They couldn't get out of camp, let alone hunt. For five days the men had to sit around and entertain themselves. Aubrey says that it's the tidiest he ever got of sitting on a wooden box, and we don't doubt it.

A lot of people are sure disappointed to hear that Walter Hardage isn't going to give away a new car again this year. He says "It's too darn much trouble."

Probably true, too. We'd hate to have the responsibility of bothering with that mountain of tickets they had last year. Remember when they started out with a barrel to put the stubs in, and kept graduating upward to larger containers until they had a stock tank?

A lot of people remember, too, now since they didn't have any way of mixing up such a tremendous quantity of stubs, several men got into the tank and stirred up the stubs with their feet.

That's the biggest crowd that was ever in Texico-Farwell, and probably will be until another car is given away.

We went to see the dentist Friday. He plugged up the holes in our teeth and unplugged the holes in our pocketbook.

We don't get a chance to see how ignorant Americans really are until we're compared with the people of some other countries. While we make the pretense of being the lover and protector of all the people of the world, when it comes right down to the facts, it just doesn't stack up so well.

We read where the average French high school student can name more of our 48 states than most of us can; where the British young people can recite you more facts on the history of our nation than the typical American in his 30's.

The Norwegians understand our system of banking far better than do most of us, and the Chilean college students can name two state capitals to our one.

If you want to bring it home, look how not one in a hundred of us can speak acceptable conversational Spanish—the language of our neighbor to the south, (and of a good many native-born Americans).

Mexican nationals who have come to this part of the country this year, particularly a little to the east and south of us, have had a real problem making themselves understood.

More of those lowly (economically speaking) cotton pullers are bilingual than we folks here are, and about 90 percent of our population has had at least a high school education where the laborers have seldom been to school at all.

We live in the Southwest, where the tradition of Spanish influence is rich in our history. And we call ourselves well read and well educated.

Mrs. Decker, Early Settler, Dies at Merkel

Mrs. Ellen Baker Decker, 84, a West Texas homesteader, died at 4 a. m. Monday at her home in Merkel. She is the mother of Mrs. T. E. Levy.

Born Ellen Baker in Goliad County on July 7, 1869, she moved to West Texas in 1878. She was the widow of the late W. L. (Bill) Decker.

The couple settled on a section of land near Trent under the Homestead Act, which offered an acre of land for a dollar. Texas Rangers had just driven the Indians out when the Deckers started homesteading. From 1915 to 1929 the couple worked the Cal Hammer farm at Stith.

Mrs. Decker was a member of the Church of Christ for many years.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday in the Merkel Church of Christ, with Rex Kyker of Abilene Christian College and Roy E. Gulley of Merkel officiating.

Burial was in Rose Hill cemetery under the direction of the Starbuck Funeral Home in Merkel.

Survivors include three sons, Jim and Bill, both of Goree, and A. Z. of Abilene; eight daughters, Mrs. J. E. Kirkpatrick of Waco, Mrs. T. E. Levy of Farwell, Mrs. J. B. Balder of Southland, Mrs. J. L. Wingo of Brentwood, Calif., Mrs. Warren Kelly of Muskogee, Okla., Mrs. O. C. Shouse of Mineral Wells, and Mrs. Ima Moore and Mrs. Hollis McCoy of Merkel; 39 grandchildren and 56 great-grandchildren.

Magerus, Stover Sales Scheduled Next Week

Doshier and Francis will have their hands full Monday and Tuesday of next week, when they conduct the farm sales of Albert Magerus and R. A. (Bob) Stover.

The Magerus sale is scheduled for Monday, starting early (9:30 Texas time), and 31 head of Holsteins, 59 head of registered Short-horns, 93 head of registered Hampshire hogs, and a big list of machinery will go on the auction block.

The machinery will be auctioned before noon, hogs sold at 1 p. m., and the cattle sale will follow. Elmwood Farm, as the Magerus place is known, is located 5 miles east and 1 south and 1/2 east of Clovis; or 1 mile west of Port of Entry, 1 south, and 1 west from Texico.

Fairfield Ladies' Club will serve lunch.

Stover's sale will be Tuesday, and he has 26 head of dairy cattle, a list of machinery, and lots of miscellaneous items to attract bidders. His place is 4 1/2 miles north of Texico-Farwell on the state line road. The sale will start at 10:30, Texas time. Pleasant Hill Community Club will serve lunch.

COURT TO BE 24TH

District Judge E. A. Bills of Littlefield will be here Nov. 24, to hold non-jury court trials, Loyde Brewer, county clerk, says. Schedule for Nov. 11 was not filled because of Armistice Day.

"Somebody ought to get out and make an actual count of those irrigation wells in the county," said one Parmer County farmer. "I tell you, no one had any idea that we'd get such a crop this year."

Main reason for the bumper production is thought to lie in the high yield, rather than simply a matter of acreage. Elevator men say yields are going to average somewhere around 3000 pounds per acre, which means that some fields are returning as much as 6000 pounds and over.

The reason the yields are so large is because there are so many new irrigation wells, farmers believe. Land under irrigation the first year will produce far more than will land that has been watered a number of years. That is discounting fertilizing, of course.

Some elevators were shipping out to terminal storage Tuesday when this story was compiled, but generally speaking, the movement to terminal storage might be regarded as light.

Following is a report brought in by Abie Crume, correspondent for the Friona area:

Grain storage facilities in Friona have been exhausted as the 1953 crop poured into the two local elevators in a constant stream of trucks and pickups over the weekend.

"I never believed we'd do it," said Arthur Drake, manager of the Friona Wheat Growers Elevators on Monday, pointing out that storage space of more than one million bushels would be exhausted by noon of that day.

And across the tracks at Santa Fe Grain Co., Manager "Preach" Cranfill opined that his elevator would be full to the gills by evening Monday.

The same story was true at Black, nine miles east of the city. "None," said J. R. Braxton of the Black Elevator Co., when asked about storage. At the Sears Grain, Manager D. C. Allison said:

man replied, "We have a little storage left, but it won't last long."

And so it goes. What had been expected to be a good but not unusual crop is turning out such a bountiful harvest that storage facilities all over the area are being pushed to the limit.

In Friona itself, very little grain has been moved out into terminal storage, managers report. The Black Elevator Co., however, has shipped out a total of 75 cars, and was loading more on Monday, allowing them to receive grain that day. Terminal storage is available, it is reported, but boxcars to move local grain aren't.

Yields are hardly short of phenomenal in some instances, according to reports, and the general consensus of opinion is that the average in the territory on irrigated stuff, will run 3500 or up per acre.

In Bovina, J. P. Macon reported his elevator "filled up." He said the grain had been coming in rapidly, and remarked that a good deal of it was pretty wet.

Moisture content has run from 12 1/2 to 15 percent, he says. Macon indicated he will have some terminal storage to relieve his present "filled up" position.

At Sherley Grain Company, whose recent addition gave them 2,060,000-bushel storage space, Penrod Anderson estimated they would be full "about 4 o'clock today" (Tuesday).

Sherley then plans to go ahead and accept grain and pile it on the ground. A road grader was busy Tuesday morning preparing a space in anticipation of this move. Anderson said they would put 300,000 or 400,000 pounds on the ground "if we have to," but indicated they didn't want to unless necessary.

Friona elevators filled up Monday, and trucks from that part of the county helped account for the 80,000 bushels that poured into Sherley Grain that day.

Bovina Wheat Growers, with a 100,000 capacity, were reported full, and piling grain on the ground. Their big days were Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last weekend.

Employees indicated they will attempt to ship out grain that will be temporarily placed on the ground.

Lariat Grain and Seed were full Tuesday, as reported by Mrs. George Houser, and so was Lariat Elevator, according to Mrs. Boone Allison. The latter concern has shipped "about 120 cars" to date. Grain was still coming into Lariat.

In Texico-Farwell, Lovelace Grain and Seed was "full," according to Mrs. Gene Lovelace. Capacity there is 290,000 bushels, she said, adding that their big run came Monday of this week.

Roberts Seed Company, with elevators in Texico, reported that they were doing a large seed business this fall. "The sudan crop was officially estimated at 69 percent larger than last year, and 41 percent larger than the 10-year average," says James Patrick.

He went on to say, however, that he considered this as an underestimation, and noted that it looked like Bailey and Parmer County's crop would almost account for the total Texas estimate.

Herbert Potts at Farwell Elevator said he had been keeping up with the harvest by shipping to terminal storage, but "there's just about to catch me now," he says.

Charles Starts CROP Drive To Help World's Starving

Motivated by word from a Parmer County man in South Korea who has written home describing the terrible conditions of the people there, Wilbur Charles of Bovina was out making the rounds this week, trying to reactivate the CROP program in Parmer County.

Two years ago, there was a drive for contributions of grain for the humanitarian idea (Christian Rural Overseas Relief Program), and the county shipped out a car of donated grain.

Last year, interest slumped and no one was willing to take the responsibility of heading a drive in Parmer, so nothing was sent.

Charles, although not anxious to assume the responsibility, has taken the Parmer County chairmanship, saying "Somebody has got to do it," and he indicates that workers will be gathered to a committee meeting the first of next week.

As immediate assistants, the Bovina man said he was asking R. W. Anderson Jr. to serve as treasurer; and Wilfred Quickel as secretary.

Committeemen from each county community will be appointed this week, and called to a meeting Monday. State CROP official Walter Parr will be here at that time.

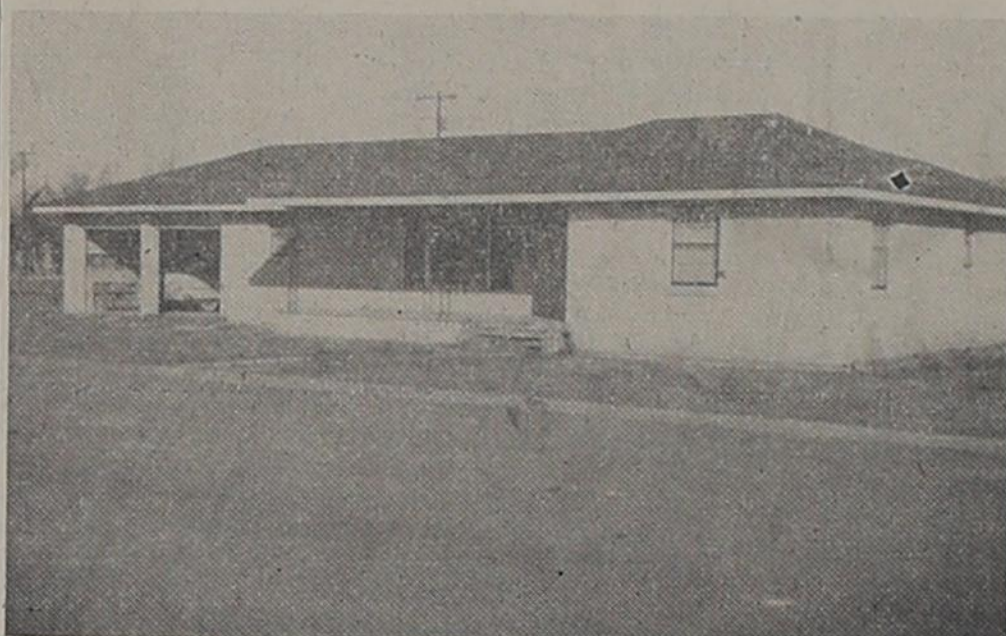
The first meeting will be at

Friona at 9 a. m., and another at Farwell at 11 that morning.

Charles said the drive will be for at least one carload of grain. "We ought to get that much easy," he said, considerate of the tremendous crop with which Parmer farmers have been blessed this fall.

However, contributions aside from grain will be appreciated, too. Cotton would be especially welcome, and citizens may donate cash if they prefer. Additional details will be carried in next week's paper, but the chairman reminds that the campaign must be concluded by "the middle of December at the very latest."

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Trend Back to Washington Again Noticeable

Late in 1951, and early in 1952, there was great talk made about the ominous encroachment of federal influence over state, county, and municipal sovereignty. But how long has it been since you heard the cry about the "Washington Octopus"?

Not since the coastal states retained possession of the "tidelands" have we heard so much as a mumble about how the Great White Father in the nation's capitol was horning in on business that was not his.

Further, there has been a noticeable slump in the zeal of strong individualists who so recently decried the over-centralization of the federal executiveship. What has happened?

Here's the way we feel: Even though war was officially concluded in 1945, the machinery for keeping the war machines alive and healthy was maintained. Consequently, inflation and high wages, by-products of a military economy, continued until just recently.

Farmers, salaried people, and especially wage earners have "never had it so good," as the Democratic party put it. They were really feeling their oats with the high demands for nearly all products.

Now, however, there has been a definite downturn of the business economy, and although not serious as to promote an actual depression, it appears that we have truly reached the "levelling off" stage.

Most farm prices are down drastically. Over-time for industry workers is almost non-existent. Many of these workers are in debt and are depending on overtime to pay their way out.

These groups are still penalized by prices for goods and services (at a retail level) that are at an all-time high. The net result is frustration.

And as a consequence, the people have turned their eyes to Washington for the solution of their problems. Rather than a sober consideration of what may be the result of their demands for guaranteed wages or high prices for their products, their chief interest is immediate relief of their problems—although the picture is not as serious

as some believe. The earners and producers of America today have grown flabby in the lush years of and following WW II and the Korean conflict. They are frightened into panic by even the thought of a readjustment to normal times—let alone a recession.

Spread Gets Us, Too

We are, like a whole lot of other people in this nation, inquisitive over the situation of falling farm prices and static or rising retail prices.

There has been a tremendous increase in the spread of beef produced on the farm and the steak or roast at the market. This margin has not been so conspicuous in the case of second grade cuts of beef, we'll admit, since by and large, the cattle that have been going to market in recent months aren't highly finished animals.

Nearly all farm prices have been bearish in the past nine months. Some retail prices have slumped, but never in a ratio comparable with what the farmer had been hit with.

Some people who three years ago wondered why they didn't get into the cattle business and make some of that big money now know.

It is our private opinion that a lot of money finds its way into our church that wouldn't be there if it wasn't a deductible income tax item.

We bet it won't be six weeks before some half-asleep driver collides with one of those new street lights on Mabry Drive going into Clovis.

We have come to the conclusion that it is an impossibility to print one newspaper without an error. So have a lot of our readers.

In thirty years Bovina citizens will regard their recent bond election as one of the wisest things ever done for the school system. Nothing is too good for the preparation of tomorrow's Americans.

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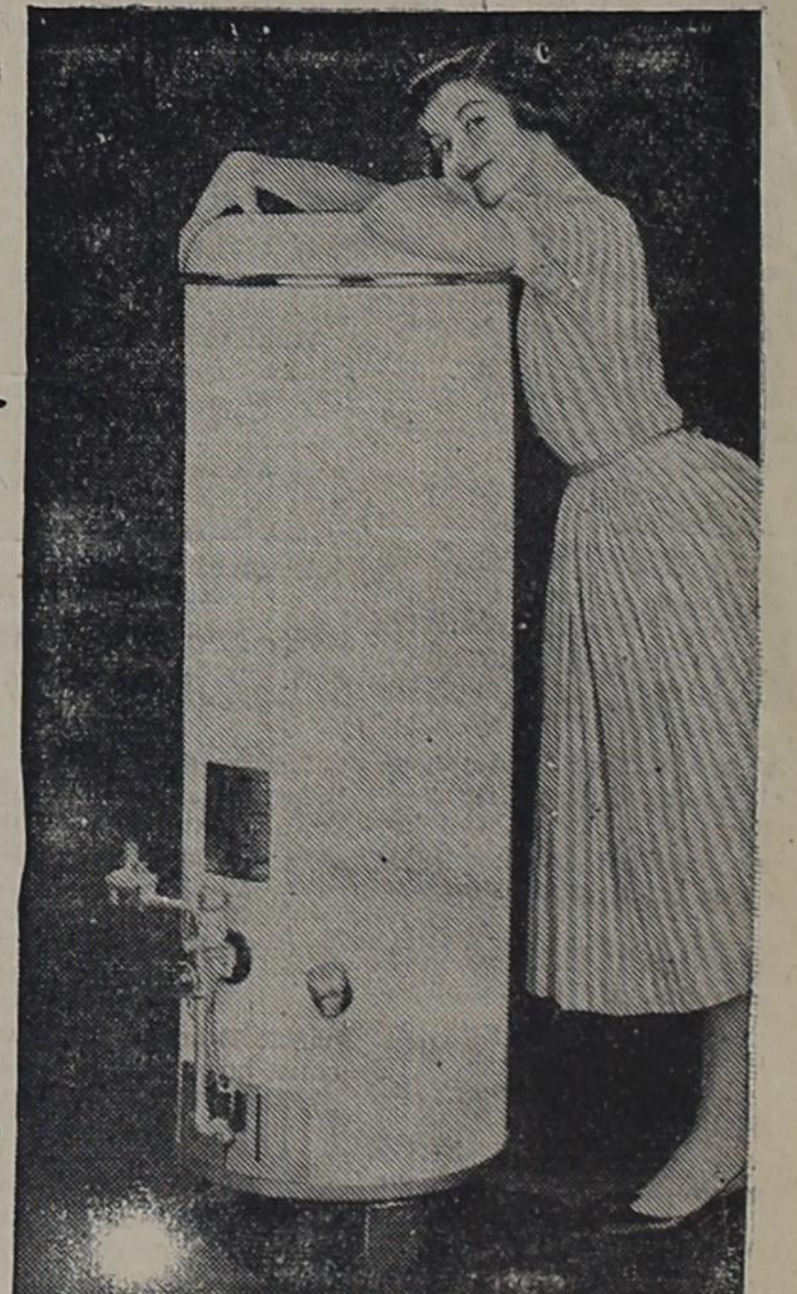

Residents Recover From Gas Poisoning

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Brownlow this week report no lasting ill effects from their near-brush with a serious, if not fatal, threat to their lives ten days ago, when they were almost overcome by gas fumes in their home north of Friona.

The couple had both visited a dentist during the day, leaving their young daughter, Jacquelyn, with relatives at Hale Center. Arriving home late in the afternoon, Brownlow lighted the gas heater, turning it on fairly high to warm the house, and shortly thereafter the family retired.

Awakening feeling ill, Brownlow went to the bathroom, falling several times as he made the trip, and disturbing his wife, who managed to get up to find out what ailed her husband. "I knew I was sick, but thought it was from the dental work," Mrs. Brownlow said this week.

She finally got control of her faculties enough to write a note and send it via a passing Mexican to a family down the road, and shortly afterward the Browns were being checked at the local hospital.

Jacquelyn suffered no poisoning at all, apparently because her bed was located in a corner surrounded by windows, through which some air had managed to come during the night. Mrs. Brownlow said this week that ordinarily they kept a window open in the bath when a fire was left burning, but having spent the day away from home, the window had been closed.

Fire Chasers Will Be Fined for Obstructing Passage of Trucks

A crackdown on the practice of following fire trucks is coming, it was announced this week by city officials, and City Manager Roy Wilson stated curtly, "Something has to be done . . . it has reached the point where many times the route of trucks is blocked by spectators."

Wilson hastened to add that the department welcomed assistance at a fire—but on the other hand, pointed out, "We'll ask for help as we need it, and people cluttering up the area with cars are more of a menace than a help."

Specifically, it is pointed out that spectators are violating the law if they park in the same block when a fire has necessitated calling the department. Likewise, when a siren sounds, all moving traffic is required by law to pull to the side of the road or street and remain in such position until the trucks pass, or the siren stops.

Cooperation is going to be asked from residents, but Wilson emphasized the fact that City Marshal Jim Roberts will be authorized to offer tickets to offenders unless the practice of obstructing the right-of-way is halted.

Fines for first offenders will be \$1 going up on a "doubling" scale for each successive offense.

We have heard some criticism of a resolution commending the Secretary of Agriculture for work done in investigating the spread between cattle prices on the hoof and at the market. One delegate rose and insisted that the word "commend" be stricken and "condemn" inserted. The vote, however, favored commend by a large majority, and it reads that way because Farm Bureau is democratic in fact and in action; the majority rules.

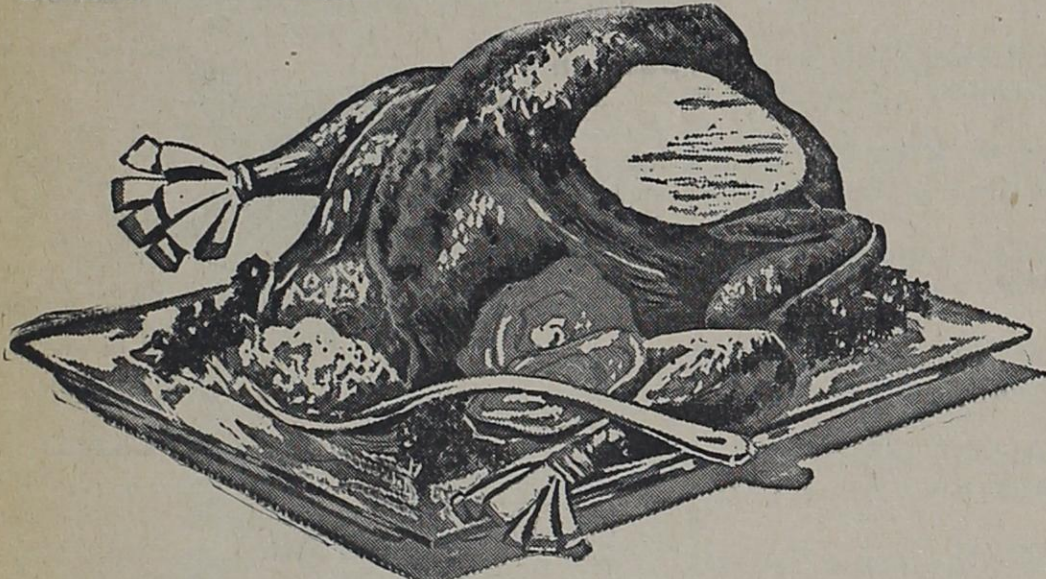
