A Few Thoughts on the Truce With the Communists

Few indeed were the serious-thinking persons of America who did not breathe a prayer of gratitude for the signing of a truce ending more than three years of holocaust on the Korean peninsula. Irrespective of whatever mortifying concessions may have had to be made by the United Nations to effect the armistice, the thousands of mothers, fathers, wives and children of men who have been fighting in Korea are thankful today—thankful that their loved ones will no longer be maimed and killed by fanatical, brutal orientals who despise the very word "American."

The Parmer County wheat acreage allotment will be made known next week. It's going to amount to a reduction. That's for sure. The cotton acreage allotment for next year is going to be seriously curtailed too.

We are fixing to see a return to the age of the "cow, sow, and hen" farm where most of the farmers who are retiring today got their start.

The number of "farmers" who live in town and run out to the place for an occasional check or re-setting of irrigation tubes is going to be smaller every year for a while, at least. The number staying on the farm will increase.

They're going to be forced to do this, because they won't be able to utilize their acreage under a government-sponsored program, and they won't be able to compete with the world market if they try to go it on their own.

Chores—lots of them—are getting ready to return to the farm. FFA and 4-H Club boys are going to be carrying mighty heavy inventories on their projects in a few years, because the livelihood of the family is going to require it.

How Do You Like Your Rain?

Please take the article on "weather modification" carried on the front page of The Tribune for what you feel it's really worth. We are going to try real hard to not say anything in this newspaper to make you either "fer it," or "agin' it."

The only reason we gave attention to the matter is for the sake of keeping the people of the Plains informed on what is developing in that field of science, in order that they may judge for themselves whether it might be worthwhile to look into.

We got a good laugh when we were talking to some folks the other day from Plainview. Plainview, as you probably know, is where a group of farmers is paying a handsome price to some fellow who says he can keep it from hailing out their cotton crops.

These people were telling about one of their neighbors, a fellow who could usually be relied upon for homespun witticisms.

There were six boys from Bovina who attended the National Boy Scout Jamboree in Santa Ana, California. The boys going were Phil Caldwell, Denney Ware, Erith Hawkins, Larry Ezell, Neil Smith and myself.

We went by greyhound bus and left Clovis at 6:00 A. M. on Saturday morning, with boys from the Eastern New Mexico Area Council. We got to the Jamboree at 12:30 Sunday night. We went by the Painted Desert and Grand Canyon in Arizona. We were the first ones to get to the camp grounds at Irvine Ranch. Monday we set up camp and Tuesday we went to San Diego to the Zoo. Wednesday we went to Catalina Island by boat. Thursday we went to Los Angeles. We went to a 3-D movie and to Knobby farm. Friday the jamboree opened. We had three movie star shows and got to see vice-president Nixon. We were in Troop 28, Section 32, Region 9.

We had pictures taken of us on Sunday night and also Monday. Several of the pictures were in the Los Angeles papers and we were also in one of the newsreels taken of the Jamboree. 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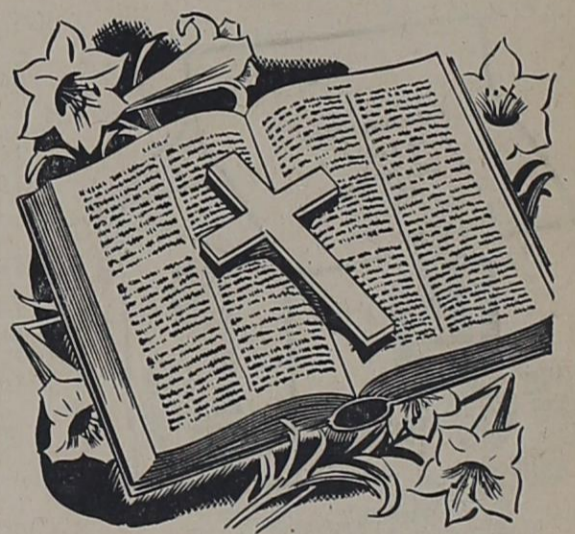

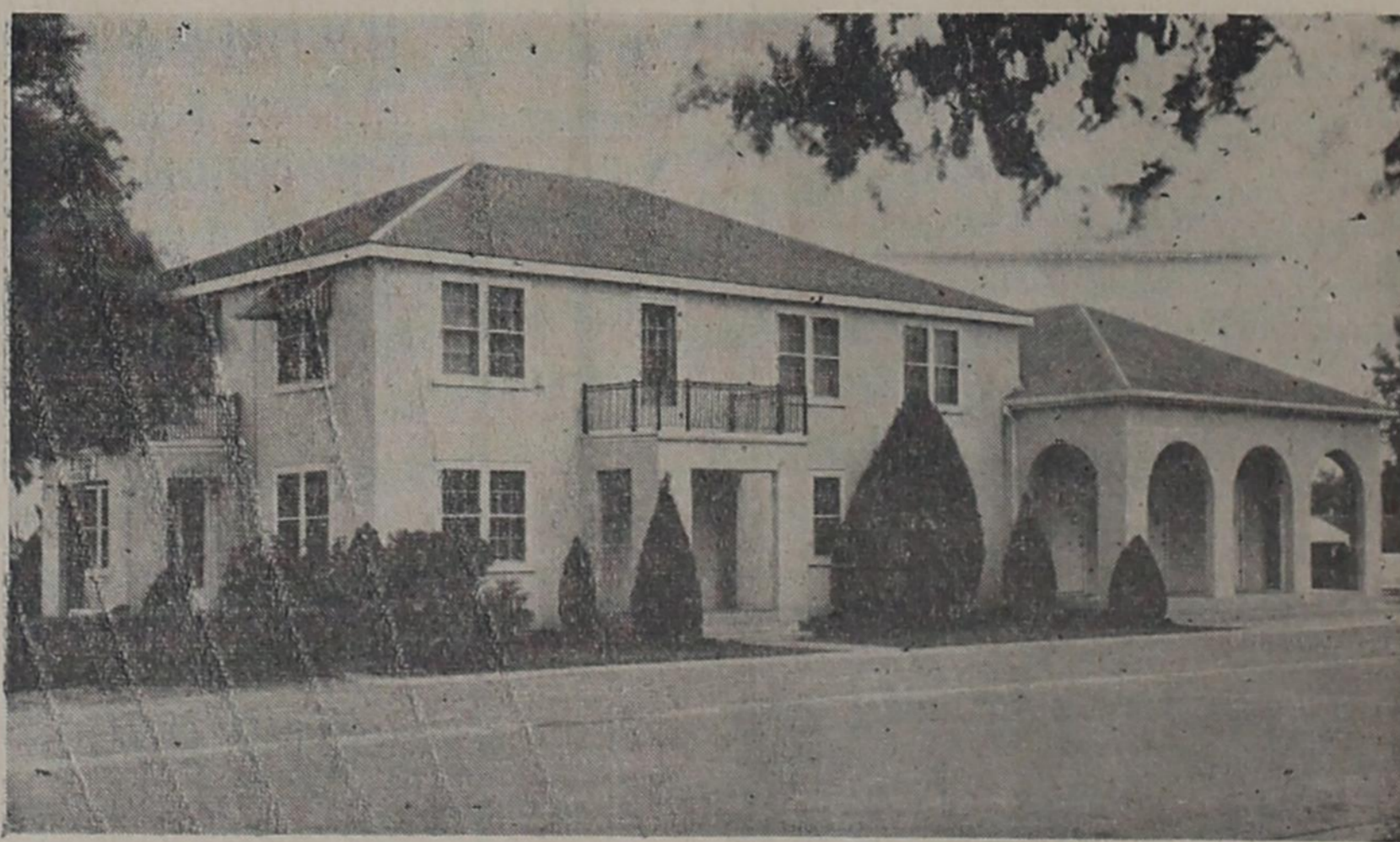

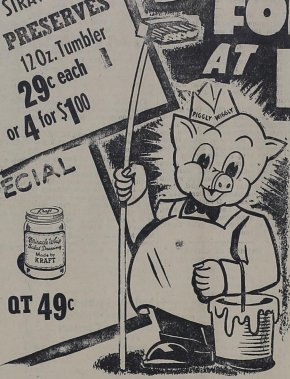

Friona Institutes Dollar Day Event for Trading Area

Believing that the business district of Friona is large and progressing enough to cope with any other in the Panhandle, the merchants of Friona have promoted a city-wide Dollar Day, the first of which will be staged Saturday August 1.

Businessmen of Friona have long felt the need for a business promotion which was community-wide in scope, since a large part of the payroll earned in their trade territory was being siphoned off by distant shopping centers.

Other cities around Friona have long attempted to draw trade from that area with highly-advertised programs which were similar in nature to the Dollar Day event which will be instituted here Saturday.

Merchants are hopeful that their operation will be a success from its beginning, but they also realize that it takes time to establish anything like their Dollar Day in the minds of the buying public, chiefly because the competition for similar-type projects has been going on for years in larger cities.

Still, Friona businessmen are optimistic, and they hope that within six months they will be able to compete on a level equal to any high Plains city—regardless of size.

A check of advertising space taken in this newspaper this week indicated that the merchants really "mean business" in saying that their prices are comparable with any out-of-town competition.

Busy Time Now For Friona Farmers

It's a busy time right now for Friona farmers. If they got rain, they're getting weeds to go along with it; and if they weren't lucky enough to get in on Mother Nature's watering, they are hard at work putting irrigation water out in an effort to bring forth bountiful harvests.

Last weekend saw quite a number of the growers in town, as weather conditions had slowed outdoor work down to a walk—but Monday was a different story. With the temperature climbing back into the upper 90-degree readings, it was rush to water and rush to weed on all sides.

Pastures in the immediate vicinity of Friona gave vernal evidence of the three-to-four inches of rain received here. Bright green grass was showing where only a few days before the outlook had been definitely drab. In general, most of the area got in for some showers, although there were reports of several vicinities getting only one-half inch or less.

The showers brought on two other phases of work—spraying the city for flies and mosquitoes, and mowing the roadside bar ditches, which had been surprisingly free of growth this year during the hot dry weather.

While the potato harvest may be a disappointment, in the matter of market prices, outlooks continue good for cotton and grain sorghum crops, both of which have been under irrigation, and indications are that the area will produce good yields along this line.

Market Slows Down Spud Harvesting Here

Falling market prices which during the latter part of last week dropped as low as \$1.75 per hundredweight slowed down harvesting of potatoes in the Friona section, but things began to pick up the first of the week, according to Herman Neff, operator of the local potato shed.

Spuds were rolling through the machines at the shed on Monday, and Neff was of the opinion that the majority of the growers had decided to "salvage what they can" at the then-prevailing market price of around \$2 per cwt. in order to avoid a complete loss on the crop.

"This has slowed things down to the point that we probably won't be through here before the middle of August," Neff said on Monday, after having predicted last week that the local harvest would be concluded earlier.

Spotted showers of the past ten days interfered to some extent in the digging of the potato crop, he explained, and the low market was discouraging to producers who would face considerable labor expense in getting the crop out of the ground.

Acre yields in the Friona area continue to be around or above average, turning out in the vicinity of some 160 or better sacks of No. 1 potatoes with an additional 20 or more sacks of those graded at No. 2.

And at the potato shed, anxious producers watched flying hands sort the spuds at the same time they kept an ear cocked to hear the latest market reports.

This is Friona's first venture into the potato field, and indications earlier were very promising. The yield is good as yet—but the price isn't making growers too happy, especially when they point out the difference between what they're getting and what potatoes are continuing to sell for in grocery stores.

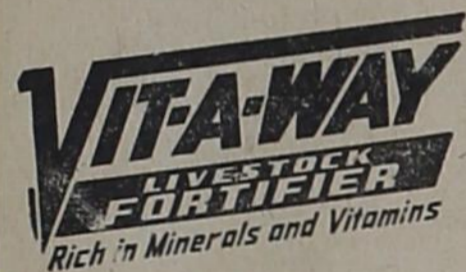

LEGAL NOTICE

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF FARMER
CITY OF FARWELL

On this 14th day of July, 1953, there was held a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Farwell, there being present and presiding John S. Williams, Mayor; Wilfred Quickel, City Clerk, and W. D. Hardage and Raymond Suddeth, Commissioners; and there came on to be considered licenses and occupation taxes; and it is found that the interests of the public health and safety require that various occupations be regulated.

Therefore, on motion of Commissioner Suddeth, seconded by Commissioner Hardage, and carried by unanimous vote, all members voting.

BE IT ORDAINED: (1) That on any of the public streets, alleys or parking areas within the limits of said city no automobile, truck, trailer, vehicle or other structure or contraption shall be parked and used as a place for vending merchandise, as same creates a definite safety hazard, and any person guilty of violation of this ordinance shall be fined the sum of \$10 and costs;

(2) That any person engaged in hawking or peddling any goods, wares, or merchandise or agricultural or farm products within the city limits shall, before engaging in such occupation, obtain license therefor from the City Clerk and the sum of \$10.00 is hereby determined to be a reasonable, fair and just charge for the issuance of such license and investigation of the person desiring same and such license shall be good for a period of 12 months from the date of its issuance;

(3) That any person engaged in storing or selling fireworks within the city limits shall, before engaging in such occupation, obtain license therefor from the City Clerk, which license shall likewise be good for a period of 12 months from the date of execution and no such license shall be granted until the City Clerk has thoroughly investigated and determined that such fireworks are stored in such quantities and in such locations as to minimize the fire hazard, and that all sales thereof are conducted so as to create a minimum fire hazard, and any such license so granted may be revoked at any time and the City Clerk shall each 14 days after the issuance of any such license, carefully inspect the plant of

such licensee and determine that all safety factors are being observed and the City Council here now determines that \$50.00 per year is a reasonable and just charge for such license, and should any person so engage in such business without obtaining such license within the city limits, he shall be fined \$50.00 and costs for each such offense;

(4) Any person desiring to use the public streets or alleys of said city for any purpose such as plumbing, pipe fitting, tree doctoring or the pruning of trees in the parking areas or streets or alleys, or for any other purpose than as a place of passage, shall, before engaging in such occupation within the city limits, obtain from the City Clerk a license for such work, and the sum of \$10.00 is hereby determined to be a reasonable, fair and just charge for the issuance of such license and such license shall be good for a period of 12 months from the date of its issuance.

Burnett Dairy Herd Classified

HIS FAVORITE COW

One of the most important steps in the progress of Farmer County dairying—if not the entire state—was made last week, when the Brown Swiss herd of D. C. Burnett was classified by a man ranking high among the nation's dairy animal authorities.

Of the more than 120 Brown Swiss herds in the state of Texas, Burnett's is the only one which has received the distinction of being graded.

Aside from the importance of the classification itself, residents of this area will be proud to learn that the Burnett herd rated exceptionally well. Of 23 animals classified, lowest grading was "fair," and this mark recorded on only two cows.

On the other hand, Burnett's prize animal, Silver Creek Florence, rated a "very good" score; 10 cows "good, plus"; and 10 "good." County Agent Joe Jones, in explaining the system of classifying, pointed out the strictness with which grades are recorded. "An animal is graded against 'perfection,'" he said.

The judge, one of the very few men qualified to grade five breeds of dairy cattle, was F. W. Atkeson of Kansas. His ratings are considered official to all dairy associations.

Others on hand to participate in the judging included Marvin Cruse, Brown Swiss field director of Beloit, Wis.; O. C. Rose, secretary of the Texas Brown Swiss Assn., Amarillo; and Martin Fulcher, a Brown Swiss dairyman formerly of Black, but now residing in Lubbock.

Burnett, whose Brown Swiss herd numbers about 50 registered cows has been working with the breed since 1947. He has lived south of Friona since 1922, moving

there from the northeast corner of Roosevelt County in New Mexico.

He has been milking cows for 32 years, and since his interest first turned to dairying, he has strived to get and keep a herd superior to the average.

As most Plains dairymen do, Burnett got his start with Jerseys. He has switched breeds a number of times, but finally settled on Brown Swiss, regarded as a "dual purpose" animal.

The management of the dairy herd has been aided by sons of Mr. and Mrs. Burnett, who include Leroy, 20; Lester, 17; and Leonard 14; The Burnetts also have one daughter, Dorothy, 23.

"If it wasn't for my boys, I would have had to sell out," says Burnett, recalling a few months back when arthritis had rendered him unable to tend to the chores.

There is a lot of work in taking care of 50 registered dairy cows, as anyone who has tried it will testify, but the Burnetts are fortunate in having available modern equipment to help them out.

Their milk barn is kept clean, and must meet standards of a commercial company in Amarillo which buys the Burnett milk. The cows are locked into their stalls by devices made by Burnett himself which allows him to handle several animals at once. Milk is cooled in a large unit near the milking stalls.

Burnett assembled his foundation herd in 1947, when he purchased five registered heifers and one bull from Silver Creek Farms at Freeport, Kansas.

The Borden Company of Amarillo was so interested in getting Burnett to try out the Brown Swiss cows they sponsored a six-day trip for him, to give him a chance to look over the breed. He was convinced of their possibilities.

Aside from producing dairy products for commercial sale, the animals owned by Burnett have distinguished themselves time and

time again in fairs and expositions held all over the Southwest.

Bigger prizes have been taken at the New Mexico state fair in Albuquerque than anywhere else, says Burnett, although he also regards scores of ribbons and banners from other fairs as noteworthy, also.

Burnett is firmly convinced of the future of the Brown Swiss breed in Texas and Farmer County agriculture. He has worked—and is working—toward encouraging more members of the Brown Swiss Association of Texas to have their herds classified. He considers this a move necessary before the recognition of advanced breeding and production records in this part of the country will be nationally realized.

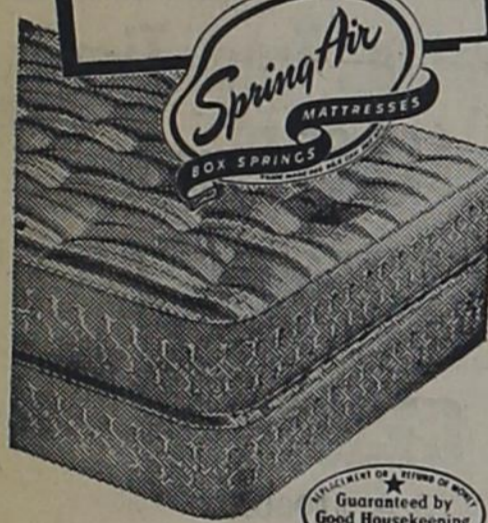
