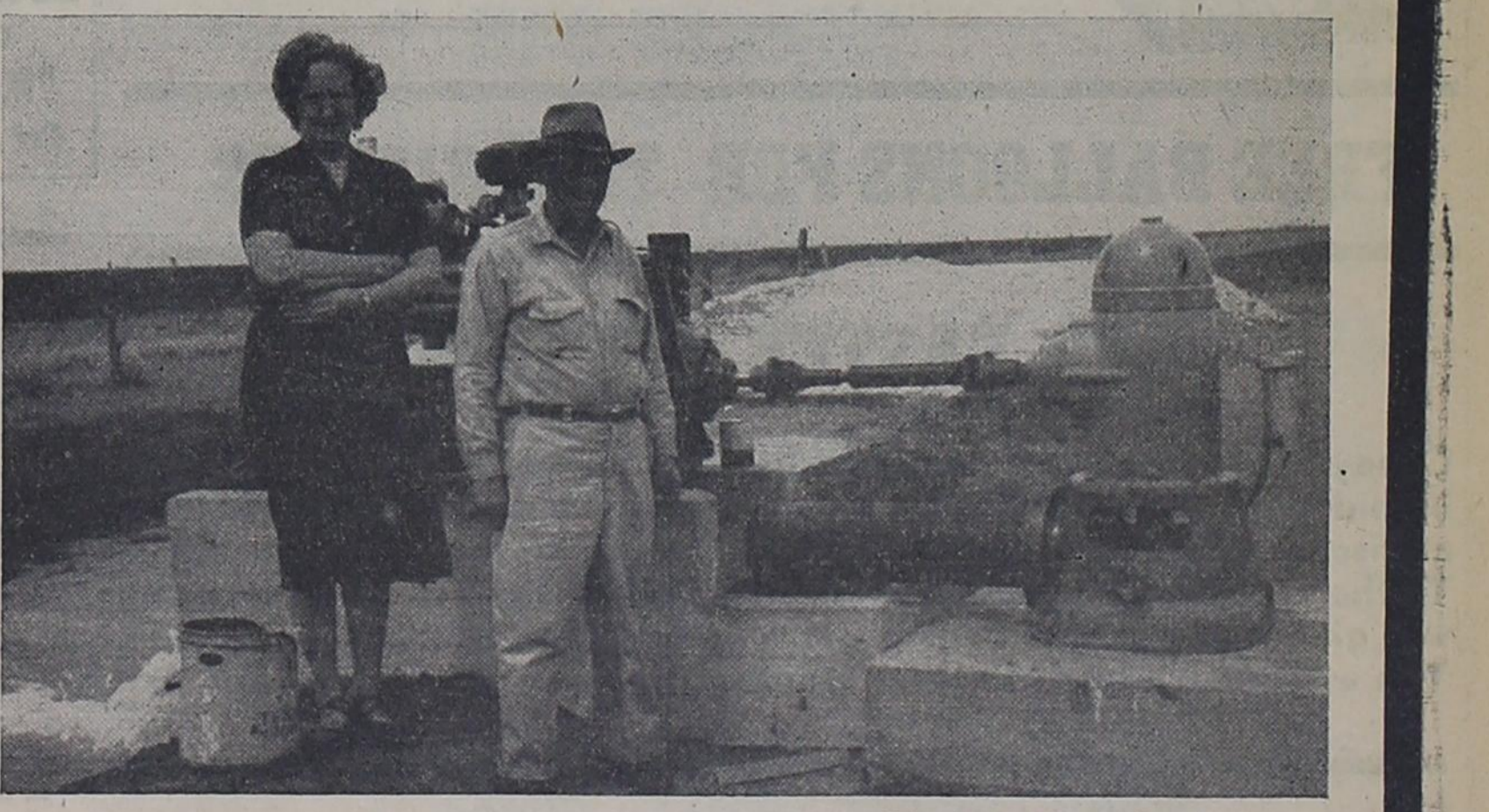

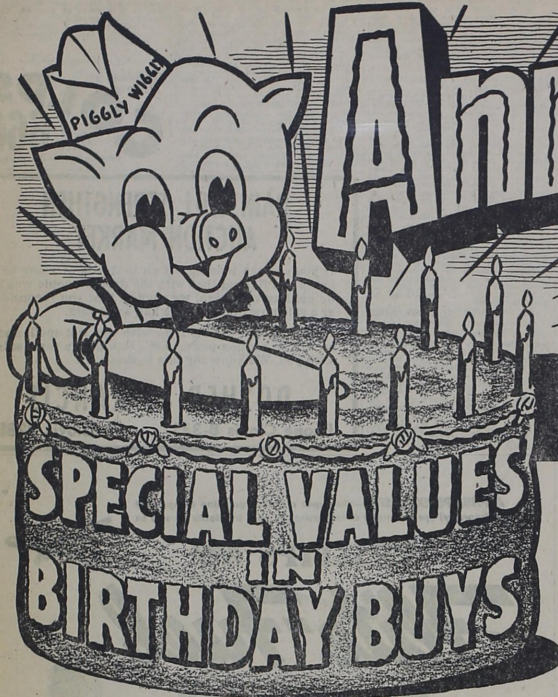

School Bond Issue Approved Locally In Light Vote

Voting in the proposed bond issue involving some \$250,000 in grammar school construction for Friona was very light the past Saturday, with T. J. Crawford, judge of the election, reporting only a total of 139 ballots cast.

And the "for" count far outnumbered those opposed to the issue. Tabulations by Crawford gave a total of 115 favorable ballots as compared to 24 registered in the negative.

Supt. Dalton Caffey, contacted on Monday morning, said that preliminary plans for the grade school building had been in the making for some time, pending the outcome of the election. Now, the architect will be given the green signal, and final drafts are expected within a few weeks.

Next move in the program will be letting of a contract to a construction firm, and it is presumed that actual work on the building will be ready to begin by the close of the current school term, in May.

One-Act Play Given Before Lions Club

The Friona high school's one-act play, which won district honors during the weekend, was the feature of the entertainment program for the Lions Club, when a regular meeting was held the past Thursday evening at the club house.

Boosters from Hereford were among the Lions assembled, with some forty-three local members and guests on hand.

The local club is looking toward the convention to be held in Amarillo the latter part of this month, and plans are being made for a delegation representing Friona to attend. Miss Sally Osborn, Lions Club sweetheart from Friona, will be entered in competition with other girls from over the area at the Amarillo convention.

Rain, Beautiful Rain, Falls in Area

The first measurable amounts of moisture to be recorded in 10, these many months, fell in varying amounts over the Friona trade territory the early part of this week.

And whatever the amount, from a sprinkle upward, it was received with cries of joy over the area. The moisture seemed to be fairly general over the entire Panhandle; at the same time, amounts were spotted and will naturally, do considerably more good in some areas than in other less-fortunate locations.

Summerfield recorded hard showers during the early part of Sunday afternoon, and from that community to past Black the rain appeared heavier than was recorded in Friona. Rain gauges locally set the city receipts at close to .25 of an inch up to noon Monday, with some light spatters still being received.

West and north of town, the precipitation appeared about the same as that in the city, and reports to the south indicated the same general amounts. One unconvinced farmer near Black was seen out in a good steady shower, Sunday afternoon, grimly going about the business of sending irrigation water down the lines on his field of wheat, but a large number of wells were shut down for a brief breather until the skies began to clear and the full extent of the moisture could be determined.

Pasture-land and dry wheat fields, such as there are in the county, will receive the greatest benefit from the rain, but every resident in the district stands to benefit indirectly.

Seniors Take Part In Field Day Work

Seniors of the Friona school, accompanied by Murry Ford, were in Muleshoe the past Saturday where an educational field day was sponsored for all seniors of the area by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

Various panel groups were offered for discussion in different professions, with professional men being on hand to speak to the students. Representatives from various colleges and universities in the area were also on hand at the meeting.

Extended Coverage Approved in Friona

Extension of local telephone service to encompass rural areas has been approved by subscribers who expressed their preference in a recent postcard survey conducted by General Telephone Company.

According to records kept at the office of City Manager Roy Wilson, the pro vote ran to a total of 200, with some 78 ballots being counted in opposition. Deadline for voting was set the past Saturday, with a total of 278 cards out of a possible 374 being returned to the city office.

Approval of the Telephone Company's proposal means that toll charges to rural cooperative phone numbers will be eliminated, but at the same time, a slight hike will be noticed in charges on telephones within the city limits of Friona.

Asked as to when General Telephone might be expected to "tie in" the rural phones, Wilson said that earlier information was to the effect that it would be "two to three months" after necessary material is ordered, which would indicate that the extended service will not likely be in effect before early fall.

Rhea Turns in \$73 To Red Cross Fund

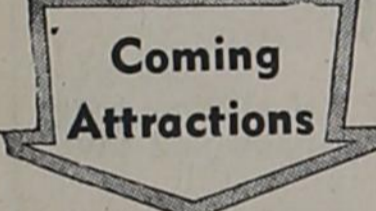

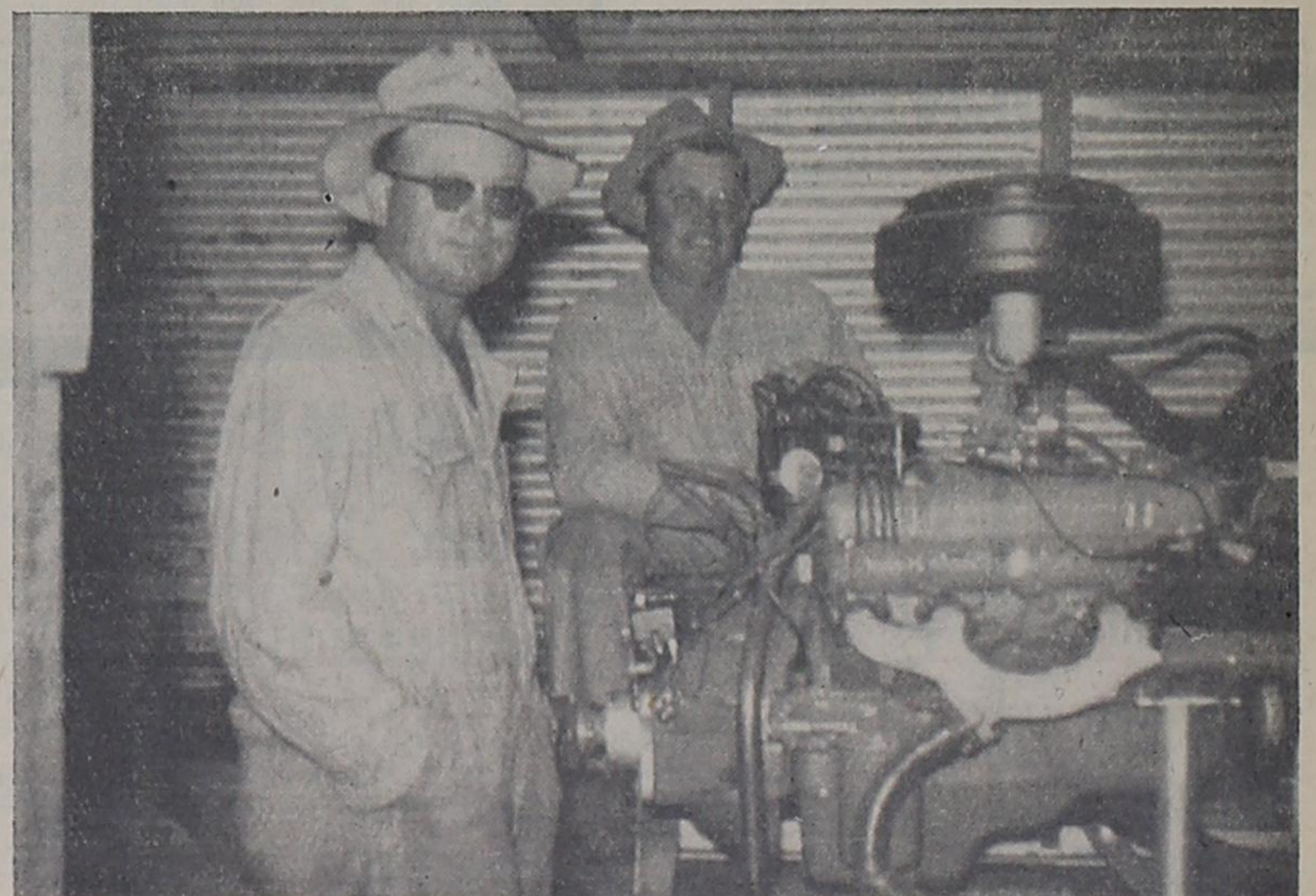

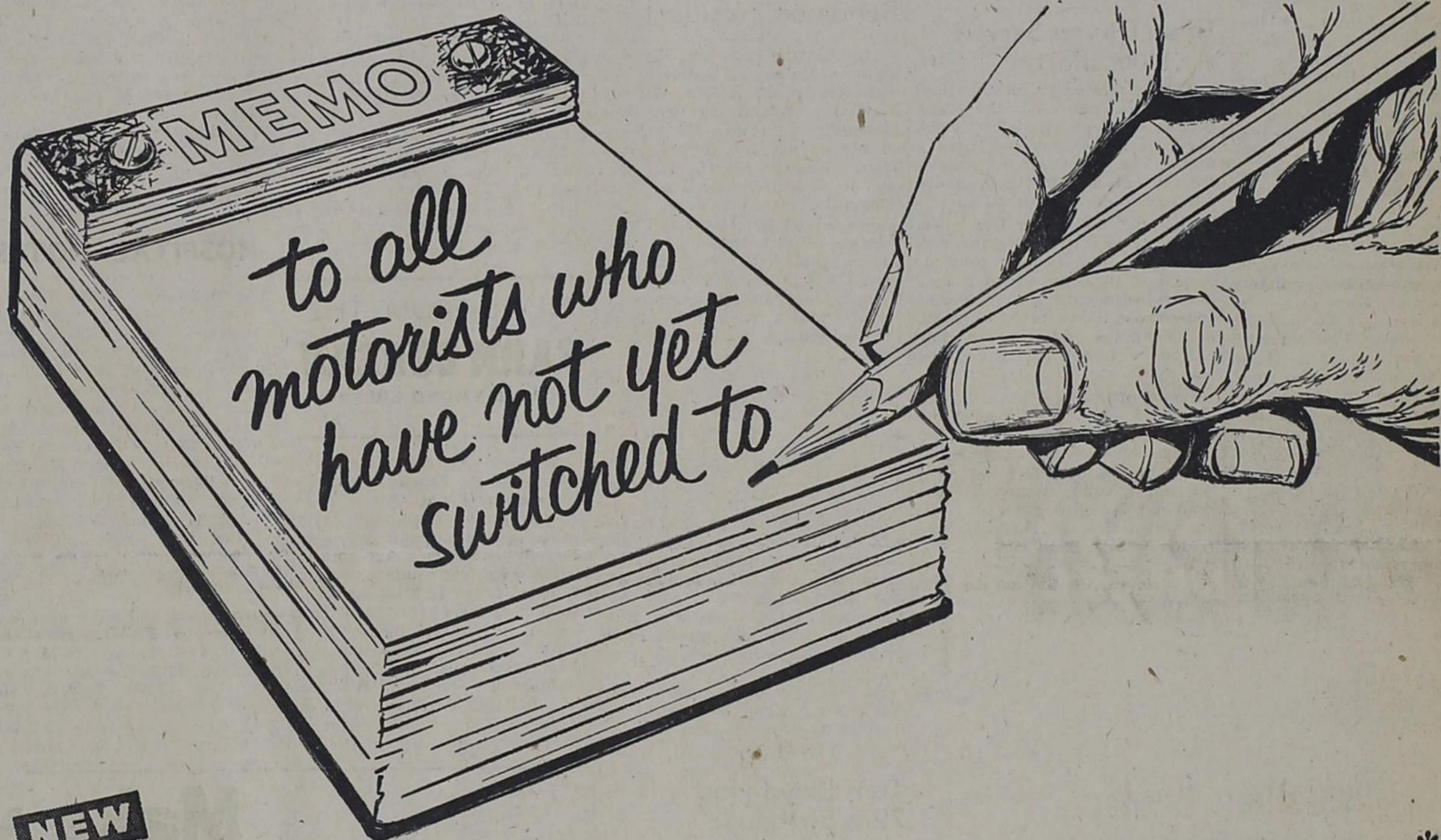

Irrigation day was a very successful day for Extension Service and SCS last Friday. Seems to us it should prove profitable to every farmer attending, and we wish everyone irrigating, or contemplating irrigation could have been on hand. There is little doubt, in the light of facts presented at the meeting, that many thousands of dollars could be saved in the initial installation and long-term operation of water wells. It is also our conviction that haste is again the cause of much waste when a man feels the final urge that com-

pels him to start irrigation. Congratulations to Steve Bavousett and Joe Jones, promoters of the program.

Secretaries and presidents of county Farm Bureaus in District Two met in Lubbock April 6. They adopted recommendations to be presented to Congress to aid farmers in drouth areas. Parmer County, fortunately, is delivered from the bulk of tragedy caused by drouth by the abundance of irrigation water. Emergency loans with extremely low interest, long term contracts were recommended. It was recommended that such loan monies, when repaid, be held in a permanent fund for reallocation for drouth relief, instead of being returned to their source. 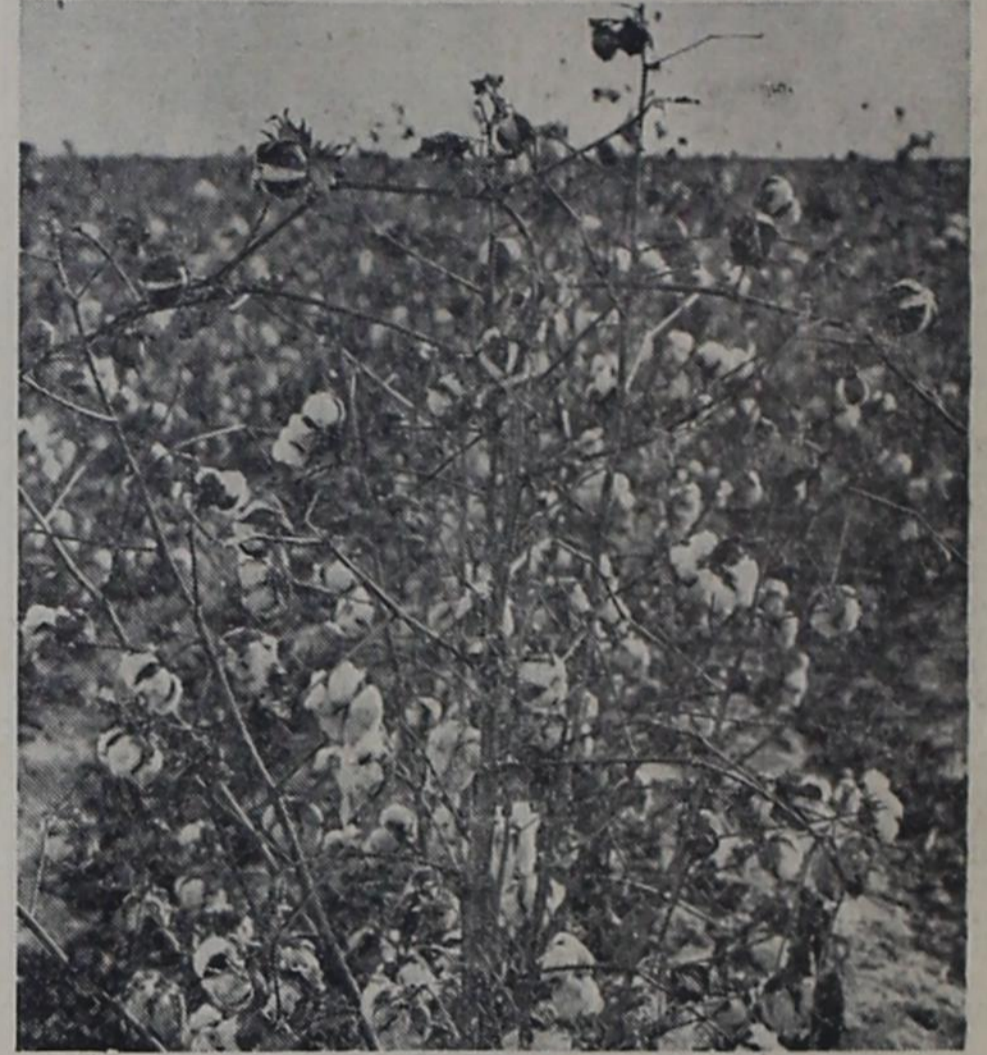

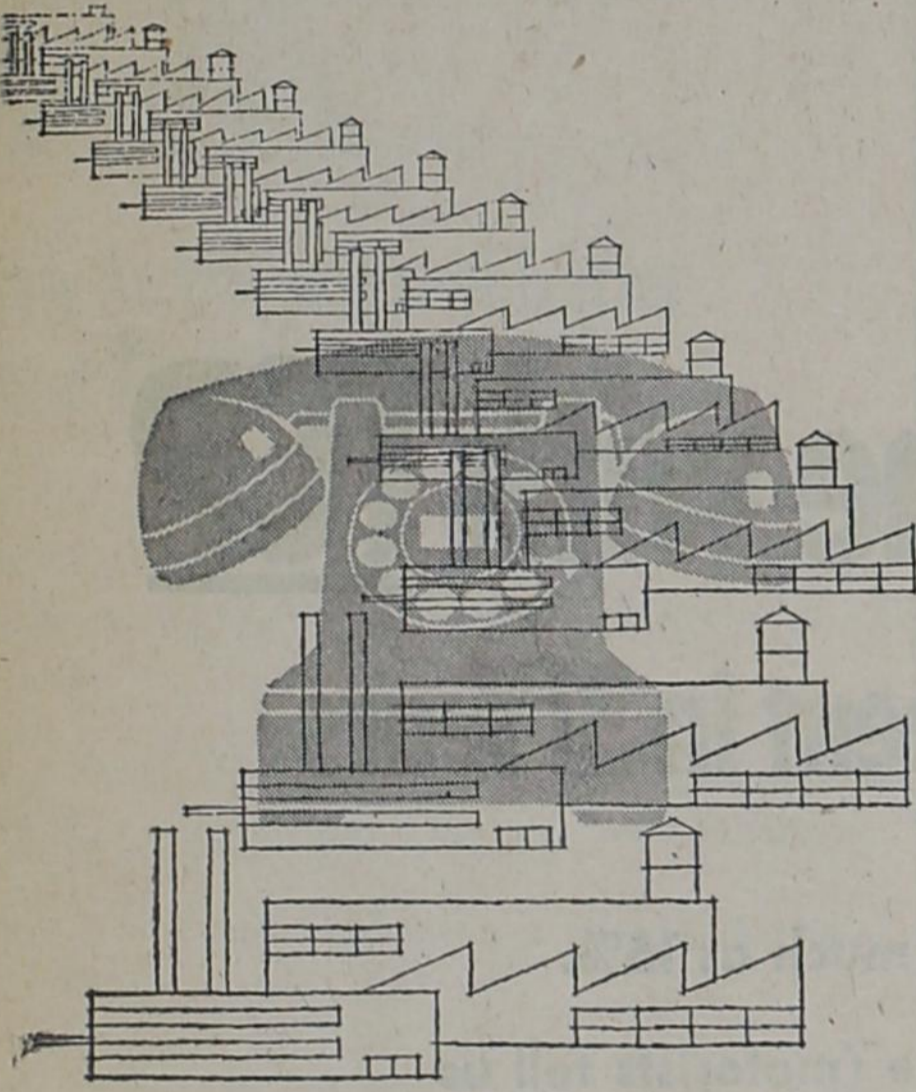
