Irrigation Meeting at Bovina

Parmer County farmers, beset with regulations of all types to which they must comply in their farming operations, will get a break and have a chance to get straightened out on at least part of them next Thursday night at Bovina.

That's the date for an irrigation meeting at the Bovina Legion Hall, to start at 8 o'clock. Emphasis will be on regulations relating especially to irrigation farming, but plenty of other

type information will be in circulation, too.

Speakers scheduled for the meeting include Bob Thurmond, irrigation expert of the Extension Service, who is no stranger to High Plains irrigationists. He will help farmers solve problems of conservation and methods of application for irrigation water.

Also on the program is Tom McFarland, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District. He has spent

many hours in this part of the country working with farmers in the district of which Parmer is a part.

He will be able to help clarify many problems relating to rules and regulations in the district, and the expectation is that there will be a new emphasis placed on the regulation challenging wasteful use of irrigation water. This is the "law with teeth in it."

Third member to appear before the group will be Bill Broadhurst,

who is the chief engineer for the district. He will explain to farmers things of a more technical nature. Broadhurst is expected to report on methods now being given a trial in an effort to conserve water and recharge underground sands.

All in all, it promises to be a program irrigation farmers of the area can scarcely afford to pass up.

G. F. McLean Dies In Friona Sunday

George McLean, 79, well-known resident of this area, passed away around 10:30 Sunday night due to a heart attack. He died at his home in Friona where he has been living the past six or seven years.

Funeral services were held at the Friona Methodist Church, Tuesday afternoon, with Bro. U. S. Sherrill in charge. Assisting was Bro. J. J. Spurlin, of Melbourne. Interment was in the Bovina Cemetery.

George Francis McLean was born November 9th, 1874 at Powersville, Miss.; and died at his home in Friona, April 18, at the age of 79 years, 6 months and 9 days. His parents were Gregory Doyle McLean and Sarah McLean, and he was their eldest son.

On December 28th, 1895, he was married to Miss Laura Gish, at Powersville, Missouri. To this union were born two daughters and a son, Agnes, Bessie and George. After the death of his wife, Laura, he moved to New Mexico, where he met and married Miss Ollie Whitaker, on November 30th, 1905. They homesteaded 20 miles north of Texico, where they resided until moving to Friona in 1938.

In 1905 Mr. McLean joined the Methodist Church, of which he remained an active member until his death. He is survived by his wife, Ollie McLean, one brother, John McLean, of Bovina; three sisters, Mrs. Hattie Alsip, of Chicago; Mrs. Kate Queen, of Bovina; and Mrs. Mattie Spurlin, of Texico; one daughter, Mrs. Bessie Houlette, of Friona; 11 grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren. George McLean was a friend to everyone and leaves a host of friends and relatives to mourn his passing.

Deposits Hold Firm At Security State

Bank deposits held a firm place at the close of the second quarter this year, according to a report made by Security State Bank in accordance with a call from the state banking commissioner.

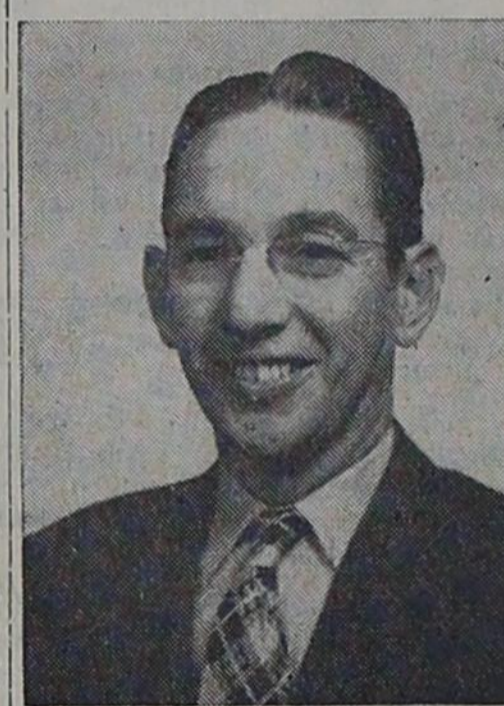
All Cubs and their parents are urged to attend, and any other interested persons in the Scouting movement are issued an invitation.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

How Come So Many Unhappy People?

A thousand books have been written on happiness and how to achieve it. The very fact that there are so many treatises devoted to the subject is testimony of their ineffectiveness. A person can no more attain happiness and personal satisfaction from reading a book than he can expect to be an expert and success in the newspaper business simply by digesting several books on the subject.

The reason for this is because it takes different kinds of things to make different types of people happy. Some are happy in succeeding in business. Some find happiness in helping others. Some people attain happiness through their work and association with other people. There are even a few of us who are only happy when we have caused others to be unhappy.

Our friends 30 years and older tell us that a peculiar thing about the depression of the 30's is that it seemed to bind folks together—made them better friends—and happier people. That sounds like a paradox, to be sure, but they say it's really true.

As an example, suppose you have been living on a modest, but sufficient standard of living. Your neighbor has had luck. Not only is he out of a job, but the family suddenly loses what little they have through a fire. You, of course, very willingly pitch in to share what is yours and help the family in every way possible. In so doing, you manage to learn in an intimate way everything about this family. Strong ties are made. You feel happy. You ARE happy. You have shared. You have helped someone who needed help.

Granting that the Red Cross, the community chests, and various and sundry other welfare groups have made contributions toward relieving suffering and pain, and that we would today find it difficult to get along without these agencies, we are of the opinion that these groups are in the dangerous position of taking the responsibility away from all of us for the concern of our neighbors' welfare.

We chip in a five spot when the Red Cross worker comes around and cross that off for the year's work for our fellow man. It's a different conception of love, that is substituting the dollar for understanding and compassion.

No wonder so many people are today so unhappy. They are so wrapped up in themselves and their own little worlds that they have little time and no desire to reach down and help a friend when he may need help the most.

They say that it happens just about every spring anyway, but nevertheless, it is a very refreshing pleasure to report to our readers that nearly all businessmen are reporting increasing retail activity. This is going to be a good year for most of our farmers in spite of the very dry start we are having.

A Necessity for Our Time

If you live in a community interested in the welfare and guidance of its youth (and what community isn't?) we suggest that you underwrite and lend all the assistance you possibly can to whatever summer recreation work may be planned for the young people of your town.

Showing real interest in the needs of our young people has been one of the real faults of the modern day mothers and daddys. We challenge anyone to show us a group of teen age and under boys and girls who are willing to pitch in and work to help provide more and better recreational facilities for the town. They lack only guidance and genuine interest from their parents.

Second to taking the kids to church on Sunday, we place being interested in seeing that they are provided wholesome healthful programs of recreation.

We predict a raise in retail business in small cities of this part of the Southwest on the strength of optimism generated by the rain. Clouds and the sweet smell of freshly dampened earth are welcome visitors to this fertile area, and irrigation wells have not in the least diminished our hospitality to them.

Considering the price of new cars today, in addition with the crowded condition of major highways, to say nothing of parking problems in fairly populated areas, we are surprised at the lack of growth of private light-plane flying. How often do you see a private plane advertisement in your morning or weekly paper, or even in popular, nationally-circulated magazines? Perhaps the lack of this type sales promotion has something to do with this, as we can think of few fields with more opportunity for growth.

Concrete Pipe Should Be Deductible Expense, Says Daniel

A letter received last weekend by The Tribune from Sen. Price Daniel brings good news to many irrigation farmers contemplating the installation of concrete underground pipe.

Sen. Daniel has asked the senate finance committee to include a provision in the new income tax revision bill to permit farmers a deduction for the installation of this pipe as a current farm operating expense.

"The wise use and conservation of irrigation water is of supreme importance in the drouth areas of our Country," Senator Daniel told the committee. "Such a provision would assist materially in the conservation of this valuable resource."

Under present law, expenditures made by farmers to improve their land are required to be capitalized rather than deducted as a current expense. As passed by the House of Representatives, the new bill would allow the farmer to deduct the cost of soil and water conservation improvements as a current expense, up to a maximum of 25 percent of the

gross income derived from farming in any one year.

Senator Daniel's proposal would extend this provision to include the installation of underground irrigation pipe, which is now specifically excluded from the bill.

WACO—Baylor University has conferred degrees on 83 students who completed academic requirements for graduation at the close of the winter quarter, President W. R. White announced today.

Their graduation brings to 178 the number of students already graduated during the current school year. Dr. White explained that these students have been awarded degrees, without waiting for May's commencement ceremonies, so that they might go immediately to positions for which they have been engaged in the field of their vocational choice.

Among the graduates is Hurshel Harding, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. R. Harding, Bachelor of Law.

The Easter Pageant at Lawton was beautiful and impressive. I certainly enjoyed the few hours we sat on the side of the hill.

The Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture of Friona still has Keith Brock working for the Parmer County Soil Conservation District. Keith is running lines and locating wells all over the district. Thanks again to the Friona Chamber.

The Board of Supervisors met last Monday. Joe Blair, A. L. Black, Henry Reynolds and Matt Jesko were present for the meeting.

The supervisors decided to arrange for a sparring meter to measure the output of irrigation wells. With the meter and the draw down gauge that belongs to the Water District, anyone that wants to keep a record of his well may do so.

A year to year record of your well draw downs can tell you quite a bit about your pump and well. Of course, you probably won't need the information until the pump quits pumping water, then it will be too late to get it. A properly kept record can tell you if the well is going dry or if the bowls just need repairing. The records would take only a few minutes each year and might save you the cost of pulling a pump.

You should receive your pamphlet on water application and summer legumes soon. They have already been sent to the printers. Supervisors would like to know what you think of the pamphlet. So the next time you see one of them tell them what you think. If there is any other subject that you would like to have the supervisors print let them know about it.

Now is the time to get ready to plant your cowpeas in the grain sorghums. Your implement dealers either has or will get you an attachment for your planter that will plant the cowpeas. The seeds are available at the Castro County Grain Company, Howard Gault of Hereford and Roberts in Texico.

Plant 6 to 8 pounds of cowpeas per acre along with the regular amount of grain sorghum. Use the Brabam cowpeas with silage or bundles and the New Era or Whip-poorwill with combine grain sorghum.

LAST WEEK

The irrigation field day is now in the past. I particularly enjoyed Mr. Wood's talk discussing the things that have happened and will happen any place there is a permanent irrigated agriculture. One point he made was in reference to land leveling. He said there has never been a permanent irrigation agriculture that did not level their land. The areas where the land was not leveled was soon eroded and depleted until irrigation was impractical. Thanks to the implement dealers who had some nice displays. Raymond Euler had a string of aluminum pipe there.

Recently the supervisors sent a sample copy of their magazine "Soil and Water" to nearly all of the district cooperators. They would like for you to look over the magazine and see how you like it. They hope you will like it well enough to subscribe. Personally I like "Soil and Water" because it is a magazine devoted to conservation in Texas. Much of it is devoted to the high plains.

It looks as if the Parmer and Hub exchanges of RTA will be hooked on to the Friona telephones. It took a majority vote of the Friona subscribers. Miss Hart of the city offices said we had the needed number of yes voters.

We are still working on bench leveling. Raymond Euler, Archie McCutchan, Bill Brown, Vernon Jamison, Sam Cook and Nelson Foster are working on their leveling jobs. 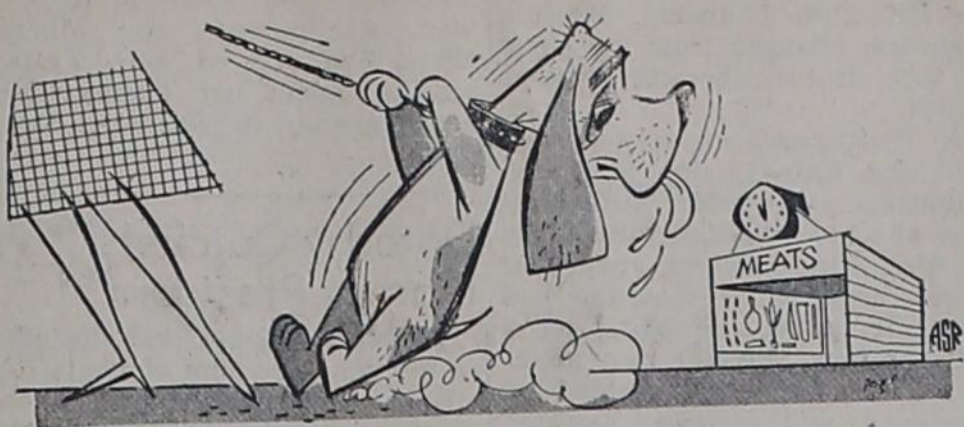

Food Sense—Not Nonsense



Let's Have No 11 o'clock Drag!

Breakfast habits of many Americans on-the-go are due for a change—a change back to better breakfasts. Too often, this first meal of the day could no longer qualify as one of the good old-fashioned "three squares a day." People who skip breakfast or eat a skimpy one are apt to drag by 11 o'clock.

These are the people who may say, "I'm not hungry early in the morning." Perhaps they may not be, but are they alert at this time or does it take a good lunch to get them into action? Those who lack an early morning appetite might start the breakfast habit by eating small portions of a balanced breakfast, stepping up the quantities gradually. The cost of mid-morning hunger has been checked in an extensive study at the University of Iowa School of Medicine. During late morning hours, college students who ate a good breakfast turned out more work, were quicker in their reactions—both mental and physical—and did not tire as easily as when they either ate no breakfast or had only unsweetened coffee.

Scientists say that those who skip over this meal or who eat a slim one, frequently fail to get enough of the needed nutrients in luncheon and dinner. For example, fresh fruits which furnish vitamins for sparkle are not always included in the last two meals of the day.

What is a good breakfast? Authorities say that breakfast should furnish from one-fourth to one-third of the daily food needs. Plenty of fatigue-chasing protein should be in the breakfast—at least one-fourth of the daily protein needs should be included if that let-down feeling is not to appear by mid-morning.

A good breakfast can follow a basic pattern—fruit, a main dish such as eggs or a breakfast meat, enriched bread or toast, and milk. All of these foods except fruit are top sources of protein; they feed out a steady supply of energy. Enriched bread supplies not only protein but the essential B-vitamins, riboflavin, niacin and thiamine. Served as French toast, bread can be the basis of a high protein dish which combines eggs, milk and bread.

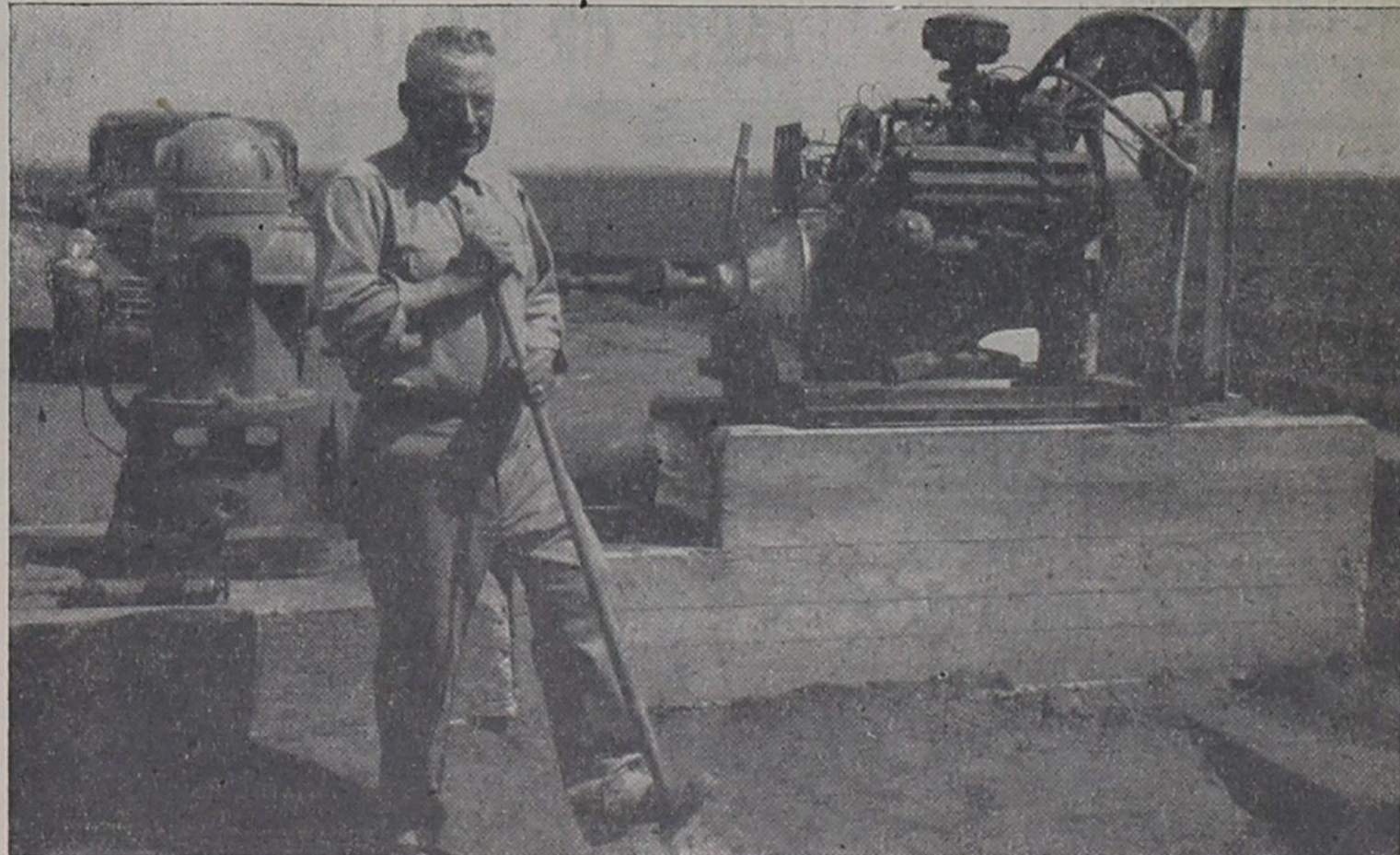

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Austin—George T. Hinson, member of the Texas House of Representatives from Mineola, already has filed as a candidate for Lt. Governor on the Democratic ticket.

He was co-author of bills for teachers' and state workers' pay raises and the state building program.

Two members of the Texas House of Representatives have resigned since the special session of the legislature ended April 13.

They are Gabe Garrett, newspaperman from Corpus Christi, and Richard S. Stark of Gainesville.

Stark gave no reason for his retirement.

Garrett resigned to run for Con-

gress.

Texas' friendliness no longer extends to Communists. The big friendly state now has the only law in the nation, including the Federal Government, which outlaws the Communist party and its members and make belonging to the Communist Party a crime punishable by a 20-year maximum prison sentence.

The law became effective immediately upon the Governor's signing it last Thursday.

With the signing of bills by the Governor, the 1954 special legislative session is rapidly becoming history.

Complete victory for the Governor's program was the net re-

sult of the called session. He got everything he asked for. That included: pay raises for teachers and state employees, appropriations for state building, and the anti-communist law.

To finance the new spending, the legislature passed tax measures, as recommended by the Governor, on corporations, franchises, beer and natural gas.

Perhaps the biggest news in Texas was the rain.

From its Austin office, the US Department of Agriculture announced that precipitation over much of the state, including drought-ridden West Texas, brightened the prospects for farmers and ranchers this year.

Everywhere, the situation was described as improved, but more moisture was needed to insure agriculture success during the coming season.

While the rains helped, the Texas drought was not completely broken.

Governor Shivers said he would ask for more Federal aid for dry West Texas counties.

As usual, Texas weather went to extremes.

In the lower Rio Grande Valley, there was too much rain. Flood situations existed for a time in Alamo, McAllen, San Juan, Donna, Edinburg, and Elsa.

Turbulent weather conditions brought a tornado warning to Central Texas, reminding of the Waco disaster last year, when on May 11 a twister caused 114 deaths, injuries to 500, and vast property damage.

Governors from the drought stricken state of Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas will meet at the call of President Dwight D. Eisenhower for a conference in Washington on April 26.

Governor Shivers has signified his intention to be present.

The conference will precede a meeting of the commission of Intergovernmental Relations, to which Shivers belongs as a presidential appointee, and a conference of governors on economic and defense matters.

Government support and cutting the cost of milk and dairy production are not the answers to steadily dropping market prices. So says Sam E. Von Rosenberg of Austin. He is state manager of the American Dairy Association of Texas.

Von Rosenberg contends that greater marketing and selling activities are the only solutions to the precarious position of the dairy industry.

To that end, dairy farmers of Texas are setting aside two cents for each 100 pounds of milk and

one-half cent for each pound of butterfat for cream, for a merchandising program to be conducted by the industry.

An important victory was won by the State of Texas in a five-year-old attempt to collect anti-trust penalties from ten major oil companies.

The third Court of Civil Appeals, here, ruled that there was sufficient cause of action to entitle the state to a trial.

Filed in 1949, the state's suit alleges that the companies conspire to fix and maintain non-competitive tank wagon prices on gasoline.

Defending companies argued that the petition should be thrown out because it did not give specific names, dates, and details of the alleged conspiracy.

Reversed by the court's decision was a ruling handed down in 1952 by District Judge Charles O. Betts, whose opinion was that the state had failed to show a cause of action.

Companies involved in the suit are: Arkansas Fuel Oil Co., Cities Service Oil Co., Continental Oil Co., Gulf Oil Corp., Humble Oil and Refining Co., Magnolia Petroleum Co., Standard Oil Co. of Texas, The Texas Co., Sinclair Refining Co., and Phillips Petroleum Co.

The group allegedly controls 90 per cent of the state's gasoline outlets.

Hugh F. Lyerly, Jr. assistant attorney general, presented the state's case on appeal and was pitted against more than a score of Texas' leading lawyers. Lyerly pleaded mainly for a chance to get the question before a jury.

Penalties totaling \$14,000,000 are sought by the state.

HAVE HOLIDAY

Students and faculty members of Texico Schools enjoyed a short holiday over the weekend, when school was dismissed Friday, in observance of Easter.

Due to paper shortage, only six or eight newspapers were published in Texas during the War Between the States.
