Farmers To Gain Irrigation Facts Friday at Hub

Irrigation field day will begin at 1:30 tomorrow (Friday) afternoon at the James Mabry farm at the Hub, and farmers are urged to be on hand to gain information on latest irrigation practices. The day is sponsored by the Soil Conservation District and the Extension Service.

At 1:30, "Land Preparation for the Most Efficient Use of Land and Water" will be discussed by Ivin Woods of United States Department of Agriculture, Woods, who is from Logan, Utah, is an irrigation engineer and has studied the subject for about 40 years. He has been in most of the irrigated sections of the world.

Bob Thurmond, irrigation engineer out of Lubbock, will measure the output and drawdown of a well and tell farmers how facts can be useful in a farming program, at 2:30 in the afternoon.

At 3 p. m., Woods will again be featured, when he tells how the feel method can be used to determine moisture content of the soil and will give pointers on determining penetration depths.

Jim Terrell, engineer of the SCS of Friona, has run penetration tests on soil and a discussion will be made on the rate the soil takes the water and the water pattern the farmer is getting.

Farmers will also observe displays of farm equipment new to this area that will be on display by the implement dealers of the county.

Levins New Mayor For Town of Texico

Walter Freeman, city clerk of Texico, reports that 116 ballots were cast in the Texico city election Tuesday, when the townspeople went to the polls to elect their city officials.

Ira S. (Scotty) Levins was named mayor with 81 votes over C. H. (Hugh) Tucker, who received 31 votes. Mayor M. C. Roberts did not enter the race this year.

Four councilmen were elected from seven men whose names were on the ballot, with one written in vote cast. To serve are Joe Helton, 88 votes; J. E. Stone, 88; Russell Johnson, 80; and Les Means, 80. Other candidates and number of votes received by each were: H. P. Winkles, 38; W. L. Roberts, 35; Wayne Burford, 33; and Grayson Roberts, 1.

Walter Freeman, incumbent, for city clerk, received 99 votes, and Mary Jones received two write-in votes.

Sam N. Lewis, police magistrate, received 91 votes.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

General Public Coming To Realize Value of Local Fire Departments

You never miss the water 'til the well runs dry, goes the old saying, and so it is with the volunteer fire department in communities which The Tribune serves. An average small-town citizen seldom realizes the value to his community that his local fire fighting organization can be until he—or his neighbor—has a bad fire.

Most of us have a "let George do it" attitude about the home fire department, and seldom pay any attention or give any credit to the fire boys who give freely of their time and effort to meet and train regularly, to say nothing of the interruptions they suffer to their businesses whenever the alarm goes out for a fire.

Yet we have little restraint in calling out the trucks whenever we have what is, or appears to be, a fire on our hands that we cannot control. That, of course, is when the department SHOULD be summoned.

However, the time to appreciate and assist our volunteer smoke eaters is not after we have experienced a bad fire. Those of us who think we have little time to devote to such activity as participating in such an organization should seriously reconsider our schedules, and offer our time and service to the departments.

Very few small city fire departments, which depend entirely on volunteer members, operate with a full staff. Most of them are undersupplied with help. This should not be. There are few groups in any community that can claim the importance of the small town volunteer fire department.

Whoopie—It's Election Time in Texico Again!

Citizens of Texico should not be held responsible for their conduct about this time of year, because they're having an election! And when Texico has an election, you can figure on a lot of sparks flying, regardless of who is running for what.

How come all this interest in local offices when there is no salary involved? What is it that spurs the citizenry to passionate oratory and heated debate over their candidates? We wish we knew. Every small city in the country should be envious of Texico's elections, because all too often a local election is just another day on the calendar, when some lakadassical, "people's choice" candidate is shooed into office without a stitch of opposition.

Matter of fact, the office of mayor is usually handed out on a silver platter to whoever is of a notion to take it. Lots of times very few are, too, because of the real work involved. And holders of public office always draw more criticism than compliments. Just ask them.

However, it's something altogether different in Texico. The Tribune had every intention of seeking out candidates for mayor and committeemen this year, and publishing their respective platforms. Why didn't we? Simply because nobody filed for office until the very last minute last weekend. Political strategem was held in deepest secrecy until the last possible moment. The dead-

line was Friday. On the day previous, not a name had been entered. On Friday there were a raft of candidates, all vigorously calling out the vote.

You may remember the election of 1952. M. C. Roberts was elected to succeed Orval Francis as mayor. Joe Helton was a new councilman. But the election was questioned, with the assertion being made that about 60 of the 167 voters were not properly qualified. Things drifted around in the courts for a few weeks, with the result that the election was declared invalidated. You might just have well have had no election for 1952. However, the two elected were supposed to fill their office in a "temporary" capacity until this year, when an entire slate would be up. That meant that a mayor and all four councilmen, in addition to clerk and police magistrate, were voted on this week.

As this is being written, the result of the election have not been tabulated, but one thing is sure, and that is that the election is as lively as any they've ever had.

One councilman, up for re-election, has objected to his name being used in advertising by a group who had submitted three new candidates for the office of councilmen. Word was out that Hugh Tucker, whose name had been filed as an opponent of Scotty Levins, had declared himself not a candidate.

Across the street, however, could be heard the report that Hugh "most certainly" was in the race, even if he didn't know it himself. Rumors and counter-rumors were plentiful, right down to the time for the voting to start Tuesday.

The outcome of this, we hope, will appear on the front page. Our editorial comment here is for no other purpose than to underscore the enthusiasm the citizens have for a city election. We think it's healthy, as it certainly generates interest in local government. Lots of people act like they get good and mad along about election time, but we have the suspicion that they are really just enjoying a little fun. It must be a great sport.

Austin—A record-making special session of the Legislature was rapidly winding up business this week with various types of knots tied on the governor's "package program" deadline for April 13.

Teachers seemed assured of their long-sought pay raise of approximately \$400 per year, state employees were due to get about \$120 more, a \$10 million building program for four state institutions was slated, and communists faced darker days.

Governor Allan Shivers had called the two pay issues the main unfinished business of his administration.

His floor leader in the House, Representative Joe Kilgore of McAllen, had obtained a smashing 110 to 34 victory for a \$26 million-plus tax plan to pay the salary increases.

An increase in the production tax on natural gas for \$14 million will be the largest part of the load. A higher franchise tax on corporations is expected to yield about \$9 million, and an additional levy on beer another \$3 million. Included in the bill was an amendment taxing trading stamps estimated to raise \$4 million.

It had been expected that the Senate would approve the tax

plan without much debate since that body had already voted for the items calling for more taxes as desired by Shivers.

Speaker Reuben Senterfitt, who opposes new taxes and has differed with Governor Shivers on the best way to raise teacher pay, voted against the Kilgore tax proposal. But he helped to suspend the rules for quick final passage of the bill.

Kilgore commended the "pre-

siding officer's fair and impartial manner."

A new gas gathering levy, instead of the production tax, was before the Senate after House passage as a substitute for the law declared unconstitutional by the US Supreme Court.

Due to the uncertainty of the proposal in court actions, Representative George T. Hinson offered a token tax bill aimed at pipeline companies in order to test the

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legality of such a law.
If courts held the tax to be valid, the rate could be boosted to replace the production on producers and royalty owners.

For all of the grimness with which the Legislature tackled the problems posed by the State Industrial Commission and submitted by Gov. Shivers, there were comic sidelights.

A resolution by Rep. Jack Fisk of Wharton proposing to invite Sen. Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin to speak before the House on communism provoked an uproar.

Rep. C. E. Hughes of Sherman suggested that McCarthy be asked to speak on "political influence in the Army" rather than "communism", and Rep. R. W. Baker of Houston said, "Let's lay McCarthy on the table, subject to call of the Army."

University of Texas students were agitated by the invitation to Sen. McCarthy to deliver a San Jacinto Day speech in Houston on April 21.

More than a thousand students met and started petitions of protest against the invitation to McCarthy "to speak at the official state shrine in a formal commemoration of the death of Texans for Texas freedom."

Political smoke continued to make undistinguishable the figures who will line up in the gubernatorial sweepstakes this summer.

There was one clearly distinguishable figure, and he departing from the lineup. John C. White, 29-year-old commissioner of agriculture, declared he would not be a candidate for governor and would run again for the job he wrested from veteran J. E. McDonald four years ago.

Governor Shivers, Speaker Senterfitt, and Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey devoted their several attentions to legislative matters and said nothing.

Ralph W. Yarborough, Austin attorney, who ran against Shivers two years ago, has stepped up his speaking program. His case strengthened with White's announcement as both men were strong "Loyal Democrats."

Clyde B. Kennelly, assistant attorney general, resigned April 1 to devote full time to his campaign for congressman in the 9th District. He is opening headquarters in his home town of Rosenberg.

J. C. Morrison was chosen president of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative board of directors at a directors meeting Saturday afternoon moving up from the post of secretary-treasurer.

The directors met immediately after adjournment of the first annual meeting of the coop, during which seven directors were chosen.

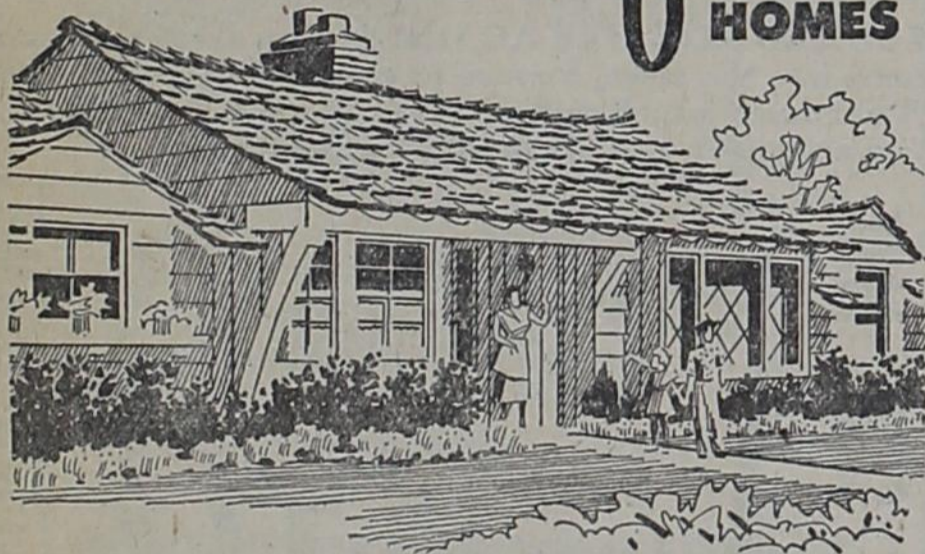

Discussions Given Problems of Age

Austin—Some folks are old at sixty while others are mentally and physically alert at eighty. The number of years one has lived may not be the true index to ones physical condition. Actually, the length of a person's life span is influenced by the condition of his arteries. "Premature hardening of the arteries, often due to avoidable infections, improper diet and possibly worry and strain is to a certain extent preventable," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Many of the problems connected with the hygiene of old age are due to lowered mental power. Therefore, a cheerful and optimistic attitude toward the aged, especially during sickness, is essential to their well being.

Old people regard their condition as far less serious when they can be fully dressed and out of bed. When they can be up, the excretory organs function more satisfactorily. However, when an overtired, or otherwise not physically fit, elderly person complain of being tired, a day of rest in bed is advisable. By providing light and easily digested food and applying warmth to the body of an aged patient, he is often tided over a mild threatened illness.

Special attention should also be paid to proper clothing, diet and exercise of the elderly. With reasonable attention to certain well defined and easily followed principles of personal hygiene, it is possible to grow old gracefully. Further more it is also possible, in many instances, to retain ones faculties to such an extent as to make old age a pleasure rather than a burden.

New Tax Saving Passed to Telephone Users, Says Manager

The reduction in excise tax rates enacted by the Congress and approved by President Eisenhower will affect every telephone user in Clovis, according to W. H. Strickfaden, local manager of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company. Pointing out that all bills dated April 1 and thereafter will reflect the tax reduction, Mr. Strickfaden emphasized that all savings from the reduction go directly to the telephone user. For example, a customer paying \$4 for this regular service and using \$2 per month in long distance service has been paying \$1.10 monthly excise taxes. Under the new excise tax rates, he saves 50 cents a month or \$6 per year. Other rates are affected proportionately, Mr. Strickfaden said.

Farmers Can Get Cotton Measured

Parmer County cotton growers can arrange for official measurements of their 1954 cotton-acreage allotments prior to planting time, the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee announced this week.

To get the premeasurement service, which is being provided on a cost basis, a cotton farmer must file a written request with the county ASC office prior to Wednesday, April 21, says Joe Camp, committee chairman. The rate to be charged for the service in Parmer County has been established at \$5.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each plot over one, and payment based on this rate must be made at the time the request for measurement is filed.

"The premeasurement is purely optional," says Camp, "and is offered as a service to growers who prefer to have an official measurement to use as a planting guide." The chairman explains that all cotton acreage in the county will be measured as soon as possible after the cotton "comes up" to determine compliance with the acreage allotment-marketing quota program. When compliance is checked, the farm will be considered to be within the farm acreage allotment if the crop is planted within the premeasured area.

Now we have the recipe for you. Mary gave only one small bit of advice about this quickie recipe. She says, "don't double the recipe, but make two batches if twice as much is desired. I tried doubling it once and it is too much to handle, so I ended up with a mess."

Orange Jelly (with frozen juice)

3 1/4 cups (1 lb., 6 oz.) sugar 1 cup water 1/2 bottle Certo 2 tablespoons lemon juice 3-4 cup (6-oz. can) quick-frozen concentrated orange juice.

Measure sugar and water into a large saucepan and mix well. Place over low heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard one minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, stir in Certo at once. Add fruit juices, mix well. Skim, then pour quickly into glasses. Cover with paraffin. Makes about 5 glasses.

New Phone Lines Likely for Parmer

New rural telephone extensions are in the offing for Parmer County, according to Leo Forrest, manager of the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, which handles the paper-work and details of the phone cooperative.

On Monday of this week, Forrest reported that the board representing the phone group had okayed the proposal offered by the REA on the recent loan approved in Washington. He went on to say that he expected money from the loan to be released to the cooperative "within thirty days".

In the meantime, applications for more phones on the rural lines are being taken at the Hereford office. Individuals who live not over 1/2 mile from the existing lines will get quick service in securing phones for their homes, the manager explained, while longer extension will, of necessity, take more time.

And speaking of homes, it appeared this week that the proposal offered the Friona territory by General Telephone Company regarding charges for extended service will be approved. A post-card ballot survey has been conducted by the company recently, and although a total of only 208 cards had been received locally, the "ayes" had a 117-91 majority. A total of 374 cards were mailed to subscribers.

Here in Friona, Mayor Charles Allen pointed out that with the cutting of the Federal tax on telephone service, the increased cost for extended coverage (taking in rural phones) would actually be negligible. Quoting figures, the residential party-line subscriber will receive extended service for \$4.35, as compared to about \$4.56 prior to the tax cut, where one-party business phones can get out for \$8.25, compared to \$9.38.

Natural Gas Lines Soon Will Operate

One Parmer County gas line extension which will distribute natural gas to farmers for use in irrigation well motors has already been activated, and the second extension, running south of Friona, is due to be "gassed" this week, according to W. H. Deardorf, manager of Pioneer Gas Co., with office in Hereford. In a conversation on Monday, Deardorf said that gas has been diverted from the main line into the extension going some twenty miles north and west of Black. He went on to add that the twenty-mile extension south and east of Friona is expected to be completed and ready to receive gas this week.

Asked as to an estimate on the number of well motors in the immediate territory which would go on natural gas, Deardorf replied that it "could only be a rough estimate," but the figure is expected to vary upward from 300 to a maximum of 600 well motors.

Friona leads at the present report with a grand total of \$440 in the city, but Lakeview, per capita, has the best showing. In this small community, a total of \$105 has been subscribed to the Red Cross. Black has reported \$88, and Lazbuddie \$65.50.

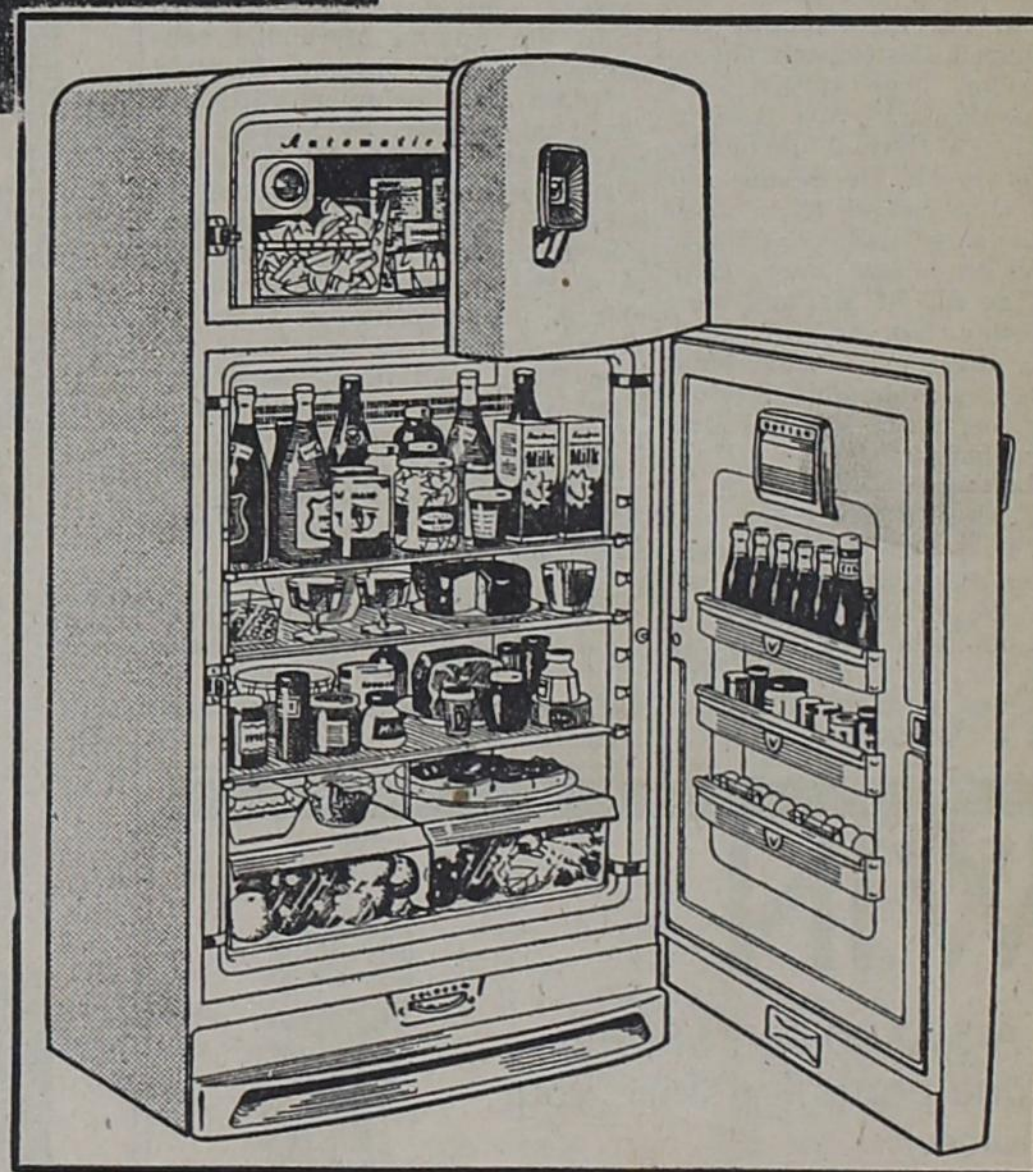

Keepin' Up

What do you expect when you enter a hospital as a patient? The typical answer would be "I expect to get well." That would be very true, but to think back just a few years, you realize that what people really think is that every time they enter a hospital as a patient they expect a miracle to happen.

It is a miracle compared to a few short years in the past, but the more miraculous the cure, the more people come to expect. Here in Parmer County we are very fortunate in having the services of an outstanding medical staff. Many smaller hospitals have trouble finding doctors who are in sympathy with small town ways. They just don't understand the people they are to deal with in a business and social way, let alone professionally. Besides being versed in this manner, due to having been raised in similar surroundings, your medical staff in Parmer County is tops in quality and would be able to practice in any recognized hospital. They are doing the people a service in a building that is as outdated as medicine is advanced. It is usable and that is all.

We believe the people of Parmer County deserve better. How can it be obtained? Only in one way, through the people wanting it. They are going to get it because when a group of West Texans take after a project and get behind it in force, it is going to work.
