, as she had lived in Burma and India for five years as a child. Returning to the states, the majority of her education was received in California, before she went to South America. Her parents are still in Peru, South America.

Benton and Pauline now have four daughters, Patricia, 12, Sandra, 10, and twins, Janice and Linda, 2½ years old. Sandra contracted polio when she was only one month old, and has spent 19 months in the national foundation hospital in Warm Springs, Georgia. Although not fully recovered, she is doing as well as could be expected according to her parents' report.

Janice and Linda have done quite well for themselves since coming to Farwell, as they have captured a first prize in the baby

show at the Border theater last week.

Telling about life in South America, Mrs. Graham said that recently she and the children had lived in a fairly modern house in Cucuta. But, Benton was working in the Tibu oil fields and was able to be with the family only on weekends.

Mrs. Graham laughs, "Conditions were much better than some we had experienced down there. In one place, the water went off on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday afternoons, and would come on again at noon on the following day. And we also had trouble with the lighting at other places."

"A knowledge of Spanish is almost required in order to run a home," stated Mrs. Graham. She had servants to do everything except cook, and she preferred to do that for herself. In speaking of the food, Mrs. Graham said that it was sold in an open market, and that the natives thought nothing of buying meat which had been hanging out in the air, and covered with flies. The Grahams solved that problem by buying their meat fresh, and storing it in a deep freeze. They also boiled their drinking water, although it is not absolutely necessary.

All in all, the Grahams report that they have enjoyed life in South America, but it is good to get back to the U. S. A. for a while. Mrs. Graham and the girls plan to live in Clovis for the time in which they wait for visas to Indonesia.

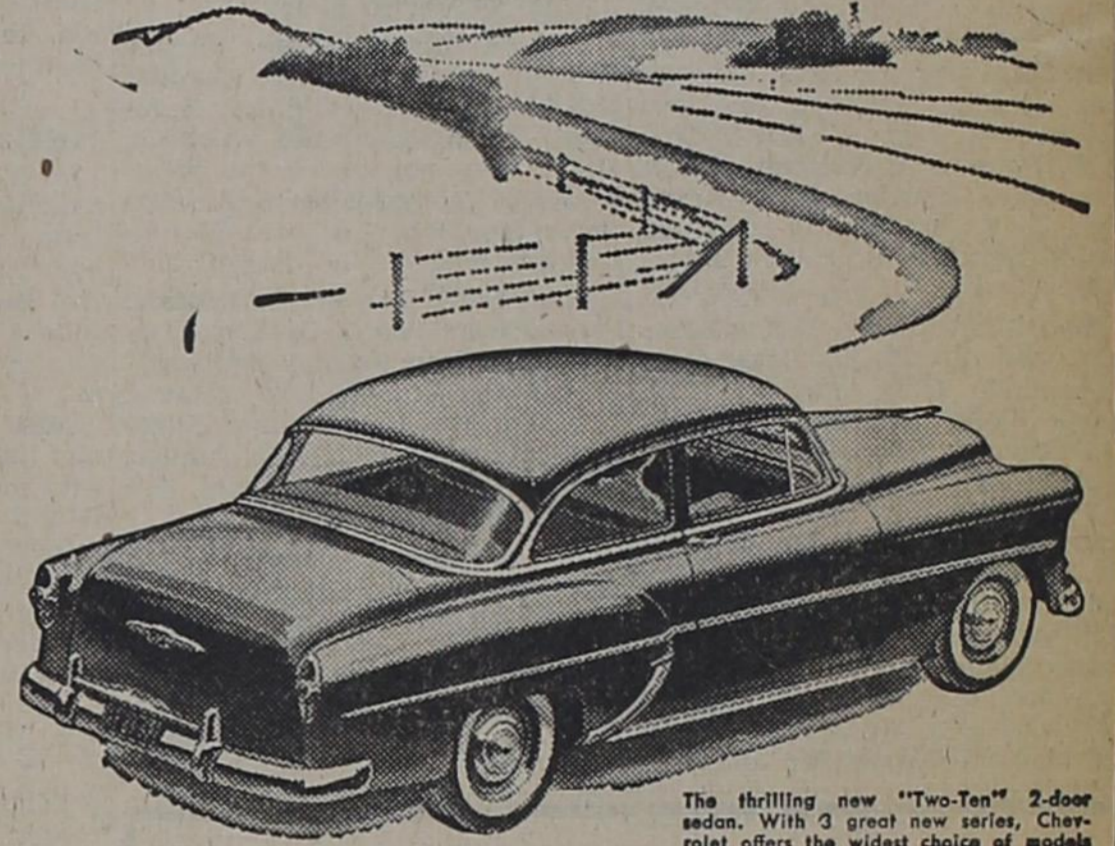

Three Friona Businesses Move Into New Buildings this Week

Retail business may have tapered off a lot in the past few months due to the long-term drought that has set in upon the High Plains, but it hasn't slowed down the expanding businesses of Friona, biggest town in Parmer County.

Just this weekend, for instance two—possibly three—businesses will throw open the doors of their new buildings for grand openings, and huge crowds are expected to flock to town to get in on some of the bargains which will be offered.

The Friona business representing the largest investment is the

new Friona Piggly Wiggly, a supermarket whose building is now in the state of being completed, on Main Street two blocks south of Highway 60.

Gaylord Newell, owner of the Piggly Wiggly in Friona, is putting in the new business, and the store will be managed by "Bonnie" Wilson, also of Hereford. Wilson, his wife and their girl and boy moved to Friona to take up residence last Saturday. Wilson has had considerable experience in the grocery business and was affiliated with the Piggly Wiggly in

Hereford.

The building which cost over \$20,000, is 80 X 50 feet. Of brick construction, the new store is functionally modern, with large plate glass windows and flanked by a surfaced parking area.

Inside, virtually all fixtures are new, although a few display racks were brought in from Hereford. Fluorescent lighting and pastel colors blend to give the store a restful appearance inside.

Display space includes a 24-foot vegetable rack 18 feet for frozen foods, 20 feet for meats, and a 12-

foot dairy case.

Aside from the customary tiers of grocery items which occupy most of the store, Wilson says a drug and hard goods department will be included as well as a complete market in the east end of the store.

At the entrance there are three checking stands.

The new manager, asked how large a payroll would be maintained said that he is unable to make an accurate estimate of how many will be needed since the volume of business the store will do is unknown. Wilson did say, however, that Piggly Wiggly will begin operation in Friona with 11 employees, which indicates that a pretty fair-sized business is anticipated.

The opening is to be Friday morning.

The couple, confident of the future of business in Friona decided to move into new quarters when the opportunity presented itself, and although they will not own the building, they are quite proud of its appearance.

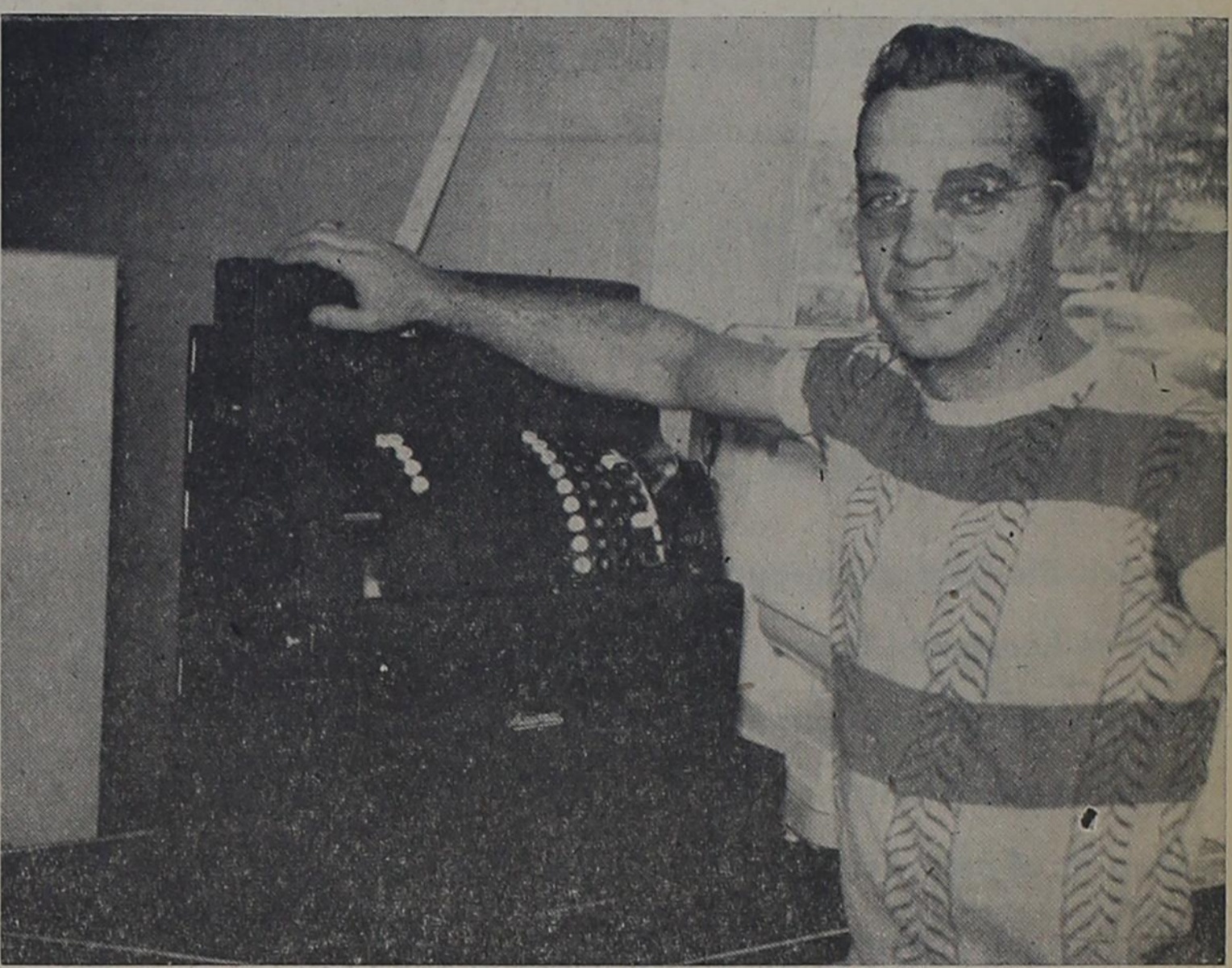
The store which they operated increased in stock worth from about \$7000 when they took it over in 1948, to \$15,000 when they were ready to move.

Mrs. Lewis, who manages the business, is particularly fond of what she refers to her "notion" department and she posed for a

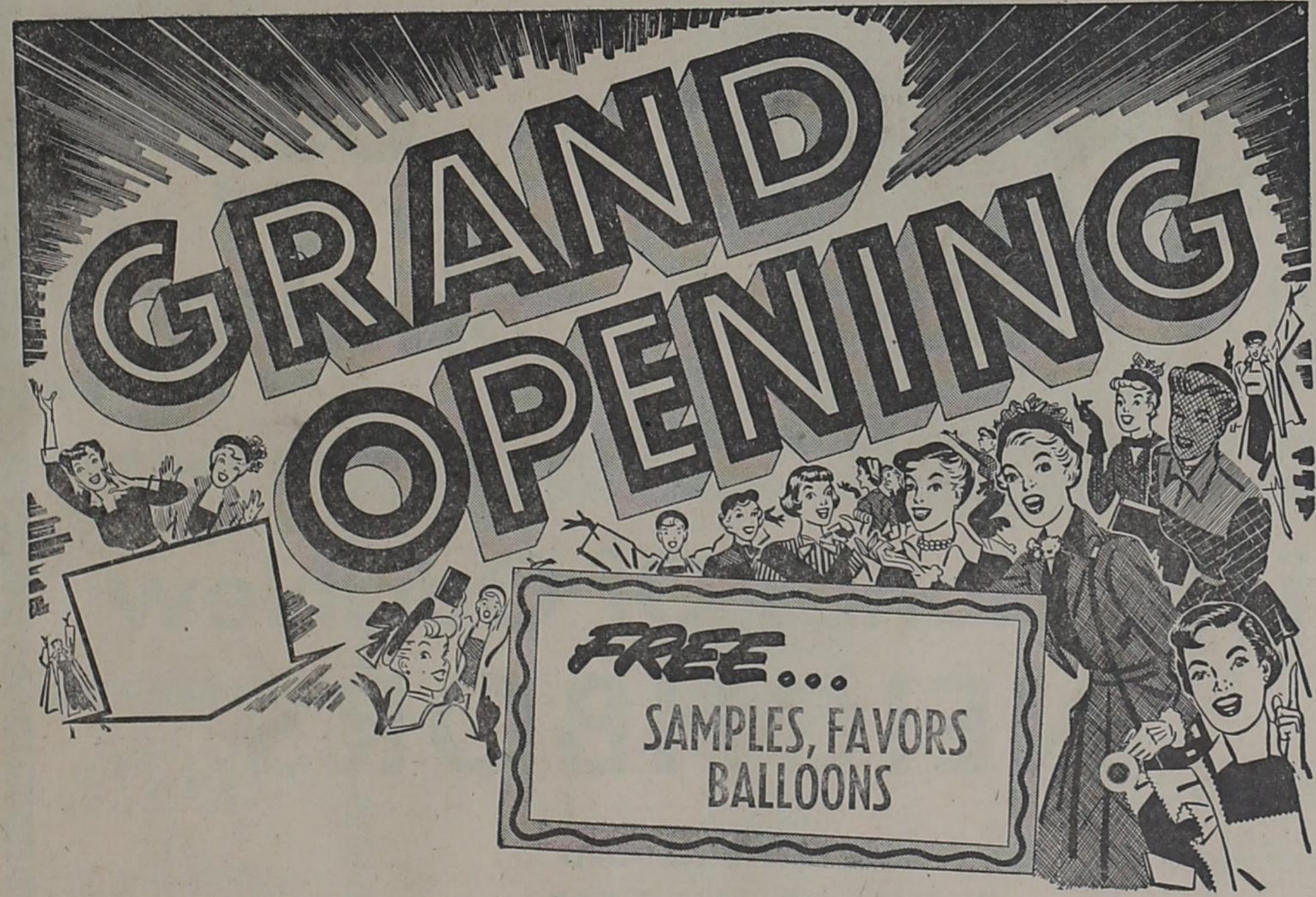

REV. C. M. FIELDS

(One of a series of articles written by persons not connected with this newspaper. We will have articles from people of every walk of life—Ed.)

TO KNOW AND NOT TO KNOW

"It is given unto you to know" Matt. 13:11.

"It is not for you to know" Act. 1:7. Some things are for us to know, some things are not for us to know. Blessed is the man who learns early which is which. Most of our unhappiness is caused by not knowing what we should know and by trying to know what we are not to know.

The supreme privilege of life is to know Christ. That was Paul's motto: "To know him." Of course, he already knew Christ as Saviour

and had so known Him since the day of the Damascus Road. But there is a gradual knowledge: Too often we think of the Christian life in terms of rules and doctrines and church activities and forget that it is a personal faith in the fellowship with the Living Christ. We can know a lot about Christ and do a lot for Christ and not know Him.

But, of course, there is much to know about Him too. We are witnesses unto Him and witnesses "of these things," the truths concerning Him. He invites us to come to Him and receive rest, learn of Him and find rest. In Him are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge and He is made unto us wisdom.

It is our privilege to know Him personally, to know the truths concerning Him and also the truths He taught. He was speaking of that in the verses with which we started. I am afraid that some of us have greatly neglected the Christ of the Gospels these days. Some have dwelt entirely on His teachings before the cross as though He were only a teacher of a way of life. Others, emphasizing that the Gospel message is Christ dead and risen have almost ignored the days of His flesh before Calvary. But we who believe in Him are to walk as He walked and to know how He walked we need to walk with Him in the Gospels. There is not one word of His teachings that does not have a very pertinent message for us today.

Blessed is the man who learns what is given to him to know. We err because we know not the Scriptures or the Power of God. Most of our misery is due to ignorance and often wilful ignorance. But there is much trouble due to trying to know what we are not to know. The disciples wanted to know if Jesus would restore the kingdom of Israel. Now we believe in the Kingdom of God, but too many dear souls wear themselves out trying to figure out the mysteries of prophecies when they might be witnessing here and now a Living Christ.

And there are many other things we bother about which we are not to know. Peter wanted to know what would happen to John. We are always wondering what is going to become of this man and that movement. We need our Lord's rejoinder, "What is that to thee? Follow thou me."

Then we bother a lot about happenings in our own lives which we cannot understand. Job and Habakkuk tried to understand why they had so much trouble. They were not given explanation but revelation, they saw the Lord. Which brings us back to our starting point. The best way to be cured of worry about what we are to know is to get better acquainted with what we are to know, with Him whom we should know.

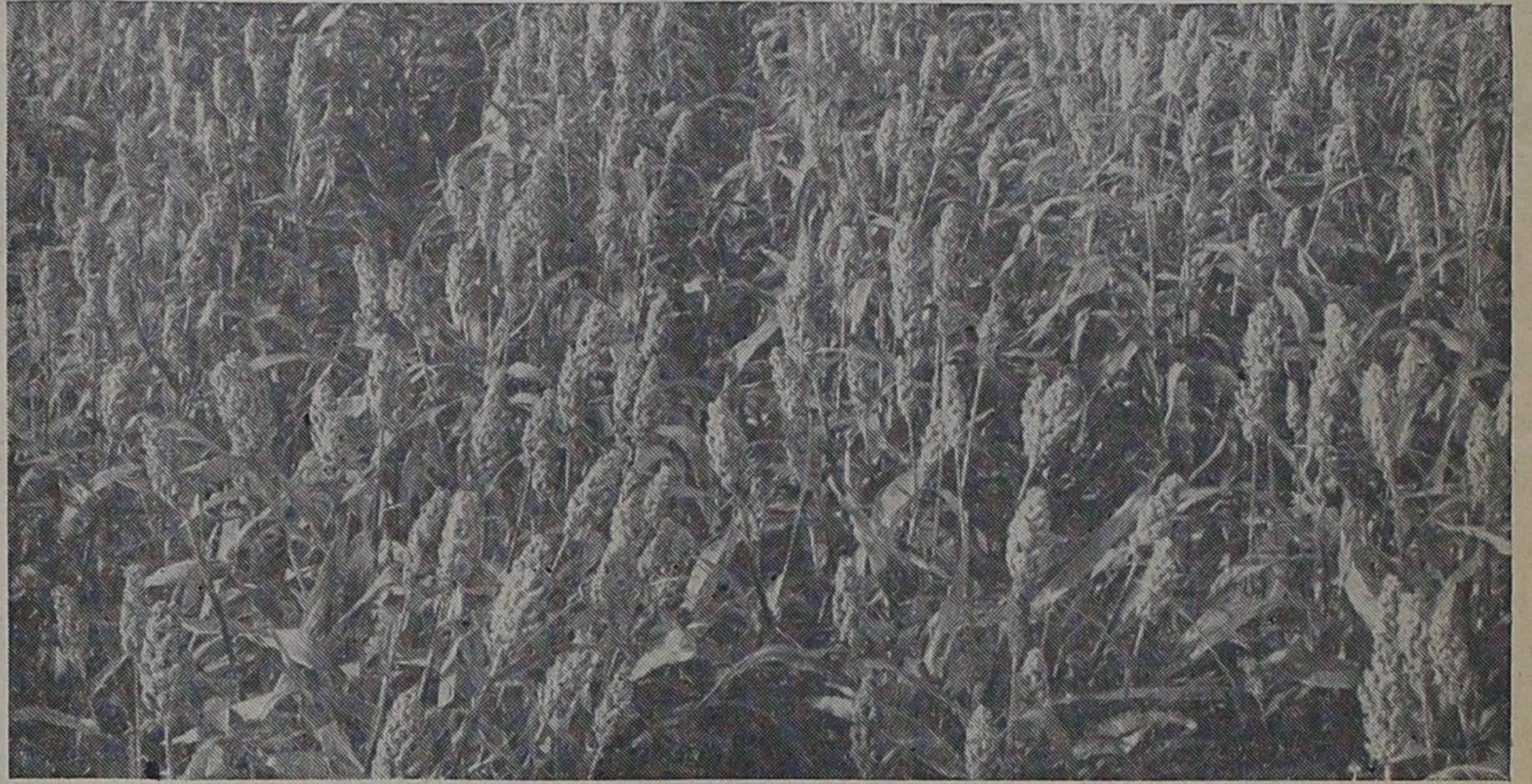

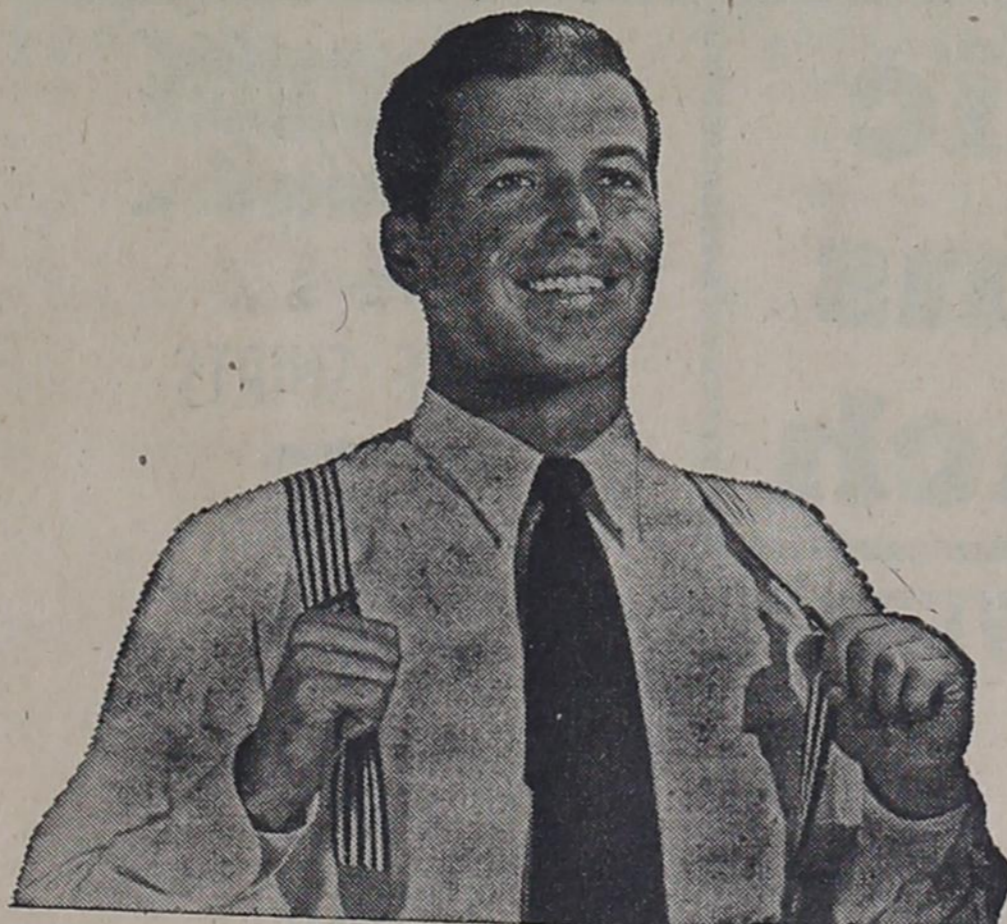

picture in this part of the store. Lewis Variety also has a nice line of piece goods—a little unusual for that type store.

The business generally operates with three employees. Besides Mrs. Lewis, there are Mrs. Eva Jones, and Mrs. Vera Bainum. Don Lewis, 15, also helps out sometimes, as does Mrs. Betty Allen, a part-time employee.

The air-conditioned brick building features fluorescent lighting, asphalt tile floors, and modern appointments. New superstructures have been added by Mr. and Mrs. Lewis for displaying goods.

The 25 X 80 building will have an office located at the rear.

Store hours will be from 8 a. m. until 6:30 five days a week, and Lewis Variety will be open until 10 o'clock Saturday night. The formal opening will be Saturday morning at 8 o'clock.

BI-WIZE DRUG STORE
At the time this information was being compiled, it was doubtful that the Bi-Wize Drug, next to Lewis Variety and south of the Galloway Implement building, would be ready to open for business this weekend.

But it is well to give attention to that business, since its introduction to the Friona business district pretty well coincides with Piggly Wiggly and Lewis Variety.

The Bi-Wize Drug is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Roden, formerly of Littlefield, who have had years of experience in the drug business.

Roden himself is a registered pharmacist and his wife is pretty well acquainted with the general operation of a drug store herself.

The Rodens, have two children: Jon Mack, 12; and Pamela Sue, 9; moved to Friona June 1 from Littlefield.

In one respect, Bi-Wize will be a sort of unusual drug store. It will not have what is generally referred to as a "fountain", complete with all flavors of syrup.

Instead, a "parlor" will be featured in the rear of the building where malts, milkshakes, and ice cream orders may be taken. Carbonated drinks will include root beer and Coca-Cola, both from dispenser-type containers.

Mr. Roden will be available on call for prescription filling in the medicinal department in the northwest part of the building.

Mrs. Roden, who says she will be a "flunkie" for the business; will spend most of her time in the cosmetics department and at the cashing stand.

Two other employees will be used by the new drug store. Bi-Wize will be a Rexall drug store.

Education Costs Less Than Sitter

Austin.—Your child's education in the Texas public schools costs less than the hourly rate charged by the youngest baby-sitters, Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association, said today.

"A lot of people talk about the high cost of education," Tennyson said. "Actually, during the 1951-52 school year, the actual cost per classroom hour for each child was only 21 cents."

Figures for the 1951-52 school year are the latest available. Total public school costs for that year were \$318,963,078, according to figures compiled by the Texas Education Agency. Average daily attendance was 1,213,000. Dividing that figure into total cost shows that \$262 was spent that year for each child.

Dividing \$262 by 180, the number of school days, gives a cost per day of \$1.45. Dividing \$1.45 by seven, the hours in a school day, gives an individual per hour cost 21 cents.

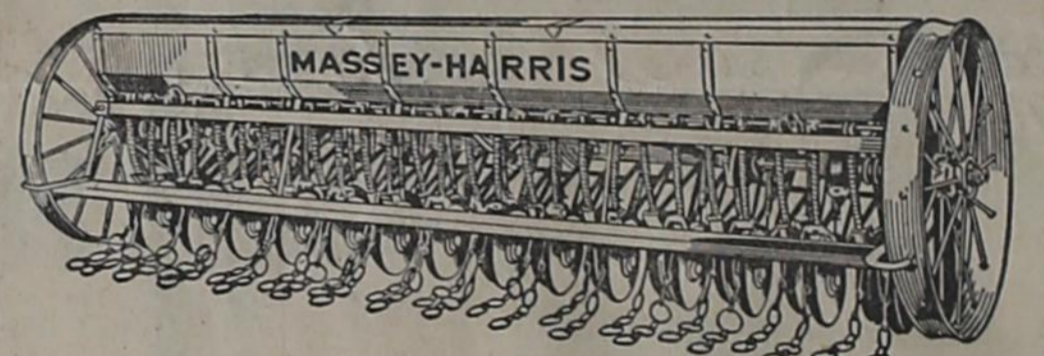

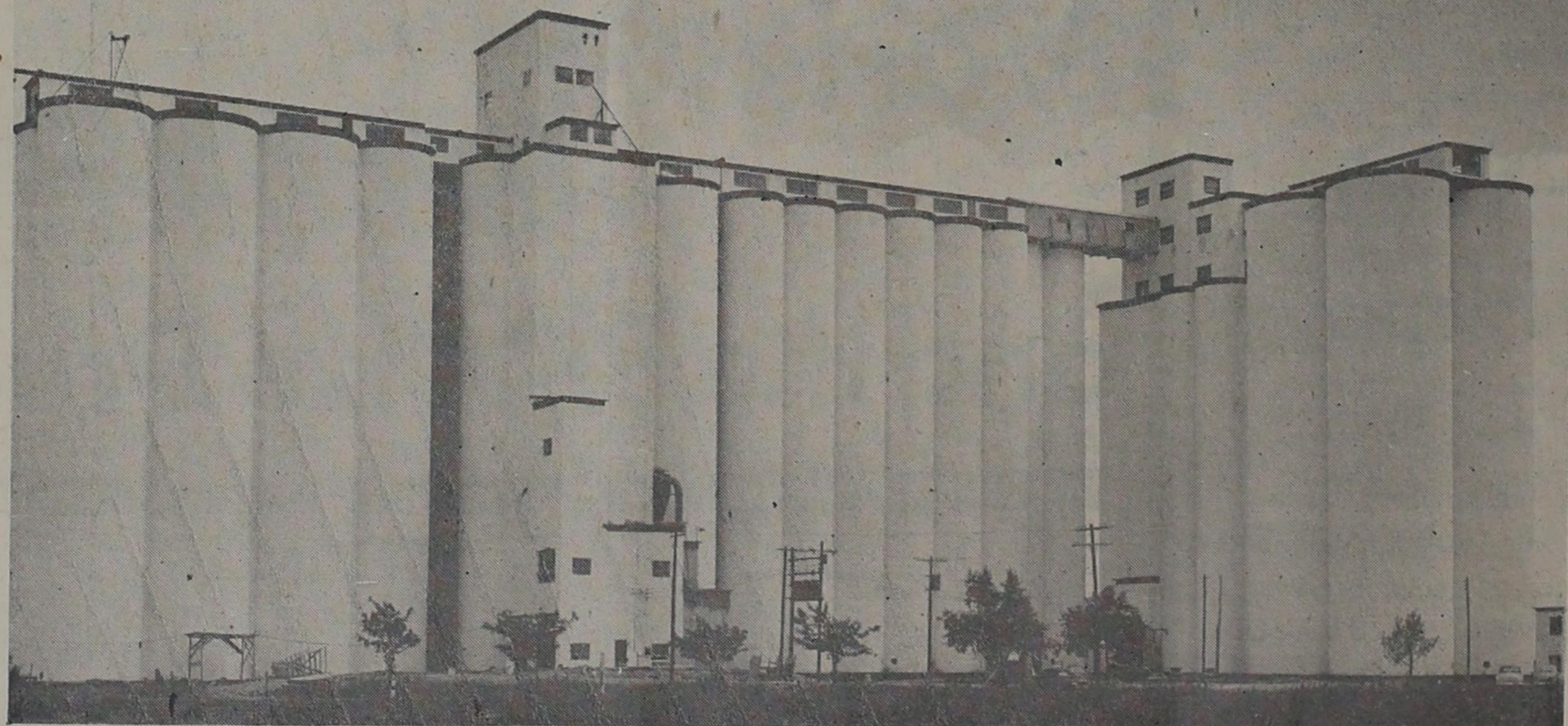
