This grocer purchased a double page spread to announce his sale, and offered some "hot" prices plus an attendance prize to draw crowds. The Tribune reached his potential market and the result was gratifying to the merchant and us too.

Crowds came to his store in spite of a highly publicized promotion of a big supermarket in Clovis, which was at the same time staging a grand opening, complete with big prizes, lossleader prices, and what-not designed to pull in the public.

This goes to show that the small-city merchant can and should compete blow-for-blow with his bigger competitors. The local grocer does not have a spacious, expensive "super market" to lure the trade. He must depend upon three things: Personalized service to his customers, low prices, and getting the word passed around that he is offering these things and wants the business.

Personal service is something that can be given by the small city business that has no substitute. It is the "ace in the hole" of small merchants to be able to call out the first names of their the courthouse, or the Farwell customers: "Hello, John, what can I do for you," or "Good morning with his number. Mrs. Brown, can we help you

Lots of small businessmen think they can't offer low prices because they can't hope to attain the volume they need. Focey! The small-city merchant can often skin a big operator alive, especially since the fixed costs, or "overhead" of a small store is much, much lower.

Costs like labor, rent, utilities, nesses easy to locate by strangers. insurance, and depreciation grind on hour after hour at about the same rate, regardless of how much traffic is going through the store. That's why really big store owners break out in a cold sweat when business tapers off to a trickle. They lose money fast. The bigger the operation, the bigger the overhead, and the more risk involved during business slumps.

Then we come to the third thing the small merchant must depend upon: letting people know he's in business. That's our business, you know, and pardon the commercial, but we're mighty proud of the job we are doing for a lot of our advertis-


All of this does not necessarily apply to the grocery trade alone, naturally. Any of a dozen other types of businesses can be run on the same basis. We hope more of our small merchants catch on. It'll be good for everybody.

While on the subject of small businessmen, we couldn't help thinking of Clay Henson who readily admits that he has a few things to learn about the hardware business.

A customer came in recently and requested a "left-handed iron." Clay almost laughed in the customer's face. He was sure it was just a variation of the old joke about a left-handed monkey

It would be funny if it weren't so serious, because it's such a ridiculous attitude. We are speaking of the slipshod remarks of State Rep. Jack Fisk of Wharton who said recently he would propose abolition of the public schools system in Texas if the U.S. Supreme Court holds segregation unconstitutional.

A few words later, he even said he would favor secession from the United States if it became necessary to prevent invalidation of the Texas Jim Crow

Although he attempted to show that he was not out of his mind by saying, "I have never issued a more sincere statement than that if there was no way possible to keep segregation in Texas, then I would urge and fight for secession from the United States." We think that Rep. Fisk is carrying things a bit too far. It might even be accurate to say he has "gone off his rocker" a little.

What would he do without the public school system which Texas has nursed along for an even 100 years into a well organized and regimented institution? Why, he thinks the kids should be turned back to private instruction, "which would save millions of dollars". Now, who does he think he's kid-

We have yet to see a man with an average tax rating who says he could get his children educated in a private institution at or below what his school taxes run per year. As for seceeding from the U.S., that's hardly a practical philosophy any more, and we have little fear that his remarks will find much popularity among other legislators.

It's people like him who bow their necks and refuse to look for a sane solution to their problem that keep everybody in a stir nowadays. He has offered about the most unconstructive criticism we have ever heard.

A-No. Pension rates for nonservice-connected total disabilities are not affected in any way by the number of dependents you may have. The rate is \$63 a month with or without dependents, increased to \$75 when you reach age 65 or when you have been on the rolls for 10 years.

A little more than half of the natural gas produced in Texas leaves the state with a very small tax on it. Some other states derive more tax revenue from Texas natural gas than does Texas.

Three years ago the Texas Farm Bureau was primarily responsible for the passage of the gathering tax on natural gas. This tax bill, which placed a tax on natural gas going into interstate commerce, was recently declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court.





No permits will be issued between regular meetings except when crops would otherwise be jeapordized.

Holders of temporary or special permits must come in for completion of permits.

INFORMATION REQUIRED:

Measurements must be accurate within 10 yards; EXACT when minimum spacing (400 yds.) is used.

Land description—measured distance to wells or hi-points on all ad-joining quarters—measured distance to two sides of quarter in which drilling is to be done. (Minimum spacing is 400 yards).
