

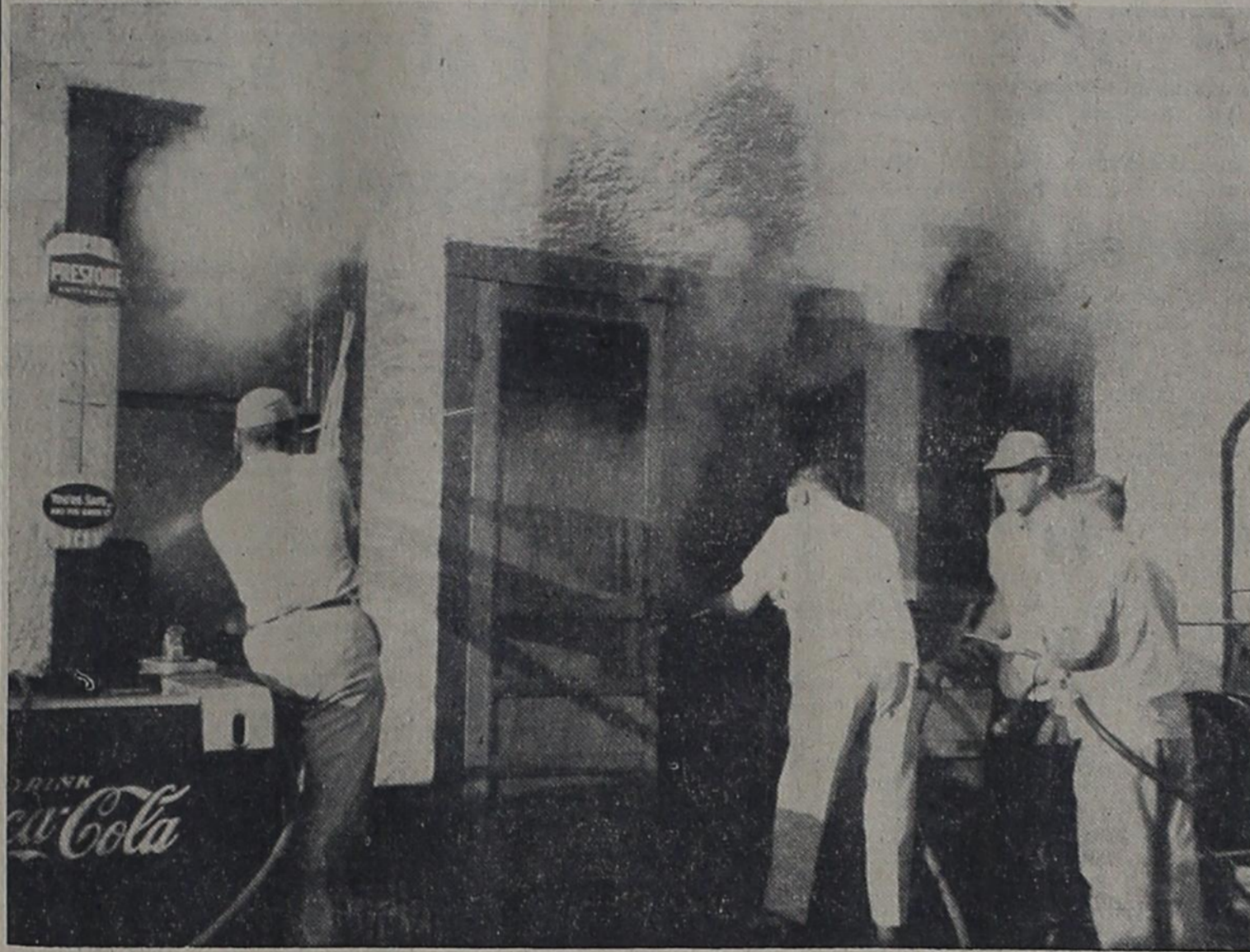

### Roberson Service Station Burns Sunday Morning

Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Roberson and family are grimly cleaning up the charred filling station they own this week, following an early morning fire which ruined everything they had in the front part of the business.

Roberson estimates his loss at "between \$2000 and \$2500", although he says it will be difficult for him to tell exactly what he lost, since his credit records were burned.

Bulk oil, new tires, a cash register, cigarette machine, and hundreds of small items were consumed in the Sunday morning blaze, which started about 7 a. m. Cause of its start is unknown.

Roberson's sons, Jimmie and Wallace, were at the station when the fire broke out, but the parents were out of town.

Jimmie, 15 years old, was sleeping in the station, and he was awakened by the family dog which was scratching on the window screen. He discovered the fire, summoned Wallace, 17, who ran up the street to Pop Spurlin's station to call the fire department.

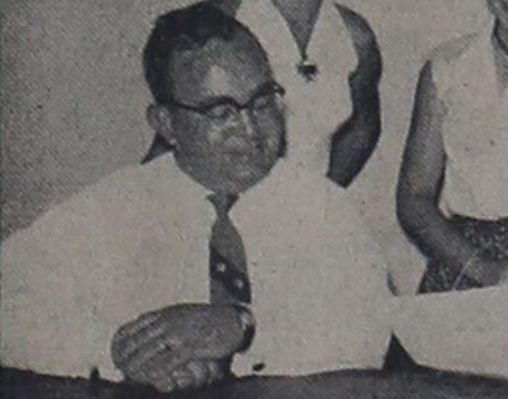
But the damage had been done by that time, and there was little to be salvaged from the smoldering ruins.

Roberson is convinced that had it not been for the dog which awakened Jimmie, the station would have been entirely consumed, and possibly the young boy along with it.

Although Roberson owns the building, he had no fire insurance to cover or defray the loss.

The family, one of modest means, is going ahead with cleaning up

the building, salvaging what they can, and doing business as normally as possible.

### WHEAT VOTE TOMORROW

Tomorrow is the day when the nation's farmers will decide on the wheat support program. Growers will either accept or disapprove:

Price support at 90 per cent of parity, with marketing quotas and provision for penalties on wheat grown in excess of the allotment.

Or, no marketing quotas, and price support at 50 per cent of parity for cooperators—those who keep within the acreage allotment—and no support for non-cooperators.

Regardless of the outcome, acreage allotments, already announced, will be in effect.

Polling places in Parmer County include the courthouse in Farwell, Parmer County Implement in Friona, and the Church of Christ in Lazbuddy.

### Bovina Baptist Youth Revival Begins Friday

The youth Revival of the Bovina Baptist church will begin Friday night, August 14, and will continue through Sunday, August 23. Services will be held twice daily at 9.15 a. m. and 8:30 p. m. Rev. Robert Jackson will be the evangelist, he is a former Clovis resident and is a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Taylor of Bovina. He surrendered to preach some 15 months ago and was licensed by the First Baptist church of Sudan, he is now a student at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Irrigating to keep crops watered is a night-and-day affair for virtually every farm with a well. Hot, dry winds and searing afternoon suns have made watering mighty slow.

The moisture from the rain that visited the area only a short time ago has vanished into thin air. Irrigated crops are holding up well; dryland is beginning to suffer pretty heavily. That seems to be the story.

Even though crops are looking good to excellent over nearly all the county, farmers this week are being warned by County Agent Joe Jones to be "on the lookout for boll worms" in cotton fields.

"Cotton insects are not serious as yet," he says, "but could get that way. When four or five small boll worms and eggs are found, the infestation is heavy enough to warrant spraying."

Jones stressed the importance of timeliness in combating insects. They are easily disposed of, he reminds, in the early stages, but are difficult to exterminate after moving down into bolls.

"It takes about thirty days for the boll worm to complete its cycle which consists of egg, worm, and moth," the county agent explains. "The moth lays about one thousand eggs singly on tips of squares and terminal leaves which hatch in about five days, and the cycle starts all over again."

Eggs are white, dome-shaped, about the size of a mustard seed. Five-day intervals should be followed when spraying to coincide with hatching eggs. Jones says it will generally take at least two sprayings at five-day intervals to knock boll worms out, and sometimes more than two.

"But remember this", he says: "Don't spray unless you need to spray, but don't wait if you do have enough worms and eggs to warrant spraying. It is awfully easy to fall behind the boll worm so watch your cotton closely these days."

The agent says it would be well to also be on the lookout for leaf worms, since they have shown up in counties south of Parmer. But be cautious against confusing the leaf worm with the cabbage looper which seldom does any damage.

The leaf worm is 1 1/2 inches long, greenish in color, with white and black stripes, and black spots.

In summing up the insect situation in the county, Jones says: "Meetings similar to the ones held in July will be later should the infestation warrant it. When such meetings are held, everyone is urged to come out and learn how to identify both harmful and beneficial insects and make counts to determine whether poisoning is justified."

### Farm Bureau Queen To Be Named in Friona August 21

Farm Bureau members will crown their county queen Friday night of next week, August 21, when a special program will be in conjunction with the contest.

Several candidates have already been named and Flossie Anderson of Bovina, who is handling the contest, says more are expected.

Girls must be between the ages of 16 and 22, before September 1, be a daughter or sister of a farm Bureau member, and single. Business, individuals and organizations are sponsoring candidates for the contest, which is county-wide affair. The sponsoring organization pays the \$5 entrance fee, which is required for each girl.

Informal cottons will be worn by the girls for the county contest and out-of-town judges will name the winner. County queen will go to Lubbock September 3 for competition. Winner there will go to Mineral Wells in November and to Chicago in December with \$750 expense money to accompany her and her matron. The local Farm Bureau will buy the formal apparel for the county queen to wear in the Lubbock contest.

Rev. Johnnie Lee McBroom from Wildorado will direct the music. He surrendered to preach some 18 months ago and was licensed by the Palo Duro Baptist church. He has preached youth revivals at his home church and at the Dawn Baptist church, and has directed music for youth revivals in several churches in the past year. He is a student of Hardin-Simmons University.

Miss Ella Bradshaw will play the piano for the revival. She is a resident of Bovina, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Bradshaw and will enter her senior year at Wayland college in September.

The church is looking forward to one of the greatest revivals that it has ever had, because of the marvelous spirit that has been shown in preparation for the meeting, the pastor says.

### Fight Carried To Courts in Texico Paving Squabble

A legal fracas has arisen over the prospects for paving several Texico city streets, with the result that court action will be necessary to determine whether property owners will—or will not—have paving.

On Monday, Orville Frances, Virgil Boone, and R. N. Williams Texico property owners, filed for an injunction in District court at Clovis to restrain the city commission from going ahead with the paving.

They set forth an argument, the principal theme of which is that owners would be financially unable to pay for the improvements, with the result that their property would sooner or later be confiscated to make up for what the paving had cost.

The city commission, meanwhile which had already voted to go ahead with plans for paving, received a bid Monday night from a Clovis contractor to do the paving for \$4.50 per block foot, including curb and guttering.

Mayor M. C. Roberts says it is the intention of the city officials to file a counter-suit on the matter in an attempt to show that the paving is desirable, and can be afforded, by the town.

The argument of the two sides will be heard by Dist. Judge E. T. Hensley Jr., who probably will announce a final hearing date in the near future. At that time, it will be decided whether paving will be started or dropped, depending upon evidence submitted by both the plaintiffs and the defendants.

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

(The following appeared in a recent issue of the Ralls Banner, and is reprinted here because it touches on a matter of local interest.)

## Sideline Ranchers On Aid "Gravy Train"

"Them who has gets." The drought aid program, at least in Crosby county, has proved a bonanza to certain cattle raisers, particularly those best able to finance feeding of their own cattle. Rancher or "tax write-off business men" engaged in farming and cattle need no paupers' oath. Under the administration's program an applicant does not even have to show any hardship case whatever in order to avail himself of feed which taxpayers have furnished at terrific prices.

Let's just take the cottonseed meal situation as relates to those in Crosby county who are getting it under the aid program. The taxpayer bought the stuff from indigent farmers and it is valued at about \$70 a ton. Mr. Ezra Benson's department is doling it out at \$35 a ton to feed cattle. The taxpayer, then, has taxed himself to buy feed for ranchers so beef prices can be hiked so the taxpayer can pay double what he would otherwise pay for meat for his table.

Only the folks who desperately need cottonseed meal aren't the ones who are getting it. J. S. Bridwell, who owns about as many oil wells as he does cattle, received 420 sacks of cottonseed meal for his cattle. A Lubbock doctor, who wields a \$100,000-a-year scapal over some loyal patient, received 222 sacks of meal for some 370 cows he keeps in Crosby county. He also has a cotton farm in Crosby county, and wouldn't it be nice if he would raise his own cock-eyed feed?

In the fall we'll be paying support price for his cotton that should have been planted in feed for his 370 cows which he keeps as a sideline to his physician's practice. One fur-lined gobson will be awarded to the person who first discovers that the doctor looks with favor upon government subsidization of the cost of operations for patients unable to pay for them.

### Nobody Turned Down

In all, 121 applications for emergency feed have been processed by the Crosby drought committee of which Jack Robertson of Ralls is chairman. Not one application has been denied the owners of 13,922 cattle now registered in the county. This does not include those cattle driven across the line into Dickens County each Jan. 1 to escape taxes.

Fully half of the aid given here has gone into the hands of wealthy men fully capable of financing the feeding of their own livestock. Certainly these wealthy men are not to be blamed for getting a lion's share of one of the biggest give-away programs to come out of the Eisenhower administration.

The writer has personally examined the instructions contained in letters and telegrams to PMA administrator James E. Winter of Crosbyton, and in none of them is there any restriction as to whom shall receive aid. There is a hint contained in a telegram signed by J. Earl Cooke denying that a pauper's oath is necessary for aid.

It says in effect that it is presumed that those financially able to buy feed will not seek drought aid feed.

Small wonder, indeed, that the county aid committee does not seek to ascertain the need before issuing a feed supply. In the absence of any program or any basis on which to distribute feed, the committee has no alternative but to ladle out costly feed to the deserving and undeserving alike.

Here is tangible evidence that the present administration plans to out-spend the previous administration, and that the only consideration is to heap additional coals of taxation upon the heads of hap-

less taxpayers who have spent 20 years pulling farmers, ranchers, and big business out of the hole through tax money.

It is argued with some intelligence that to discriminate between needy and wealthy ranchers is unfair; that the wealthy man stands to lose a proportionate amount on his beef, and should not do so.

However, the same discrimination exists in income tax returns—the wealthy man is penalized because he can best afford it. If the aid program is designed to dump billions of dollars worth of feed helter-skelter over the land in an unprecedented burst of benevolence, that is one thing.

If the aid program was instituted at great cost as a means of saving the hides of those unable to weather the high feed cost as compared with low beef prices, that is another, and quite admirable thing.

### Pardon the Nausea

The writer, for one, is damned tired of forced participation in a long series of give-away programs financed with his personal tax money, and even more tired of his hard-earned money going into the pockets of wealthy men who use farms and ranches as sidelines and who are capable of buying a thousand and harrassed taxpayers' lock, stock, and barrel without batting an eye.

And a few undesigned men are maintaining sidelines merely as a place to write off tax money they made from operation of their legitimate businesses. He's getting tired of all these programs that make the rich richer and leaving the poor man flat on his pratt.

He's getting tired of paying out money for programs that are nothing but gigantic hoaxes, where he finances beef in order to enjoy higher prices for it over the counter.

I, for one, don't give a tinker's dam if the doctor ever makes money on one of his broken down heifers or not. All I know is that the man is fully capable of standing on his own feet, and if I were a member of that committee he would furnish a financial statement before he got a sack of meal. And if his financial statement showed him able to support his own cows he would summarily be thrown out on his august eyebrows. Guys like me have been subsidizing guys like him for years, and the pinch is getting bad.

For a character who frowns so hard on government in his medical business, he's fairly quick in grabbing every cock-eyed dollar some stupid administration offers him. He's got about as much business in the cow business as I've got slashing open anaesthetized bodies.

Crosby County, and no other county we've heard of, has any limit on the over-all amount of government-owned grain and concentrates that can be distributed to this great class of under-privileged sideliners. Just remember that the government is me and you and the guy across the street. That feed belongs to us. And at a time like this, with the cost of living at a new all-time high, a bungling Ezra Benson and company is digging into our personal reserves to serve no worthy purpose other than further increasing the cost of food.

## COTTON SCHOOL COMING

Farmer County cotton growers, who sometimes wonder how they get a "dusty," "oily," "seedy," or "grassy" classification on their bales will be interested in knowing that a cotton classification school designed to help clear up these matters will be held this month.

On Monday, August 24, farmers from Parmer County will be eligible to attend the school at no cost. The class will run from 9 a. m. until 3 p. m.

In addition to the bale markings listed above, questions will be answered on what is a two-sided bale, a gin-cut, or a mix-pack bale, and why farmers get more than one grade and (or) staple from a multiple load.

# To Patrons of the Texico and Farwell School Districts:

The Texico and Farwell School Boards met in a called session on August 10, 1953. Due to continued pressure on the Supt's of the respective schools whose parents desire to be exceptions in child enrollment, in the two districts, the following policy was adopted. "Pupils shall enroll and attend school in the districts in which their parents reside, with the exception of any seniors affected by this policy for the 1953-54 school year only. If residence should be changed from one district to the other during the school year the pupil shall change schools at the nearest examination term."

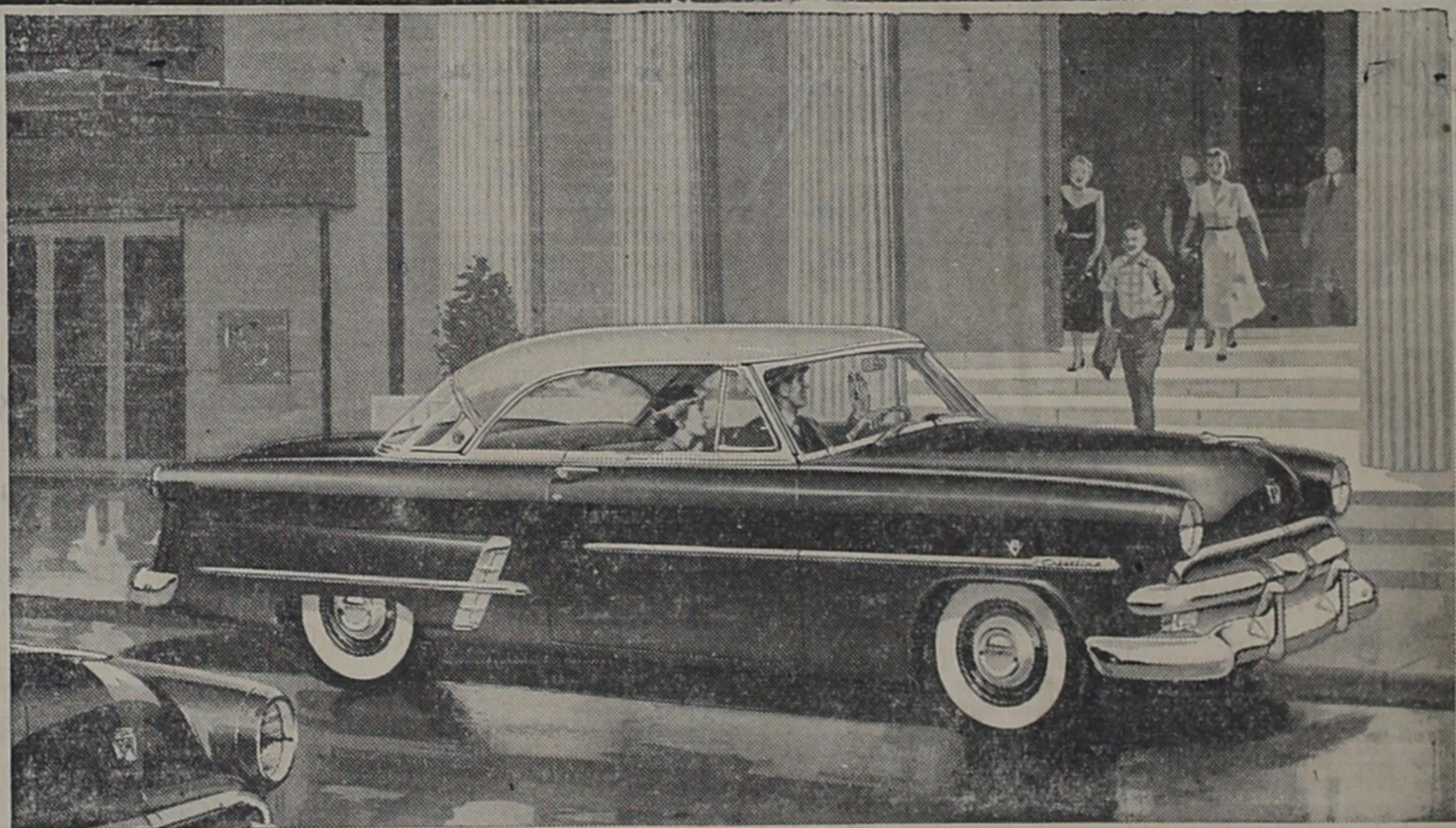

# Happenings at Friona

## School Registration Slated To Begin September 2nd, Some 700 Anticipated

Registration of an anticipated 700 students will begin at the Friona schools on Wednesday, September 2nd, to be concluded on Friday, September 4th, school officials announced this week.

Setting up the schedule: seniors will be first to register, being asked to appear at the school on Wednesday; juniors will register on Thursday; and the remainder of the school body, both high and grade school, will get on the list on Friday.

School buses will make their initial runs for the year on Friday, and "business as usual" is expected to be going on the following Monday.

In the meantime, the customary repairs, improvement and paint-up jobs are being rushed to a climax on the school property, four new rooms for grade school students have been worked out this summer, with two being made in the old band hall and two in the old cafeteria.

The cafeteria is ready for the school rush, with a capacity of some 250 per noon meal, officials said, and across the road the field house at Chieftain Field has undergone extensive improvements, getting a new roof along with stucco and paint job.

This week, the faculty list was in good shape, although not ready for publication, and officials indicated that unless the almost-seasonal August resignations fouled things up, the teaching staff is complete.

Two new school buses have been ordered by the district—but whether they would arrive in time for first of the year service was not definite this week. A fleet of ten buses will be operated to bring rural students to school.

**Must Have Inoculations**  
Dr. Paul Spring, county health officer, reminded this week that all children entering school for the first time must be inoculated for smallpox, under state law.

He went on to point out that "booster" shots for whooping cough are also required by the local school board before entrance. In general, children nowadays receive immunization for diphtheria in the infant stage, and there is no state law requiring the additional shot. However, this matter is left to the discretion of the local board, which for several years has required the "boosters" in a positive effort to prevent any whooping cough epidemics.

Parents of all children who are

entering school for the first time this year, or those who may be transferring here from states not having such requirements, are advised to take note of the above. It might also be advisable to determine just where little Johnnie's birth certificate has been put before he takes off to enter school.

## Brother of Local Woman Dies as PW

Lt. Roger W. Hartman, brother of Mrs. Orville Houser of this city, who had been believed to be a prisoner of war since 1950, died in a prison camp in Korea, Lt. Hartman was later listed on the War Department.

Notification of the death was made by a cablegram to his wife, Mrs. Mary Hartman of Santa Fe. First listed as "missing in action" on July 5, 1950, just six days after he entered service in Korea, Lt. Hartman was later listed on the prisoner of war roster.

Information on the death of the former Hereford man, 25 years old, is believed to have been brought back to the War Department by returning prisoners. No details have been forthcoming as yet.

Hartman was a veteran of World War II, in which he was a German prisoner of war following his capture in the furious Battle of the Bulge in 1944. He was interned for six months.

Other than his wife and Mrs. Houser, survivors include his father, G. C. Hartman of Dove Creek, Colo.; two brothers, Elwyn and Jiggs of Hereford; and two other sisters, Mrs. Gordon Witherpoon and Mrs. Bill Simpson, both of Hereford.

## Local Elevators Ready For Fall Harvesting

Local elevators are getting ready for the coming sorghum harvest employees reported this week, with Santa Fe Grain reporting that shipments of stored wheat were being made currently while the Friona Wheat Growers reported that such consignments had already been cleared out to make way for sorghums this fall.

G. (Preach) Cranfill of the Santa Fe Grain, said that he expected to have around 1/2 million bushels of storage space available, while Glenn Williams replied that the Friona Wheat Growers should be able to handle around 1 million bushels of the fall cuttings.

Whether or not sorghum will go into government storage this fall is currently a moot point, Cranfill said, pointing out that the immediate present market price is higher than government loan guarantees. This aspect of the harvest, however, is subject to abrupt change, observers pointed out.

Comparatively cool weather, occasioned by the July showers which occurred almost daily, has

given way to a blasting hot August. Temperature readings have climbed well into the 90's and up to and over the 100 mark during the past ten days, and irrigation wells all over the territory are going on a 24-hour-per-day schedule unless interrupted by breakdowns.

In general, the outlook for sorghum harvest continues to be good with heavy heads showing on all irrigated crops. Some dry-land plantings, which got a big boost by the July rains, are still looking very good, but 100-degree weather, combined with scorching winds and no rainfall, can quickly turn a promising crop into something good only for fodder.

## Some Spraying Being Done In Locality

Some spraying of cotton fields is going on in this locality, according to report from Friona Air Park this week, where the spraying planes are located.

Indications were that most of the current work involves cotton where a few worms have been noticed, but employees at the air park said that plans are now underway to begin spraying lettuce in the Hereford and Muleshoe truck crop areas in the near future.

Asked about weed spraying, employees said none is being done right now since such spraying invariably injures cotton fields which may be adjacent to those being sprayed.

As for Friona proper, city employees are also using spraying machines in a fight against an unusually large fly population City Manager Roy Wilson said on Monday.

The city has sprayed via plane on an average of every two or three weeks in addition to machine spraying down the alleys and individual spraying of garbage cans Wilson said.

In an effort to cut down on the pest population of both flies and mosquitoes both of which have shown a huge increase since the July rains, Wilson added that the city hopes to carry out a twice-a-week pickup of trash. Currently, trash cans are emptied weekly, he said.

## Farm Bureau Directors Meet In Friona

"The most important thing right now is to decide what farm program is going to succeed the present one. What we need to do is get the people to discuss the subject so their ideas can be incorporated into resolutions". This is one statement made by Roy Euler, chairman of Parmer County Farm Bureau's Resolutions committee at a meeting of directors in Friona Monday night. Mr. Euler and Bruce Parr, president, had just returned from a meeting of president and resolution committees in Plainview. It was pointed out that unless the farmers themselves heed USDA secretary Benson's plea for their own suggestions, there are plenty of other people ready to mould a program without consideration of the tillers of the soil.

On the state level, the record shows that thirty of the thirty-six laws supported by Farm Bureau were passed in the last legislative session. One of those, The Texas Warehouse Act, originated in Parmer County last November.

In view of the importance of knowing what farmers want, the directors agreed to call a meeting September 7, in the Bovina Auditorium where the resolutions committee will present suggestions they have already received and studied, and ask for further discussion of all farmers present. New resolutions are expected to be written as a result of these open forums. These resolutions, coming from Parmer County Farmers, will be prepared for presentation in October at the Annual County Convention. From there they will go to the State Convention, at Mineral Wells.

"We will appreciate suggestions from everyone on any agricultural problem", said Mr. Euler, "and we will make every effort to include them in the final analysis of resolutions". Other members of the committee are: A. L. Hartzog, Farwell, T. W. Fuller and E. G. Snodgrass, Bovina; A. L. Tarter, Lazbuddy.

A nominating committee was selected consisting of C. V. Potts, Archie McCutchan, Harold Carpenter, W. O. Burford and Roy Euler.

The youngster was a nephew of Mrs. Rudolf Renner and Mrs. H. H. Weis of this city. Both ladies made the trip in company with Mr. and Mrs. Lee Renner. Funeral services were conducted on Saturday afternoon at Woodward, with burial in that city.

The youngster met a watery death in a pond on the Oblander farm. Gary, younger brother of the drowned lad, saw "Davie" go to his death in the pond, but was unable to assist. Relatives surmise that the youngster, who had been warned to stay out of the small lake, decided to try to learn to swim. David had recently joined Scouts and was slated to learn swimming.
